PROTECT BIRDS BY VACCINATING

Most poultry raisers who live in areas in which either fowl pox or infectious laryngotracheitis is a problem will probably want to vaccinate their growing birds sometime during the next month. It is a wise practice to vaccinate for a flock can be made 100 per cent immune to the two diseases

if the job is done right. Egg Production Falls

Pox and laryngo usually show up in chickens when they are just starting to lay or when they have reached marketable age. Both diseases cause heavy losses in egg production, and laryngotracheitis may even cause rather extensive mortality. Each is caused by a microscopic organism known as a virus and is highly contagious. It is best to vaccinate when birds are between 6 and 12 weeks old. If vaccinating is delayed until egg production starts, the vaccination itself may induce some drop in production.

Fowl pox is easily recognizable disease. The first symptoms of pox are small white or grayish pimples on the comb, wattles, or mouth. These pimples soon become large, wrinkled, yellow scabs, ultimately turning dark brown or black. Pox also occurs in another form, known as "wet" pox, in which whitish-yellow cankers form in the mouth and throat and on the tongue. Gasp-

Laryngo Symptoms

Common symptoms of fowl laryngotracheitis include violent gasping and choking. The birds' necks are outstretched and cawing sounds are emitted. Occasion-

ally, cheesy plugs form in a birds throat and become large enough to cause suffocation.

With both diseases, it is advisable to check the birds at the proper period after vaccination to see that they have properly. If no reaction is visible on a bird, it should be re-vaccinated.

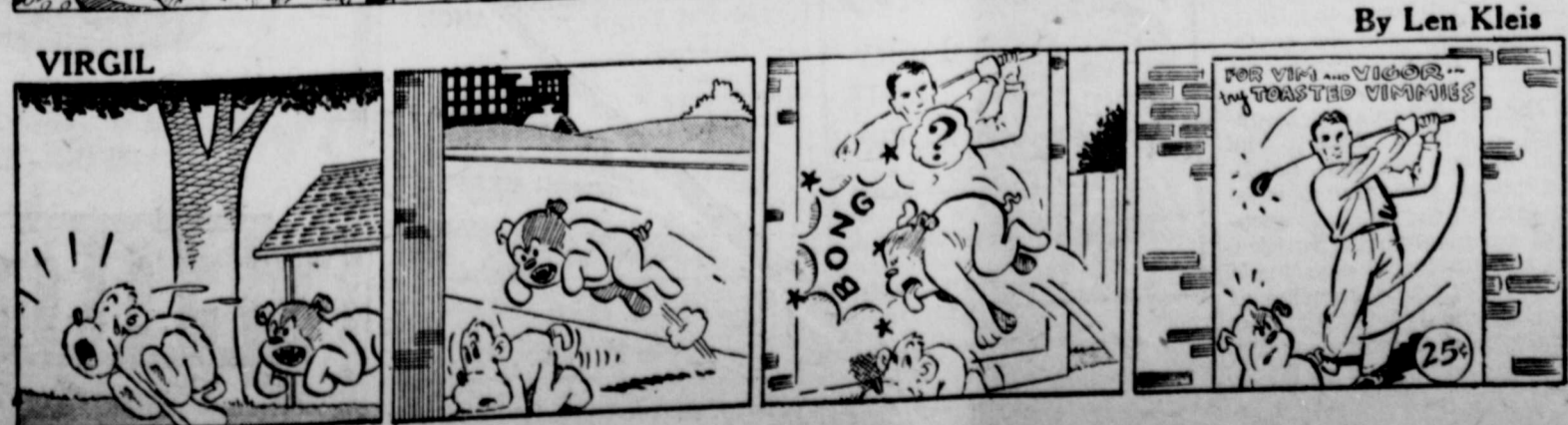

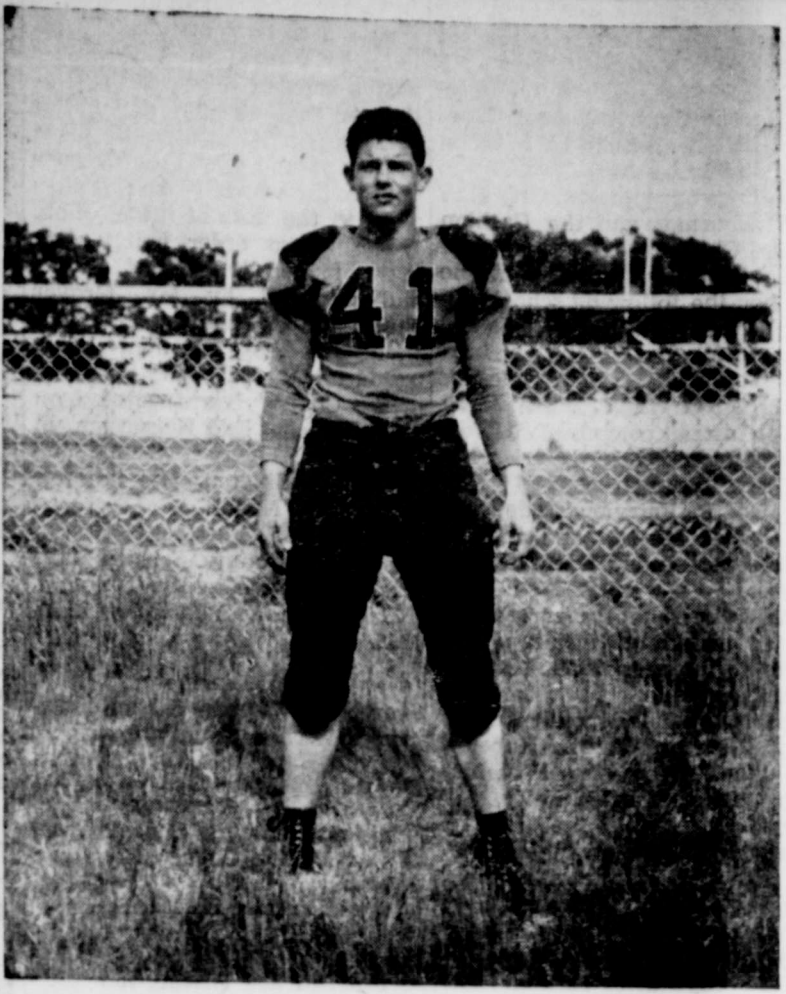

RURAL HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT ANNEXATION ELECTION ORDER
THE STATE OF TEXAS,
COUNTY OF WICHITA,
COUNTY BOARD OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES:

On this the 19th day of May 1948, the County School Trustees of Wichita County, convened in session with the following members present: H. J. Flusche, F. A. Foster, Edd Heiserman, Grover Bullington, Henry Prinzing, and among other proceedings held by said County School Trustees was the following:

There came on to be considered the matter whether Cashion Common School District No. 21 should be annexed to Burkburnett Independent School District consisting of Everett Common School District No. 22, Clara Common School District No. 9, Fairview Independent School District and the old Burkburnett Independent School District under the provision of Articles 2922a and 2922c, Revised Civil Statutes, as amended (Articles 2922a, 2922c, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes); and

WHEREAS it is determined that each of said school districts was validly formed and is now a legally existing school district; that such school districts are contiguous to one another and that all may be included in a common boundary line; and

WHEREAS, it is determined that Burkburnett Independent School District has a scholastic population of "two hundred and fifty" or more; and

WHEREAS, (1) the proposed district will contain a greater area than one hundred square miles and that, therefore, before said annexation can be made, an election must be held under the provisions of (Articles 2922a, 2922c, Revised Civil Statutes, as amended (Articles 2922a, 2922c,

Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes) in which election a majority of the electors residing in the proposed district must vote in favor of such annexation;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED By the County School Trustees that an election be held on the 11th day of June 1948, at the following voting places: City Hall in Burkburnett and the Cashion Baptist Church near the Cashion School Building site to determine whether the following school district Cashion Common School District No. 21 shall be annexed to the Burkburnett Independent School District composed of Everett Common School District No. 22, Clara Common School District No. 9, Fairview Independent School District and the old Burkburnett Independent School District.

The following persons are appointed presiding officers and clerks at the respective election place indicated:

Burkburnett Independent School District, W. A. Roberts, Presiding Officer; Miss Bess McGinnis, Mrs. Frances Felty, Clerks.
Cashion Common School District No. 21, Arthur Ramming, Presiding Officer; B. Bryant, Sam Spencer, Clerks.

The presiding officer shall within 5 days after said election has been held make due return thereof to the County School Trustees of this County.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and County and who are resident qualified voters of said school districts shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all voters who favor the annexation of the aforementioned school districts shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"For Annexation"

And those opposed to such consolidation shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"Against Annexation."

The Secretary of the County School Trustees shall forthwith post a copy of this order as Notice of said election and notice shall be posted at a public place in each of said school districts for not less than twenty-one full days prior to the date of the election.

The above order being read, it was moved by Mr. F. A. Foster and seconded by Mr. Grover Bullington that the same do pass, thereupon the question being called for, the following members of the County Board voted Aye: H. J. Flusche, Edd Heiserman, F. A. Foster, Henry Prinzing and Grover Bullington, and the following No: None.

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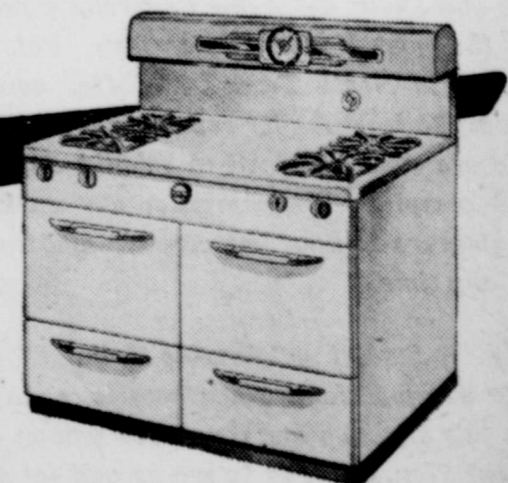
