

## Harvest Delayed By Heavy Rains Monday Morning



Wheat harvest is again in full swing after a heavy rain Monday morning. Early last week rains stopped combines until Saturday and Sunday when the high and sandy land dried out enough to support the heavy machines. The Monday rain was not wide spread enough to stop combines any longer than Tuesday when Oklahoma fields were dry enough for entering. By Wednesday morning many farms around Burkburnett had a number of combines at work. Today, most every field that is ripe enough is fairly dry. Some of the low places are still boggy.

To date 110,000 bushels of wheat have been brought into three Burkburnett elevators. If no more rain falls by another week most of the grain in this area will be harvested. Some late grain will not be ready to harvest for another two weeks.

So far all wheat coming in has been moved out of the elevators as fast as it arrived. Railroad cars have not been scarce and a large number of trucks are making daily trips to Fort Worth keeping the grain from stacking up in the elevators.

The best yield per acre reported is 50.1 bushels per acre. A few farms have averaged 40 bushels per acre. The average for the area will be something above 20 bushels if the present yield holds up.

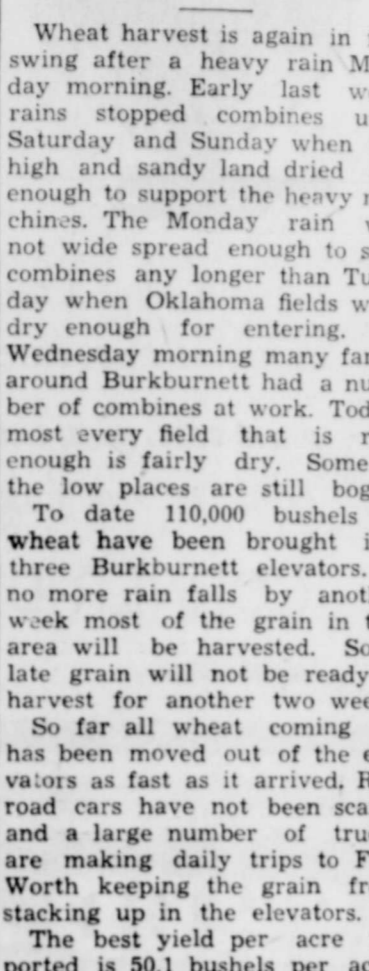
There is no shortage of combines or trucks. A few machines have already moved out, going to the Panhandle to await the harvest of a bumper crop in some areas.

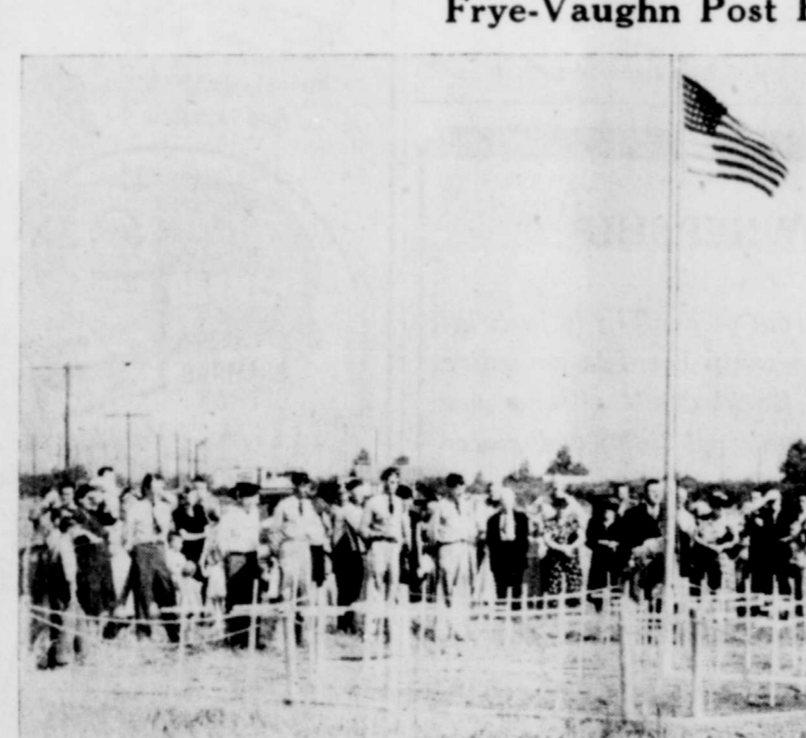
Next Thursday noon Chamber of Commerce directors and other members of the organization will meet at Town Hall at 12 noon for the regular monthly luncheon and business meeting.

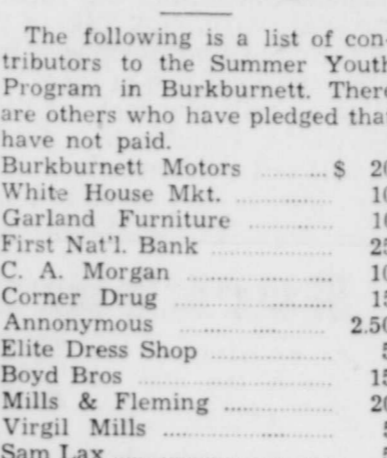

## Conservation Tour Showed Results Of Good Farming

Last Friday afternoon approximately 75 farmers and business men made the tour of farms under the Soil Conservation program in the North Burk District.

Those making the tour who had not seen the results of conservation previously were amazed. On some land that only a few years ago seemed worthless for farming, good crops are now growing.

First stop was on the Matt Riley farm north of town. On land that was once oil fields and very poor, rank growth of yellow bloom clover was noted. It makes fair hay and is a wonderful soil builder.

On the Van Lesley farm tended by Norb Zimmerman a good example of soil building was in evidence. Before starting the soil conservation program two years ago much of the land was practically devoid of top soil. Erosion had carried it away. Mr. Zimmerman planted a Hairy Vetch which adds nitrogen to soil, taking it from the air. When the Vetch is cut, the nitrogen still remains in the ground in the form of monogules formed on roots. About \$50 worth of seed per acre may be gathered.

A stop at the Howard Henderson farm revealed a sight that was thought impossible before he started conservation practices. On a hillside a beautiful field of alfalfa was almost ready to cut the second time this year. Planting soil builders and adding 250 pounds of phosphate per acre brought the land up to its present productivity.

Many miles of terraces have been built in the past two years. The program, which was to cover a five year period in this district, is now 76 per cent complete. Twelve farms are cooperating under the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation set-up. Farms that were once non-productive are now being built up to high yields per acre.

Every farm visited brought new evidence of the benefit of the program. Some 12 farms of approximately 6,000 acres are in this group. Those who missed the tour would do well to visit any of these farms and see just what is being done.

## Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresiam)

### GIVE POULTRY A BALANCED RATION

Chickens which feed on a ration lacking one or more of the essential food elements not only produce fewer eggs but may develop a nutritional deficiency disease. Good flock health requires a bal-

anced diet which includes adequate supplies of minerals, vitamins, proteins, carbohydrates and fats.

### Commercial Feeds

A bird which consumes plenty of commercial mash is getting nearly all of the nutrients needed to meet bodily requirements. Thus it is extremely important to have enough mash available in the feeders. Grains supply ample carbohydrates and fats, but sometimes chickens may overeat at the grain hopper and as a result fail to consume enough of the other necessary food elements from other sources.

Protein deficiency causes retarded growth and feather development in chicks as well as low egg production in adult birds.

Two of the commonest deficiency diseases — rickets and slipped tendon — result from inadequate consumption of vitamins or minerals, or a combination of both.

### Check Feeding Methods

A bird with symptoms of a deficiency disease may have reached this condition in one of several ways. Incorrect feeding methods often discourage or prevent birds from getting the food they need. Birds heavily infected with

internal parasites do not utilize feed efficiently, and often fail to eat enough. A crowded poultry house may cause poor feeding for some chickens.

To avoid these diseases, you should feed your birds carefully and watch closely the rate of consumption. When appetites lag,

use any of the recognized methods for improving appetites and encouraging full feeding. Provide plenty of feeder space. Keep the birds free of worms by practicing

good sanitation. Give plenty of mash or other feed that every required element is in the ration receives.

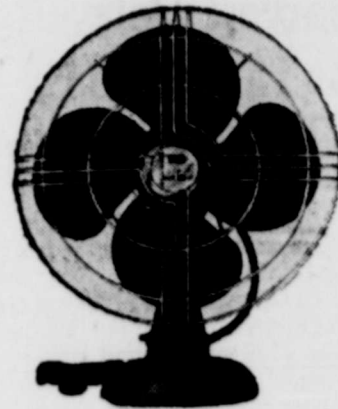

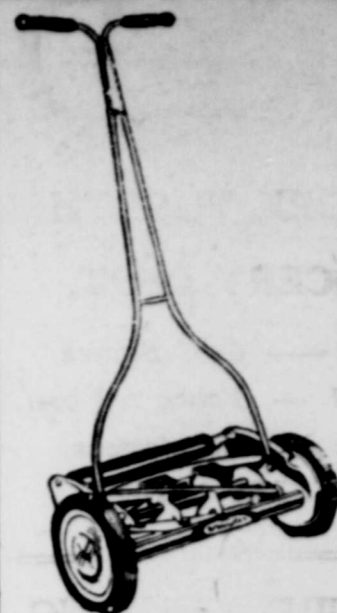

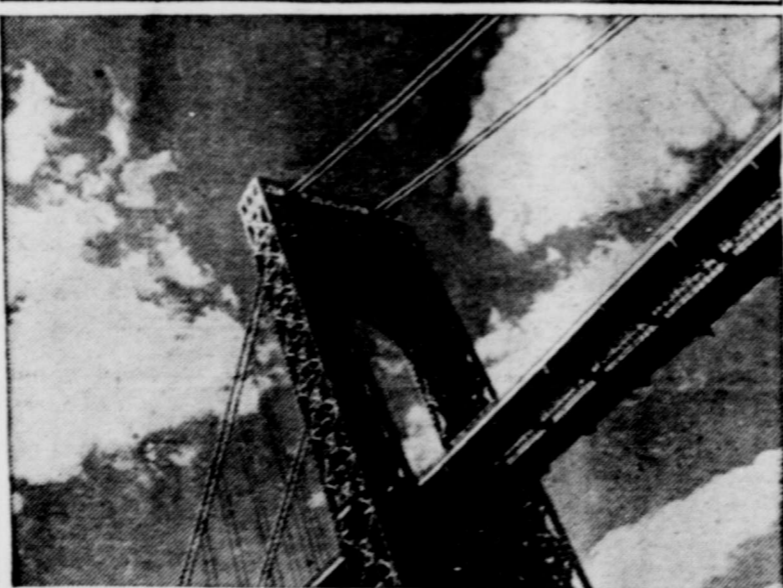

**Around The Town**

ONE of the more attractive snapshot collections which I've seen of late is an album one of my friends has been assembling. It's a picture of his city. More than a hundred snapshots, all told, of a typical American city—its business district, its public buildings, its quiet residential streets, its parks, its bridges, its waterfront.  
All in all, it's a striking job. And one, my friend says, which he's had a world of fun in doing. "I should think more people would try the same stunt," he told me. "There are hundreds of striking pictures in every town or city."  
In making the album my friend has had no overall, elaborate plan. "I merely set out," he explained, "to get a good collection of pictures. Generally carrying my camera with me, I shot as the opportunity came."  
Some of his shots, however, speak a quick eye for picture subjects. There is, for example, a striking scene of the main business section crowded with people in the pre-Christmas rush of last minute shopping. To go with this snap is a second picture, taken from exactly the same angle, but this time made

early Sunday morning. The streets are deserted.  
Other shots in his collection show the city's library by day and by night, an amusement park running full tilt in summer and all boarded up in winter, a beautiful bridge and the run-down area which lies beneath the bridge approach, the city as it appears when pictured from the highest building in town.  
He's also caught the feeling of change in the city with pictures of buildings under construction and others of structures being razed. He's captured the sense of the city's authority in a shot of a lordly policeman halting the hurrying lanes of traffic. And of the city's lawlessness in a dramatic picture of a deserted home, its windows broken by the stones hurled by small boys.  
But it's impossible to list all his shots. And it's more important to explain his approach to his subject. For what he has tried to do is accurately to depict the face of his city in every season of the year, from almost every angle. It's a worthwhile project—worthwhile for every picture taker from Erie to El Paso.

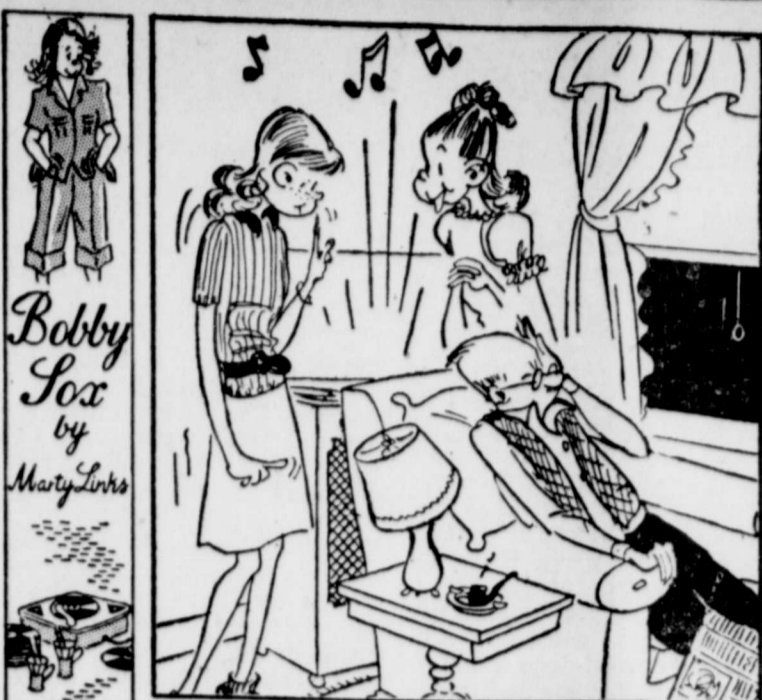

Future Prosperity of U. S. Depends on Sound Postwar Planning

Historically, America's economy had its beginnings in farms and in small towns. As more goods were produced and as farms multiplied, more towns came into being and some of them grew into large cities. The existence of the large cities does not, however, detract from the importance of rural communities. About one-fourth of our people are farmers and dependent upon the production from their land for nearly all their income. Roughly, another fourth, living in small towns and to some extent in the cities, depend on farm trade in one form or another for a livelihood. These two groups represent at least one-half our population. The importance of prosperity in rural America to the rest of the economy is indicated by the fact that approximately 70 cents of the farm dollar goes into the purchase of things which have to be manufactured. The farmer's prosperity, therefore, makes a maximum contribution toward the creation of pay-rolls and jobs. Sound postwar planning should result not only in more jobs in your community but in permanent advances for the United States. In a democracy, progressive community action is essential to social and economic progress. — From "Postwar Jobs and Growth in Small Communities," Committee for Economic Development handbook.

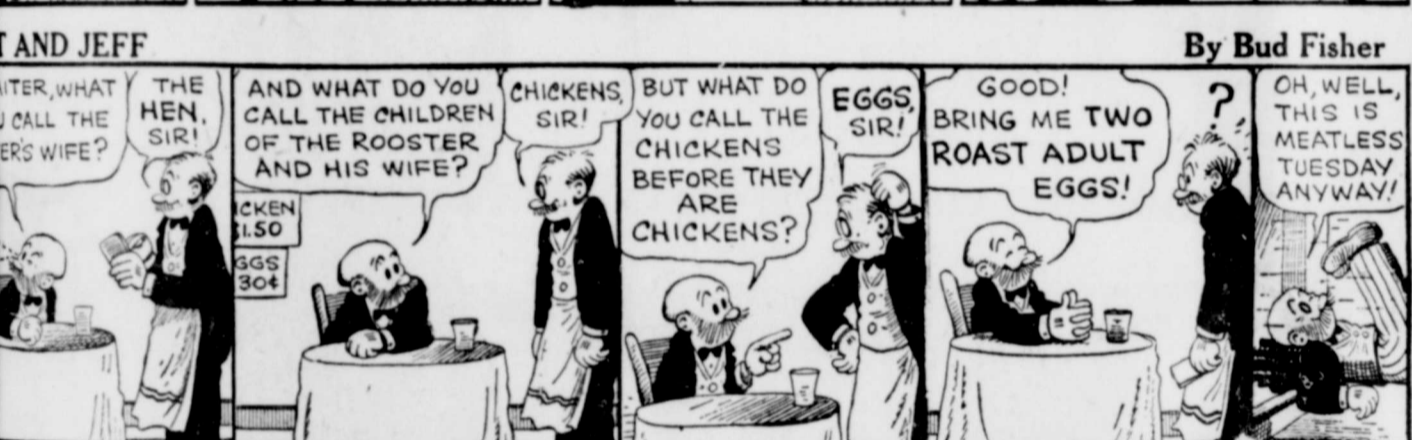

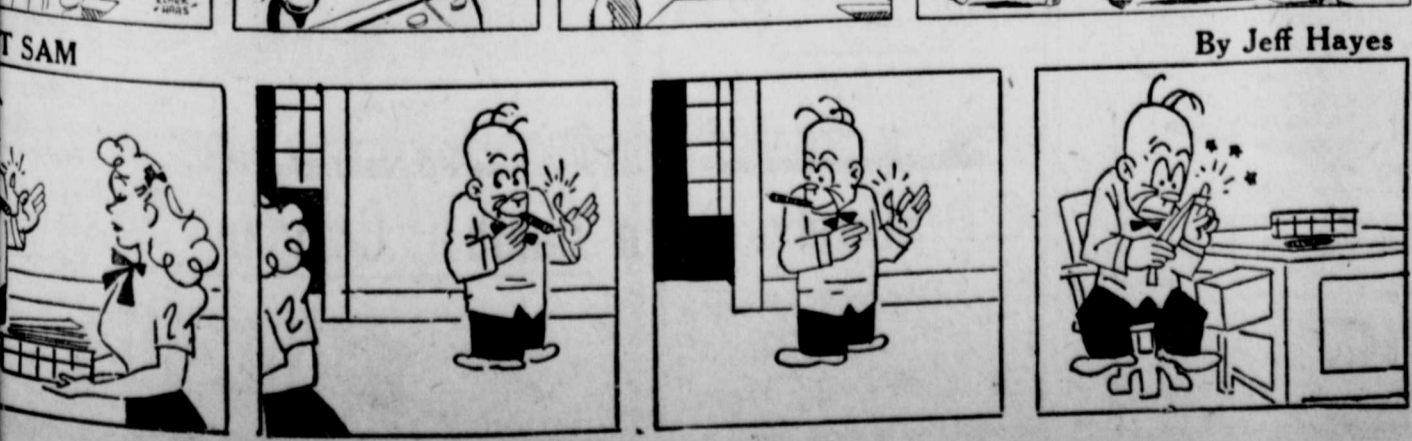

Last fall he planted a mixture of 30 pounds of rye and 15 pounds of Vetch per acre on this land. The past spring very little sand was in movement. At present Vetch and rye are better than waist high. He plans to harvest seed from this year's Vetch crop. The present crop of Vetch is from seed harvested on his farm last year. All of his conservation work has been completed, his conservation plan was approved by district supervisors of Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District two years ago.

Good growth of Vetch is now present on farms of Van Lesley, Norb Zimmerman, E. O. Mullins, M. B. Riley, Shorty Branson and Mrs. P. C. Chensult.

Howard Henderson has a fine growth of biennial yellow clover on 35 acres. Clover is an excellent soil improving crop. Mr. Henderson has 20 acres of alfalfa that has been cut for hay once and will soon be ready again. He also grew other legumes one or two years on the land planted to alfalfa to build up the nitrogen in the soil. Also before planting the alfalfa he spread phosphate fertilizer. The above soil building crops are part of crop rotation being carried out on this farm. Mr. Henderson has been a cooperator of Soil Conservation District for two years.

The conservation of soil should be the concern of everybody, whether living in the city or on the farm. The soil is the backbone of all civilization — Talk conservation.

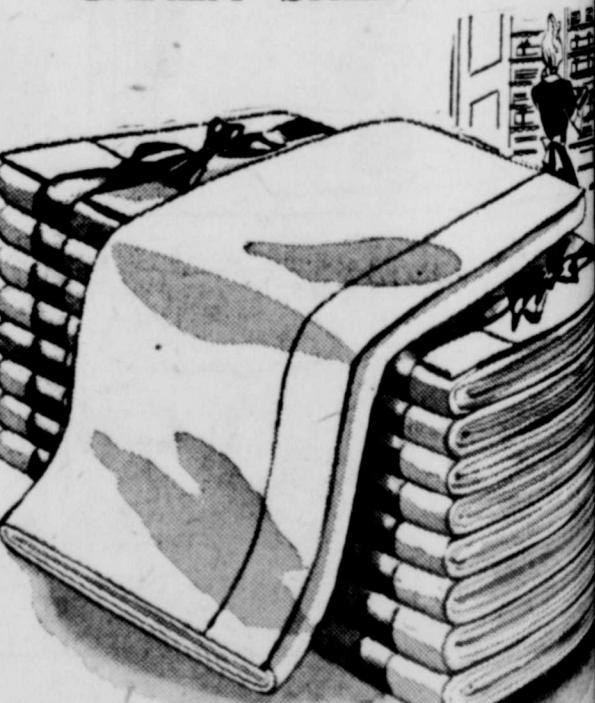

**The SNAPSHOT GUILD**



A simple, story-telling snapshot like this appeals because it pictures a situation everyone understands.

**What Makes a Picture?**

SEVERAL weeks ago one of our acquaintances tried to pin us down. "All right," he said aggressively, "What makes a good picture good? Why is it that two shots of similar subjects, both in focus and correctly exposed, may be as far apart as the poles in arousing interest?"

I confessed he had asked a puzzler. "Let's put it this way," I began. "Suppose someone's telling a story. If it's a good story you'll pay attention; if it's a poor one you won't. And even a good story can be murdered when it is poorly told. So, if the story teller hopes to keep your interest, he first must have something well worth telling. And he must tell it well.

"The same thing is true of pictures. The pictures that have the widest appeal are pictures that say something to you—shots which tell you something about the people who are in them or which convey the feeling of a place or situation.

"And secondly, these pictures must do this well. They must make

clear at a moment's glance just what they try to convey."

I showed my friend the picture used with this column. Not a great picture, I frankly admitted, yet one with plenty of appeal.

It seems to me to prove the point. It tells, at a glance, of a small boy's pleasure. In terms of a situation which anyone can easily visualize. And it does so simply. It adds up the elements of the story—firetruck, small boy, friendly fireman—quickly, without distractions.

That last is an important point. You'll notice no attempt has been made to show the whole fire truck. It could, of course, have been included, but what would it have added? Not a thing, since as long as enough of the truck is visible so that one knows it's a fire engine the story is complete in itself.

The fact is, that including the whole truck in the scene would have meant moving the camera farther back from the boy—and the boy is the key to the picture.

**FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING**

**Q. How much water do laying hens need?**

A. Laying hens should have about a quart of water for each pound of feed consumed. This is about six to seven gallons per 100 birds per day. Since the eggs a hen lays contain about 65% water, it is important that sufficient water be given to laying hens. During the winter months be sure the water given your birds is not icy, as they will not drink sufficient quantities of icy water to keep production at a high level.

**Q. What is the best way to remove horns from two-year old heifers?**

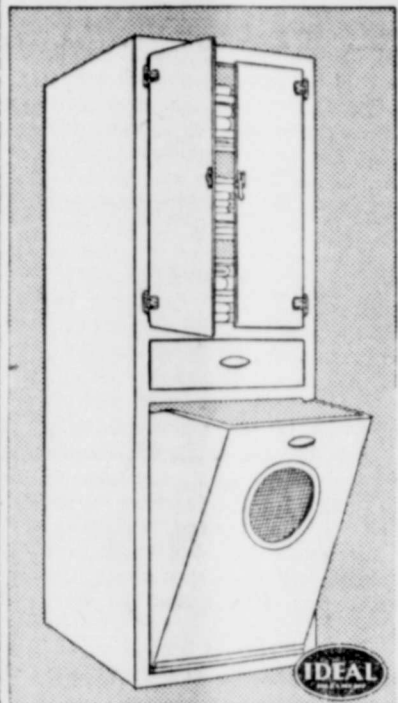
A. Actually it is better to dehorn dairy cattle when they are very young. At the Ralston Purina Company Research Farm a dehorning paste is applied to the horn buttons when calves are just a few days old. The action of the paste kills the horn, leaving the head smooth, and the whole operation is done with a minimum of pain to the animal.

With mature animals, the only successful way to dehorn is to have a qualified person cut the horns off with a set of dehorning shears. This will cause bleeding, and a heavy vaseline type of salve should be applied immediately after the horns are removed. We suggest that a qualified veterinarian be called in to do this dehorning.

**Q. Is it more profitable to market hogs at 225 pounds than at 300 or more pounds?**

A. Yes, high grain prices are forcing pork producers to sell at lighter weights than usual. Iowa State College has released figures showing that for a farmer to "break even" on hogs under present conditions a 200 lb. hog would have to sell at \$21.75 per hundred, and a 400 lb. hog at \$24.20 per hundred. Moreover, in hogs weighing less than 225 lbs there is little waste in excessively fat cuts, the meat cures out evenly, and a more palatable product is obtained.

Battle of Coral Sea Termed

First Big Defeat for Japan

In the battle of that island-studded ocean known as the Coral sea, which is near the Solomon Islands and about 1,000 miles northeast of Australia, America's first real victory of the war with Japan was scored. The action occurred on May 4, 1942, and called for deeds of valor as thrilling as any in all American history.

The Coral sea battle was the first great naval defeat ever dealt the imperial Japanese fleets. And yet this battle was fought entirely in the air, by the planes of opposing aircraft carriers.

The ships engaged in this battle never got sight of each other. They slugged it out without firing a single gun at another ship—the first engagement of its kind in history. In this first great victory for the U. S. in this global war the Japs lost more than 15 ships sunk and at least 20 others severely damaged. The action perhaps saved Australia from invasion.

However, America paid a high price for her victory in the sultry Coral sea. In this engagement the aircraft carrier, Lexington, famed ship that laid the foundation of our modern navy's aircraft carrier operations, went to the bottom. This happened on May 7.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Instead of sewing shoulder pads into dresses, attach them with small snaps. Sew top half of snap to shoulder seams, lower half on pads. Snap out at laundry or cleaning time: one pair will do for several dresses and blouses, too.

An ordinary alarm clock may be used to indicate when cakes should come out of the oven, and time other household tasks.

Custom Work on Farms

Two reasons account, in large measure, for the heavy demand for custom work with farm machinery during the past few years. In the first place, the amount of machinery available on most farms simply is not sufficient to meet the demand resulting from the shortages of labor and increased purchasing power in the hands of farmers. Secondly, numerous farms are now and always have been too small to make effective and economical utilization of many types of farm equipment. The only way the operator of a small farm can have economical access to certain types of machinery is either to hire a custom operator to do the work for him, or, if he elects to own the machines himself, to do sufficient custom work for others to provide for economical utilization of his machinery.

SCRIPTURE: Daniel 1:1-17  
DEVOTIONAL READING: Acts 5:27-31

Men Who Dared To Stand For God

Lesson for June 6, 1948

A FIERY furnace, and a lion's den. These are the tests to which Sunday's lesson will put our hero about whom we studied last Sunday, this young man Daniel. Three friends, Shadrack, Meshach and Abednego, will undergo the test of the fiery furnace, having been convinced by Daniel's example that God is trustworthy. And Daniel will spend the night in the den of lions. You will need to read chapters three through six to get the full story.

DANIEL IN THE DEN OF LIONS

THE sixth chapter must be read to have an adequate background for this study. Daniel had been chosen as the first of three presidents to rule over 120 princes who should govern the kingdom. The other two presidents and the princes could find no fault in this Hebrew, save that he believed and observed the law of his God. So, they conspired against him by persuading the king to issue a decree that no person in the kingdom was to make a petition to any God or man for 30 days, save to the king, on the penalty of being cast into the den of lions. This decree was issued by Darius, and Daniel's enemies reported to Darius that Daniel was opening his window three times a day, praying to his God. Darius was greatly troubled, but had to stand by his decree, and Daniel was cast into the den of lions. Darius spent a sleepless night, and hurried to the den at dawn to know about Daniel. Daniel replied, "O king, live for ever. My God hath sent his angel, and hath shut the lions' mouths, that they have not hurt me."

DARIUS REWARDS DANIEL

CONVINCED that Daniel's convictions had been miraculously rewarded by God, Darius ordered the other two presidents and the princes, together with their wives and children, thrown into the lions' dens. They were all destroyed by the lions.

Then Darius issued a decree to all the nations and people of all languages that dwell in all the earth. Hear this decree:

"Peace be multiplied unto you. I make a decree, that in every dominion of my kingdom men tremble and fear before the God of Daniel; for he is the living God, and steadfast forever, and his kingdom that which shall not be destroyed, and his dominion shall be even unto the end." So Daniel prospered in the reign of Darius and of Cyrus, the Persian.

COURAGE TO PUT GOD FIRST

LOOK now at the other test of faith—that of the three Hebrew children, Shadrack, Meshach and Abednego. Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, had made a golden image, 90 feet high and nine feet wide, and set it up in the plain of Dura. On a certain day, when he was going to establish his state religion, he ordered every subject to fall down and worship this image.

But Shadrack, Meshach and Abednego refused to worship the image. Nebuchadnezzar was furious when he heard of their refusal. He summoned them into his presence, and warned them of their fate if they further refused to worship his gods. They answered him frankly that they would not bow down to the image. He ordered them thrown into the fiery furnace.

They decided that death was more honorable than apostasy. The men who cast them into the furnace fell dead!

UNSEARED AND UNSINGED!

BUT THE three Hebrew children walked in the flames, unseared and unsinged! The king was astounded. The people were amazed. They had witnessed what the God of all the earth can and will do.

Then went forth the decree, "There is no other God that can deliver after this sort." Thus we have the golden text for Sunday's lesson:

"Be it known unto thee, O king, that we will not serve thy gods, nor worship the golden image which thou hast set up."

And what happened in the long ago when man dared to stand up and trust in God will happen today and every day.

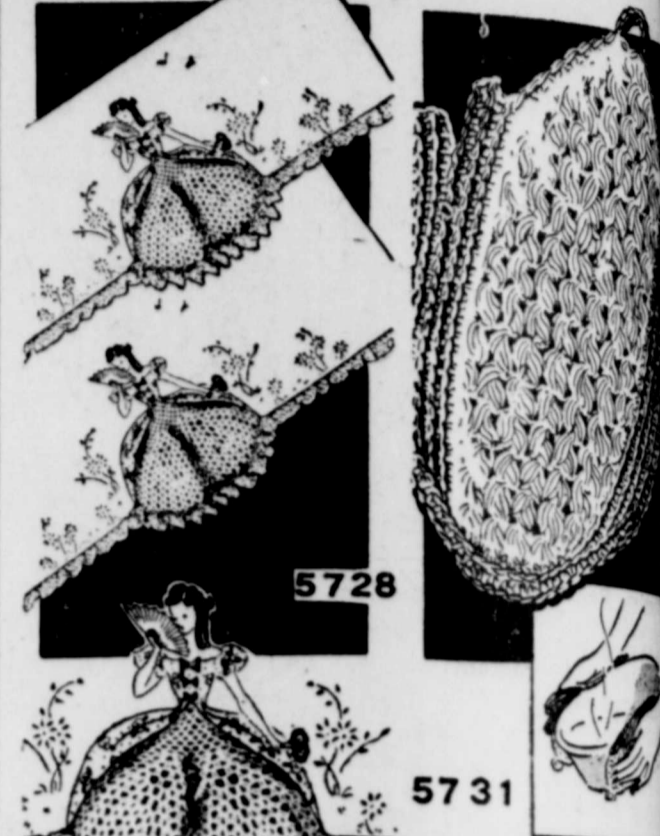

FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE

by Roger C. Whitman

QUESTION: My hot-water tank is not a year old and I have rusty water coming out of my hot-water faucets. Can you give me any suggestions on the subject?

ANSWER: One reason may be that you're heating the water too much. A temperature of 130 to 140 degrees is hot enough for domestic hot water. When water is heated more than that, sediment is stirred up that is carried along in the water supply. You could prevent overheating by installing an automatic control. Also, your water supply may contain a great deal of sediment, which could be controlled by a water filter.

QUESTION: We are planning to put up a frame cottage of five rooms next summer. Regarding cement blocks for foundation, people have cautioned me against buying blocks that are made during the winter. Is there any reason for this?

ANSWER: It is true that cement work should not be allowed to freeze during the process of manufacture or construction. Reputable cement block manufacturers do not allow this to happen, however, even during the winter.

On this the 19th day of May 1948, the County School Trustees of Wichita County, convened in session with the following members present: H. J. Flusche, F. A. Foster, Edd Heiserman, Grover Bullington, Henry Prinzing, and, among other proceedings held by said County School Trustees was the following:

There came on to be considered the matter whether Cashion Common School District No. 21 should be annexed to Burkburnett Independent School District consisting of Everett Common School District No. 22, Clara Common School District No. 9, Fairview Independent School District and the old Burkburnett Independent School District under the provision of Articles 2922a and 2922c, Revised Civil Statutes, as amended (Articles 2922a, 2922c, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes); and

WHEREAS it is determined that each of said school districts was validly formed and is now a legally existing school district; that such school districts are contiguous to one another and that all may be included in a common boundary line; and

WHEREAS, it is determined that Burkburnett Independent School District has a scholastic population of "two hundred and fifty" or more; and

WHEREAS, (1) the proposed district will contain a greater area than one hundred square miles and that, therefore, before said annexation can be made, an election must be held under the provisions of (Articles 2922a, 2922c, Revised Civil Statutes, as amended (Articles 2922a, 2922c,

Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes) in which election a majority of the electors residing in the proposed district must vote in favor of such annexation;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED By the County School Trustees that an election be held on the 11th day of June 1948, at the following voting places: City Hall in Burkburnett and the Cashion Baptist Church near the Cashion School Building site to determine whether the following school district Cashion Common School District No. 21 shall be annexed by the County School Trustees to the Burkburnett Independent School District composed of Everett Common School District No. 22, Clara Common School District No. 9, Fairview Independent School District and the old Burkburnett Independent School District.

The following persons are appointed presiding officers and clerks at the respective election place indicated;

Burkburnett Independent School District, W. A. Roberts, Presiding Officer; Miss Bess McGinnis, Mrs. Frances Felty, Clerks.

Cashion Common School District No. 21, Arthur Ramming, Presiding Officer; B. Bryant, Sam Spencer, Clerks.

The presiding officer shall within 5 days after said election has been held make due return thereof to the County School Trustees of this County.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and County and who are resident qualified voters of said school districts shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all voters who favor the annexation of the aforementioned school districts shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For Annexation"

And those opposed to such consolidation shall have written or

printed on their ballots the words: "Against Annexation."

The Secretary of the County School Trustees shall forthwith post a copy of this order as Notice of said election and notice shall be posted at a public place in each of said school districts for not less than twenty-one full days prior to the date of the election.

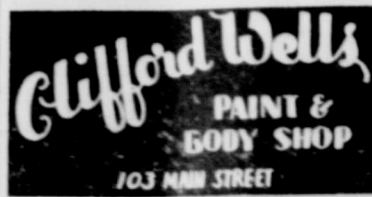
