## New Street Lights For Burkburnett

Monday night the City Commissioners took action on a matter that will be of interest to citizens of Burkburnett, and also to visitors in the future. New street lights will be placed on four blocks of Main street. The new lights will be the newest thing out; mercury vapor. Two sample lights of this type have been up for some time to give an idea of the amount and kind of light they give.

City Manager P. A. Wiggins, long a contender for this type light, assured the Commission the lights would be installed by time the Celebration opens July 21st. Workmen are already getting the posts ready to set. Delivery of the lights is promised within thirty days. During that time the steel posts will be up and ready for the brackets. A few days is all the time necessary to mount the lights.

Twenty-four new lights on Main street will really light it up. All the present outmoded awning lights will be removed. The new type lights will give about twice the amount of light the awning lights give—with only one-half the amount of electricity now being used for that purpose. The saving in electric power will pay for the lights in a short time.

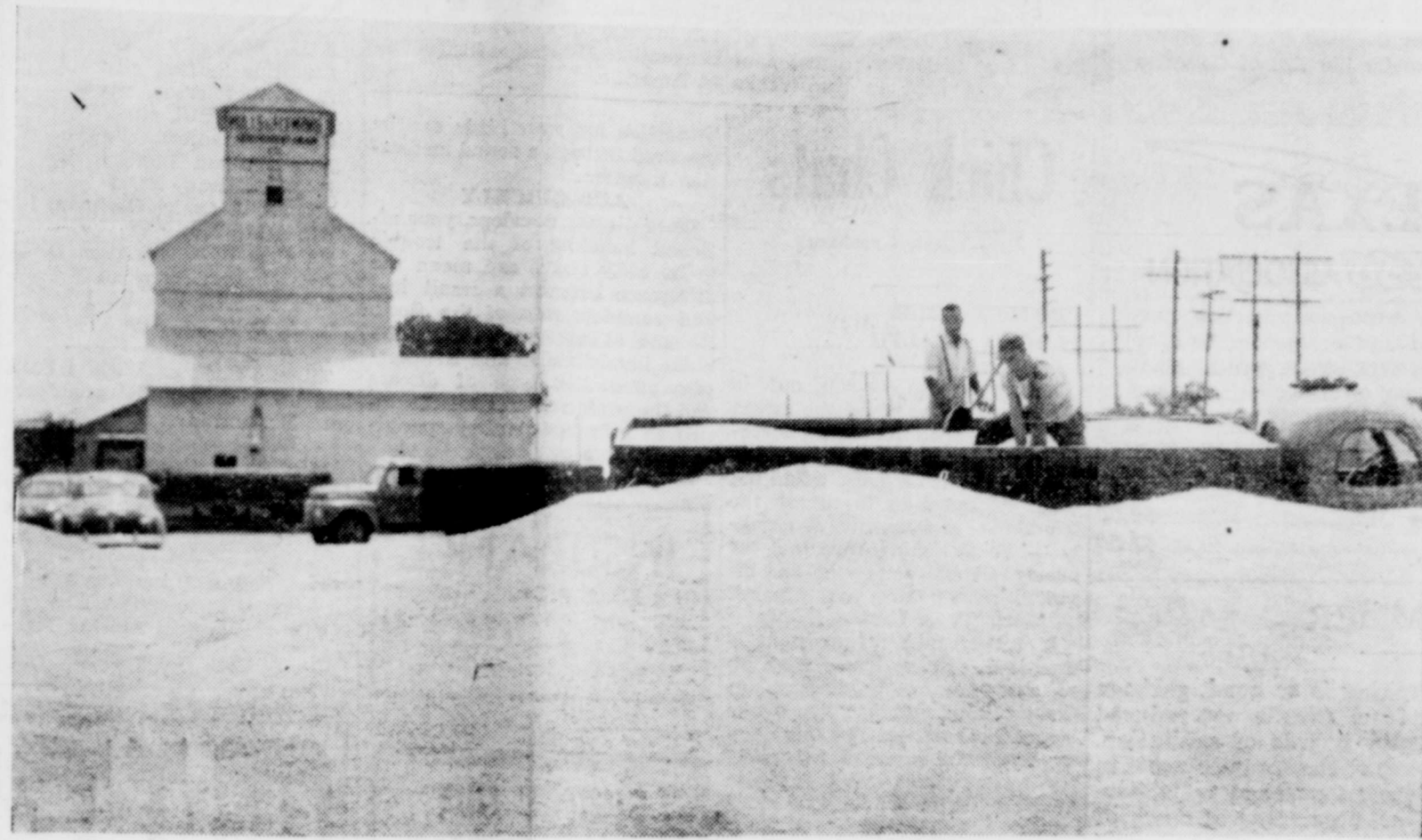
## Burk Gin & Elevator Has New Manager

## Thousands of Bushels Wheat Dumped In Downtown Street of Burkburnett Past Week



WHEAT! Precious golden wheat! Thousands and thousands of bushels of it stacked in the streets of Burkburnett! That's the story that went out on the wire services to newspapers all over the United States. The stories and pictures of the wheat piled high were picked up by papers everywhere. Burkburnett was once again making headlines over the nation, just as it did years ago when the city became known as the original oil boom town. This time it was different in many respects. It was wheat instead of oil that put the town in headlines. Faster, better news services made the news available to several million more readers in a day or two.

What's the story behind the story? Why was there so much wheat brought to Burkburnett? Was the harvest so much larger than in previous years? Those are the questions people everywhere have been asking. To the people that had some knowledge of the situation the questions were easily answered. In the first place, there was quite a bit more than an average crop harvested around Burkburnett. But not as much more as might be suspected. In the second place practically all wheat was ready to cut at the same time. In the third place, more combines and trucks were on hand than ever before. Just as wheat harvest was ready to begin this area received more than three inches of rain. That stopped everything for a few days. Wheat that was hardly ready before the rain, filled out and took on more weight. That brought up the yield per acre.

When fields dried out enough to support the heavy combines they moved into the golden ripe grain. Some fields had as many as a dozen combines running at one time. That many machines can cut a lot of wheat in one day. Trucks stood ready at all times to empty the harvesters as they filled.

Three elevators in town which can handle a normal harvest satisfactorily, were swamped. All the wheat came in to town in just a few days. Last year the harvest was spread out over a month or six weeks. Only a few box cars were on the siding. The elevators filled up. All available trucks were called into service to haul wheat to Fort Worth. They run day and night. Still the wheat kept coming in. Trucks from the fields were lined up for blocks and waited hours to get unloaded at the elevators. If they didn't get unloaded the combines would have to stop. If they stopped the dead ripe grain would be lost if a rain came. No one can predict the weather here.

Something had to be done and Harlan Mills and Woodrow Fleming at the Mills & Fleming Elevator did it. They got permission to rope off a street and began dumping truck load after truck load of wheat into the street. The pile kept growing in height and spreading out to the curbs. Soon a whole block was filled and the grain kept

coming. The news got out and spread like wildfire. Pictures were made and news stories run. Quarter of a million dollars worth of wheat piled in the streets was interesting news to other people too. Monday night this area was threatened with rain. The street full of wheat was sandbagged at the edges to keep it from washing away in case of rain. The news wires began buzzing again. Dallas and Fort Worth offices wanted to know how much the wheat would be damaged if it rained. Was it raining in Burkburnett? What did the weatherman predict? The wheat in Burkburnett was still live news.

Wednesday Gordon Yoder of Dallas came up to make pictures for Paramount News. Thursday he was back making some more for Television. Lee Orr of San Antonio was also here Thursday making movies for Fox Movie-tone News. Burkburnett will be in pictures—all because of a big pile of wheat.

Trucks are now being loaded with two portable loaders. The work went on all last night and will continue tonight if the crew of men can stand it.

Two young business men who had courage enough to buy wheat and stack it in the street and take the gamble that no rain would come, put Burkburnett on the lips of more people in the United States than any other town, regardless of size.

## Bible School Closes Wednesday

The Vacation Bible School at the First Baptist will close with commencement exercises Wednesday night at 7:30. There will be a demonstration by each department, worship program, presentation of certificates, etc. Every boy and girl who has attended at least four days of the school will receive a certificate. Those who have been neither tardy nor absent and have all memory work up and good department will receive highest honor. There will be seals of special recognition for special work done. Everyone is invited to attend this closing program according to Rev. T. Lynn Stewart, principal of the school.

The average attendance of the school for the first three days of this week was 141. The average attendance by departments was: Beginner, 40; Primary, 45; Junior, 37; Intermediate, 16; General Officers, 3. The school will have a picnic this Friday at noon. Moving pictures are to be made of all the boys and girls one morning during the school.

## Cashion School District No. 21 Annexation Election To Be Held June 11

Burkburnett and Cashion District No. 21 School Annexation election, will be held Friday, June 11 at the following places: City Hall in Burkburnett and the Cashion Baptist Church with Mr. W. A. Roberts presiding officer for election box at City Hall and Mr. Arthur Ramming presiding officer at Cashion.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and County and who are resident qualified voters of said school districts shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The importance of this election cannot be over emphasized due to the saving of taxes to the now present Burkburnett School District. If this election carries the county tax base will be used for the tax base for the new form district.

The following explains as to how the consolidation of school districts will effect a saving to the local tax payers. The Burkburnett School has operated the past year as a State Aid School due to the fact that the salaries were increased last year, and as the results of this increase, Burkburnett qualified for \$20,407 of State Aid (Salary Aid.) This was derived by formula in which the State takes one-half of the valuation, times the rate of local district, plus per capita which will be the revenue of the district. The expenses are calculated by the number of teachers, times the salary they are qualified to draw, plus \$300 per teacher for operating expense. These two items added together give the total operating expense. Total receipts subtracted from total expense, gives the amount of the subsidy from State Aid as salary aid. (This is in addition to transportation aid which amounts to ap-

proximately \$6,000 per year.) If this election should carry, the school district valuation would be lowered to approximately two and one-half million dollars. At present we have property valuation of approximately \$3,700,595. Under the same formula for State Aid purposes, the state will pay to the Burkburnett School, more State Aid money. Rather than receiving \$20,407, Burkburnett Schools might qualify for thirty or thirty-five thousand dollars. The only reason that this annexation can be a saving is that the 50th Legislature in writing the equalization aid law, stated that an Independent School district or Common School District which was continuous could be annexed and new valuations for the new district could be declared and still make the district eligible for aid, provided the new valuation or base is not below the current county base or value. This has also been confirmed by the Attorney General, so as a result of this ruling, Burkburnett can set up County base for the newly composed school district and save the tax payers a considerable sum of money.

If this election should carry, two elections will be necessary to complete the set up. An election to spread the bonded indebtedness and new tax rate election. (When two districts are annexed it is necessary that a new tax rate be voted upon.) The only district that has any bonded indebtedness is the old Burkburnett Independent School District, the others are debt free.

The total indebtedness of the Burkburnett School District amounts to \$30,000. \$25,000 which is owned by the district in the O. L. Clark trustee fund, leaving the outstanding indebtedness of 05,000.00.

## Entire Town to Be Sprayed With DDT

City Manager P. A. Wiggins, always alert to matters pertaining to the welfare of the citizens of Burkburnett, announces the entire town will be sprayed with a solution of DDT. The decision was made after conferring with City Health Officer Phil Carpenter, as a precaution against Polio, which is rather widespread in Texas. Although little is known about the cause of Polio, best authorities believe that filth and insect infested premises contribute to its spread. Mr. Wiggins feels that any precaution against Polio in Burkburnett is justified. Every alleyway, every patch of weeds and grass, and all areas around trash cans will get a thorough spraying. An ideal sprayer is already for use. The Ford fire truck, equipped with a five hundred gallon booster tank and separate power unit for pressure will be used. With the regular fog nozzle breaking the stream into millions of tiny particles under high pressure, every square inch of any given area can be saturated. Every citizen should get their premises ready for a visit from the big spray wagon. All weeds, tall grass in alleyways, in fact every bit of rubbish should be cleaned up. For the spraying to be effective all premises should be as clean as possible. Flies, mosquitoes and other objectionable insects thrive in filth and unsightly places. DO YOUR PART TO MAKE THE PRECAUTIONARY EFFORT EFFECTIVE.

### COME SUMMER

Flies like summer when foraging is so good, garbage and refuse so plentiful. Danger from flies is not reduced entirely by commercial spraying, by boards of sanitation. Common sense is necessary to control the summer pests in Burk Burnett homes. Many cities thru garbage collection, city incinerators for burning refuse, do dispose of much of the problem, but health authorities can't carry the whole load. Sanitary practices must be followed by every household. A strong spray containing at least five per cent DDT and usually with pyrethrum, is suggested as a good agent against flies. Keep garbage containers covered, use the spray inside and out, of the container, and the area around it. Brush or spray screens and the area around them with the solution. Keep the fly swatter handy and do your duty by your town, this summer.

### JUNE FOR BRIDES

### Chick Chats

#### PROTECT YOUR FLOCK'S HEALTH

When disease breaks out in the laying house or on the range, there is a need for swift, forceful action on the part of the flockowner. If he doesn't find out what he must do to arrest the trouble — and then do it quickly — he is risking the loss of nearly all the money he has invested in his poultry to that point.

**Mortality or Laying Slump**  
If hit or miss management is practiced, disease losses may be so extensive or production so greatly impaired that the flockowner loses money. For this reason, more and more of our poultry raisers are becoming aware of the need for following a planned management program. Such a program aims, first, at preventing trouble; second, at knowing how to control disease once it appears.

In considering the disease and parasite problem, it is well to look first to the probable source of your trouble. Generally, chickens become diseased or parasite-ridden because of conditions traceable to neglect and poor management. Therefore, keeping your flock healthy is a matter of correcting faulty practices in sanitation and feeding and in providing pleasant, healthy surroundings for the flock. Further

protection for your birds can be acquired through a sound medication program.

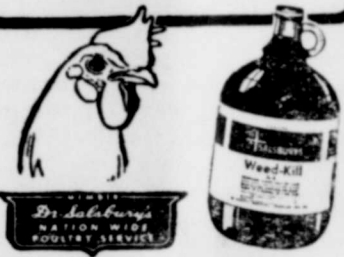
**ACT QUICKLY**

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS
Israel Registers Diplomatic Victory By Agreeing to 'Cease Fire' Order; Lewis Quits First Coal Conference

PALESTINE: Diplomacy
What the Jews of Israel lacked in armed strength to resist Arab attacks against their new state they had made up in shrewd diplomacy.

That development, which took place as the battle for Jerusalem entered its sixth day in an unholly atmosphere of rattling guns, bursting shells and violent death, made the most favorable impression possible in the United Nations.

It was a clever diplomatic maneuver on the part of the Jews but, at least at the outset of this new line of circumstances, the Arabs were having none of it.

Actually, all the Jews had done was to issue a surprise cease fire order in compliance with a U. N. security council request that the fighting be brought to a halt.

But that put it up to the Arabs who, faced with a deadline set by the U. N., were having trouble deciding whether or not to cease fire.

SECURITY: Desperate Plight
President Truman came up with another sound plank to reinforce his campaign platform when he demanded that congress overhaul and broaden the social security program.

To relieve the "desperate" plight of the aged and needy in this inflationary period he called for a 50 per cent increase in old age insurance benefits and asked that 20 million more persons be protected.

He offered a five point program and said he wanted quick action on it. For three years, the President pointed out with some irritation, similar requests on his part have been shunted aside.

1. A 50 per cent increase "at least" in old age and survivors' insurance benefits; allowing pensioners to earn up to \$40 a month instead of \$15 without losing benefits; raising of the tax rate from 1 per cent to 1 1/2 per cent next January 1.

2. Extension of coverage to farm and domestic workers, the self-employed and others not now covered.

3. Broadening of unemployment insurance to cover employees of small firms (having fewer than eight workers), federal employees and others.

4. Disability insurance to protect workers from loss of earnings caused by sickness and injuries.

5. Increased federal benefits to match state aid for dependent children, the needy, aged and blind.

Whatever his motives in presenting the problem of inadequate social security benefits again at this time, Mr. Truman did have a good, even a noble, point.

ESTHER'S ZEAL FOR HER PEOPLE
Lesson for June 18, 1948

GEORGE MEREDITH has a line that runs like this, "God's rarest blessing is, after all, a good woman." In this study of Esther, you may wish to think of her primarily as a courageous woman—most people do, I guess.

One must read the Book of Esther, of course, to have any grasp of this great story. It requires but a few minutes, and every reader will be richly rewarded.

A QUEEN WHO WAS BRAVE DANIEL, we agreed, was a brave person; but not more brave than Esther. There is a verse in Hebrews 13:6 that serves admirably to interpret this first stage of Esther's manifest courage.

He was not against Moody personally. Officially, his union's position was that the 14 regional organizations which comprise the Southern association must bargain in 14 separate groups, rather than delegate bargaining authority to the all-inclusive association.

According to Lewis' accepted pattern of operation, this balk at the Southern Coal Producers was the opening tactical stroke in his 1948 campaign for an improved miners' contract.

Following that, he could sit back and present the UMW wage demands in his own good time. Then, if the coal operators did not accede, he could call the annual strike.

Lewis knew his position was good. The UMW's recent pension walkout had left the nation's coal reserves seriously depleted.

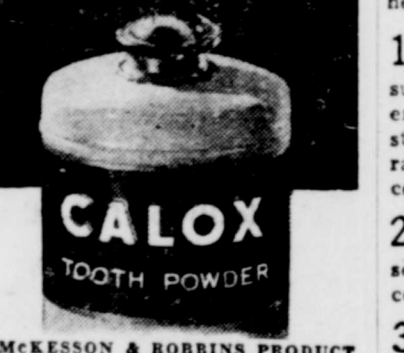

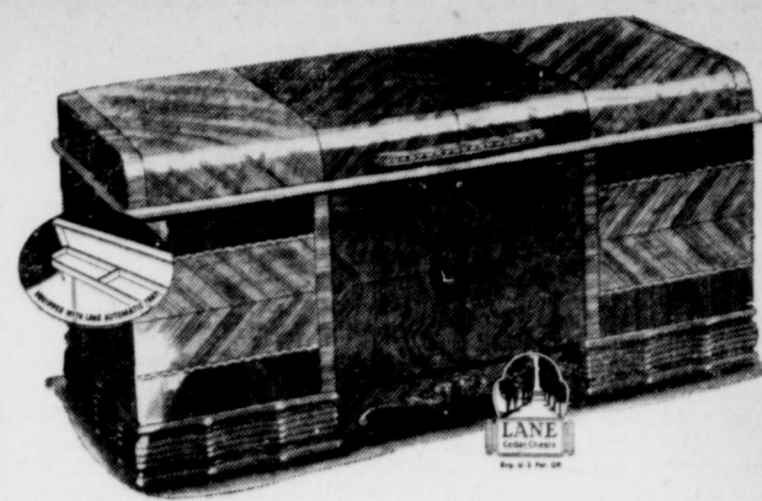

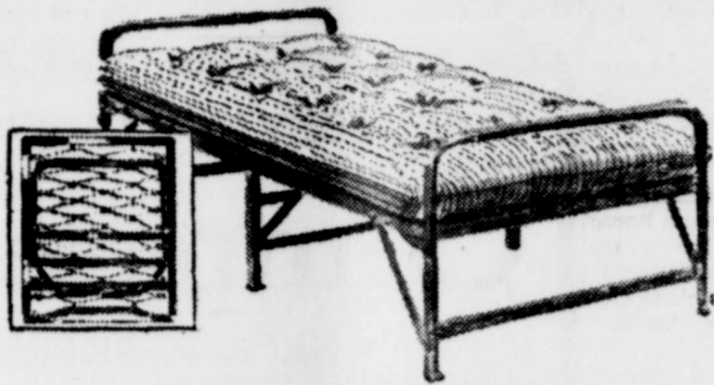

Anyone possibly believe, or teach, that the act of baptism that puts one into Christ is non-essential. Will you believe the teaching of God's word, or the theories of man?

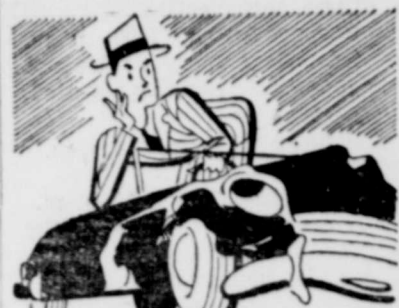
