INSPECTORS ADVISE CLEAN - UP FOR BURK

25 Volunteers Make City Inspection Wednesday

Wednesday 25 business men volunteered their services for the day to make a lot by lot and house by house inspection tour. They were looking for unsanitary spots, and notes were taken of every finding. A glance over the findings shows that Burkburnett is not well kept. It is not the duty of the City to do the cleaning up. It is up to each property owner to put their premises in order. Just plain laziness plus the habit of living in filth accounts for most offenses. With conditions such as they are, inspectors say it is nothing short of a miracle that epidemics are not raging here. Open toilets, livestock dirt and high weeds and grass make ideal places for flies and mosquitoes to breed and spread disease. Here are a few of the inspectors' reports, with no punches pulled: Beginning at the gas office and going West: Uncovered garbage can, open toilet, excessive weeds and grass, unsanitary chicken pen, 4 hogs in filthy pen, recommend thorough campaign in entire colored district, HOGS MUST BE MOVED. Alley between 3rd and 2nd: needs everything. All Harwell street needs everything in the catalogue. Grass, weeds, tin cans, junk yards, shoulders on streets need mowing. Recommend all out-door toilets and chicken houses be sprayed regularly. Alleys between 4th and 5th and 6th and 7th weeds and grass 6 feet high, including all vacant lots. Corner Ave. D and 8th St. oil tanks and open slush pit full of oil and water. 8th St. weeds and grass bad. Entire 7th St. bad condition. Vacant lots 100% bad condition. That is just a sample of the reports written out by the inspectors. You know whether or not your premises need cleaning up. If you don't want other people to know it, do something about it.

Thursday morning the big fog machine from Wichita Falls was hauled to Burkburnett for a thorough spraying of the City with DDT. The machine was furnished through the courtesy of the City of Wichita Falls with no charge other than for an operator. Burkburnett furnishes the DDT solution and other necessary laborers to complete the job. Twenty-five of Don Short's foot ball boys manned the hand spray cans to reach nooks and corners not accessible by the fog making machine. This is the second time Burkburnett has been saturated with DDT this summer in the fight against flies, mosquitoes and other insects in an effort to stall off an attack of Polio in this city. Residents are urged, yes, begged to clean up around their homes in order that the spraying will be more effective.

USE YOUR HEAD

Those who live in tropical climates know the value of periodic use of salt or salt tablets to combat extreme heat. Humidity and heat come with the hot summer months. The body, through perspiration, loses much of the needed salt that acts as nature's air-conditioning plant in the human. The army, even certain industries, see that the taking of salt tablets by their men, is a routine matter. We must also supply fluid to back up the loss through perspiration, which wards off heat prostration. Too, sunburn is another point to consider. There are a number of preparations on the market to protect the skin against sunburn, but don't rely upon them entirely, for with some skins they work and with some they don't. Since some sunburn causes illness, there is a loss in work days, in efficiency among workers. Those folks in Burkburnett who want to return from a vacation as brown as a berry, often return as red as one. Sunburn isn't something to pass aside lightly, figuring it as a necessary step to acquire a tan. Sunburn isn't healthful even in minor cases. It is painful, and in aggravated cases it can be very serious.

FIRE PROTECTION

Fire can be the servant of man. When not harassed, it quickly becomes his enemy. Fire put to good use, is a blessing. Fire handled carelessly and ignorantly, is a destroyer. Who, in his youth was not thrilled by the fire siren screaming, following on wind-spiced feet the fire engine as it roared down the street. We, as oldsters, hop in our car to follow the fire trucks. Whether it is a grass fire soon extinguished and causing no damage, a fire that sweeps an entire block or destroys one modest dwelling, the total cost of fires throughout the year, adds up to millions of dollars. One does not weigh loss or life with property damage. A fire may ruin the savings and labor of years. It may cost an in-

Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

CARING FOR THE BIRDS ON RANGE

The health and laying potential of your growing birds are dependent to a considerable extent on how well you care for them during the growing period.

If your young flock is on the range, you will want to give the future pullets every possible chance to develop and grow as they should. It costs no more to do the job right, and in the end it's far more economical.

Provide Good Range

Give your range flock a clean plot of well drained soil with a balance between sunny and shady spots. It is best to use different ranges from year to year, if possible, so that the ground is not contaminated by flocks of the

past. Never range growing chickens with older birds. If both pullets and cockerels are being raised, keep them on separate ranges. Provide good forage, such as bluegrass, timothy, or similar crop. Help the flock keep this forage short by occasionally mow-

ing, so that the sun's rays will penetrate to the soil and help kill germs.

Have enough shelter space. And make sure the shelters are well ventilated and sturdy enough to give protection against bad weather. Clean roosts, waterers and feeders regularly — and use a reliable disinfectant on them, too.

Provide plenty of life's essentials for the birds — water, feed, sun, and shade. If trees do not grow on your range, you may want to try sunflower. For convenient watering, try high-capacity range fountains. Sheltered feeders are best for outdoor use to protect the feed from rain. Supply enough feeders so that each 100 birds have 30 to 36 feet of feeder space. Don't forget to supply grit and as pullets begin to lay, oyster shell.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS GOP Convention Hands Nomination To Dewey in Display of Unanimity; Warren Second Choice on Ticket

DEWEY EYED GOP Convention

Out of the smoke-blurred rooms during the recess before the third roll call came the word: It was Dewey—first again with the medicine men.

From the very beginning of the GOP convention in the sweltering confines of Philadelphia's convention hall it was a simple case of Dewey against the field. The field was composed of Taft, Stassen, Vandenberg, Warren and MacArthur, plus a scattering of favorite sons.

Despite some frenetic jockeying for delegates by Dewey, Taft and Stassen over the week-end preceding the convention, the big three of the GOP started out on Monday with their pre-convention alignments unchanged.

But by the time Gov. Dwight Green of Illinois had finished with his keynote address Monday night it was apparent that a stop-Dewey movement was struggling to get under way. As it turned out that movement never did get beyond the struggling stage and Dewey remained virtually the only one unaffected by it.

In retrospect, the convention by that time already had assumed an inexorable course toward the Dewey camp. Second-guessers maintained that the whole affair coiled along as if motivated by some fundamental and changeless law, although that was not fully evident until the convention could be viewed as a finished product.

If there was a fundamental law it was compounded from a series of heterogeneous factors, political and personal.

First of all there was the superbly functioning Dewey machine, operating with almost 100 per cent efficiency to coral votes.

Secondly, the Dewey opposition was divided. Taft and Stassen, poles apart in their political philosophy within the Republican party, could not get together. Stassen flatly refused a deal and Taft kept waiting for a break that never came. California's Gov. Earl Warren refused to have a hand in a stop-Dewey drive, insisted he was running for the nomination and not just against Dewey. Vandenberg added to the confusion by remaining silent, noncommittal and even disinterested.

Nomination

Actual climax of the convention came when Sen. Edward Martin of Pennsylvania renounced his favorite son candidacy and threw his support, backed by about half the members of Pennsylvania's 73 delegates, to Dewey. That started the blitzkrieg. From then on it was Dewey and downhill all the way.

As the crucial balloting began in humid, steaming convention hall it became more evident that a stop-Dewey coalition had not jelled.

On the first roll call it was Dewey 434, Taft 224, Stassen 166. On the second ballot Dewey had gone up to 515 and Taft to 274, while Stassen dropped to 149.

At that point the convention recessed for three hours, a move engineered by Taft, Stassen and other anti-Dewey leaders to give them time to decide whether or not to continue the fight.

When the convention reconvened for the third roll call the stop-Dewey drive had changed to a nominate-Dewey stampede. Sen. John Bricker of Ohio was the first on the rostrum to withdraw the

Dewey Runs on Calculated Ambition

Thomas Edmund Dewey is a success story in himself, featuring the kind of success that is achieved not happenstance but through precisely calculated ambition spearheaded by precisely directed energy.

At 46 he has been elected governor of New York twice and defeated once, for the same office. Moreover, he has received the Re-

name of his state's candidate, Senator Taft. This was swiftly followed by similar withdrawals by Warren, Stassen, Vandenberg and MacArthur.

On the third ballot the 1,094 delegates to the convention nominated Gov. Thomas E. Dewey as their unanimous choice to run as the Republican candidate for President in 1948.

Warren

Selection of Gov. Earl Warren of California as the Republican nominee for vice-president came as a complete shock to almost everyone, despite the fact that the choice was a logical and reasonable one.

Warren was a surprise pick because prior to the convention he had maintained stoutly that he could not afford to take the vice-presidency and would not accept the second spot.

It was even more a departure from the norm in that the Dewey-Warren ticket failed to offer a grain of consolation to the old guard and isolationist wing of the party. Warren has strongly internationalist political views—even more so than Dewey—and has been a consistent critic of the GOP isolationists.

Initial speculation as to the vice-president spot ran to Rep. Charles Halleck of Indiana or Sen. Kenneth Wherry of Nebraska, both of the "conservative Republican" tradition.

But in the night-long pow-wow that followed the Dewey nomination it was Warren who was chosen. Dewey himself averred that he had not influenced the choice, that the party leaders had become convinced that the California governor was the best bet.

Nevertheless, Dewey had had to make certain promises in order to get Warren for the job: The vice-presidency, he said, no longer would be the stale, flat and unprofitable post it has been. He planned to make Warren a "full partner."

Significance

Whether the GOP convention constructed its policy platform to fit the candidates or nominated the candidates to fit the platform is, of course, an impossible question. Nevertheless, the Republicans managed to do both.

Categorically, the platform is a sound, forward-looking one in the light of the issues, both foreign and domestic, to be faced.

Strongly internationalist and bipartisan in tone, it rejects the old line of isolationism for isolationism's sake and upholds the European recovery program.

That foreign policy stand, harmonizing as it does with the previously stated convictions of Dewey and Warren, may stand as a historic milestone in development of the Republican party.

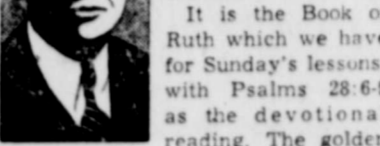

FAMINE in Judah, where Elimelech and his wife, Naomi, and their sons, Mahlon and Chilion, dwelt, drove them to Moab, in search of bread. Elimelech died, and the sons married young women of Moab, Ruth and Orpah. And then the sons died. Naomi, feeling that she must not longer remain in Moab, announced her intention to return to her native land, and bade Ruth and Orpah farewell. In one brief decade Naomi had lost husband and sons, and now she longed for home.

"TREAT ME NOT TO LEAVE THEE"

ORPASH accepted Naomi's suggestion, and turned away to her own people; but not so with Ruth. She loved Naomi. She could not give her up. Naomi had done something for Ruth in those years of sorrow and loss.

"Treat me not to leave thee, or to return from following after thee; for whither thou goest, I will go; and where thou lodgest, I will lodge. Thy people shall be my people, and thy God my God. Where thou diest, I will die, and there will I be buried. The Lord do so to me, and more also, if I ought but death part thee and me."

With these sublime words, Ruth lashed herself to Naomi, and together they started on the long trek to Bethlehem.

WHEN FAITH CONQUERS

HERE we witness conquering faith—conquering faith in the hearts of Naomi and Ruth. And they come to Bethlehem. It was the harvest season, and Naomi directed Ruth to glean in the field of Boaz, a wealthy and generous-hearted citizen of Bethlehem. Faith in action! And the world loves the story of Ruth becoming the wife of Boaz, and thus the mother of Obed, the grandfather of David the king in the ancestral line of Jesus Christ, the King of kings.

And Naomi, through her conquering faith, held in her arms the little baby, Obed, and dreamed of God's unfolding purposes to bless the world.

In this unsurpassed romance we witness faith in adversity, faith in association, faith in conduct, faith in claim, faith in confidence, and faith in a glorious climax.

WHEN FAITH CONQUERS

LIFE is always ennobled when faith conquers. It is easy to imagine how history might have missed this beautiful love story, had not Naomi been a woman of conquering faith. She might have given up and over to her great sorrow, and pined away in grief and defeat.

But Naomi followed the gleam. And her trust in God shed its gentle glow into the lonely heart of the Moabite widow, Ruth. Ruth clung unto Naomi. She could not do otherwise. "Truth is stranger than fiction."

And all history was enriched. It is ever so when faith conquers. Thus the poet states the case:

"God moves in mysterious ways, His wonders to perform, He plants his footsteps on the sea, And rides upon the storm."

FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

Q. How soon after farrowing
should the sow be allowed to exer-
cise?

A. Animal husbandrymen at Pur-
due University say that starting the
second day after farrowing the sow
should be left out for one or more
hours of daily exercise. This activ-
ity helps sows to function normally
and should not be overlooked.

Q. Is there an effective treatment
for foot rot in sheep?

A. The type of treatment depends
upon severity and extent of infection
in the flock. In severe cases no treat-
ment is particularly effective unless
necrotic tissue is pared away. If
circumstances warrant individual
treatment, apply tartar emetic 50%
in a lanolin base wax, or use a 10%
formaldehyde solution. This or other
treatment of individual sheep should
be under the supervision of a veter-
narian.

When the infection involves the
majority of the flock and is not se-
vere, satisfactory results may be ob-
tained by the use of a foot bath
trough (wooden) containing a 20%
solution of copper sulfate or so-
called bluestone. Walk the sheep
through this solution at three-day
intervals.

Q. How can red mites in the pullet
house be controlled?

A. The Ralston Purina Co., St.
Louis, Mo., puts out an insect oil
which when thoroughly painted or
sprayed over the roosts, floors and
walls of pullet shelters should elim-
inate the red mites and keep them
down for about a year.

Q. When cows are on pasture,
should they also be fed grain?

A. Yes, feeding the proper amount
of grain ration while cows are on
pasture is one of the most important
measures of all to keep a herd at
capacity production and profit
through the year. Even when cows
are turned out on the finest of spring
pasture, they need a well balanced
grain ration to maintain production
and still keep up body weight.

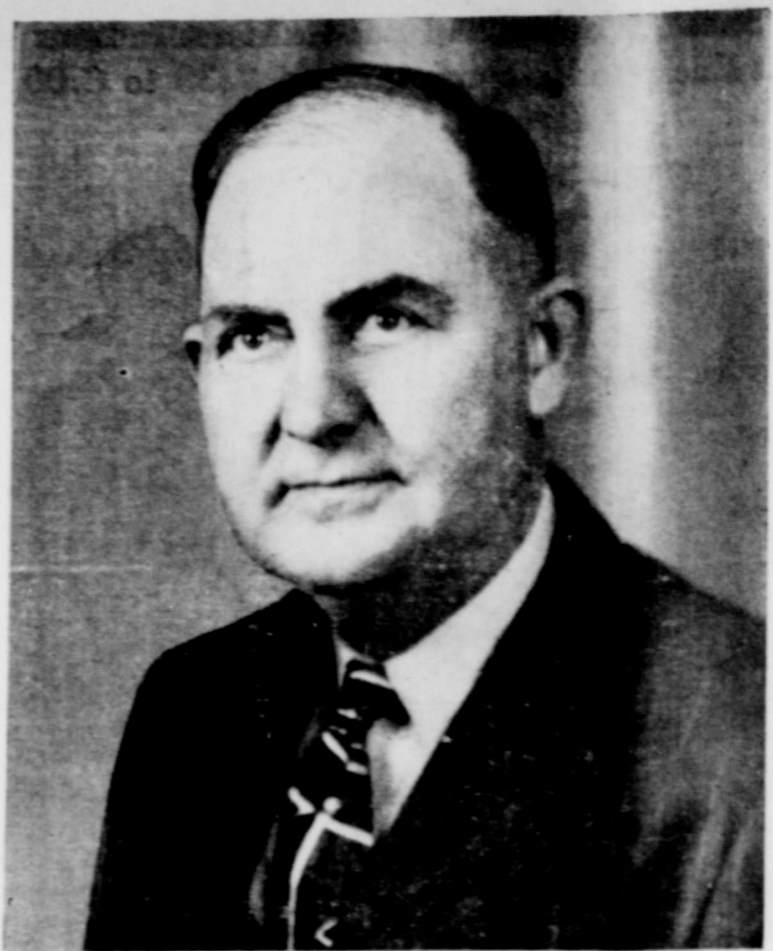

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The New Testament Church

First consideration in our study of the New Testament church is the name by which it was known and called by the apostles. In any case of identification, the name of utmost importance; and, in the study of the church, the names are more important. What were the names by which the church was known. From the individual standpoint the disciples were called Christians. Acts 11:26, Acts 16:1. There was no prefix nor suffix to designate as certain kinds of Christians, but they were simply Christians.

In the collective sense, the church was known as: (1) Church of Christ, Matt. 16:18, Rom. 16:16; (2) Church of God, Acts 20:28; (3) Church of the Lord, Acts 20:28, Revised Version; and (4) The Church of the Firstborn, Heb. 12:23. The names honored God and the Lord Jesus Christ, and the names are truly scriptural.

Designating and identifying the New Testament church is not a name assuredly that it must have a name that is throughout the religious world, there are scores of names whose names honor men, ceremonies and procedures every kind. Paul wrote that we should do ALL in the name of the Lord, both in word and deed. Col. 3:17. If a person claims to be the New Testament Church, and, at the same time, wear a name that is foreign to the New Testament on these things.

Someone objects and says, "There is nothing in a name." There is something in a name, and everyone knows this is especially true in regard to the name of Jesus Christ. Acts 4:12. The name is not the only important thing, but notice in later lessons; but how can any religious organization claim to be the New Testament Church, and, at the same time, wear a name that is foreign to the New Testament on these things.

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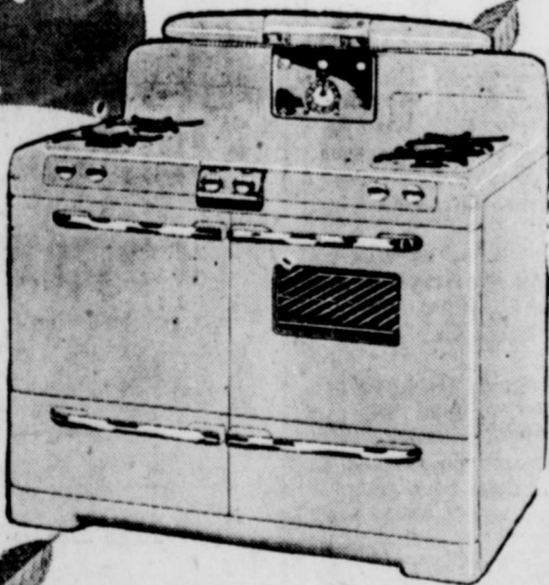

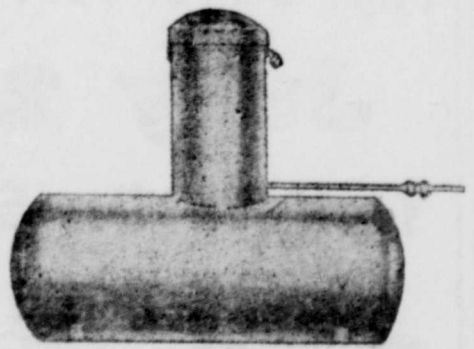

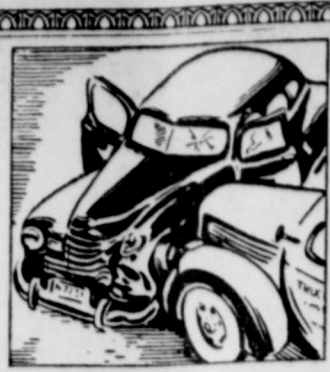
