W. T. Holman Asks Re-election As Commissioner



In announcing for re-election as your County Commissioner of Precinct No. 2, I first want to express my deepest appreciation to my friends and voters of Precinct No. 2 for the privilege of serving you the past eight years as Commissioner and for the confidence you have manifested in me, and for your hearty co-operation given me in the discharge of my duties.

The time has come for you to choose your Commissioner for the next two years. I earnestly and sincerely submit to you my application for re-election as your Commissioner of Precinct No. 2.

Upon my past record of service, rendered in the past eight years, I have constructed 33 concrete culverts and bridges; and this Precinct has all of the bridges, culverts, concrete and steel sufficient to carry the heavy loads hauled over county roads. We try to construct six to eight miles of black-top road per year. We have just completed eight miles of Farm-to-Market road and have five miles more to complete as soon as rock and asphalt can be secured. I have at the present time the rock in the County Yard and will complete the job soon. I am working to the point of hard surfacing all mail route and school bus roads as soon as possible. As of July 1, 1948, Precinct No. 2 had a cash balance in its Road and Bridge Fund of \$77,000.00 dollars.

I have attended Court regularly and have done everything within my power to take care of Precinct No. 2's interest to the best of my ability. I have worked in full cooperation with the County Judge and Commissioners' Court on any and all matters that have come before the Court and with the Highway Department in securing Farm-to-Market highways and on the re-routing of State and Federal High 277 and if elected will continue to work for the best interest of Precinct No. 2.

I wish to thank the employees of Precinct No. 2 for their help and cooperation in helping me to perform the duties of your Commissioner.

In conclusion, if you want a continued efficient administration and approve of my past record of service as your Commissioner, I will be deeply grateful to you to re-elect me to serve you and will work hard to serve you to the best of my ability.

When they went into the figure eight many in the grandstand gasped as the horses, running full speed, just barely passed without a collision. You'll enjoy this part of the show.

Giant Parade Opened Annual Celebration Here Wednesday

Over 1,000 Horses, Floats, Etc. Made Up Parade

Wednesday, opening day of the four days' Celebration here was a very busy day. At two in the afternoon a parade was held in Wichita Falls, covering several blocks in the downtown district. The Wichita Falls part of the parade was led by the Wichita Falls Range Riders, followed by several other riding clubs, floats, bands, etc.

After the Wichita parade every body loaded up and came to Burkburnett for the greatest parade in the history of this city. The parade Wednesday was made very colorful by floats entered by various clubs and organizations. Many, many hours were spent decorating the huge trucks into beautiful floats. This is the first year floats took a major role in the parade.

More than one thousand horses took part in the hour-long procession: Some fourteen riding clubs from neighboring towns in Oklahoma and Texas were here to add color to the Western theme.

Parade Winners

Floats Division—1st place went to the Burkburnett Study Club. Bluebonnet Garden Club took second place honors for the most beautiful float.

Most unique float was entered by Wid Philips. Mounted on a large truck was a pen of calves. The traditional branding fire was burning briskly, with several branding irons glowing red with heat. As the truck proceeded down the street the calves were taken from the pen and really branded. A pot of hot coffee steamed near the branding fire. The scene was a reproduction of one duplicated thousands of times in the past on ranches all over the West.

Best riding club entered was the Range Riders of Wichita Falls. Second went to the club from Duncan, Oklahoma. These and other riding clubs, with their flashy costumes, decorated saddles and prancing horses made a very impressive sight. First prize was \$75.00. Second drew \$50.00.

Buck Benson was judged best dressed cowboy. He received a pair of silver bits from the Bauch Leather Co., Wichita Falls.

Best dressed cowgirl — Miss Nadine Shaw, hand tooled leather belt, given by Kirkland Boot Shop, Wichita Falls. Boyd Bros., Burkburnett, gave

best dressed Junior cowgirl a pair of boots.

Junior cowboy got a pair of boots from The Manhattan, of Burkburnett.

Best dressed Indian was Mary Tououhty, who received blanket given by Bauch Leather Co. of Wichita Falls.

Cowboy contestants at the rodeo have not been forgotten either. Gameson Leather Goods of Archer City is giving a belt with silver and gold inlaid buckle, to the best average in calf roping.

Nocona Boot Co. is giving a pair of classy boots to the "hard-luck cowboy" of the show here.

Low point cowboy will get a pair of boots from the Dixon Boot Co., Wichita Falls.

One of the high lights of the rodeo Wednesday night was the naming of the Queen to reign throughout the four nights. The queen was chosen by points received from selling tickets to the rodeo. Miss Beth Brookshear, with a total of 14,605 pts., was proclaimed queen. Dressed in solid white costume including boots, Miss Brookshear was presented to the huge crowd which filled the stadium to overflowing. Second place went to Maxine Rankin, who amassed a total of 4,480 points. Third in the race was Jo Nell Griffin of Randlett, Oklahoma, with 3,465 points.

The two runners-up were presented as attendants to the queen.

Everyone who saw the rodeo Wednesday said the stock was the roughest they had ever seen at any rodeo. Beutler Bros. of Elk City, Oklahoma, are furnishing the stock. The rodeo was fast, with some of the best cowboys in the business contesting for cash awards.

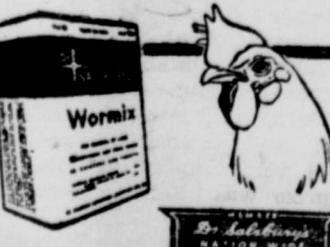

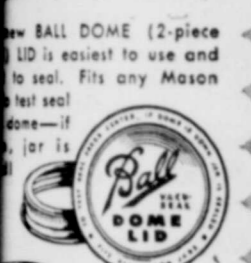

1. How fast do rats reproduce?

2. Will chicks hatched after May 1st make satisfactory replacements for a laying flock?

3. Which animals should the goat raiser cull?

1. Rats begin to breed at two to three months of age, and the period of gestation is about 21 days. The average litter is probably ten, and one female may have from three to four litters a year. That is why it is so important to guard against this rodent and why rat control requires constant attention.

2. Yes. At the Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company pullets are grown out each month in the year on all types of feeding programs. These tests show that it is possible to grow out pullets for replacement any time during the year and by doing have ready-to-lay pullets for any season to replace hens which are culled or die.

3. The following should be culled out and slaughtered — never sold for breeding purposes:

1. All buck kids except those from registered, high-producing ancestry.
2. Under-sized doe kids. Cull out the poorest ones and save their feed to do a better job on the rest.
3. Old, unprofitable does who have passed their prime.
4. Milking or dry does with one or both halves of the udder unsound.

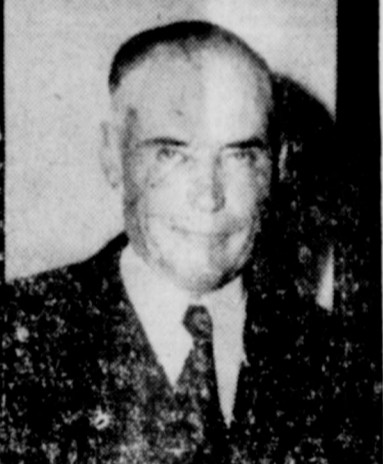

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS Arabs and Jews Go Back to War As U.N. Truce Fails in Palestine; Truman OKs Farm Price Support

FAILURE: U.N. Truce

There was not peace, but once more a sword in Palestine. The United Nations truce had failed. As the four-week interruption of hostilities between Arabs and Jews dragged somberly through its final hours, combatants on both sides were making preparations to resume warfare.

They had failed to come to terms, and that failure arose out of the fact that there had existed no political or social basis upon which a peace agreement could be rested, nor were either the Jews or Arabs particularly eager to create one.

Count Folke Bernadotte, U.N. mediator in Palestine, had tried hard, but he had had to carry out his negotiations in what might be termed a spiritual vacuum between the Jews and Arabs. There simply was no meeting of minds upon which he might have capitalized.

Previously, during the last days of the truce, the Arabs had rejected a plan submitted by Bernadotte which included an extensive revision of the now defunct U.N. partition scheme.

Bernadotte's proposal would have restored the area of Palestine to what it was before Trans-Jordan was separated from it, and that total area then would have been partitioned into independent Arab and Jewish states.

Trans-Jordan was especially antagonistic to the plan, insisting that it would put the nation under at least partial jurisdiction of the United Nations, thus making it no better than a dependent state.

FARM BILL: Price Support To the accomplishment of his now customary blast at the 80th congress President Truman signed into law a farm bill that extends present price support policies for 15 months and establishes a long-range, flexible support program to begin January 1, 1950.

Although the presidency of the United States still is far from a reality for Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, the Republican nominee nevertheless is giving considerable thought to some of the problems that will face him if he does get elected to the office.

REPUBLICAN: Changes, If Congress, he said, failed to enact legislation to strengthen the soil conservation program; it did not provide the necessary funds for marketing research; it did not act on the international wheat agreement. It failed, he specified, to meet "the serious problems of rural housing, health and education."

Under the extension bill farm prices generally will be supported at their present levels. However, the support price for cotton will drop from 92 1/2 to 90 per cent of parity.

The idea behind parity farm prices is to insure the farmer the same buying power, compared with the rest of the community, that he had during a favorable crop period. Usually the standard interval upon which parity prices are based are the five years from 1909 to 1914.

Spending Money As the economic cooperation administration closed its Marshall plan books on the first three months of its operation it reported that recovery shipments worth \$762,747,140 were approved for Europe and China during that period.

That total is about 58 per cent of the goal originally set for the quarter, but ECA Administrator Paul Hoffman said the unspent balance would be used eventually.

BERLIN: Trouble

As U. S. planes continued to fly tons of food into beleaguered Berlin the East-West stalemate over Germany was solidifying in a stubborn mold.

The Russian blockade of Berlin had brought the painful German issue to a head, and both the Soviets and the western powers were anticipating that events might begin to move very rapidly soon.

At the same time, on the free side of the iron curtain, German political leaders were expressing their opposition to the western powers' plans for a West German federal government.

In Berlin, power cuts were ordered in the three western sectors of the city to save the dwindling coal stocks. The action was taken despite the fact that coal shipments had begun to arrive by air.

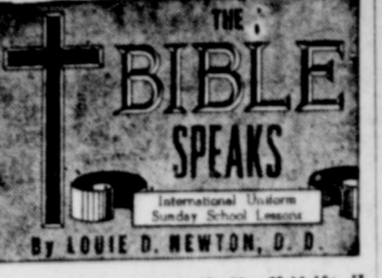

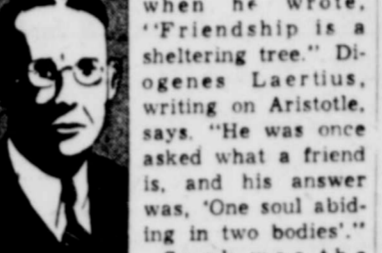

Higher Grades
 Proper handling of eggs can increase a poultry raiser's income by a sizeable amount over the period of a few months. On the other hand, slipshod methods in caring for eggs before they are marketed can result in quite a big loss in profits. The reason is, of course, that well handled eggs are usually graded higher; and that means a higher price per case.

What are some of the things a poultry raiser should do to produce the top market grades of eggs. Here are a few of the important points he should remember:

- Pointers on Egg Care**
1. Produce clean eggs. Have plenty of nests, keep the nesting material clean, don't allow birds to roost in nests, and watch your flock for signs of diarrhea that may soil eggs.
 2. Gather eggs at least three times a day, using ventilated baskets.
 3. Cool eggs promptly and keep them cool. A temperature below 60 degrees is preferred. Keep the egg room fairly moist and free of odors.
 4. Pack the eggs carefully, small end down. If possible candle them before packing and do not send cracked, thin-shelled, or badly stained eggs to market.
 5. Market eggs at least twice a week. Avoid rough handling of cases and protect eggs against extreme temperatures on the way to market.

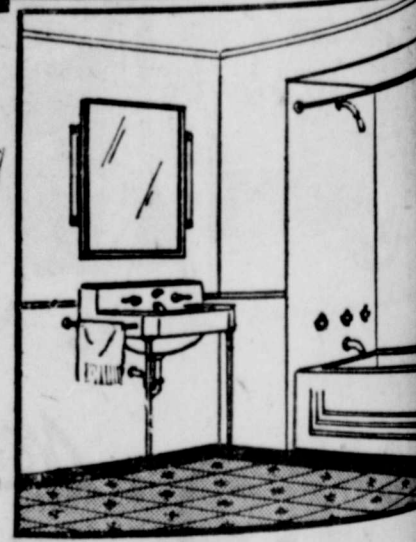

New Testament Church

For our lesson this week, we want to study the organization of the New Testament Church. Let us carefully study the New Testament and learn of the organization of the church, and then we can measure the religious organizations of today by this infallible standard. As we study last week, it is necessary for the church today to have the same name as in the days of the apostles; in like manner it is imperative that we follow the New Testament organization.

In the early church, each congregation had its own elders, bishops, and deacons. Paul addressed the Philippians to the church, with its bishops and deacons, in Acts 14:23, Paul appointed elders in every city and he instructed Titus to ordain elders in every city. We see that in every congregation, in each city, there are elders to oversee the Lord's work, with deacons to assist or serve. They were to teach, lead and guide the people in things spiritual and material.

We also find in a careful study of the New Testament, that there was no larger, or higher, organization than the local church with its elders and deacons serving under the authority of the Holy Spirit. The ecclesiastical super-organization of today were unknown in the days of the early church.

Today, the same organization must exist in the Lord's church. Many religious bodies claiming to be the New Testament church have no elders, others have neither elders nor deacons. The popes, cardinals, archbishops, presiding elders, superintendents, etc. are in existence without authority of the word of the living God. Is the church, of which you are a member, scriptural in its organization; if not, how can you follow?

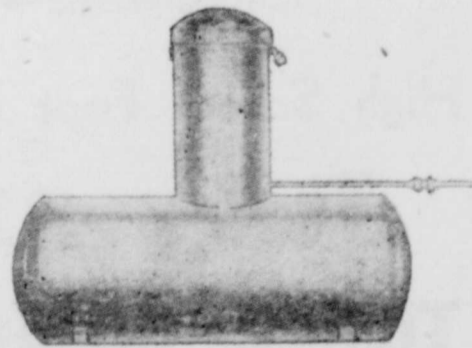

Newfoundland Stamp First
 A collection of stamps displaying dogs would show the portrayal of several different breeds and types. The first dog picture to grace the design of a postage stamp was the head of a Newfoundland, which was shown on a one-half cent stamp issued in 1887 by the country from which the Newfoundland derives his name. A Canadian stamp issued in 1927 shows a team of sled dogs, which can be identified either as Alaskan Malamutes or Siberian Huskies. Sled dogs are also shown in 1931 and 1933 Newfoundland issues, and in a series of Russian stamps issued in 1935 and 1938. Another dog sled team is shown on a 1932 issue of St. Pierre and Miquelon, but, rather than displaying the erect ears and curled up tail characteristic of the Arctic breeds, these dogs resemble Newfoundland, St. Bernards or Bernese Mountain Dogs in type. A conventionalized pair of Greyhounds are incorporated in the design of a 1905 issue of Crete. In 1942 the principality of Liechtenstein issued two elaborately designed stamps showing Great Danes as part of their composition. A Great Dane is also part of the design of a 1938 Spanish Loyalist Government issue. A St. Bernard carrying the traditional brandy keg on his collar embellishes the tab se-tenant attached to a 1906 Italian stamp. One of the most appealing stamps featuring a dog is a 1926 Saar issue which shows a German Shepherd leading a blinded war veteran. The dog wears the emblem of the Red Cross on his harness. The association of dogs with famous explorers is again emphasized in a 1915 Panama stamp which portrays Balboa, discoverer of the Pacific, standing on a rugged mountain peak with a large dog crouched beside him, Mr. Miller concludes.

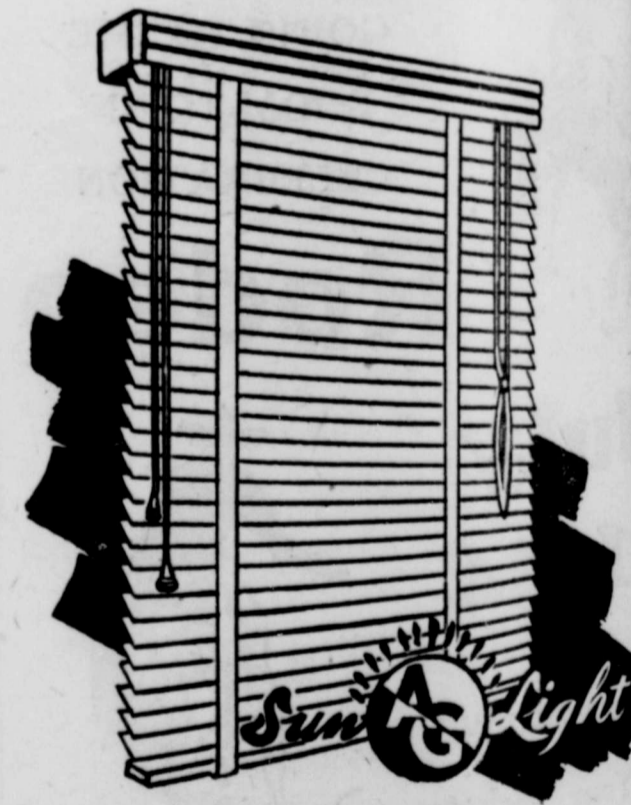
and wash with mild soap, well.
