Water Meters Show Burk Population Is More Than 5,000

Everybody loves (?) statistics because you can prove anything by it them or those. And, according to statistics, Burkburnett has over 5,000 population.

Here is the proof: Dave McNeil got a book put out by the State, covering all municipalities in Texas. In cities where the population is known, and the number of water meters is known, it shows the number of persons (and fractions of persons) per meter. For seventeen cities scattered over the state, the average population per meter is 4.96 persons.

According to McNeil, Burkburnett has 1,054 water meters. That means we have 5236 persons and one child almost grown (.84).

A voluntary census was attempted recently, but you know how that works. The results show 117 people living in Burkburnett.

Polio In Neighboring Towns Prompts Better Clean-up Here

Burkburnett has made some efforts towards cleaning up the town in recent weeks. But, there still remains lots to be done. With so many cases of Polio reported in near-by towns, we should be prompted to finish a job that should be done, even if there were no Polio scare. Not too many people in Burkburnett know about it, but there has already been one case of Polio here. Recently Dr. Philip A. Carpenter, local health officer, listed several safety measures that should be taken. Not very many of those suggestions have been carried out.

Open toilets and sewers, uncovered garbage containers, (and some houses do not even have a garbage container—they just throw it in the alley or in their neighbor's can) are not major contributions to good health. Those conditions exist here.

Dr. C. T. Bradford, local physician, and his wife were in Amarillo last week for a few days. On the trip home they stopped in Plainview where some forty Polio cases were under treatment. Dr. Bradford is a former member of the staff of doctors at the Plainview clinic and talked at length with the head doctor. He was learning all he could about Polio—what might cause it and diagnosis and treatment. According to Dr. Bradford, prevention is the greatest weapon against Polio. And prevention means cleanliness. He stressed, very strongly, the necessity for Burkburnett to follow the advice and suggestions of Dr. Carpenter in cleaning up this city. POLIO IS GETTING TOO CLOSE TO US FOR COMFORT. WE ARE CONCERNED

More youngsters will go to grade school this next September than ever before in our history. The number of new teachers is but a few thousand less than seven years ago, but these are mostly scheduled for high schools. The grade school and kindergarten lack instructors. Primary education plays an important role in shaping a child's character, in its attitude toward learning. It is a force that results in a man or woman's worth in their community, their home. There are some teachers not as well suited to grade school work as high school, but those who are, should be encouraged through pay and prestige, to take jobs in the lower grades.

OFF AGAIN

Boosting sugar prices doesn't lower living costs. At the time when Burk Burnett housewives need sugar for canning, the effect of an artificial scarcity means increased cost of the sugar. Cuba has a record crop and wonders what to do with the surplus. By reducing the domestic sugar consumption quota a half million tons below the amount set last February, it means the Cuba import of sugar will be reduced about this amount. Consequently the high price is maintained here. Again the consumer takes it on the chin. Some housewives are hoarding, because they found a sugar shortage in stores. Well, the fellow who raises bees and found the honey prices dropping will benefit from this sugar business, probably. It's an ill wind.

WE CAN LEARN

We might take a lesson from the Danes. Norway flies 65,000 trees to plant on the barren wastes of Iceland, to draw down the moisture and form a blackade against winds. They hope this will help turn thousands of acres of now useless land, into soil for cultivation. Time will also produce timber for lumbering there. HELP TO the AILING HOUSE

ON: Our gas refrigerator taken on a yellowish stain. Can I restore it to its whiteness?
 R: Try washing the surface with mild soap and warm water, using about three quarts in a quart of water, and dry.

ON: What should I do with shingles on my house?
 R: Sometimes a curled shingle can be split in two or three and then well nailed. A few of your shingles are loose. Replace them with shingles of good quality.

ON: What can I do with water pipes that cause the paint to peel off?
 R: Repair several rooms like this information.
 R: You could use a rattle, following the manufacturer's directions for application. You should make some for a slight darkening under heat and choose a little lighter than you would select. The pipes are clean and cold for a good and for thorough drying.

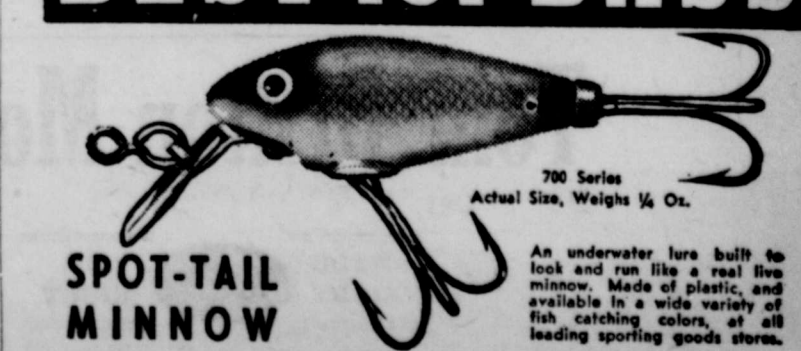

The SNAPSHOT GUILD



One tip for better pictures of people is to pose your subjects in a plane parallel to the film of your camera.

Pointers on Posing

IF you're not altogether pleased with the results you've been get- ting, chances are you can improve your pictures by knowing how to pose your subjects.

And the secret of posing, con- densed in a nut shell, is not to pose but to be natural. Webster defines the verb "to pose" as "to assume a studied attitude." What you want is not a studied attitude but a nat- ural one.

That's why, as a general rule, the best informal pictures of people show them reading, cutting flowers, petting a dog, or engaging in some other simple activity. Such shots are natural shots. The subject, at- tention absorbed by what he's do- ing, doesn't "freeze up" for the camera.

But granted this point there are several other tricks that can help your pictures. One of the best of these is to pose your subject in a plane parallel to the film. For ex- ample, today's shot is a nice one.

But turn the girl toward you, legs stretched toward the camera, and you would get a distorted picture: her feet would seem size 12's.

Another thing to remember when taking someone's picture is to keep the picture compact. It's possible to make a good snapshot of a girl stretched out full length on the floor, reading the Sunday paper. It's possible, but not easy. Generally, such a shot is likely to wind up as a wind- mill effect—all arms and legs every which way.

After all, when you pose for a picture, you hope it will do you justice. And when you take some- one else's picture, you should be fair to the subject. Make sure that he's relaxed and comfortable. Being comfortable is in itself the first step to being natural. Remember, un- less a person looks pleasant and comfortable in your camera's finder, he won't look pleasant and com- fortable in your finished print.

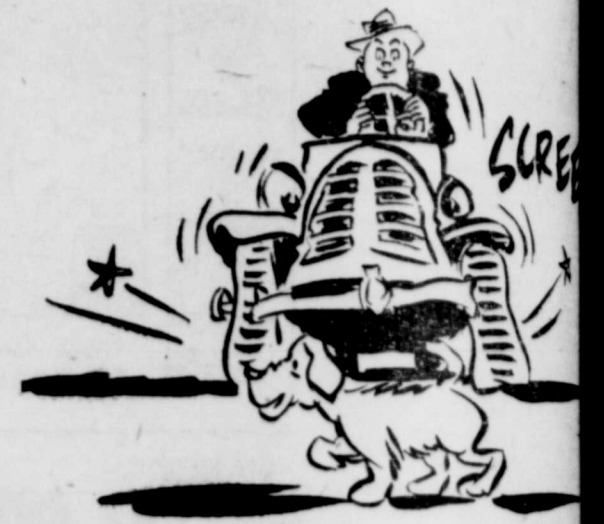

Wichita County Farm Bureau News

From the Office of
MRS. M. L. HINES
Secretary-Treasurer

Two events typical of a functioning Farm Bureau organization took place this week in this area. Monday afternoon Bob Crocker, P.M.A. secretary, and Loys D. Barbour, county service agent and district III director of Farm Bureau, represented Wichita County in a meeting called in Vernon to consider ways and means of securing more storage for grain and sorghums in order to secure a support price through the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Twenty counties were represented in the gathering. By oral reports, a survey of crop acreage was made, and evidence pointed to the fact that farmers must provide more storage space through the general discussion did not reveal a solution.

Loys D. Barbour, reporting for the Texas Farm Bureau, said that organization saw this emergency some time ago and two weeks ago began contacting the proper sources in Washington and got the U. S. Department of Agriculture to approve the use of surplus government buildings, such as barracks and hangars, for extra storage space for grain. The only step lacking now is to determine who shall be responsible for the care of the grain when stored. The Farm Bureau director lamented the failure of congress to ratify the International Wheat Agreement, which has

added to the problem. Since the expansion of the organization is for the welfare of Farm Bureau, Wichita County members will appreciate the fact that Jack County is being reorganized. H. T. Cardwell presided at a meeting in Jackboro Monday evening, when Loys D. Barbour was the speaker and Dick Christian was elected temporary chairman for the county.

The speaker outlined the history of various farm organizations in contrast with the history of the development of the Farm Bureau Federation, showing that the outstanding success of the latter stemmed from the fact that all its functioning originated first in the local and county groups, spreading later to the state and national organizations. Barbour also delineated the conditions existing in the relationship between labor, industry, and agriculture, emphasizing that there must be parity, or equality, between the 3 groups.

"Labor and industry definitely are looking after their own interests and are not going to look out for the interests of the farmer. Only organized agriculture can do that," continued Barbour. "Because our leadership never goes radical, and because the American Farm Bureau has always been unselfish in its procedure through the years, it commands the respect of Congress. The American Farm Bureau has attained its status in national legislation, not through great numbers nor through money power, but through methods of fair dealing with all three groups above mentioned," concluded Barbour, as the group was dismissed to continue further the promotion of Farm Bureau in Jack County.

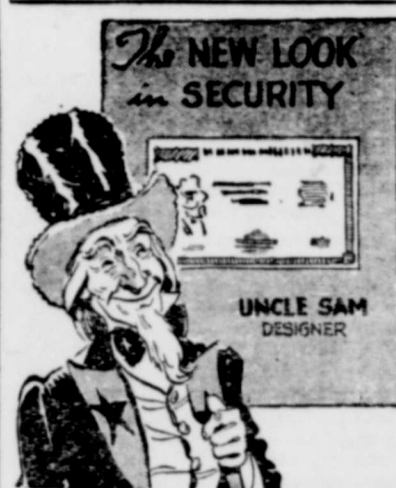

Chick Chats

(By Clark Gresham)

CHICKENS "CHEW" WITHOUT TEETH

The chicken is a toothless creature yet it is able to consume large quantities of hard grain and dry grasses. It can do this because Nature has given it a different kind of equipment with which to grind food—the gizzard.

This is the tough muscular organ in which the grit or gravel is retained to crush and grind the feed. When it is loaded with feed the gizzard begins to expand and contract causing the hard grain to be crushed and ground by the pebbles or grit. When the feed is reduced to finer form by the grinding, it passes out of the gizzard and on into the intestine where it is digested and assimilated by the bird's body.

Impacted Crop

Of course if there is no grit in the gizzard no grinding can be done. Impacted crop or gizzard frequently results when the bird does not have access to grit or other grinding material.

Eventually the grit grinds itself into powder, then passes on through the intestine. Grit should always be kept before the birds so that they may replenish their supply.

With baby chicks and poults it is a different story. While the youngsters are receiving all-mash rations there is no real need for grit and so it is recommended that it be withheld for a few weeks. The dangers in giving grit to very young chicks, is that the little birds may gorge themselves on the substance, filling up their gizzards so completely that the regular movement of feed through the digestive tract is blocked. Of course after the birds are old enough to eat whole grain, grit should be available at all times.

Grit should be rather insoluble. Soft material such as marble or ordinary limestone powders

quickly and the birds must eat large amounts of the material for replacement.



Colonel James E. Taylor of Kerens is the new chief-of-staff of the 36th Infantry Division. The announcement was made today by Major General K. L. Berry, Adjutant General of Texas. His home town is Kerens where he is engaged in farming and ranching activities in addition to serving as director of public relations for the Texas Manufacturers Association.

The horse uses lettered or numbered blocks in nearly all of his tricks. The blocks have leather loops atop them which the horse picks up in his mouth. In adding the horse works from left to right, reversing the human method.

The only horse ever to approach the mental abilities of Serrano was Muhamed, greatest of the almost legendary Elberfeld horses of Germany.

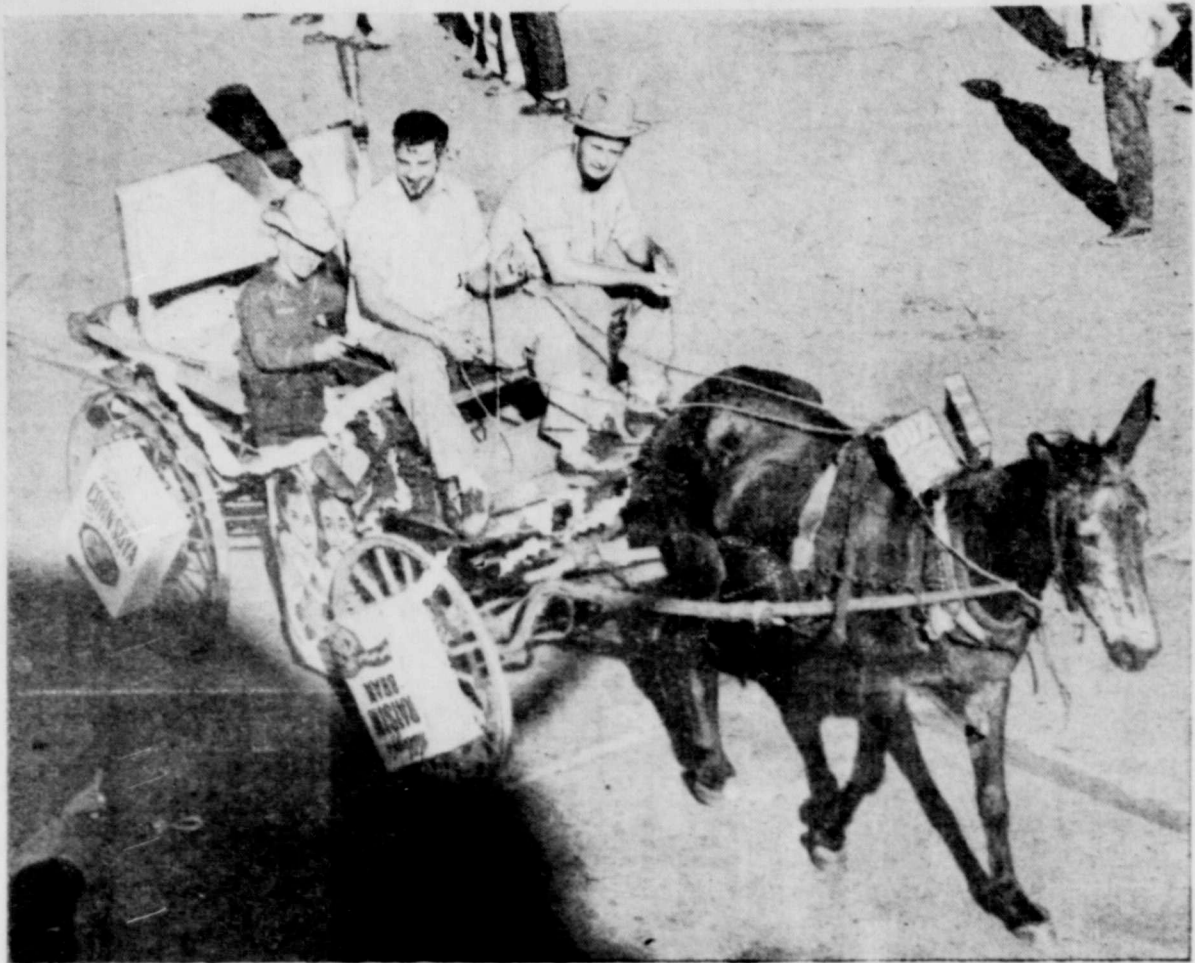

Ain't It The Truth



The Melody Lingers
 Our experience with rent control has underscored this fact: the longer we permit political controls to linger upon the scene, the harder it is to get rid of them. This is a good lesson for us to learn. For two years in succession now, our Congress has decided to keep the controls, while adding some "de-control" features that never seem to get rid of the controls. So, we still have rent control.

These efforts to control the nation's housing by tampering with rental units is actually making it difficult for the country to come back to a more normal housing situation following the dislocations of wartime economy. Rent control creates very few fair and square deals between renter and landlord. Indeed, it brings more injustices than it corrects.

But the worst thing about rent control right now is that it keeps housing scarce. Millions of rental units would become available at once, if it were not for rent control. Veterans and others in need of housing are suffering under the direct burden of rent control.

Let Industry Do It.
 It has been said that the nation has more housing per person today than it had in 1940. Yet, we're worse off. We need more housing, yes. But as long as we have rent control, we may not expect more rental housing. The hazards of control and its well-known injustices are too easily remembered by those who could offer rent housing. They will not undertake this kind of enterprise, when the count is already against them. Moreover, the private builders of the nation do not want to be compelled to compete with public housing, which is subsidized by tax money.

The truth is this: if government would get out of the scramble, private building would soon meet the demand for rental units. Competition would then go to work in keeping rents at reasonable levels.

Depend On Incentives.
 Yet, there are those who work hard trying to keep the government in the housing business. These agitators want rent control because rent control keeps the building industry in a dither and creates these artificial shortages. These tinkers want rent control because they believe it will help bring socialized housing.

When private money is deliberately scared away from investing in rental housing, then the next step is to holler for the government to put up housing. Actually, rent control and public housing are two pieces out of the jig-saw picture-puzzle of socialist and collectivist controls that the agitators are trying to foist upon the nation.

Once a government agency has power to tell you how much rent you must pay, whether you can live in a private house or a government project, then we are getting to the place where we can join up with Russia and all the other Communist experimenters.

The Socialists and Communists know that it sounds good to plead for "adequate" housing. They claim to be fighting for the people, against all sorts of bogeymen. But the people are not told that rent control, together with public housing, will go a long way toward destroying the welfare and the future of our free economy in America. We must in the future depend upon incentives and fair competition. Then there will be no housing problem in America.
