Fire Prevention Week

This year, Fire Prevention Week will be observed from October 3 to 9. And never in our history has there been a time when the week was more important. Our fire waste is still running at an all-time high. During the first seven months of this year alone the destruction amounted to more than \$437,000,000—far exceeding the total for the entire year of 1944. And we cannot blame this on higher prices and values. They are a factor, of course, but the fact remains that we are having more fires, and that the average fire is causing more destruction.

Fire prevention is especially important on farms and in rural areas, which usually lack first-class fire fighting facilities. According to the National Board of Fire Underwriters, farm fires take 3,500 lives and do \$100,000,000 worth of damage annually. And nearly one-third of those fires could be prevented by the installation of lightning rods of the proper type on buildings. Other major causes of farm fires are improper handling of gasoline, and chimneys and flues which are dirty or in bad condition. Simple care and adequate maintenance would eliminate the vast majority of these dangers.

The toll of death and destruction by fire can and must be checked. Fire Prevention Week will witness a peak of activity by the forces whose job is to prevent fire and to educate the people in fire safety. If the country will listen and learn, this needless waste can be reduced now.

Profit Isn't The Trouble

At more or less frequent intervals, the newspapers still carry accounts of consumer strikes against retail stores. The participants pledge themselves to cut their buying to the minimum until the storekeepers reduce prices by 10 or 20 per cent or some other arbitrary figure. This kind of consumer feeling may be understandable.

Modern Servant

How well are you solving the "servant problem" in regard to the greatest modern servant of them all—Electricity?

So that everyone may find out for himself, P. A. Wiggins, City Manager, has prepared this electrical intelligence test. To learn how carefully you are using electricity in your home, give yourself ten points for each question in the following list to which you can truthfully answer yes:

- 1 Always have an experienced electrician make repairs?
 - 2 Disconnect irons and other heating appliances as soon as you finish using them (you may be wrong in thinking you have turned the switch off)?
 - 3 Use non-tamperable fuses (fustats) which cannot be bridged with pennies or replaced by the wrong size?
 - 4 Always disconnect appliances by pulling the plug instead of cord (to avoid damaging the cord)?
 - 5 Never allow electrical elements in appliances to get wet?
 - 6 Never touch appliances when in the bath tub or standing on a wet floor?
- If your score is a perfect 60, you are the careful sort of person who probably never will have trouble in the use of electricity. If your score is below 50, start checking up; you are running too many risks.

But to blame the retailer for today's steep prices makes no sense at all. If the storekeeper—particularly those dealing in staple necessities—made no profit whatever, the average family's buying power would be increased very little.

There is one main reason why this should be so—competition. In this country all kinds of stores compete with each other. Chains and independents are after your business. They try to outdo each other by offering better qualities, more extensive stocks, improved service—and more reasonable prices. Under that kind of a set up, no one is going to be able to profiteer for long.

Retailers will be among the first to cheer if prices ever come down. And, in the meantime, they'll sell you what you want at the lowest cost possible.

Remedy For The Meat Situation

The meat situation has been the subject of more loose and uninformed talk than practically anything else, ranging from unfounded charges that big profits are the cause of high prices, to political demands for a reimposition of price controls, which would discourage production and channel most of the available meat supply into black markets.

In the light of that, a statement recently issued by the American Meat Institute deserves wide reading. "The real remedy for the meat situation," it said, "is the production, as promptly as nature and other conditions will permit, of adequate numbers of meat animals." It then went on to make a series of specific suggestions for achieving this goal.

First, farmers should be encouraged to breed sows for late fall and early winter farrowing. Second, producers should be urged to use the new corn crop to feed spring pigs to reasonably heavy weights. Third, breeding herds should be rebuilt with younger stocks, and older, poorer producing cows should be marketed. Fourth, the slaughter of calves should be reduced. Fifth, producers must be assured of a continued relative strong demand for meat. Sixth, livestock conservation should be pushed.

This is a long range program, and it is based upon the sound principle that the country must have more meat—and that high meat prices are in large part the result of heavy demand in the face of a limited supply. Rationing and other government controls, as any school child can understand, would not increase the supply of meat by a single pound. Whenever the government interferes with the basic laws of economics, scarcity, not abundance results.



HOUSEHOLD HINTS

If someone burns a hole in a leather-covered table top, hide it by melting candle wax of a matching color; pour it into the hole and smooth it out while it's soft.

If you'd like to avoid having to strain cranberry sauce, run berries through a meat grinder before you cook them.

Tenderize a steak that looks tough by soaking it in a pint of water and a tablespoon of vinegar for 10 minutes before you cook it.


When you beat dust out of upholstered furniture, lay a damp cloth over the part you're beating so the dust won't fly all over the room.

You can "richen" margarine by warming two pounds of it until it's soft and then stirring in one large can of condensed milk.

To clean a parchment shade, rub it with a fresh piece of white bread or an artgum eraser, or with a cloth dipped in milk. In any case, be sure to brace the inside of the shade with one hand while you rub with the other, or you may poke the rubbing hand right through.

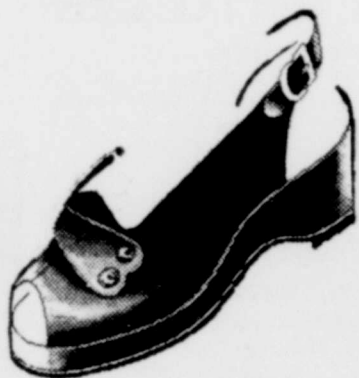

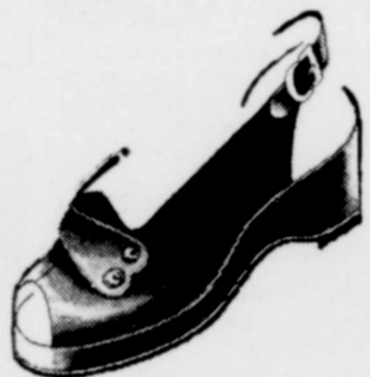

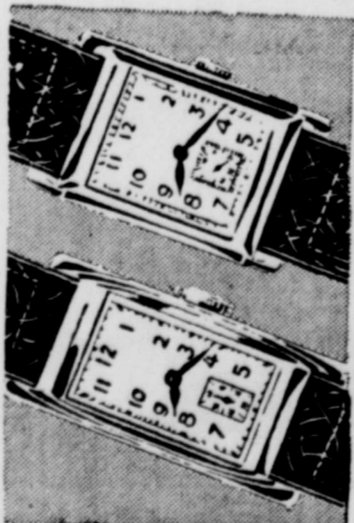

FUEL OIL: Plentiful Last winter's serious fuel shortage in homes and industries probably will not be repeated this year, according to present predictions. The supply of fuel oil is becoming so plentiful that there apparently is no need for an elaborate distribution system to be set up for the purpose of doling it out. Stored supplies are 60 per cent ahead of last year at this time and crude runs from distilleries are half a million barrels ahead of a year ago. New refining facilities are largely responsible for eradicating the shortage. Moreover, oil industry officials say, there now is an ample supply of gasoline. Only thing that could put a crimp in that would be a national emergency or a transportation stoppage. Most of the major cities are well supplied with oil, and while there might be spot shortages in rural communities during the winter they probably would be only of a day or two duration. "Last winter," said one industry member, "part of the trouble was caused by snow tying up the railroads." That happens and attention is focused on it when there is an oil shortage. It could happen again.

HOW TO HOUSE

THOSE PULLETS

There are as many shades of opinion as there are sections of this vast country, so it comes to a question such as "When should pullets be housed?" there is no pat answer.

The time at which the pullet flock should be selected and placed in the laying house varies according to climate and season.

However, there is one pretty stable rule to go by in housing pullets and that is—confine them before their rate of production is not upset by the act of housing, whereas, if you wait longer to put them in, you may have a little trouble getting production going. So when you see

some eggs on the pullet range each day, it's time to think of housing.

Of course, only the well developed pullets will be laying eggs on the range. Since most flocks vary considerably among individual birds, it is usually a good idea to do some careful selection in making up the laying flock. If your pullets vary between well-developed and slow maturing birds, choose only the former for your laying flock. Leave the slower birds on the range for a while longer, or market them immediately, according to your best judgment.

In selecting pullets for a laying flock, observe such characteristics of good layers as: a rather square, not-too-long head; well developed comb, with good color; long broad back; long keel bone; and plenty of depth of body.

Poor pullets usually are the opposite in characteristics, having long, "crow" heads, underdeveloped combs, and a short back and keel bone. They usually are very shallow of body.

There is ample opportunity for further paring of the flock, after the birds have been housed, of course. Constant culling should be practiced by the poultry raiser; this means that nonproductive birds should be weeded out throughout the laying house season. However, this opportunity should not be abused by allowing a high percentage of poor pullets to be housed with the good ones. Keeping poor stock in the flock at any time merely drags down the quality of the whole—and costs the raiser money.

Once you have decided against a bird, better get rid of her.

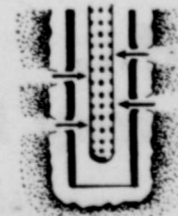

Sept. Campaign For Child Safety

A state wide effort to reduce Texas' child accident toll of about 900 lives yearly through participation in the national child safety campaign in September was set forth by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, as an immediate public health objective calling for concerted cooperation by all public health and medical authorities and interested civic organizations within the state.

life, or the crippling of even one child, is an exorbitant price to pay for any neglect of this problem," said Dr. Cox.

The importance of such a campaign is evidenced by the fact that accidents are now the leading cause of death among children more than one year old. Among children 5 to 9 years old, the death rate from accidents was 25.7 per 100,000, as compared with a rate of 4.6 for rheumatic fever and organic heart disease, the next cause; and among children from 9 to 14, the accident death rate was 20.8 and that for rheumatic fever and organic disease 7.2.

The outstanding improvement

in the death rates from all non-accident causes during recent years is the result of the advance in medical science and concentrated efforts in the field of child health. The premise of the child safety campaign is that efforts now must be intensified to bring about a somewhat comparable reduction in the number of child accidents.

Wichita County Farm Bureau News

From the Office of MRS. M. L. HINES

Extensive planning, led by Austin Crowmover of the State office, for the fall round-up, featured the meeting of the presidents and secretaries of District III, Texas Farm Bureau Federation, in the session at the Holt Hotel in Wichita Falls Monday, when eleven counties participated. District III Director, Loys D. Barbour, presided. Crowmover stressed the point that "the big boys" were out to do away with support prices for the farmer and that the best way to meet that situation was for more farmers to work as a group through the Farm Bureau.

A report on the rural roads program, which is sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau, was given by the chairman of the state committee, Loys D. Barbour. The plans were completed at a recent meeting in Waco and will be presented to the state convention in November. If approved there, they will then be presented to state legislature in January. The county allotment of roads, as advocated in the Farm Bureau plans, will be based on 50 per cent rural population and 50 per cent rural mileage.

The long range farm program as adopted by the recent congress came up for consideration. In this program the Commodity Credit Corporation was made a permanent organization, when previously it was just extended from time to time. "However," said Barbour, "the item which means most to the farmer was not included in the bill — the item which permitted the CCC to build storage space, or to assist the farmer to build storage space. Consequently, it is forcing the farmer to sell his grain at the prevailing market price."

The district queen contest will be held at the Holt Hotel on October 1 in connection with the annual district meeting. Five out-of-the-district judges will officiate and contestants will wear formal dresses.

The Texas Farm Bureau was luncheon host to the presidents and county agents present.
