Korea's Isle of Amazons
Lives on Ocean Harvest

As shallow-sea divers for pearls, shellfish, edible seaweed, and various items of commerce, women of Oriental coasts for centuries have outdone the men.

Those of Cheju, 50 miles off Korea's southern tip, have been notably adept. An estimated 10,000 today live by harvesting ocean areas, while their men in some cases tend the children and prepare the meals, notes the National Geographic society.

From this feminine monopoly has grown the tradition of Cheju as an Amazon isle. It took positive form in the West about 1900 when a traveler brought back the tale that the island until 1850 had been populated solely by women and young children in storied Amazon style.

In the 1946 census, Cheju counted 276,148 inhabitants, virtually all on the coasts of the 45-by-20-mile oval of land. There were 113 women to each 100 men on Cheju in 1946, whereas on the Korean mainland men outnumbered women.

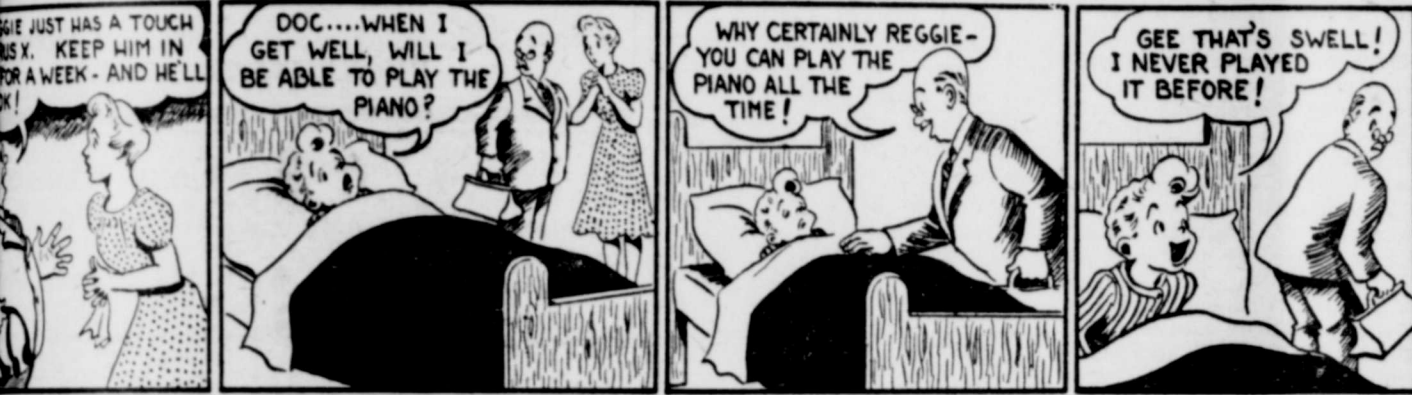
Cheju port on the north coast is the island's capital and chief center, counting 30,000 inhabitants. They live largely in crude, thatched-roof huts of mud and stone. Ancient walls to defend against pirate attack still stand along the shore.

Life of Samuel Colt

After being expelled from Amherst, Samuel Colt was sent to sea. The ship's paddle wheel gave him an idea for the revolving pistol cylinder. At the age of 14 he whittled out a model and it worked. Later, he quit his father's dye plant to seek his fortune as "Dr. Colt". In 1832 he sent his plan of a gun to the U. S. patent office, and was awarded a patent in 1836. After the original company failed, Colt invented the submarine "mine", while still in his twenties. He died wealthy at the age of 48.



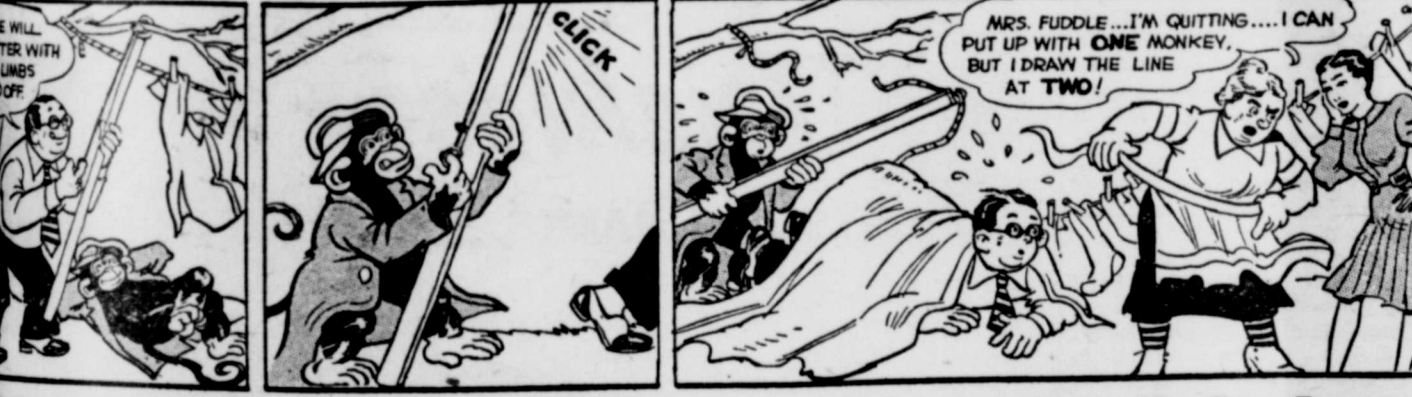

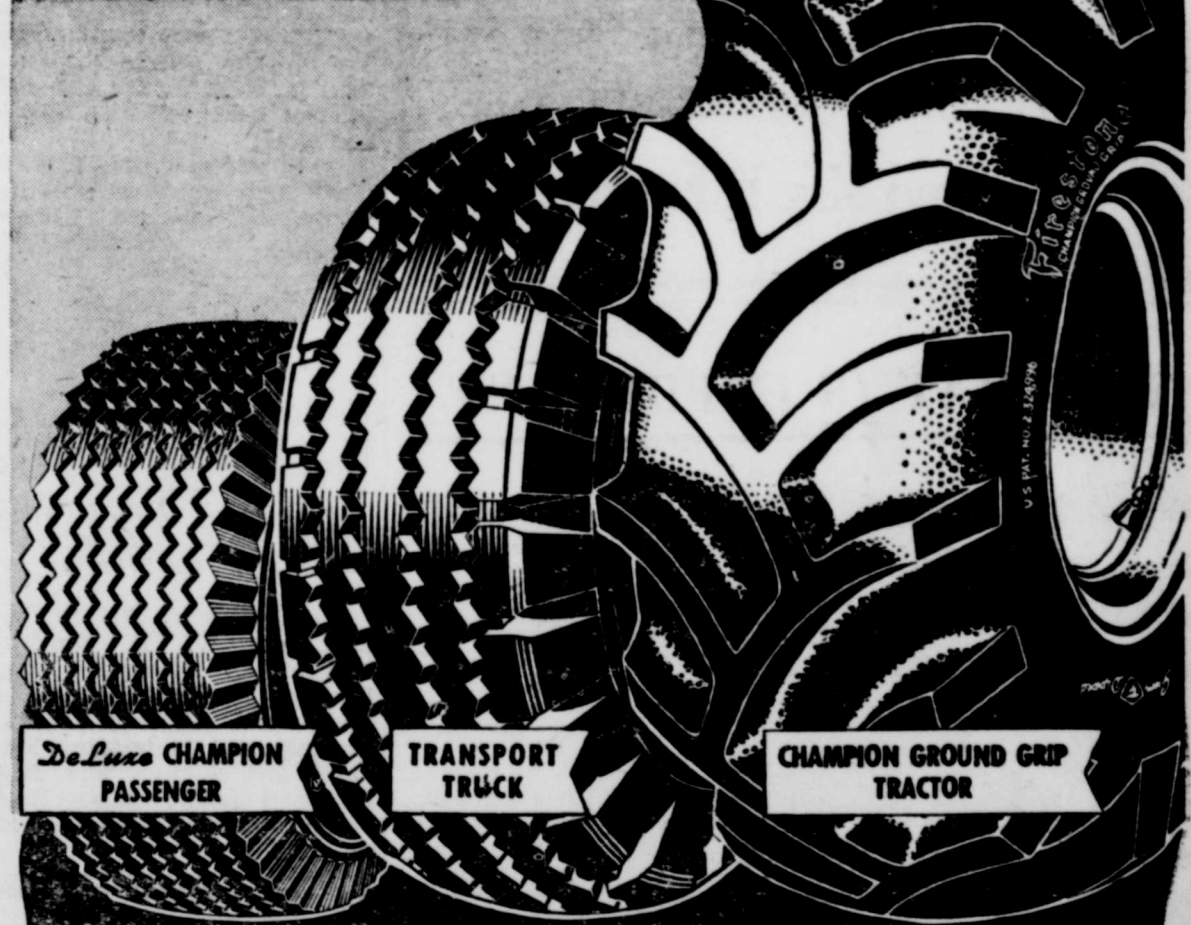

How to Save Gas



A well-tuned engine and proper driving methods resulted in gasoline savings up to 70%, tests recently conducted by Plymouth Motor Corp. at Detroit showed. The testing team above checks recording equipment and notes results of the unusual experiment.

Driver Tests Show Conservation Easy

How to conserve precious gasoline and save money was recently demonstrated at Detroit when results of engineering tests showed savings as high as 70% possible through proper engine tune-up coordinated with correct driving techniques.

The tests were conducted by the Chrysler Engineering division at the instigation of W. B. Rice, director of service for the Plymouth division. They were made by technical experts with a 1948 Plymouth special deluxe sedan equipped with recording and measuring devices including a "fifth wheel" electric speedometer, gasometer, vacuum gauge, odometer, and batteries of stop watches.

No "trick" gasoline saving devices or special fuels were used. The secret of the savings obtained lay in (1) proper spring tune-up of the car, including ignition, carburation, cooling system, oil change and chassis lubrication, and steering and brake adjustments, and (2) employment of proper driving techniques in handling foot throttle and brakes.

A basic gas saving up to 10% may be secured by giving an out-of-tune car the approved dealer's spring tune-up, the tests showed. Fast that point the driver himself holds the whip hand in achieving phenomenal gas savings.

The first test run was over a ten mile course in a section of Detroit where stop lights and stop signs were numerous. Here, reasonably moderate acceleration and braking showed a 60% greater gasoline mileage over the "quick stop and start artist."

Surprisingly, the safe driver who saved so much gas, arrived at the finish of the ten mile course only one and one-half minutes later than the "hurryup" man, made 50 percent fewer stops and spent 51% less of his time at those stops. He averaged only two per cent slower speed and two per cent greater elapsed time.

In a test run over the 165 mile highway from Detroit to Lansing, Michigan, the safe driver achieved a 50% saving in gasoline on the trip.

The surprising difference in gas economy was achieved by maintaining a normal speed of 50 m.p.h. on open highway as against one of 70 m.p.h.

Added to the advantages of conserving the nation's fuel supply for next winter's heating use and the saving in money accruing to the individual is the fact that safety statistics prove the "moderate" driver involved in fewer and less serious accidents than the speed-seeker, Rice pointed out.

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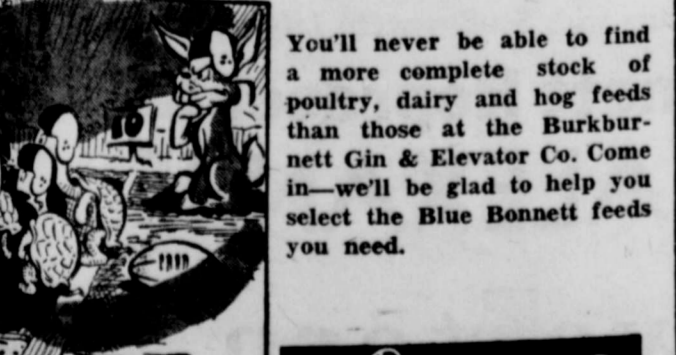

Tex W. Logan's Body Returned For Burial

Santa Monica, Calif.: The article below was received by the Star from Mrs. Robert Dunn of Walters, Oklahoma. Her son, Bill Gokey of Santa Monica, California, mailed the clipping to her. Mr. and Mrs. Gokey attended the services.

One of the Santa Monicans who "came home" aboard the Honda Knot for burial near the homes of his loved ones was First Lt. Tex W. Logan, Air Force, who died as the result

of an airplane crash on Attu Island, July 24, 1944. The plane a UC-64 carrying four officers, crashed into a mountain side after running into a dense fog. Two of the officers were killed instantly. Lieut. Logan, who had received his promotion to first lieutenant that day, suffered third degree burns and a compound fracture of the leg. The other officer, Capt. R. W. Bartley, although seriously injured, was thrown clear of the plane and was able to reach the wreck where he found Lieut. Logan still conscious. Lieut. Logan gave Captain Bartley instructions which enabled him to find help in about two hours.

When the rescuers reached the wreck, Lt. Logan was unconscious. Rushed to a hospital he lived until the following day.

In service two years, Lt. Logan was post operations officer at Attu. Prior to entering service he was an Army inspector for the Vega-Lockheed Corp. and the Douglas Aircraft Co. Before the war, he operated the Capitol and Tex Theatres in Burkburnett, Texas.

After his death a new B-17 was dedicated to his memory by the Lockheed corporation. This plane was flown to its destination by Lt. Logan's brother, Flight Officer Chauncey Logan, then an instructor in the ferrying command of the AAF.

Lt. Logan is survived by his widow, Mrs. Vernice H. Logan, 127-A 14th St.; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. P. Logan, Ft. Worth, Texas; the brother, who lives in Bellflower, and two sisters, Mrs. M. T. Taylor, Swissmore, Oregon; and Mrs. Jewell F. Wright, Long Beach. Mrs. Wright served in the WAC during the war.

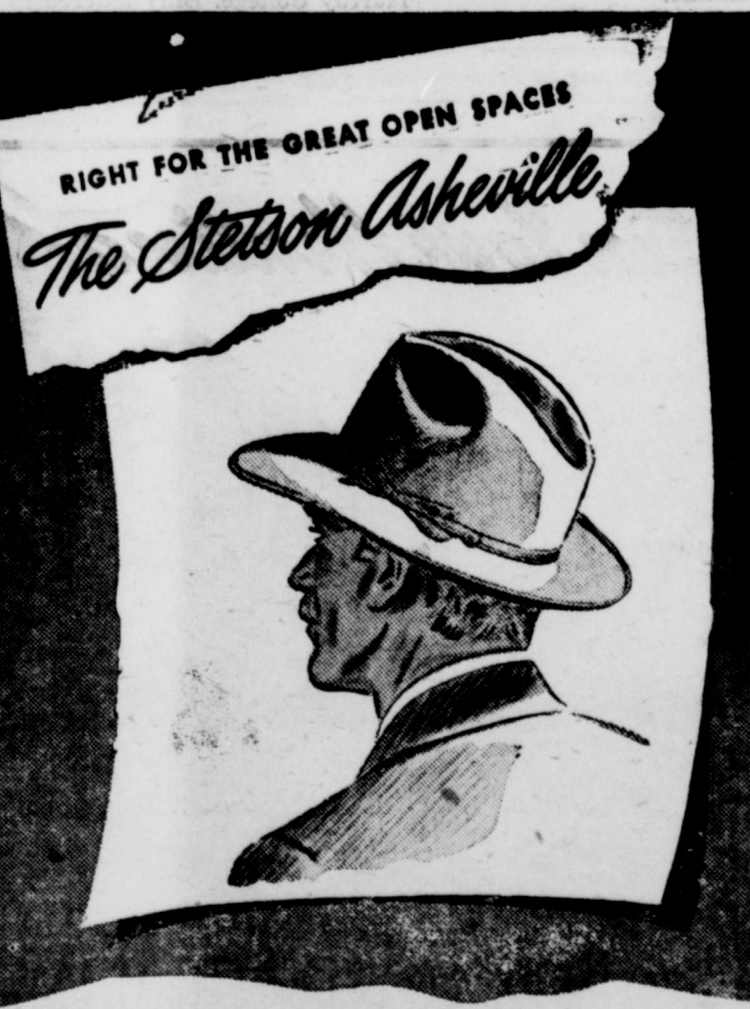
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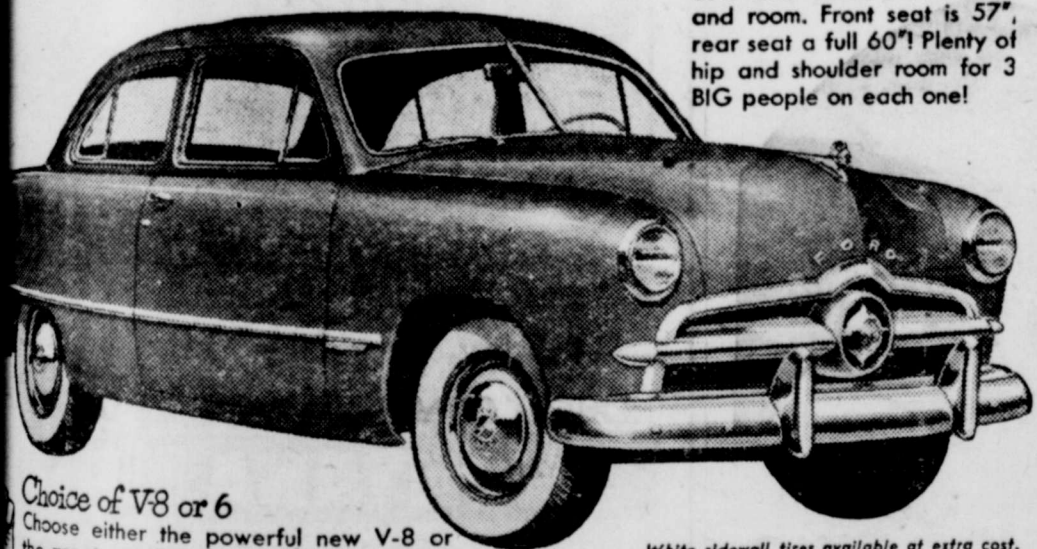

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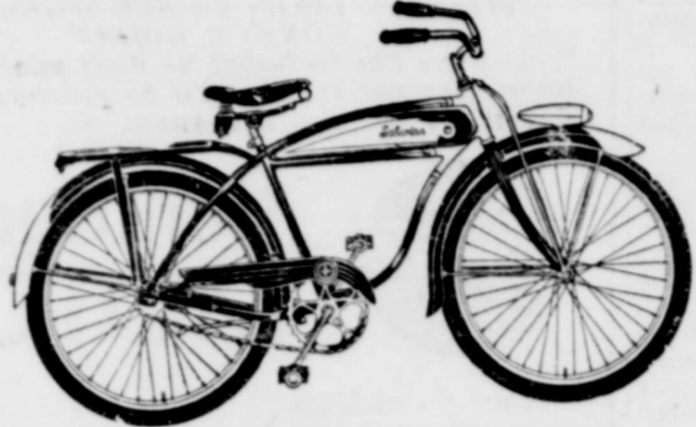

An American's Faith
 This year at the commencement exercises of Harding College a notable address was delivered. It was no ordinary speech. The burden of its message was so significant, and the appeal so earnest, that I wish the audience had been many times larger. I am therefore taking this method of passing to you a portion of this solid and thoughtful address. It was made by Mr. Lamar Fleming, Jr., of Houston, Texas.
 "This historic responsibility is new to us. . . . But those who view accomplishments in the atomic laboratories and the development of other terrible means of destruction must recognize that no one on earth longer has the power to decide whether he will live alone. That power of decision has passed to those who are evil enough to . . . use terrible new weapons for their evil designs—unless mankind combines to prevent them from so doing.

Our Call from Destiny
 "If we accept that, being sons of God, we are, brothers to all Mankind, and that we are the only nation strong enough to lead Mankind to combine for suppression of violence and recovery of Peace, we cannot reject the role to which our Destiny calls us. We will cherish the memory of more placid days, when this responsibility was not upon us, but we cannot reject our Destiny.
 "We must enter this role in humility, conscious of our shortcomings and determined to overcome them to the best of our ability. We must search our souls. We must do more than conquer the resistance to truth which springs from our animal instincts. We must chastise all who seek to inflame and prey upon our group grievances, greeds, and hatreds. We must remind ourselves constantly that our duty of human brotherhood is no less to distant peoples . . . than to our neighbors in our home towns.

Men of Good Will
 "We must realize that peace and well-being will not return to them nor remain with us unless we achieve the ability to work together in a brotherly and mutually helpful company, each placing the common good above the greeds and ambitions of any person, group, or nation. We must include . . . people temporarily prevented from cooperation toward the common good and must pray for the day when their chains will be removed and they will be free to join our company.
 "Above all, we must require of this great undertaking that it function by the standards of millions of individual consciences, which are the communion of sons and daughters with their Spiritual Father—not by group, party, or national ethics, in which conscience gives way to animal instincts, fears, and passions of the herd, and responsibility is spread so thin that no one feels it as his own. This calls for a profound spiritual revival—in us, and in all men and women of good will.
