Bull Dogs Defeat Valley View 24-0

Slashing out with a 24 to 0 defeat over Valley View, the Bulldogs won their first conference game of the 1948 season. Dopsters had predicted a Valley View win, possibly by one or more touchdowns. The Warriors never did give completely up, but their play seemed listless at times during the game.

Early in the first quarter the boys from Valley View bogged down with their offense on the 46 yard line in Burk's territory. They punted to Burk's 5 yard line which was returned 11 yards to the Burk 16. It took only 4 first downs to get the ball down on the Valley View 15. From that point Charles (Peanut) Boyd raced around right end behind good interference for a touchdown. Kick for extra point was wide and no good.

Next score for Burk came in the second quarter after recovering a fumble by Valley View on the opponent's 28 yard line. Boyd and Johnny Crane alternated carrying the ball to the 4. Big Joe Harrison went over right tackle to pay dirt. Again the kick failed.

The third quarter went scoreless, but just after the last period of play started Burk got the ball on Valley View's 32. A couple of penalties for 20 yards against Burk shoved them back and it looked doubtful another score would be made on that series of downs. However Boyd and Harrison fought back to the 4 and Harrison plunged through center for the third counter. Try for point no good. Later in the period Wayne Randolph intercepted a Valley View pass on their 35 and was brought down on the 31. A pass Boyd to Randolph was good for the 31 yards and another touchdown. Extra points were not to be had that night, so the score ended 24 to 0.

Tomorrow (Friday) night the Bulldogs journey to Seymour to try their strength against a team rated up near the top rung.

Sunday School by Mail Launched By Lutherans

Last Sunday, October 3, the Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod, with which the local Lutheran Church is affiliated, launched one of the most ambitious programs ever undertaken in this country to reach children not now enrolled in Sunday Schools. In announcing the project, Dr. J. W. Behnken, president of the church body, stated it would be called "Sunday School by Mail." Under the slogan "Reach the Unreachable," Sunday School by Mail proposes to bring the Christian message to children living in distant, isolated sections of the country, as well as children in metropolitan areas who for one reason or another are not attending regular Sunday Schools.

Official announcement of the "opening" of Sunday School by Mail was made by Dr. Walter A. Maier, speaker on the International Lutheran Hour, at a mass meeting which was broadcast over the Lutheran Hour from Hollywood Bowl, California, last Sunday. The people of Burkburnett and surrounding area, however, will be able to hear the broadcast by recording next Sunday, October 10, at 2:30 P. M., over Station KVWC, Vernon, 1490 Kilocycles. The citizens of our community are invited to tune in on the broadcast.

Sunday School by Mail will be the first major attempt by an American church body to bring a regular course of Bible-centered Christian study into the homes of unchurched people. Parents will be urged to cooperate by providing time and place for the new program in their home. At the same time, parents are asked to take an active part in the study program.

Parents here in the city and especially those in outlying sections who find it difficult to take their children to Sunday School regularly are encouraged to enroll them immediately. All enrollments in this area will be handled through the pastor of the local Lutheran Church, the Rev. Henry C. Schroeder, 309 Avenue E. Call at the parsonage or write, giving the names of the children, their ages, and address. These names will then be passed on to a district director who will maintain direct contact by mail with children enrolled in the program. All expenses will be borne by the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, including postage used in returning corrected worksheets and in sending new lessons.

Fire Check-up Urged to Save Your Home

With colder weather daily increasing the danger of preventable fires, local families are asked to make a full-scale check of homes and apartments to eliminate common hazards during FIRE PREVENTION WEEK, October 3, through 9th.

Effectiveness of thorough inspections has been demonstrated in recent years in many cities, one of which reported that a wide-spread campaign reduced the number of dwelling fires for a 12 month period from 550 to 201.

Inspect Home-Made Wiring
Any "home-wiring" which has been put up by a member of the family should be inspected by a licensed electrician. Penalties in the fuse box are an invitation to fire, and should be removed. Most home circuits use 15-amp fuses, and a supply should be kept handy. Be sure the fuses bear the U. L. label on the box or under the glass.

Special care should be taken to rearrange extension cords, avoiding hanging them over bare nails or running them under rugs. It is safer to replace any worn-looking cords.

Oil and clean the motors of all electric appliances, so they will not overheat and cause fires. Unless the refrigerator motor is the "sealed in" type, it should be oiled. Also check to be sure that the belt is in proper condition, since frayed or oily belts often slip and build up heat.

All gasoline or other inflammable fluids should be removed from both house and garage. Cleaning clothes at home is a dangerous practice, but families which insist upon doing it should use only those preparations tested and approved by Underwriters' Laboratories.

In the kitchen, remove grease accumulations from the stove and place grease containers some distance from it. Keep a few cupfuls of soda or salt handy to throw on grease fires in broilers or cooking vessels.

IT GOES TO SHOW

An Oregon town, population about 7,700, proves that kindness pays. Courtesy has its own reward, at least the police department of La Grande find it so. Where parking meters are used, when the "violation" shows in red, you generally get a ticket that indicates a fine for over-parking. In this small town, at the instigation of the Chamber of Commerce who invested \$25 as capital for the plan, when the parking meter shows "red", the patrolman puts a nickel in the slot, attaches a courtesy envelope in which the motorist can return the five cents. Those with little faith, think the system is foolhardy. However, extending such courtesy is so appreciated, that in one month's time, the interest on the investment was 6 per cent! Folks not only returned the nickel but some sent dimes and quarters. Two sent half-dollars and one sent a dollar. Maybe, over a period of time, trusting to the honesty of man, may be a loss to La Grande. We doubt it. There will be those who neglect to return the nickel and the man who pays the dime or quarter will take care of the debt. Maybe so, but we believe that the majority of people are not going to return evil for good. We need to be reminded, now and then, by just such a program for honesty and courtesy as offered in Oregon, that "chiselers" are in the minority.

Wichita County Farm Bureau News

From the Office of MRS. M. L. HINES

The biggest district meeting ever held in Texas was that of District Three, Texas Farm Bureau Federation, which met at the Holt Hotel in Wichita Falls on Friday, October 1, when 600 names were counted on the registration sheets. Loys Barbour, district director, presided, and complimented the huge turnout at a "period when more is being done to manner down the income of the farmer than ever before in history."

Miss Margaret Downey, 19 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Downey of Jean, was crowned queen of District III Farm Bureau, with Miss Veeda Graham, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Graham of Aspermont, as runner-up in the 17 area county contest, with 10 girls participating.

Marvin Carter, state organization director and featured speaker of the morning, urged farmers to continue the fight for 90 per cent parity prices and listed the accomplishments of the organization during recent days to include the program to get the farmer "out of the mud," the project for underground water control, the progress in the insurance program and the Farm Bureau's success in getting government facilities for storing grain sorghums.

Especially appreciated was the talk by Senator George Moffett in his defense of the farmers as a target of irate consumers to blame high prices on producers only. Said Moffett, "When a shirt containing 29 cents worth of cotton retails at \$3.00, I don't think the price of cotton is high. High wages and high freight rates contribute to high prices; yet you don't hear much complaint about either of those causes." He commended the Bureau for having the welfare of the entire country at heart, not just its membership. Two field representatives,

Austin Crownever and H. T. Cardwell, gave concise details for the conducting of the Fall Round-up and were very optimistic in their predictions as to the results.

Mrs. Katherine Sue Banks led the singing of the day, with Mrs. Otis Gay as piano accompanist, a dialogue by W. H. Mathis and J. M. Cox and a stunt by Mrs. W. A. Scott and Mrs. Geo. Lewis gave color and humor to the program of the day.

A second event which shows the Wichita County Farm Bureau to be a healthy organization is the booth at the Texas-Oklahoma Fair, where an educational poster forms the background for display and the free literature which is being handed out by members is there for the taking.

Delay may cost his life

may mean that the dog has swallowed some sharp object such as a splintered bone which has lodged in the intestines. Gastroenteritis, an inflammation of the mucous lining of the stomach and intestines, is a common illness in dogs and always manifests itself by a digestive upset. This is a dangerous disease that usually runs a rapid course and diagnosis and treatment by a veterinarian should be obtained without delay.

Neglected or wrongly-treated canine skin conditions can cause the dog unceasing misery and leave permanent scars and bald patches in the coat.

Distemper is the most dreaded scourge of dogdom and no right-minded dog owner should attempt to deal with this deadly virus disease without the aid of a veterinarian. High fever, listlessness, mattery eyes, loss of appetite, runny nose, and coughing are all symptomatic of distemper and should never be ignored or dismissed. By prompt dosage with a specific serum and the use of the newer antibiotics distemper can usually be licked. The dog-owner who suspects distemper and disregards the danger signals, thinking, "Maybe Fido will feel better tomorrow," is living in a fool's paradise—the chances are that Fido will be worse by tomorrow and a delay of 24 hours in the treatment of distemper can make the difference between a recovery and a sad end for Fido.

DOGS, TOO, HAVE CALORY PROBLEMS

Dogs, no less than their owners, have to watch their calories, writes Dr. M. L. Morris in The Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association. To fill their energy requirements, they need an average daily intake of between 30 to 60 calories for each pound of body weight, depending on the composition and quality of the food and the breed. Growing dogs and dogs of active, nervous type require the highest volume of calories. To figure a dog's requirements, it should be borne in mind that the average dry dog food sold contains about 1,100 calories per pound, while one pound of canned dog food usually furnishes slightly less than 500 calories.—Gaines Dog Research Progress.

PRICE AID: Sure Thing

One thing is dead sure about the coming election: No matter who gets into office, farm price supports will be continued.
Governor Dewey is on record as favoring the Hope-Aiken law passed by congress last June, and President Truman says he is in favor of farm price supports and has been all along.

BOTH SIDES have promised their help to the nation's farmers. As a result of the growing amount of light that has been shed upon the idea of price supports there has been a lot of argument as to whether they keep up costs of living in the city and, hence, contribute generally toward inflation.

The system was started in the 1930s to save farmers from bankruptcy caused by surplus production and lack of consumer buying. It accomplished that end.
IT WAS CHANGED during the war to make farmers produce more food than the country needed to feed less fortunate nations who were fighting the Axis. It did that.

After the war this incentive system was continued to keep greater amounts of food flowing into destitute areas abroad. It was successful in that, also.
Now, however, as a result of this artificial stimulation, production is beginning to pile up in the U. S. The wartime pattern of price support no longer fits the American market.

THE POTATO situation is a case in point. As the government continues to stimulate the production of potatoes the guaranteed prices keep consumers from getting the surplus crops at bargain prices, and at the same time the system keeps farmers growing too many potatoes.
Congress this year elected to revise the price support program, effective in 1950, by providing new parity prices based on modern farm practices and by allowing a fluctuation in support levels to conform with general economic conditions.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

By DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
SCRIPTURE: Genesis 11:27-25:11. DEVOTIONAL READING: Hebrews 11:1-10.

God's View of People Lesson for October 10, 1948

"YOU can learn more about human nature from reading the Bible than from living in New York," said a Yale professor who had tried it both ways. He was right; for in New York you are likely to see your neighbors only on the outside, while in the Bible you are introduced to people on the inside.

One great value of the Bible is its plain stories about people, all sorts of people—simple, great, wise, foolish, saints and sinners. They lived thousands of miles from here, and thousands of years ago. They dressed differently and many of them spoke in languages now dead. Yet somehow they live in these inspired stories.

Saints ONE of the great biographies of the Bible is that of Abraham. If you will read it in Genesis you will see it is not like one of our modern biographies; it does not follow a continuous line, but consists of short incidents strung together sometimes without connection.

It is more like an album of pictures than like a movie. Yet putting all the pictures together we get an impression of a remarkable man.
Indeed, Abraham was one of the most remarkable men who ever lived. Without a church, without a Bible, without prophet or priest or tradition, born in a nation and a family that "worshipped other gods," as Joshua said later, somehow Abraham came to know that there is but one God, and not only to know that as a fact but to know that God as a friend. (In fact, Abraham's name among the Arabs to this day is "The Friend.") We must call Abraham one of the great religious geniuses of all human history.

Yet he does not stand alone. The Bible is a book of saints; the letter to the Hebrews calls the roll of some, and ends by saying time is too short to name them all.

Now a saint is not a person who lives totally without sin. A saint is one in whose life goodness is stronger than evil; a saint is one who actually lives as a friend of God, for whom God is the central fact in all his life.

Sinners THESE are no whitewashed plaster saints, the great and small figures of the Bible stories. They come before us just as they were. Abraham, for example, at times was a coward, a liar, a bigamist, a slave-holder.

We must not suppose that everything any character in the Bible did was right, or is right today. The writers simply tell the stories, seldom using adjectives like "bad" or "good" or "noble" or "mean." We are left to make our own judgments.

We are shown what effects sin has on men, we see how evil spreads by suggestion and imitation, we see how temptation works. God inspired the biographers; but he does not inspire men to tell lies or to cover up evil by calling it good. So do not be shocked to find that even a saint like Abraham had feet of clay. The important things about him are the good, not the bad.

The Light That Shines

FURTHERMORE, when you read these Bible biographies, you catch a very interesting story, through them all; namely the story of the human understanding of Right and Wrong.

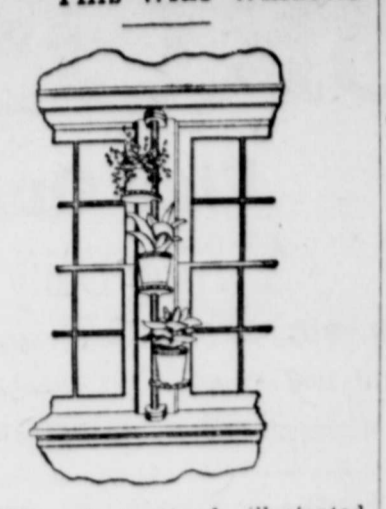
But in Old Testament times, as in the case of Abraham, we must remember they were in the dawn-years before the sunlight of Christ had risen. Some of the things Abraham did would get him into jail nowadays; but some of those very acts were then the mark of a gentleman.

Sometimes when you are discouraged and think the world is growing worse, all you need to do is to think back to some of these old Bible stories. What the very best people did then, is now by Christians seen to be not always good.

The human race has progressed, and now live more than in its knowledge of what is right to do. And even so, a man like Abraham, as good and great as he was, shines with an even brighter light across the centuries, challenging us to rise above our times as he often rose above his own.

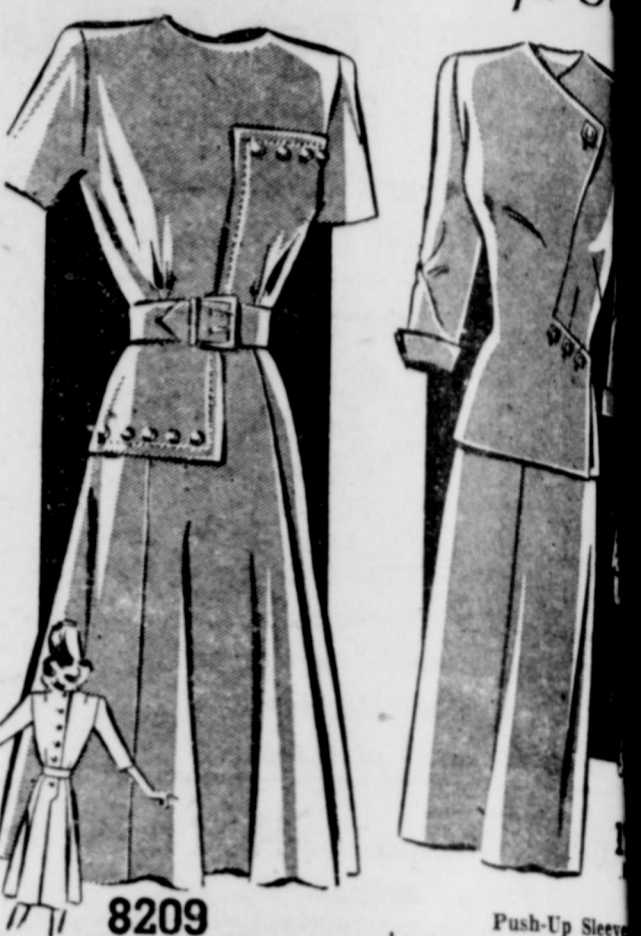

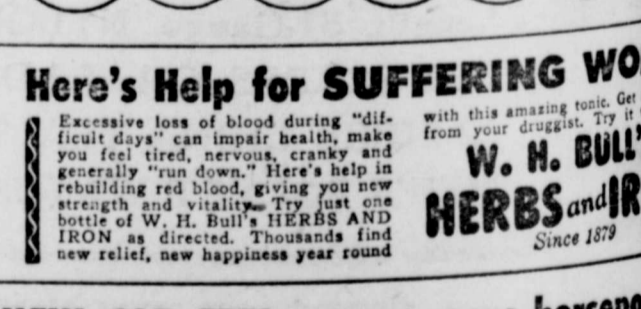

CONSERVING EGGS QUALITY IS VITAL

Present indications are that eggs will reach, or nearly reach all-time highs this season. With such conditions prevailing, the egg-producer should pay the closest heed to quality conservation, so that he can receive top prices for his produce.

Approximately 95 per cent of all eggs are grade A or grade AA when they are laid. What is it then that lowers the quality of eggs? What is it but poor handling? Yes conservation of egg quality is certainly one of the most important and most neglected—phases of poultry-raising.

After they are laid, what treatment do your eggs receive? Are they gathered at least three times daily? Are they placed in ventilated containers? Do you take care to keep them clean?

The answer, of course, to all these questions should be "yes." Here are other factors in conserving egg quality—

Cool eggs promptly upon gathering, and keep them cool. Maintain the egg room's temperature below 60 degrees. Leave the room fairly moist, but free of odors. Keep eggs in ventilated wire baskets.

Dry-clean soiled eggs before casing them. Pack them with care. (If possible, candle them before packing.) Use standard cases and clean flats and fillers. Pre-cool cases etc. by leaving them in the egg room. Pack eggs small end down only. Place long eggs and very large ones in top layer near center partition. Do not nail case lid to partition. Do not send cracked, thin-shelled, or badly-stained eggs to market. Market eggs at least twice a

week. void rough handling of cases. Protect eggs against extreme temperatures on the way to market. Sell to a buyer who will continue to conserve the quality of the eggs. This last is equally important as your own treatment of the eggs, for if the retailer allows them to deteriorate, you may get the blame though it is assuredly no fault of yours. However, there is a trend toward more conservation of quality in the progressive retail stores.

Sudden Chilling May Bring Colds

Sudden seasonal changes in the weather during the fall months often result in chilling, which in turn is usually followed by wide-spread incidence of the common cold. This disease always spreads rapidly because of the fact that very few people can live isolated lives and in any group of people, coughing, sneezing and spitting will scatter millions of cold germs among susceptible persons.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that there are countless ways of spreading a cold other than by coughing, sneezing and spitting. "For instance," the Doctor said, "if a member of your family has a cold and the other members share a common drinking glass with him, you may expect the whole family to pick up the germs he leaves on the glass. Sometimes a person with a cold

thoughtlessly touches his mouth or nostrils with his hand, and then shakes hands with another person. That person can, and very likely will contaminate his own mouth or nostrils with his hand, and the germs are transmitted into his system. A child with a cold may contaminate his toys, and the next child that picks them up and plays with them will certainly obtain the cold germs, along with the toys."

Children, as well as adults, who are suffering from a cold should be put to bed, and if complete rest, light food, and plenty of liquids do not improve his condition in a short time, the family physician should be called. Dr. Cox further advised that dressing properly for the

weather, sensible eating, plenty of rest, and avoiding persons with colds can be helpful in preventing your own infection. Colds are costly in time,

health, and money, the Doctor said, and added, "Prevent them if possible."

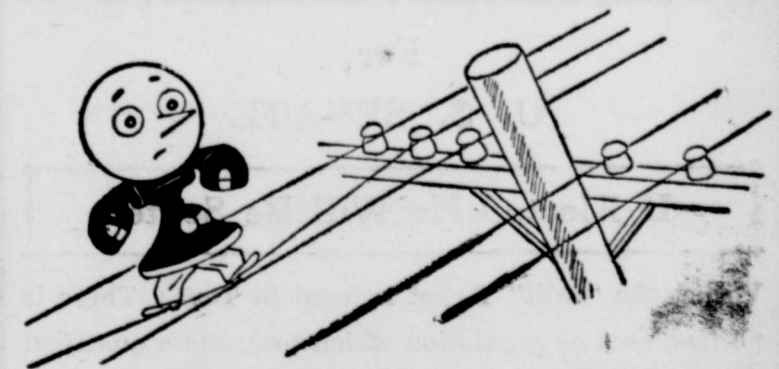

The committee, which is non-political, seeks to assure fair representation in the Texas Legislature for all counties by urging voters to support Amendment Two on the general election ballot November 2. Passage of Amendment Two will permit redistricting in Texas for the first time in 27 years, Shepperd pointed out.

U S Savings Bonds Urged for Farmers

Agricultural leaders of Texas will meet in Dallas on Wednesday, October 13, to discuss how farmers and ranchers can utilize the U. S. Savings Bonds program for the sound management of their financial affairs.

The conference was called by Nathan Adams of Dallas, chairman of the Treasury Department's advisory committee for Texas. It will be held at the Baker Hotel from 9:30 A. M. to 2 P. M.

Mr. Adams said that representatives of nearly every farm agency and organization in the state had signified their intention of attending the meeting. Tom Leadley of Lincoln, Neb., widely known editor of The Nebraska Farmer, will address the conference. C. N. Shepardson, dean of the School of Agriculture at Texas A & M College, will preside.

Mr. Shepardson also will conduct a forum discussion on means for educating farmers and ranchers to the value of regular investments in U. S. Savings Bonds as a factor in sound agricultural management.

U. S. Navy Band At Wichita Falls Monday, Oct. 18th

Engaged in its first concert "cruise" of the Southwest since World War Two, the United States Navy Band will invade Wichita Falls Monday, October 18, to entertain the public of this area in two concerts, afternoon and night, in the Memorial Auditorium.

Designated by Congress in 1925 as "The United States Navy Band," the unit rapidly lifted itself into the uppermost ranks of concert organizations in this country. In 1940, the American Bandmasters Association voted it the outstanding band in all America. In recent years, the famous band has become quite as popular on radio network programs as in concert halls throughout the nation.

Under the direction of Lt. Cdr. Charles Brendler, U.S.N., the company of life-long, highly-trained musicians will cover 13 states on the 1948 tour. Tour manager is Gib Sandefer, formerly of Abilene, who gained initial fame in that field as tour manager for the Hardin-Simmons University Cowboy Band.

The United States Navy Band will appear in Wichita Falls under auspices of the Lions Club for the benefit of charitable projects. These are the improvement and maintenance of Harrell Park for the Camp Fire Girls of this entire district, and aid for the blind. The Navy's band is available for concerts only to civic groups for public welfare projects, and can not be booked as a private enterprise. Mrs. Hal Yeager has been engaged as business manager for the event, and will handle through P. O. Box 1082 all mail orders in advance of the local box office sale of tickets during the week preceding the two concerts in Wichita Falls.

The matinee, designed primarily for youth, will feature popular music, jazz classics and novelties, all meant for sheer fun. The piccolo and contra-bassoon, for instance, engage in a dialog entitled "The Cricket and the Bullfrog." For the night concert, Commander Brendler chooses a variety of numbers to which he applies the one description: "Great Music." Press notices have been notably flattering.

Special prices and seating arrangements are being offered school and college bands of this area, many of which already are making plans to attend either one or both Wichita Falls concerts.

New Testament Church

There is no New Testament authority for the mechanical music in the worship of the church, this will be followed and various reasons are given. We want to notice some of these arguments.

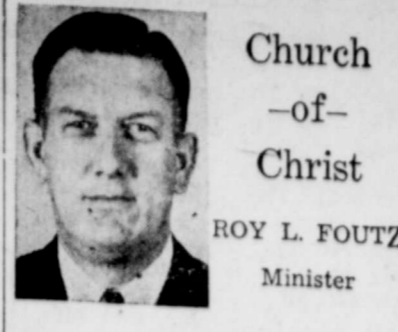
People contend for the use of mechanical music as used in the Old Testament, and if it were used, it is all right now. But remember, we are in the NEW TESTAMENT CHURCH. Many people claiming to be the New Testament church are using the Old Testament argument. The old law has been taken out of the way. Col. 2-14; Gal. 3:24-29; Gal. 3:1-4; Heb. 10:9-10, and we are no longer under the law.

The argument is used that there will be mechanical music in heaven, and, for that reason, it is all right now. It cannot be successfully proved that there will be such things in heaven, and even if it were proved, that doesn't prove authority for the use of mechanical music in the church today. If the Lord had intended this form of worship in the church, He would have said so in the New Testament.

Someone says, "The Bible doesn't condemn it." "Thou shalt not have it." This is another argument. It proves too much, and therefore, proves that mechanical music is wrong. If it were all right, it would be as good as saying that the Lord commanded us to do, and anything that is more than that is not in the doctrine of Christ, we have no authority for it. If so, let someone show us.

It is also used, but it is no real argument. If it is all right to have mechanical music in the church, it is all right to have it in the church. The church are two different institutions, and they are not parallel.

It does not permit the use of others, but they are used only because they are used at all. That there is no authority for this unscriptural practice, that these unreasonable arguments are used to keep themselves from the New Testament. How can a church be the New Testament church if it has something in its worship for which there is no authority in the New Testament. THINK ON THESE THINGS.



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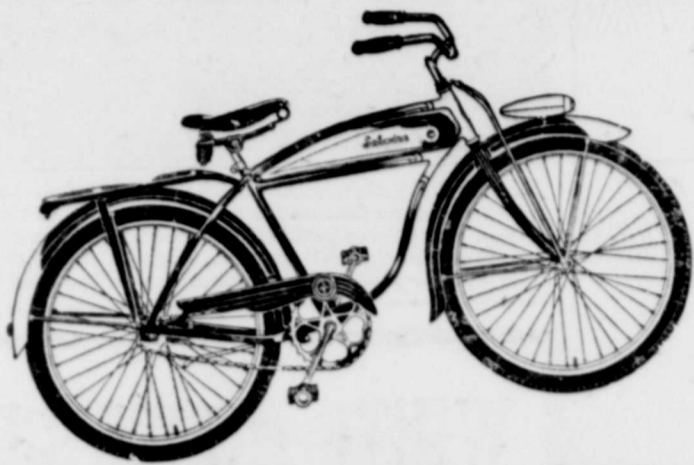
