Mrs. C. W. Stradley, president, presided over the meeting. Four representatives attending the County Council Meeting at Northside Electra School, gave reports of this meeting.

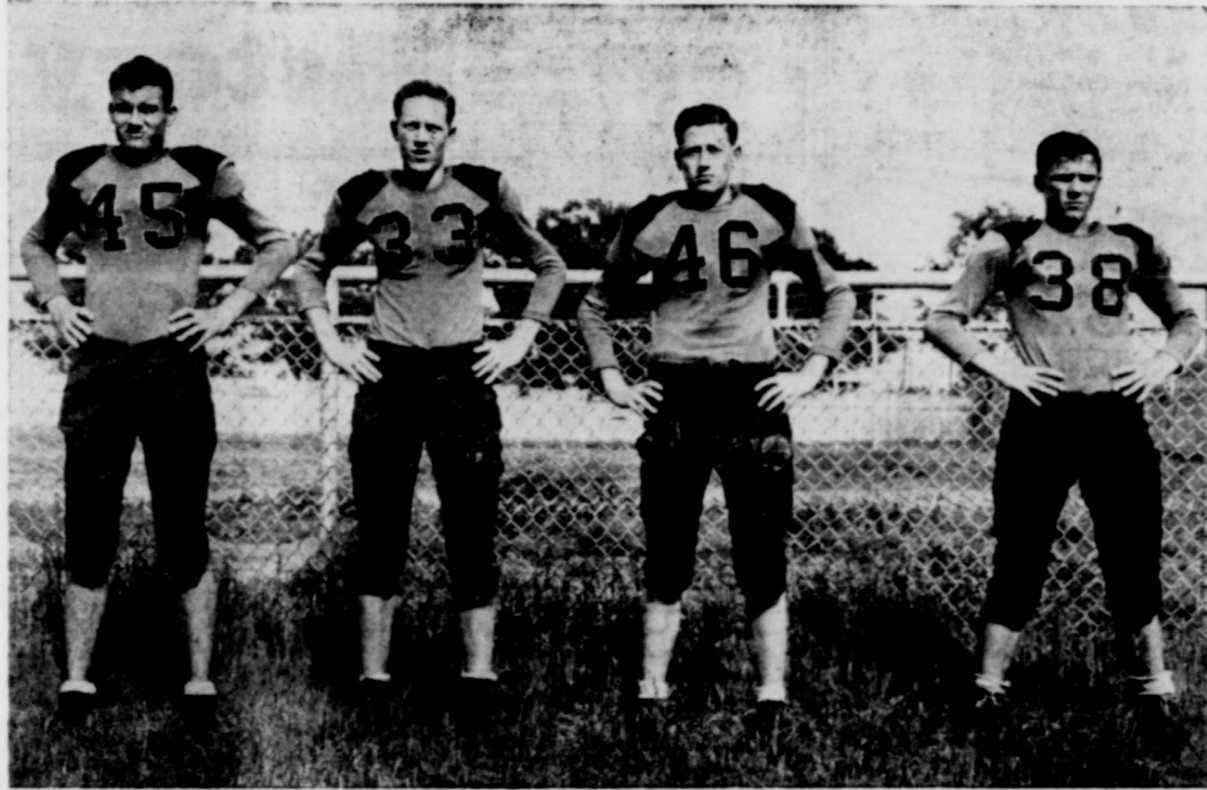

### BLAMING THE FARMER

Now that we have harvested next to the biggest wheat crop in the country's history, now that the corn crop totals the largest ever, and other crops have been generally good, numerous consumers in non-rural areas, ask why this should not immediately and effectively, bring the cost of living down. Many place the blame of high prices on the farmer. Farmers have produced to their limit, have worked longer hours than any other group, and they deserve a hearing. Ask a farmer around Burkburnett and he will quote the Department of Agriculture for the statement that farm production costs last year amounted to more than the total farm income during any year between World War I and World War II. He adds: before 1914 the average monthly wage for the farm's hired man was \$22.09, with board. Today it runs \$105, with board. During last January, costs of feedstuffs was three times as high as in 1939. All commodities used in farm production now stand at 254 per cent of the base period, 1909-1914. Average weekly earnings of factory workers stand at 465 per cent, of the same level. So better think twice before placing all the blame on the farmer, for the high cost of living.

### LET'S REMOVE OUR BLINDERS

It frequently happens that when a public figure such as a movie star, become tangled in a scandal, there results a feeling of tenderness for the idol, that he is being picked on because he happens to be in the limelight. This is occurring again about the Hollywood movie star who has been arrested in a dope raid. ### CHICK CHATS

#### WATCH BIRDS FOR DISEASE SYMPTOMS

All through the fall and winter your laying flocks should be watched with careful eye for signs of disease or parasites. Just a little negligence on your part during the cold weather months may jeopardize the health of your birds and throw your profit prospects for a serious loss.

Never is good management of your flock any more important than it is during cold weather—for this is the time when sudden heavy losses due to disease may be expected.

What are some of the things to be done to encourage better health and livability among your chickens?

First, see that your flock is not too crowded. Allow at least four square feet of floor space per bird for heavy breeds and three square feet for light breeds. Disease is more easily spread when chickens are crowded.

Keep the litter dry and clean, removing any that becomes damp. Add clean litter periodically. Stir it often.

See that the roosts are clean and sanitary and that they are constructed so that the birds are unable to contact the droppings underneath the boards. It's a

good idea to remove the droppings at frequent intervals.

Waterers should be kept clean. And there should be enough of them to eliminate crowding among birds wanting to drink.

No poultry house should be so narrow that it is difficult to place the equipment. A small house should be at least 12 feet wide. Long houses should be partitioned into units at 30 foot intervals to prevent drafts and to keep the flocks of these units segregated. Partitions should be flush with the floor, solid, and at least 2 1/2 feet high.

The house should be big enough to provide about 2 square feet of floor space for each bird—4 square feet for heavy breeds.

## Roughage Is Money - Saver For Stockman

Ample roughage is essential for the most economical feeding of livestock, even when grains and other feeds are abundant as they are this year, feeding authorities point out.

Rations built around plenty of roughage, properly supplemented with grains and protein concentrates, are most economical and efficient because the roughage furnishes nutrients at low cost, provides bulk needed for proper digestion of other feeds and increases efficiency.

Cottonseed hulls, more plentiful as a result of the larger 1948 cotton crop, are a widely used economical roughage. Ex-

perience and Experiment Station tests have proved that cottonseed hulls are equal in feeding value to Bermuda, Johnson grass and other average grass hays. In fattening rations for cattle, 100 pounds of cotton seed hulls replaced 250 pounds of sorghum silage or 200 pounds of corn silage.

Because they prevent scouring or bloating, cottonseed hulls are recommended for feeding with silage, and legume hay, and for livestock on young, tender pastures.

Dairy cows should have dry roughage available at all times. Even when pasture is excellent, keeping dry roughage available before cows is recommended by authorities as insurance for obtaining nutrients that may not have been available in grazing. With fair or poor pasture, roughage is essential to supply needed feed.

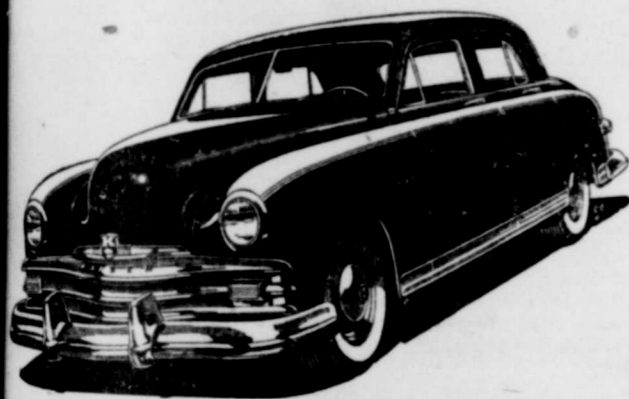

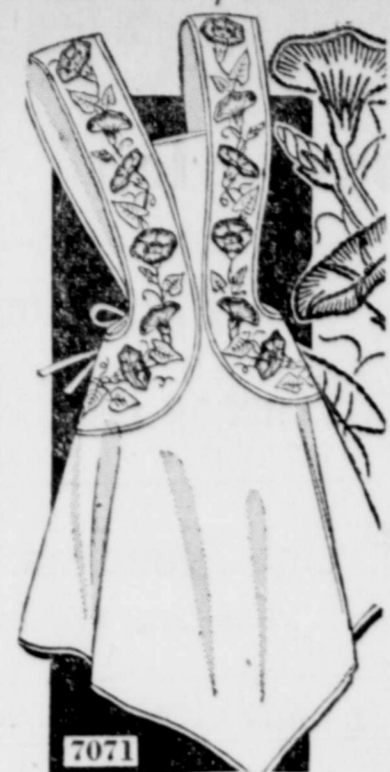

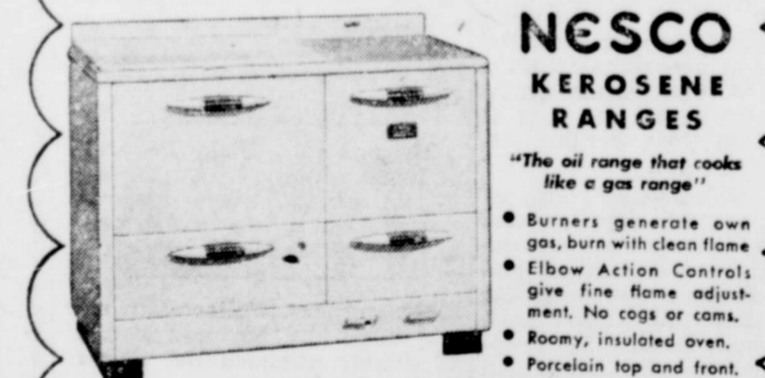

His Hand in History

Lesson for October 24, 1948

SUPPOSE you were given a long flexible wire and were asked to arrange it on a pattern which would represent history, what would you do to it?

Someone else would arrange the wire like a long arrow pointing upward; others would make it into an arrow pointing downward; there would be the pure optimists and pessimists among historians.

Others would arrange it in a series of up-and-down curves—history, they would say, sometimes goes up and sometimes down, but it never gets anywhere.

Others still might take that wire and shape it into a kind of spiral, almost repeating itself but never quite, often seeming to go backward but actually making some progress.

God's Chosen People A GOOD deal of the Old Testament is taken up with history. Starting with Genesis and going through Esther, most of what you read is history.

The historical parts of the Bible were written by men who had a theory of history. They would agree that the Golden Age is ahead of us, not behind.

They would all agree that the most important figure in human history is not a human being at all, but God the Creator. They would all agree that his hand can be seen—if you look for it—in the events of man's existence here.

The whole of Hebrew history is a sort of sermon on this text: Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people.

Somehow Good ONE great lesson the Old Testament history teaches is that God's will is good, and that when man defies and disobeys that will, he does it to his own destruction, but that God can bring good out of evil.

People often act from bad motives; yet even the worst of motives God can overrule. David waded in blood to his throne, and he treated cruelly many of his enemies. That was not good; yet God brought out of that a national independence and strength.

David put Solomon on the throne because he was the son of his favorite wife; that was pure favoritism. Yet God brought good out of a choice which was selfish.

When the Israelites were tempted to fall for the cheap and nasty gods whose shrines filled the land, that was bad; but it gave the prophets their best opportunity to make perfectly clear the difference between false and true religion.

The Voice of God HISTORY is no bucket of ashes. If you have ears to listen, it is the voice of God. These ancient tales of a nation long since dead, that lived in all scarce 500 years carry God's voice to us today.

The diseases which are fatal to a nation's life are here described: the foundations on which alone true national welfare can be built are made quite plain.

Up to now, all nations have perished sooner or later. We can see some of them decaying in our own time. That is because no nation ever yet has built its life on God's design. But the pattern is there, the lesson has been written. God still waits for a people who will learn his lesson in how to live.

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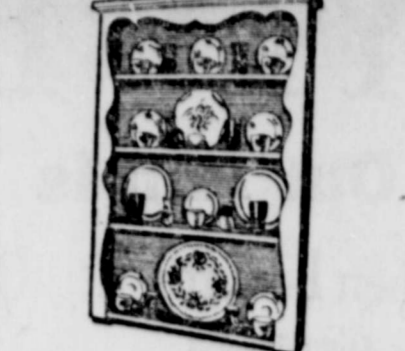

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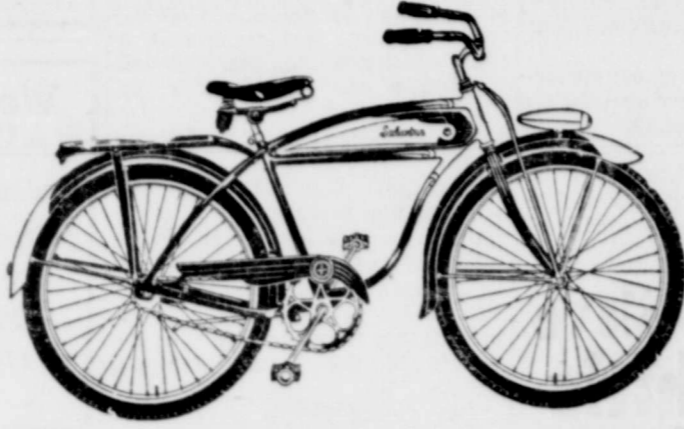

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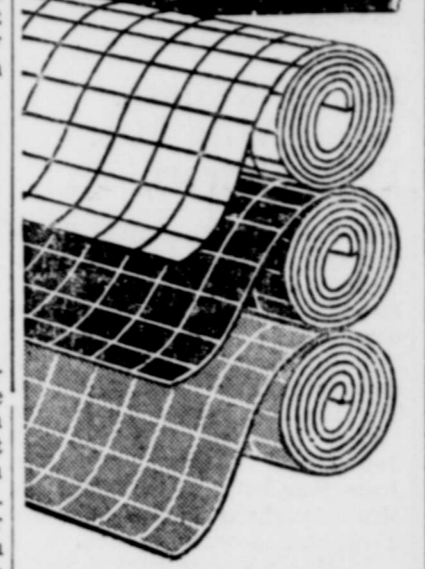
