News of Soil Conservation

There has been approximately 3 miles of terraces completed on Melinda Bingel's farm this week. They were constructed by Commissioner H. H. Haynes of Electra. Other farmers constructing terraces in the Pumpkin Center Conservation Group the past month are: Jacob Reesler, 1.5 miles; Elwood Haynes, 1.4 miles; Frieda Nieman, 3 miles; Charles Pace, 3 1-2 miles; and Judson Irby, 1 mile. Terracing is one means to an end of good conservative farming. After terraces have been properly constructed, a crop rotation that includes a legume should be followed.

Applications for assistance of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District have been received on 160 acres of J. L. Gage, 1500 acres of Gary Lee, 422 acres of Mike Hartman-gruber, and 293 acres of the Perkins-Prothro Co.

Stock ponds have been completed on the following farms the past week: Frank Foster, State Hospital, Arthur Ramm, C. H. McKinley, and Bullington-Parish. Since our annual evaporation here ranges from 5 to 6 feet each year, it is necessary to construct ponds 12 to 14 feet deep to provide an everlasting water supply for livestock.

Borders have been run and are now in the process of being constructed on 50 acres of Rufus King's farm in the Kamay Conservation Group. Prior to the building of borders, a carry-all leveled the irregular land then the 60 ft. land plane, owned by the Irrigation Improvement District, leveled the land. He plans to plant the area to alfalfa. At present, King has 250 acres of alfalfa that he is

using for hay and pasture purposes.

Borders are being run on Johnny Williamson's farm S-E of Iowa Park this week. Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service assigned to the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District are running the borders.

There have been 3.5 miles of terraces completed on Edgar Siber's farm of the Clara Conservation Group this week. F. M. Myers has 1 mile of terraces constructed on his farm N. of Clara. Commissioner Hines' equipment did the work.

1,661 feet of diversion terraces have been constructed the past week on Ross D. Schleigh's farm, East of Pumpkin Center.

A stock pond has been staked out on Wilur Prechel's farm north of Clara this week.

A terrace outlet channel has been completed on V. I. Sieler's farm of the Barwise Conservation Group. The channel has been sodded to Bermuda grass for erosion control. Terraces will be constructed and empty into the channel after sufficient growth of grass is present.

Approximately 2 miles of terraces are now in the process of being constructed on L. F. Miller's farm East of Iowa Park. The terrace lines were run by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service assigned to the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District.

One mile of terraces has been completed on Bill Overby's farm the past week and 1.5 miles on Van Lesley's farm.

Jerry Vinson has increased the growth and improved his grass or range over 50 per cent

the last two years by proper stocking. Two years ago, this ranch was one of the most overgrazed in Wichita County. Today conditions have changed by properly stocking the range according to capability of soil to produce. Over 90 per cent of pastures in this soil conservation district are overgrazed and erosion is occurring on pasture land as on cultivated fields. A simple rule to follow is improve range land is to take half and leave half.

C. M. (Duby) Thompson of Burk Burnett has purchased a new type terracing machine which is called a "Hancock Terracer." It is a modified type of elevating grader and is pulled by a large grain type tractor. In good moist soil it should build approximately 1 mile of terraces per day.

Approximately 500 additional acres of alfalfa have been planted on district cooperators' farms in the Wichita Valley this fall. Most of this alfalfa was planted on land leveled and bordered on the contour, and prepared for best irrigation. Alfalfa is one of the best soil improving crops.

Inspect Cars Now For Winter Driving Police Chief Urges

Lax automobile owners who are negligent in the care and maintenance of their cars are the cause of many of Burk Burnett night time auto accidents, Chief of Police Willis Bartley declared today.

"Greater safety on the road at night," he said, "is impossible until the careless fellow who things he can drive his car with one light on, with faulty misaligned headlights, poor tires, and brakes, wakes up to the fact that he is a menace on the road at night . . . and does something about it."

With longer nights ahead this Fall and Winter which means more night driving, it is more important than ever that motorists give their car lights regular care, Chief Bartley said. An improperly directed headlight can blind the driver of an oncoming car in an instant and cause an accident, according to Bartley. Tail lights and warning lights are also very necessary accident prevention devices which must be carefully maintained he said.

Chief Bartley suggested several important precautions for driving safety at night which all motorists should observe:

1. Check the condition of all tires, brakes and other safety devices regularly.
2. Give headlights regular care. Have them tested and aimed at least twice a year. Be sure all car lights operate satisfactorily, at all times.
3. Always lower lights when meeting another car.

As we strolled back to the airport, I asked the question that had been in my mind ever since Harvey started that story.

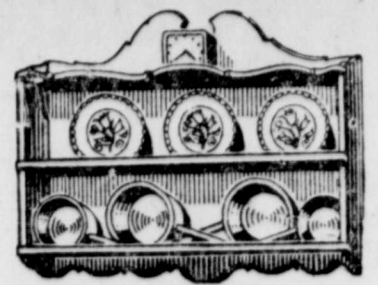
"Harv, that guy back in the restaurant... was that Mark Stevens?"

Eight Amendments To Be Voted On In Coming Election

Texans will have the opportunity to vote on eight proposed Constitutional Amendments in the November 2nd election. The following summary of some of these amendments which will be on the bottom of the ballot, has been furnished to this paper for the information of the voters by Senator George Moffett of this district:

Amendment No. 2, of which Senator Moffett is the author, provides that if the Legislature fails to redistrict the State after each Federal census, then a redistricting board composed of the Lieutenant-Governor, the Speaker of the House, the Attorney General, the Land Commissioner, and the Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw up a redistricting ordinance which shall have the same force and effect as if the Legislature had redistricted the State and filed it with the Secretary of State. Population changes call for changes in the various districts, yet the Legislature has failed to redistrict since 1921. This Amendment is considered by some to be the most important of the entire group.

Amendment No. 5 carries forward the present \$3,000 home exemption from taxation. It does not change the homestead exemption but merely continues it and should be adopted.

Amendment No. 7 abolishes the present State General Fund tax on property which is 30c on each \$100 assessed valuation. It in no way affects the school taxes levied either by the state or the local district. In addition to abolishing the State General Fund tax on property this Amendment further provides that the people of each county may through an election vote a local tax of not more than 30c for the purpose of building farm to market roads or for flood control. It is not essential that the people of any county vote this local tax and if they do vote it, the amount can be anywhere from 1c to 30c; and since the State General Fund tax of 30c will be abolished the actual result will be that many counties will have lower taxes than they now have, and it will also

mean the end of tax remission which about forty counties in the southern part of the State have been getting for many years, often without suitable justification.

Amendment No. 8 authorizes a retirement system for the district judges and also the judges of the higher courts in Texas. This has been done in most other states. It is hoped that the voters will study these Amendments carefully before going to the polls, as some of them at least are of considerable importance.

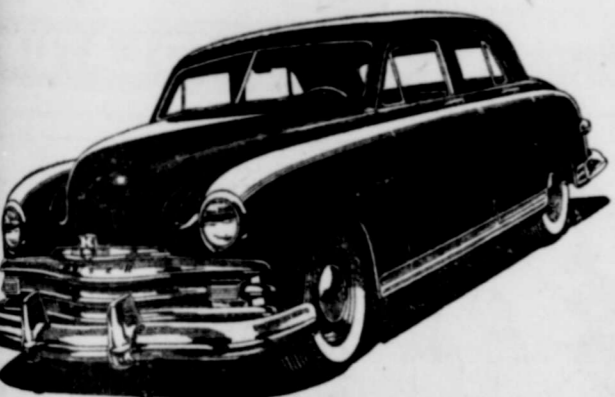

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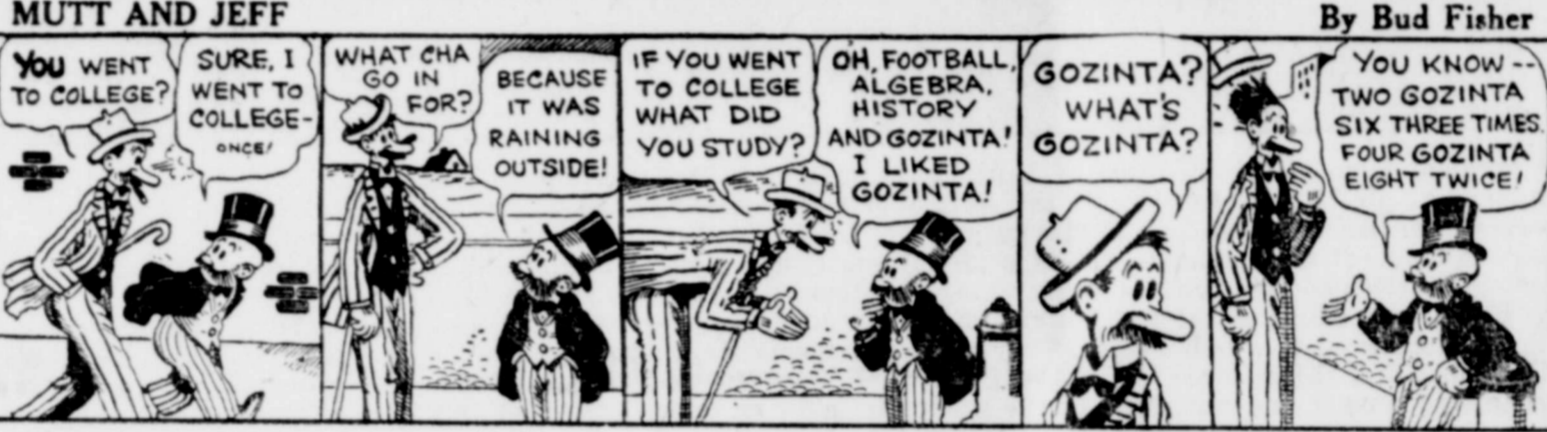

CHICK CHATS

BETTER HEALTH FOR YOUR FLOCK

As winter approaches it will be well to consider some of the cold weather precautions generally believed necessary to assure healthy and comfortable living conditions for a flock of chickens.

Basically, a house should be staunch enough to protect birds from the cold, the wind, the rain, and the snow without shutting off fresh air and sunlight. If your house is large enough for your flock and has been constructed well enough to provide protection against bad weather, it will be comparatively easy for you to keep your birds comfortable and healthy.

While the type of construction will probably be determined by the climate zone in which you live, there are some construction features which are common to poultry houses in all parts of the country. One of these is a good system of ventilation. There are several ways to attain adequate ventilation, and any one of them is satisfactory so long

as it provides fresh air without drafts and helps keep the house dry. There should be plenty of windows in the front of the house to provide a source of light, probably enough of them so there is at least one square foot of window space for every 20 or 30 square feet of floor space.

In cold climates special attention must be given to insulation. By equipping your house with double walls and filling the dead space between the walls with insulation material, the birds can be protected from drafts and extreme cold.

Usually molting will appear earlier in a flock housed without lights than in one which has a longer day of feeding. Flocks of high producing birds have been kept at 50 per cent production or better for 12 to 15 months by the use of lights.

The most satisfactory method of lighting is to turn the lights on at about 3 a. m. Usually poultrymen contrive to do this by the alarm clock system or some similar method. Under the evening lighting plan, birds get up at dawn and lights are turned on when it begins to become dark in the evening and are left on long enough to make a 13-hour day.

The New Testament Church

Does it depend solely on the authority of the Lord? Is its teaching and worship the same as the church? If not, it cannot be the New Testament Church.

The Church of Christ claims to be the New Testament Church. Our name and organization is exactly the same as in the first century. We accept no authority but Christ, and no creed book but the Bible. Our teaching is from the Bible, without addition or subtraction. Our worship is in conformity with the worship of the apostolic church. Our claims are not true, we invite your objection and we are interested only in TRUTH, and we desire that you and obey the TRUTH only. GIVE THESE THINGS YOUR MOST SERIOUS CONSIDERATION.

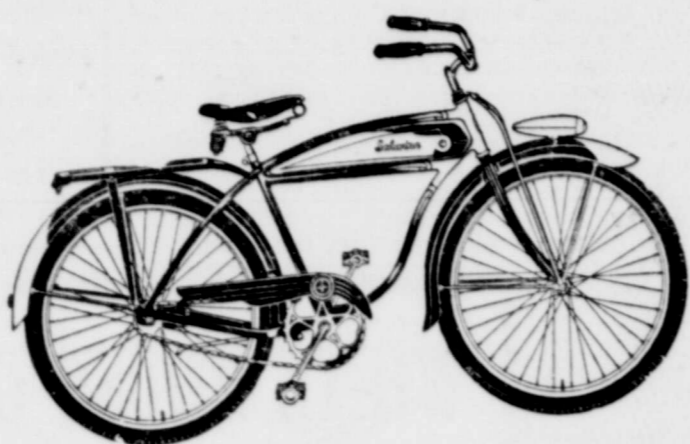
