Tollie McKown, Former Bulldog Star, Now Successful Coach at Falfurrias

Tollie McKown, one of the all-time Burkburnett Bulldogs star football players, is having a big success coaching football at Falfurrias, Texas. H. Lee Clifton, former local school principal, is now superintendent at the Falfurrias schools. Other former Burkburnett teachers in the school are: Mr. and Mrs. Morris Strong and Mrs. O. B. Jordan.

Before going to Falfurrias, McKown coached at Lamesa and Weatherford and in 1944 married a schoolmate, the former Miss E. M. Reynolds of Paint Rock, Texas. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. McKown of Riverdale, California.

McKown was graduated from Burkburnett High school in '37 where he lettered in football, basketball and track. He was selected all-state quarterback during his senior year in high school. He later attended Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene.

Three district titles in four years is the record hung up by the Falfurrias Jerseys under the leadership of McKown. When he went to Falfurrias in 1945 as head coach, the Class A Jerseys had never won a conference ball game. When the season closed in 1945, the Herd had nine wins to one loss. Tragedy On December 7th

A most tragic anniversary in American history is December 7. In 1941, on that memorable day, Japanese planes bombed Pearl Harbor. Japanese ships stormed a peaceful fleet. A dread chill fell over a tensed nation. The sneak attack hurled the U. S. into the greatest war in international history. This is a date we should never erase from our minds, not as an anniversary of hatred and revenge for a people, for out of such comes further wars. But we must remember Pearl Harbor with a prayer, that this must never happen to America again. Not with revenge and hatred, but with the determination that we will not suffer again because of neglect, uncertainty and misunderstanding. We cannot slumber in the implicit faith and confidence that no nation would dare repeat the performance.

It Wouldn't Surprise Us

If you wondered how we would fare when Petrillo placed the ban on record-making by union musicians, you were probably surprised at how little it has affected you and your listening. We do get tired of hashed and re-hashed recordings, but the monotony has been lessened by overseas recordings, by reissues of old favorites, by the backlog of records rushed through just before the union edict became effective. CHICK CHATS

CASH IN ON HIGH WINTER EGG PRICES

This is the time of year when sound management can pay real dividends, if you have a flock of sturdy pullets in your laying house. With egg prices higher it will profit you to do everything you can to coax a few extra eggs out of every bird.

To profit most from the high winter prices, there are two primary requirements you must fulfill: 1. Keep egg production at a good level. 2. Take the very best care of your eggs from the time they are laid until they reach market.

Producing Eggs

A healthy, contented flock usually is a good laying flock. If your birds are receiving an inadequate or poorly balanced ration, if they're lousy to the point of discomfort, or if they're diseased or run-down you cannot expect much production.

So it's up to you, through good management, to correct any condition that you may feel is the cause for lowering the output of eggs. Keep the birds in a warm house where there are no drafts but where there is ample fresh air. See that the house is clean and sanitary. Watch your birds closely for signs of discomfort or lack of appetite. Put them on a diet that contains all the nutrients needed for good egg production. Don't crowd them, and make sure there is plenty of feeding space at the hoppers and that the drinking fountains are big enough.

Care of Eggs

After eggs are laid, the care you exercise in handling them

will probably determine how they are graded when you take them to the market. Here are some pointers to remember about handling eggs.

Collect eggs often, three times per day if possible.

Nesting material should be clean and deep.

Do not allow birds to roost in nests at night—dirty eggs result.

Keep litter dry — this keeps eggs cleaner.

Store eggs in cool, moist place (45 to 55 degrees.)

Use wire baskets, do not pack eggs in boxes or cases until cool.

Clean eggs with steel wool.

Pack eggs big end up.

Line cases with newspaper during cold weather.

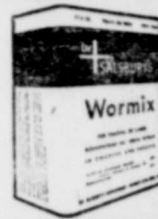
Before taking them to market candle all eggs for poor shells, cracks, and meat spots, separating them according to expected grade.

He whiled away the drowsy hours by formulating the broad outlines of his administrative policy for the next four years, and paused for a moment to turn down a proposal for another Big Four conference at this time.

NEW LIGHT: From Isaiah

New light and interpretation may be thrown on the Old Testament by discovery of the complete scroll of the Prophet Isaiah. All 66 chapters of the book, with only a few portions missing, have been found.

One of the most dramatic Biblical discoveries of all time, the scroll was brought to light recently when four of the oldest Hebrew manuscripts thus far known were found in a cave near the northern end of the Dead Sea.

Scholars date the Isaiah scroll as early Maccabean, or second century B. C., which would make it the oldest Biblical document yet to be discovered intact.

THE DISCOVERY of a complete Isaiah scroll, dating back a thousand years before the oldest one known, promises scholars an opportunity to seek new meaning from the Bible, and to determine by comparison the extent that errors may have found their way into Biblical manuscripts through the passage of time.

Bible scholars point out that the Book of Isaiah, like all of the Bible, came down to us as the result of many copyings by scribes who would make additional scrolls as the old ones wore out.

Story of Revolution

Lesson for December 5, 1948

THE MOST important history in the world is in one small book. The most important movement, the one that is destined to change the world more than any other, is the Christian church.

The story of how it began is in the book of Acts. No other book in or out of the New Testament tells the story: The history of the beginnings of the one and only international, interracial, worldwide movement that sets out to aim at nothing less than a complete transformation of mankind, the Revolution from Within, the Christian Church.

What the Church Is THERE are hundreds of churches today and they do not all agree. But every church, whatever its name or peculiarities, aims to stay on the course marked out by the Christian church when it was one and undivided, the church of the Apostles. We look back to the story in Acts to see what the true church is.

In the very beginning, the church was not the place where the Christians met for worship. It was not the officers. The Apostles themselves were not the church. The church was not a thing at all; it was people.

In Acts these people are seldom called Christians and never called churchmen or church-members. They are given more meaningful names. They are called "disciples," that is, learners, students. They are called "believers." They are called "brothers" for their life was like that of a family. They are called the people of "the Way,"—travelers together to the same destination. The church, in short, is a fellowship, the Family of the Friends of Christ.

How the Church Began THE infant church was like all human babies; it began small and poor. No bystander would have expected it to live; but it had life in its heart. Two forces set that church on its way. One was the command of Christ.

The people who were in it, or rather the people who were the church, took their orders from Christ. It was because of him that they went out to bear witness to him to the "utmost parts of the earth."

Then the people were filled with the Holy Spirit; they were guided constantly by the Spirit. The book of Acts has often been called the "Acts of the Holy Spirit" rather than of the Apostles.

Leaders GOD never does for people what they can do for themselves. So guidance of the Spirit was never a substitute for human leadership. A true church is not a mob; it acts, as the New Testament church did, in an orderly fashion.

One of the church's first problems was that of finding leaders. The history in Acts is largely the history of certain leaders—John, Peter, Paul. But these were not alone. Not even the Apostles tried to run the church like a dictatorship. The people themselves chose the officers who were ordained by the Apostles.

What the Church Does FIVE things the Apostolic church did, and these mark any true church today. They "continued in the Apostles' teachings;" the beginning of all our church schools and Sunday schools is in that brief phrase. They formed a fellowship; the church then was not a list of names of people who cared little for one another; it was a true family.

They observed the sacraments; they and their households were baptized, and they continued "in the breaking of the bread." Baptism and the Lord's Supper have always been observed in some form in every Christian church! They "continued in prayer;" a church in which only the minister prays is a feeble affair.

Above all, they were "witnesses." That is to say, they told the story of Jesus—his life, his teachings, his death, his resurrection. Jesus lives! Jesus is Lord! So the Apostles preached, from Jerusalem to Rome and far beyond. But their preaching would have been mere shouting in the wind, if Christ had not lived again in thousands of everyday Christians.

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Appearance and Reality

"There is a way which seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death." (Prov. 14:12). Bible readers have observed that this same language occurs in Proverbs 16:25. When any one says the same thing twice, it signifies exceptional importance. It ought to be of great importance to man when God warns him concerning false ways. As a rule when man warns people of a dangerous highway they heed the danger signal, but when the Lord warns men about dangerous ways, many of them go on not heeding the warning.

Universalism, salvation by faith only or salvation by grace only are ways that seem right to many people, but it is plain enough to close students of the Bible that these ways are not right. Men ought to be honest with their souls, and not jeopardize their immortal interests by walking in risky ways. Too many are of the opinion that just any way will do in religion, if one is honest about it. An honest purpose is commendable, but it is not a substitute for the truth. Honesty will not save a man's life if he drives into a flood or walks into fire, and it will not save a man's soul if he travels the wrong religious way. The Athenians who worshipped idols were very sincere in their devotions, but instead of telling them they would be saved, Paul did his best to shake them loose from their ways of doing.

Just because a way seems right is no reason why it is right. Appearance and reality do not always correspond to each other.

God is the Author of only one way, and all other ways lead to death. Noah built only one ark by the commandment of God. If he had built two, the second one would have been displeasing to God. What do you reckon would have happened if Shem, Ham and Japheth had also built an ark? We know they would not have pleased God, any more than Cain's sacrifice pleased God. There was one tabernacle and there is one Bible and one plan of salvation.

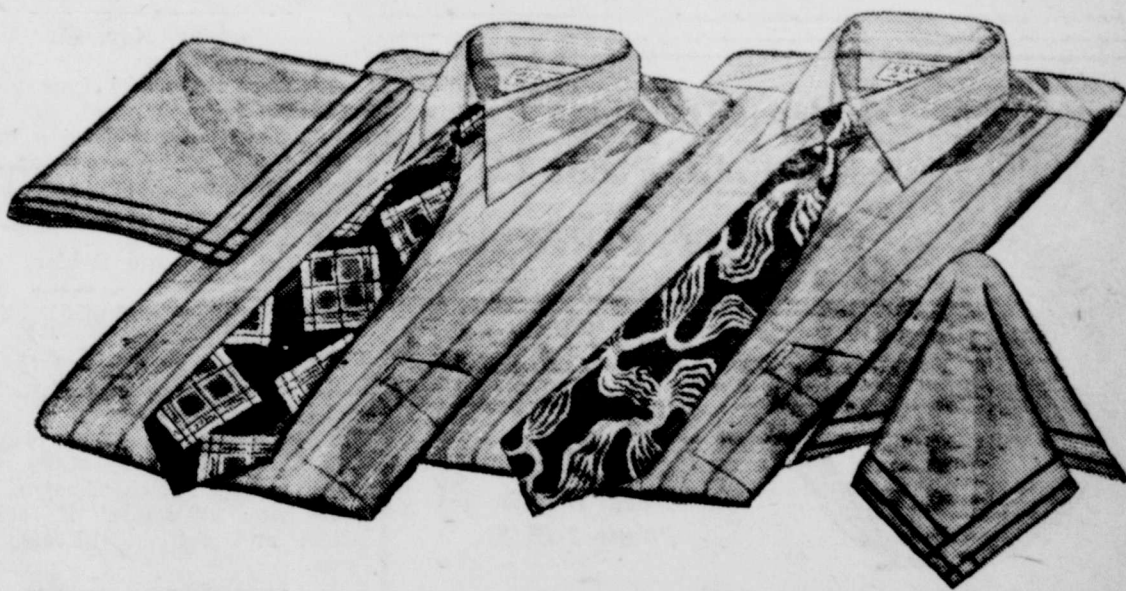

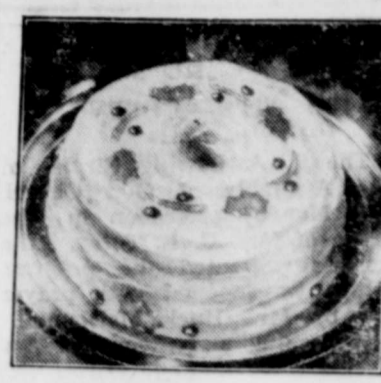

White Christmas Cake
1/2 cup vitaminized margarine | 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 tablespoons boiling water | 1/2 cup sugar
2 1/2 cups sifted flour | 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
4 teaspoons baking powder | 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
4 egg whites

Add boiling water to margarine in mixing bowl; mix well. Sift dry ingredients; add to margarine with milk and flavorings. Beat two minutes by hand or at moderate speed on electric beater. Add egg whites and beat two minutes. Brush 9-inch tube baking pan with margarine and line bottom of pan with waxed paper brushed with margarine. Pour cake batter into pan and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 45-50 minutes. Remove cake to cooling rack. When cool, frost with Snowflake Icing. Decorate with citron cut to form holly leaves and stem, with candied cherry cut like holly berries. Yield: one 9-inch loaf cake.

Snowflake Icing
1 cup sugar | 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
1/2 cup water | 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
1 egg white

Combine sugar, cream of tartar and water in a saucepan. Cover and boil for two minutes. Pour slowly over unbeaten egg white in bowl of electric mixer; turn to high speed just as syrup is added. Beat 8 minutes or until icing forms peaks. Stir in flavorings. Spread on cake. Yield: one 9-inch loaf cake.

Household Hints

Brushing plain biscuits and rolls with milk before baking gives crusts a rich golden color.

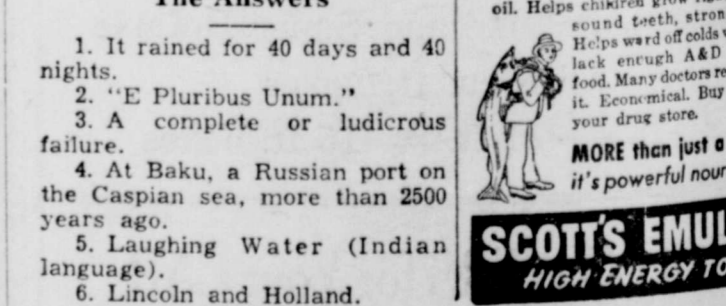

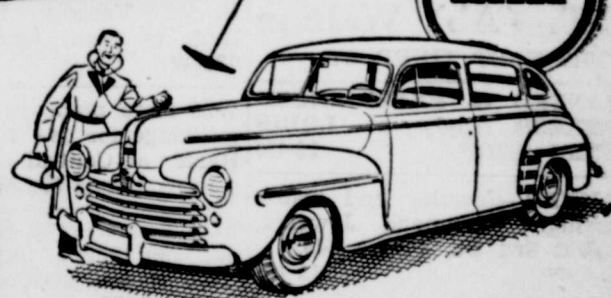
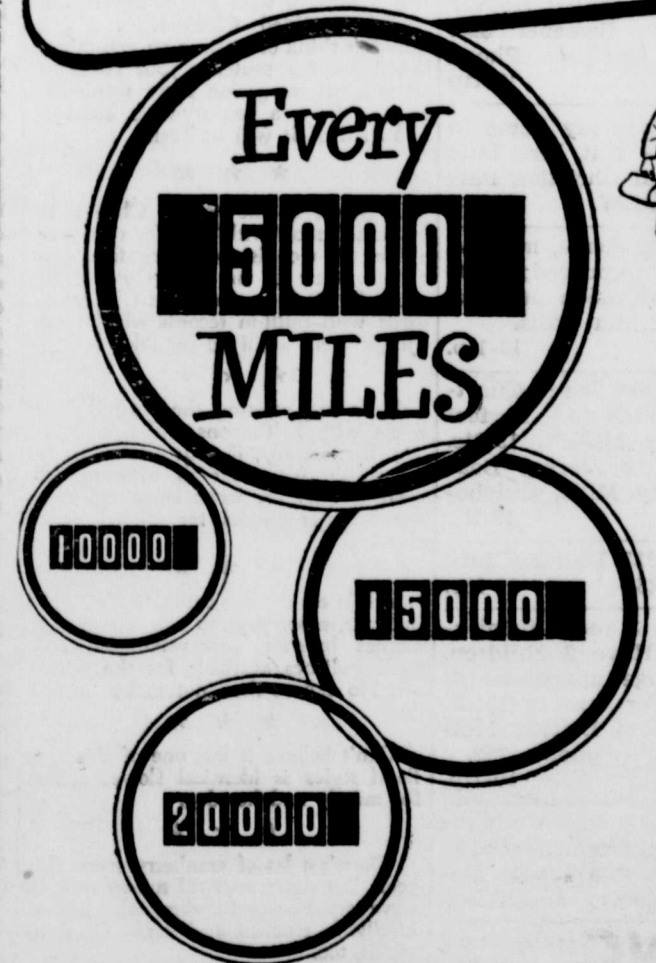

Money for Adventure
We Americans are accustomed to growth and change. We have seen our nation go forward. We moved ahead not because we conquered other lands or won territory. That kind of progress has not interested us. Our fathers did find a new and raw continent here. But even while it was being explored and peopled, the inventive minds and venturesome spirits of Americans were laying the foundations for living standards and for peaceful industry that never before existed.

Our progress may be measured in greater standards of living and in greater production for the people. Hard work has produced growth. Now, there is no earthly reason why we cannot continue to grow and grow—except one. We cannot have progress if we are willing to quit growing. Like so many great civilizations of the past, it is possible for us to hit the skids. We can do just that if we become unconcerned and stop wanting to grow.

Savings That Work
Certain seeds of decay are now planted in our economy. You see, industrial growth does not come by itself. Expansion of our great industries has depended upon venture capital. Yet, venture money is scarce today. But what is venture capital? Venture capital is the money that has built these great factories. It is the savings that are risked to help people like Henry Ford and Alexander Graham Bell get started—and keep on going.

It goes into brick and mortar. It is turned into locomotives and drag lines. It pays for the research that discovers new drugs and new plastics. It strings power lines to homes and factories. It buys lathes and dump trucks. It is back of pay checks that men must have, even before sales bring in the expected income. You see, if we want an adventurous industry, we must have venture capital, to do all these things and more.

Business Is Thirsty
Now, the big trouble is this. We have throttled down our supply of venture money. There are some who maintain that this source for new industrial activity has dried up. At least this is true: both young enterprises and established firms are thirsting for the capital which even today's normal growth requires of them. They are also hungry for the go-ahead signal, to build new plants and to improve old ones. This requires much venture capital.
Consider the oil industry. Traditionally, the oil and gas business has been financed by private risk money. Yet, men in the industry say that 12 to 15 billion dollars more will be needed in the next ten years. Dollars for plant equipment and labor go less than half as far as they did 20 years ago, while risk capital has shrunk 75 per cent in that period. This industry is typical of many others that are hungry for capital!

Shortage Hits Us
Shortage of this venture money hits us hard at every point! Without it new products that might go far in enriching mankind are sidetracked in favor of the sure money-makers. New businesses, that must live almost entirely on risk capital, are handicapped. Without sufficient capital, production everywhere is curtailed, and this affects our jobs and our national well-being. No venture means a weak industrial machine that openly invites foreign aggression. Naturally, if no venture money is found for expansion, government always wants to step in and do it for us. We must remember that money for venture will be scarce and fearful until we cut down government expenses and reverse taxes downward. It is your responsibility and mine to help keep our industry strong, adventurous and free.
