Harry learned about livestock feeding, showing and marketing, and won Harry Schneider, 1st place in the 1948 National Meat Animal program. He has fed and sold 15 head of Angus cattle and developed a herd of 70 Duroc swine. He won many first placings as champion on his heavyweights. He has also served as president, president, junior leader and leader of his local club. As recognition of these services, Thomas E. Wilson, 4-H agent, provides Harry with a \$100 National 4-H Club Certificate for his work in club and county leadership. Alvin Davis, 18, of Post, has been named section winner in the 1948 National Leadership program. In addition to serving as local, county and district president, Alvin has served as co-manager, general superintendent and chairman of the planning commission for

county shows, distributed insecticides, feeded and managed the 4-H benefit show, Southwestern Championship Junior Rodeo; and he has helped organize 4-H clubs. Alvin, who has been in club work for eight years, received an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress provided by Edward Foss Wilson, Chicago meat packer. Winner of a State award, Patsy Jo Delavan, 18, of Devine, has been president of her local club and president of the county 4-H Planning Commission, and she has served as a junior leader two years. During four years in 4-H work, she has also been active in county, club camp work, both as chairman and by introducing a discussion group. She has instructed others on keeping 4-H records and she has been chairman of the Crippled Children's Committee of the Children and Youth Program for the State of Texas. Patsy receives a 17-jewel gold watch as a reward for her many leadership activities.

These activities are conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agriculture College and USDA cooperating.

Would America Collapse?

Some wag once said that if we should suddenly do away with all advertising in the United States, our civilization would immediately collapse. This statement contains more truth than is at first apparent. There are those who refuse to see the importance of advertising in the economic life of the nation. Moreover, there are those who have singled out this phase of trade and industry for strong criticism.

Civilization today would collapse if it were not bolstered up by American advertising. Today the rest of the world depends upon American production. Yet, too few people recognize that this nation's great productive capacity could not have been built up without advertising. Again, there are too few people who correctly see advertising as the bulwark of American economic freedom. Advertising is the golden key that has unlocked the door to plenty for us all.

Greatest Users

Our world-renowned standards of living were achieved because we found out how to produce in volume: bathtubs, cars, radios, clothing, food. We learned how to make wise use of the human resources of work and brain-power. We learned to harness water-power, steam, oil, gas, and all the others. We created machinery to do most of our hard work. We learned the value of tools. In brief, we have made our factories hum.

But is that all? By no means. The Socialist schemers have failed to evaluate their old slogan, "production for use," in the light of America's vast economy. Not only did we learn to produce, we have learned to use. Americans are the world's greatest producers, and also the world's greatest users.

Better Prices, Quality

There's more to it than just production. Ask any manufacturer, and he'll tell you that the heart of his outfit is his sales force. The fellows who sell and distribute goods represent the other half of our great mass production system. Your high production is fine, but it would do no good unless the goods are placed in the hands of consumers. Continued high output lowers the price. Get the picture?

Selling and distribution simply could not do the job without advertising. Advertising not only sells goods, it always helps measurably to lower prices and to increase quality. When electric refrigerators were first sold only a few thousand were made, and it took \$600 or more to buy one. But during fifteen years of advertising millions were sold, the price came down to a fourth of the original price, and the quality was improved greatly.

Wake Up to Facts

Socialists and Communists have had some success in attacking this part of American economic life. A few years ago a survey of 5,000 consumers found that 72 per cent of those interviewed believed advertising increased costs to the consumer. Among high school teachers, this figure reached 82 per cent. Another survey, answered by 3,174 students in 33 colleges, revealed that 12 per cent considered advertising an economic waste.

CHICK CHATS

DON'T WASTE FEED ON POOR LAYERS

As feeding costs go up, the loafing layer becomes a more expensive "boarder." Often her appetite is undiminished, although she may have ceased to lay eggs several days before.

The high cost of poultry feed leaves the average producer the choice between two courses of action. One is to cull more closely and frequently than normal, selling the non-layers. The alternative is to attempt to get the non-layer back into production as quickly as possible, before the drain on the purse becomes burdensome.

Try a Tonic

Many poultry raisers find that the use of a suitable commercial tonic will have a beneficial influence on poor producers. In this way they are able to keep the size of the flock at the desired level without having to support a few laggards.

Of course, it is inadvisable to waste too much time and feed on lazy producers. Any hen which fails to respond within a reasonable time should be culled and sold.

Many poultrymen will prefer the other course, that of culling the poor producers immediately upon noticing that their laying record is not up to par. This is

a sure method for avoiding unnecessary feed waste; but on the other hand, it is always possible that some of the birds which are culled might otherwise have developed into good layers.

Watch For Markings

Spotting poor laying birds is not necessarily a difficult task. There are several tell-tale markings and some of them are often quite distinct. The vent of a non-layer is shrunken, dry and yellow in contrast to the good producer's expanded, moist, and faded vent.

The loafing bird's comb and wattles are shrunken and scaly. The layer's comb and wattles are large, waxy, and red.

Color tells the story of egg production in yellow-skinned breeds. The beak, shanks, vent, and eye ring of a good layer are faded, often bleached. When the bird ceases to lay, this coloring reappears.

Great Britain's royal family was keeping well in the forefront of world news. First it was Princess Elizabeth's baby, then it was King George's leg.

But while the first was an event of hysterically happy proportions for all Britons, the second most certainly was not. The king, apparently, was in a relatively serious condition. The royal family's projected trip to Australia and New Zealand next month had to be cancelled.

IT WAS suspected that 52-year-old George VI was suffering from a disease known to doctors as thrombo-angitis obliterans, more easily referred to as Buerger's disease, an inflammation of the linings of the arteries. There was some speculation, also, to the effect that the king might have diabetes or hardening of the arteries.

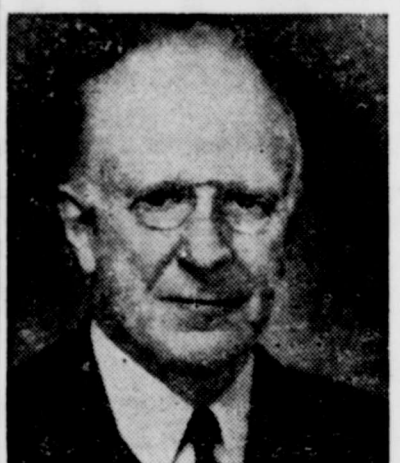
But the king's doctors weren't committing themselves. The five physicians described his symptom as "an obstruction to the circulation through the arteries of the legs."

THERE IS no known permanent cure for thrombo-angitis obliterans. Anyone suffering from it might be expected to live out his normal span of years if he were careful, stayed off his feet and led a sheltered life.

It was pointed out that standing and walking for hours at a time, which has been part of the king's job as figurehead of the empire, has aggravated his condition. Part of the treatment will be to cut out this important part of his duties and assign the walking and standing performances among other members of the royal household.

Meanwhile, favoring his imperilled right foot, King George was conducting the business of state from his bedroom in Buckingham palace.

Atomic Researcher



Dr. Frank D. Fackenthal, until recently acting president of Columbia university, has been named as head of Associated Universities, Inc., which operates Brookhaven national laboratory at Upton, N. Y. The laboratory is financed by the U. S. government to provide facilities not available at universities, but essential to nuclear research.

WAR RULES:

Atomic
The need for this sort of thing is purely speculative at this point, but the International Red Cross is preparing to propose a new set of war rules that would compel nations to establish safety zones to protect civilians in the event of a future atomic war.

THESE zones would be set up in the rear of combat areas of each battling nation. Belligerents, theoretically, would recognize them as shelter areas and would spare them from atomic attack.

Treaty conventions outlining this new security zone principle now are being circulated to all nations prior to submission to a general diplomatic conference in March.

Red Cross officials say they conceived the idea for large shelter areas as a result of their experiences in setting up neutral zones in Palestine.

Three general types of people would be protected under the Red Cross plan:
WOUNDED and sick persons, whether combatant or non-combatant.
CHILDREN under 15, expectant mothers or mothers of children under seven, and the aged over 65.
PERSONS entrusted with the control and management of the zones and the care of those in them.

Although these proposals cannot be formally binding until after approval by the diplomatic convention, officials view them as so extremely important that they are urging all countries to abide by them morally without waiting for formal treaty signing.

In addition to the atomic security zone proposal, other projected war rules would cover treatment of prisoners, prohibit kidnappings and the taking of hostages. Also, the Red Cross wants to outlaw the current Russian practice of living off the land in occupied areas.

What, No Brass?
A noted industrialist, who was a war-time brigadier general, has come up with a proposal that military brass hats should divest themselves of insignia, and that West Point and Annapolis should be converted into postgraduate schools open to all ranks.

The author of these proposals is Robert Wood Johnson, chairman of the Johnson & Johnson surgical firm.

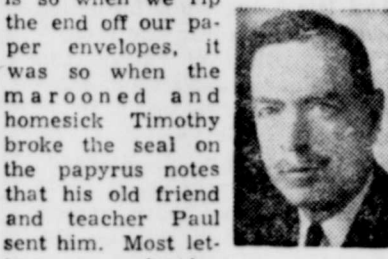

Letters in the Bible

Lesson for December 12, 1948

A LETTER in the mail! Those are exciting words. It was so when the Babylonians chipped open their dried clay envelopes, it is so when we rip the end off our paper envelopes, it was so when the marooned and homesick Timothy broke the seal on the papyrus notes that his old friend and teacher Paul sent him. Most letters reach the wastebasket, and we know that some of Paul's did. But fortunately his friends thought enough of about a dozen of his letters to save them and copy them and file them with some others and pass them around. And so we got more than a third of our New Testament, and perhaps a good deal more than a third of our theology.

Yesterday in Television

THESE letters that have come down to us from so long ago are not only keenly interesting, they are immensely valuable. An honest informal letter is like an open window. We see into the writer's mind and life, we see the life of his times. Any historian feels lucky when he lights on a packet of old letters. Here is yesterday in television.

The letters of the New Testament, especially Paul's, are not propaganda literature. Paul was not writing for publication or for posterity. He would be bothered by a problem; he would think and pray about it, and then he would sit down and write about it.

However trivial the problem might seem, such as a local church quarrel, Paul never wrote trivially about it. He would pour out his mind on papyrus, usually dictating his letters to a secretary and sometimes so fast that the secretary obviously had a hard time keeping up.

If you want to know how an Apostle's mind worked, here it is. If you want to know how an inspired religious genius, one of the great of all time, planned and grieved and hoped and rejoiced, read these letters. Further, these letters tell us the early Christian church. This is not a view of the church on parade, this is a glimpse of the church as it was "on the hoof," struggling, quarreling, ignorant, scarce one step removed from raw heathenism, and yet with the root of Christian faith in its heart, the seed of the great church that has grown up through the centuries.

Friend to Friend

THE letters in the New Testament are of various kinds. The letter to the Philipians from Paul was written, from prison, to some of his best friends. Recently he had sent him not only money but a man named Epaphroditus to stay with Paul and help him, Paul being in constant bad health. But Epaphroditus himself had fallen ill, and when he grew better he was still homesick.

Paul, generous as always, decided to send his sick friend home to convalesce, and by his hand sent the letter which the Philipian church loved, saved and copied, so that it eventually made its way into the New Testament collection.

There is some high theology in the letter; but there is also some warm human friendship, and some of the best advice Paul ever gave. It is in this letter we discover Paul's secret of happiness. I have learned (he wrote) in whatsoever state I am, therein to be content. (See chapter 4.)

When you read those paragraphs, simply glowing with happiness, remember they were written by a sick man, in jail, facing a serious charge on his forthcoming trial. Paul had actually discovered a joy which is trouble-proof.

Father to Sons

PAUL knew he would not live forever on this planet and could not live everywhere. So he spent much effort training helpers and successors. Some of these disappointed him sorely; but he was never disappointed in Timothy.

His letters to Timothy are personal, but they are more than that. They are advice from an older minister to a younger one, from a veteran missionary to a fresh recruit.

In I John we have another kind of letter, from an old, perhaps retired minister to a congregation he knows and loves. Again in I John the reader gets the impression of reading a family letter from father to sons and daughters.

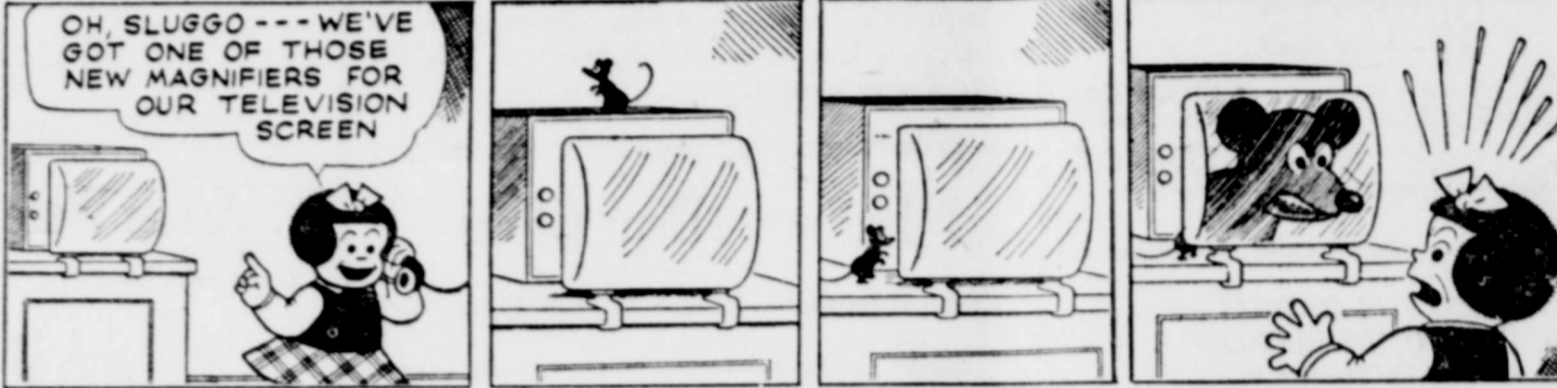

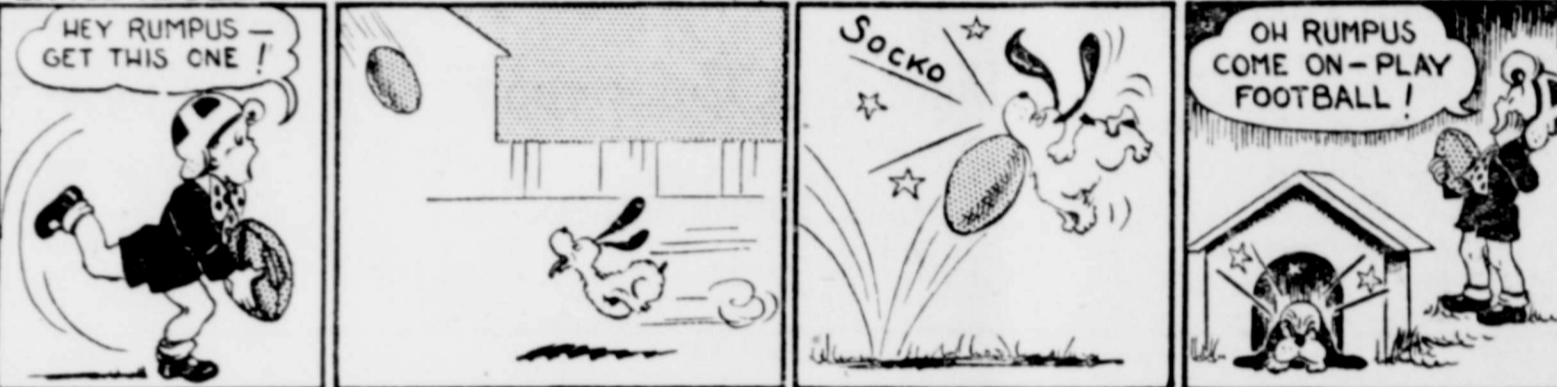

Jesus prayed definitely that all those who follow him might be one. He first prayed for his apostles, and said, "And now I am no more in the world, but these are in the world, and I come to thee. Holy Father, keep through thine name those whom thou hast given me, that they may be as we are." John 17:11. All of Christ's apostles preached the same doctrine. Peter preached a plain gospel sermon on the day of Pentecost. What would have been the effect if James and John had followed him, and preached a different doctrine. Suppose that James had contradicted the preaching of Peter by saying that baptism is not for the remission of sins. Then suppose that John had followed them, and declared that baptism is not immersion only, but it also may be performed by sprinkling or pouring. Now what would have been the effect of such contradictory teaching about the plan of salvation? It is reasonable to say that three thousand people would not have been turned to the Lord on that day.

But Jesus had prayed for them to be one, and they were in what they taught sinners to do to be saved. And the effect that they were one had power on the multitude of people to turn them to Christ. If Peter had established a church in Jerusalem, and called it by one name; and John had established another church, and called it by a different name; and James had established a third church, and called it the church of Saint James! then their work would have come to naught. But Jesus had prayed for them to be one, and they did not only teach the same thing concerning the salvation of alien sinners, but they all taught the same thing about the church and about worship. And the apostles did not only teach the same thing about the plan of salvation, but they taught all of their converts to be one. They discouraged division into sects and parties all the time. It may be wise to have different political parties, but it is most unwise to have different religious parties.

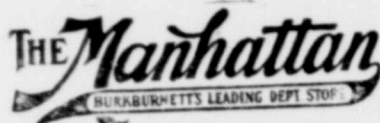
