## Light Line Workers Reserve Credit for Job Well Done

Last week when workers were called to repair broken lines caused by an inch and one-half ice which caused the lines to break in many places, they were working under handicaps which an average citizen did not take into consideration.

In the first place it was very impossible to merely stay out of the freezing sleet. In the second place, it was very hazardous trying to climb poles coated with ice. Pole climbers carried hatchets and hacked away the ice as they went up. Climbers, less than an inch of ice couldn't hold the weight of men unless buried into the lines. Even a thin skim of ice on the pole might have caused a spike to slip and let a man fall to the ground. From a height of a 30 foot pole, that would be a bad fall.

Light lines had so much ice on them that they could not be tightened between poles. The insulators would not hold the wire slip, so when the wire was pulled, it promptly broke, which made matters a good deal worse, instead of better.

Wednesday afternoon ice began to melt enough to fall from the lines. Sections of lines, gathered from several poles, averaged almost two inches in diameter. A seven inch line weighed 13 ounces, or slightly 1-2 pounds per foot. Thursday morning enough of ice had fallen from the lines to permit workers to make better making repairs. By noon, practically all lines had been put back in service. This was accomplished by men working long, hard hours, under very dangerous circumstances.

Jude Willingham, independent electrician, volunteered his services and spent as many as 10 hours per day atop poles, helping to restore service as quickly as possible. Mr. Willingham is commended for his spirit of cooperation and helpfulness in a crisis his town was experiencing.

It was impossible to secure outside help. Other towns are having just as much or more trouble than Burkburnett. It was up to local men to do the job. And it can be said they planned their job "beyond the call of duty" and took pains with their lives the ordinary citizen would not take.

## "Why" of School Lunch Program

What is the School Lunch Program and where did it come from? This question is still asked by many people and they should have information that is accurate and based on facts, about the beginning, growth, and operation of the National School Lunch Program.

In January, 1933, Franklin D. Roosevelt was inaugurated as President of the United States at a time when there was over production of all commodities but still a lot of people were going hungry. There was an abundance of farm products but no market for those products. There had to be something done and, quickly. The Department of Agriculture hit upon the plan of destroying part of the surplus and paying the farmer for the part destroyed. There was a wave of severe criticism about this plan and something else should be done. After a careful analysis of farm conditions, it was decided that the Department of Agriculture would be given money to help buy in surplus over production of any agricultural products. Part of this surplus could be held in reserve for a period of drought or low production and part was given to non-profit institutions, as hospitals operated by state and county, schools, and state institutions. These surplus commodities were given direct to the institution until World War II, and then the schools were re-imburshed in cash payment from the government in proportion to the number of meals served and the amount of abundant foods used in preparation of meals served. You will note the changing of the word surplus before the war, to the word abundant during the war.

The war changed many of our conceptions of life, but none probably any more than some of our false notions about health. It has been pointed out that 3 out of every 4 boys examined during Selective Service were suffering from some form of nutritional deficiency. That one statement was a direct slap in the face of the American people. To think of this average among the most robust of our youth was a problem that must be reckoned with. It was then pointed out that bone deformities, some heart trouble, eye trouble, nervousness, condition of teeth, and even our disposition were the result of the foods consumed and consumed in a happy way.

After a study of the report given by Selective Service on the reason for rejection of a large number of Selectees, the Seventy-ninth Congress passed the National School Lunch Act June 4, 1946.

Next week we will give the provisions of the Act.

## AN ANGRY HOUSEWIFE SOUNDS OFF ON LUXURY TAXES

Let's face it. Congress is being unfair to women and children, and the time has come for the feminine half of the nation to do something about it.

During the war we paid without complaint the so-called "luxury taxes" though from the start it was hard to follow the masculine reasoning that placed 20 per cent tax on baby oil and left a \$1.50 cake of perfumed soap tax-free! That exempted shaving cream and razor blades but taxed face powder 20 per cent; that did not count a billiard table a luxury but taxed talcum 20 per cent. No one questioned Congress about this during the war, but now women have a clear right to ask why they as a class are still on a wartime basis though troops long since have been demobilized. Industry is free of war time price control. Why do women continue to pay a wartime "luxury" tax on toilet necessities, handbags and household equipment?

During the last Congress a 747 page report was presented on the eleven bills calling for the repeal of those taxes. But no action was taken. Why? Thoroughly bewildered, we want to know by what logic cold cream is taxed as a luxury while cabin cruisers are tax-free; why there is no tax on a 5 dollar flower bulb for the garden while a light bulb for the house is taxed 10 per cent why a race horse is not taxed but an electric iron is; why roulette wheels are exempted but there is a 4 dollar tax on every \$20 WEDDING RING.

Mother may send the laundry out if she wishes. No tax. But if she tries to beat inflation by doing the baby's clothes at home she pays a ten per cent tax on her electric iron. There is a brighter side, however. She can spend \$10,000 on a rug or set of china and not worry about a tax.

She can get a sewing machine and a vacuum cleaner no, tax but a hot water heater is taxed 10 per cent so is the electric grill on which to warm the baby's midnight bottle.

Why is a deodorant a luxury if a bath is not? What is so barbarical about foot-powder, dandruff remedies and anti-perspirants that soap, shaving cream and shampoo do not share?

However, if millions of women like me are found wandering the aisles of department stores gibbering to themselves, perhaps Congress will know where to place the blame.

Write letters to your Senator, Congressman. Ask for repeal of the unfair excise taxes!

Junior may eat cereal for nourishment, but he has his eye on the premiums offered for certain brands and chooses his cereal to fill his box top needs.

Twenty-five years ago the industry offered pictures of birds and movie stars. 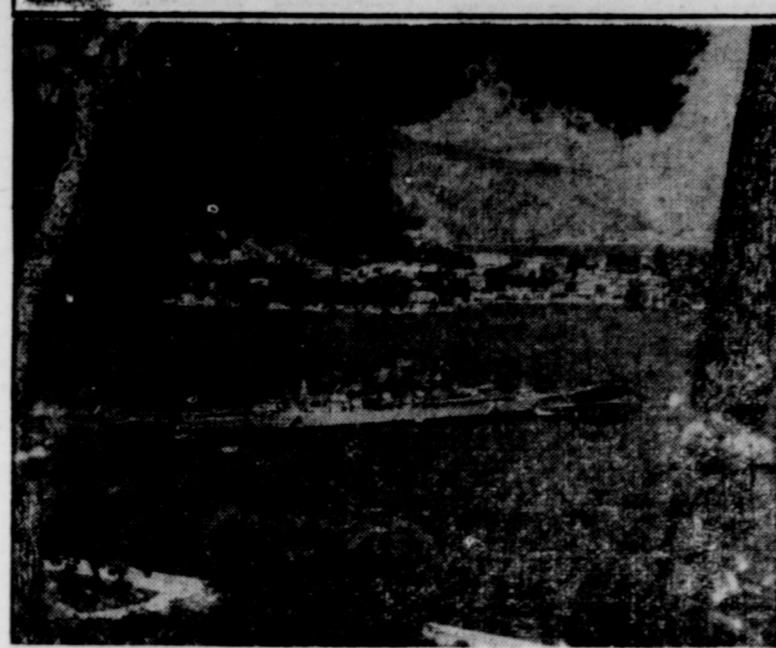

**Soil Conservation News...**

W. O. Chadwick has had constructed 1 1/2 miles of terraces on his farm in North Burk Conservation Group the past week. Jim Pirthe of this same conservation group has had 4 1/2 miles of field terraces, approximately 1/2 mile of diversion terrace and a terrace outlet channel 1300' long constructed on his farm the last month. C. M. Thompson, owner of elevating terracer did the construction work. Personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assigned to Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District run the terrace lines.

Stock ponds are now in process of construction on J. D. Ashton Jr., and Mrs. J. D. Ashton's farms south from Burkburnett. The place of watering and place of salting helps govern even distribution of grazing on range land. To provide even lasting water here a pond should be over 10 feet deep and should receive water from well vegetated range land.

Application for assistance of Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District have been received by the Supervisors the past two weeks from Mattie Hodges and Estate on 194, 196, and 388 acres of Kanay for irrigation assistance. O. M. Short and J. C. Short farm of 150 acres East Wichita Falls, J. E. Carter East Wichita Falls on 80 acres for irrigation assistance. J. D. Ashton, Jr., 359 acres, Mrs. J. D. Ashton 460 acres, and 320 acres, south from Burkburnett, and W. O. Chadwick on 180 acres West from Burk.

O. W. Fretchel of Clara Conservation Group stated last Spring "Water just stood on his more sloping pasture land after a 2" rain." His pasture land has good cover of Buffalo, Blue and side out Grama grass, rain falling in such a cover of good grasses walks and works its way down slope instead of running as is found on most of the range land. He mows his pasture land every year.

Irrigation topographical maps have been completed on farms of James Underwood, C. B. Banks, and C. W. Parker. These farms will be leveled with carryall and large land plane owned by the Irrigation District.

Approximately 34 acres of irrigated land has been leveled with carryall and maintainer on L. J. Hines farm south from Iowa Park the past two weeks. All new irrigation laterals were constructed in such a way that most of the ditch is above natural ground, this insures a better head of water. He plans to plant this area in alfalfa, clover and cold weather grasses of perennial Rye grass, Alta Fescue, Bromo and Crested wheat grass.

**Keep Layers In Warm, Dry House**

Are your layers housed in comfortable quarters? This is an important consideration in winter flock management, for during cold weather improper housing can easily lead to disease outbreaks.

A poultryman should have from 4 to 6 inches of good dry litter on the floor of the poultry house. As soon as the litter be-

comes damp or dirty, it should be removed and replaced with fresh material. Watch areas surrounding the waterers with particular care, for the litter in these spots becomes wet quickly and must be replaced with dry litter frequently.

**Straw For Insulation**

Straw in the loft or ceiling of the poultry house is an efficient insulation against cold weather in the winter, and it also serves to keep out excessive heat in the summertime. There should be at least 15 inches of settled straw for efficient insulation. Circulation of air in the dead space above the straw will

keep the insulation material dry. This can be accomplished by having small openings at each gable end of the poultry house. Walls should be insulated, as a completely insulated house is much easier to keep warm.

While many poultry raisers apparently are successful in raising birds in houses having no flooring, there can be no question that cement floors are consistently more satisfactory than wooden floors or none whatsoever. Cement floors are easier to clean and disinfect. It is impossible to do a good job of cleaning and disinfecting on a dirt floor, and often it is difficult to do a complete job if the floor is of wood, since the cracks and crevices harbor dirt and germs.

**Floor Drain Facilities Cleaning**

It is a good idea in constructing a cement floor, to have it slope toward a floor drain. This will facilitate cleaning and disinfecting.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Truman Proposes Keeping Pledges In State of Nation Congress Talk; Mercy Killing Has Public Support

CONGRESS: Big Order

In calm, unhurried manner, President Truman outlined to the 81st congress his legislative proposals. To the surprise of no one he asked legislators to enact virtually every recommendation he made during his election campaign. He called for more taxes, authority to restore economic controls, a broad program of social legislation.

ALONG WITH corporations, individuals in the middle and higher-income brackets would share in the task of providing the four billion dollars more annual revenue which Mr. Truman says the government must have.

These are the major recommendations made by the President in his "state of the union" message:

INFLATION—Widen government control over bank and consumer credit, exports and transportation allocations; extend and strengthen rent control. Grant authority to regulate commodity speculation, allocate scarce key materials, control certain wages and prices, if necessary.

TAXES—Raise four billion dollars additional revenue for the government, mainly by taxing corporations, but also by boosting estate and gift taxes; consider increasing income taxes for the middle and upper pay brackets.

LABOR—Repeal the Taft-Hartley law and re-enact old Wagner act— but with bans against jurisdictional strikes and secondary boycotts and some provision for avoiding strikes in general industry. Boost minimum wage from 40 to 75 cents an hour.

BUSINESS—Strengthen anti-trust laws by closing loopholes that permit monopolistic mergers and consolidations.

FARM—Use price supports to keep farmers at a fair economic level.

OTHERS—Extend social security; set up system of pre-paid medical insurance. Aid state educational systems. Pass some civil rights proposals made to 80th congress. Push power, flood control and navigation projects on the rivers. Maintain armed forces "sufficient to deter aggression." Pass universal training legislation.

MERCY KILLING: Has Advocates Euthanasia, a euphemism for "mercy killing", gained important support in New York state where hundreds of Protestant and Jewish religious leaders petitioned for legislation legalizing the practice.

THE QUESTION has agitated humanitarians and sociologists for centuries and there are many cases on record where mercy killings have been committed. Despite legal barriers and penalties, the record in such cases, for the most part, shows that juries are inclined to look with some leniency on the person who kills another to put him or her "out of his misery."

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Union Sunday School Lessons BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

No Greater Prophet Lesson for January 23, 1949

OF ALL the characters in history, which one do you admire most? We know how Jesus answered that interesting question.

He had a great array of personages from whom to make his selection. But he took as the Great Man of all time, up to his own generation, no heroic figure from the past, no king, general, scholar or prophet. The greatest man, for Jesus

—or at least one so great that he could think of none greater—was one of his own contemporaries, a cousin of his who was in jail at the time when Jesus said of him, "Among those born of women none is greater than John." Known to us as John the Baptist, that is, John the Baptist, we seldom realize either his greatness or the close connection between his life and that of Jesus.

John of the Jordan WE DO not know how much Jesus himself owed to John. We do know that John was the man who first called the public's attention to Jesus. John it was who gave some of Jesus' most important disciples their first training; John who introduced to Jesus, and turned over to him, some of his own followers. It may be significant too that Jesus' first preaching was identical with that of John (compare Matthew 3:2 and 4:17).

Some Christian scholars have gone so far as to suppose that it was John's preaching that stirred the young carpenter from Nazareth to leave his shop and begin his great work as teacher.

Whether this is so or not, we do know that it was the baptizing by John which led to the baptism of Jesus, and that Jesus' baptism was the turning-point between Jesus' private life and his short and stormy public career. It is quite clear that if there had been no John the Baptist, the story of Jesus would have been very different from what it actually was.

Only a Voice JOHN'S own picture of himself is not a picture at all. When they asked him to say what he was, and half-expected him to declare that he was the Messiah, the long-looked for King, John said only, "I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness."

John, so far as we know, never accepted dinner invitations, he was never under the roof of any friend, and he had no roof of his own. People even called him demon-possessed, he was so far removed from ordinary life.

But Jesus was always in people's homes. That is one reason why the greatness of John fades before the greatness of Jesus, for a Voice makes a poor companion. Jesus had the human sympathy that John lacked, and John well knew this. "He must increase, but I must decrease," he said.

Repentance: Seed and Fruit NEVERTHELESS the Voice spoke truth. John must have been a powerful preacher, for his meetings were held miles from the nearest town, so that to reach him from Jerusalem one would have to travel through wild country infested with bandits. Few modern preachers, without benefit of advertising, music or choir, without even a tent, would dare to start a revival meeting 150 miles out of town. But John did—and the people came in crowds. We do not have the full report of his preaching that we have of the preaching of Jesus, but we do know that he broke the hard crust of his listeners' conscience.

He made them see how unfit they were for the Kingdom of God for which they prayed; he broke down their pride till they went down to the Jordan and were baptized under the open sky, in public confession of their sins.

When men asked him, What shall we do? John did not have the fuller, higher message that Jesus later had. But he did make plain two things about the good life, the life that pleases God; it cannot even begin without repentance and confession of sin, but it does not end there. Repentance is not a simple granite milestone on life's way; it is a seed which if it is real will bear fruit.

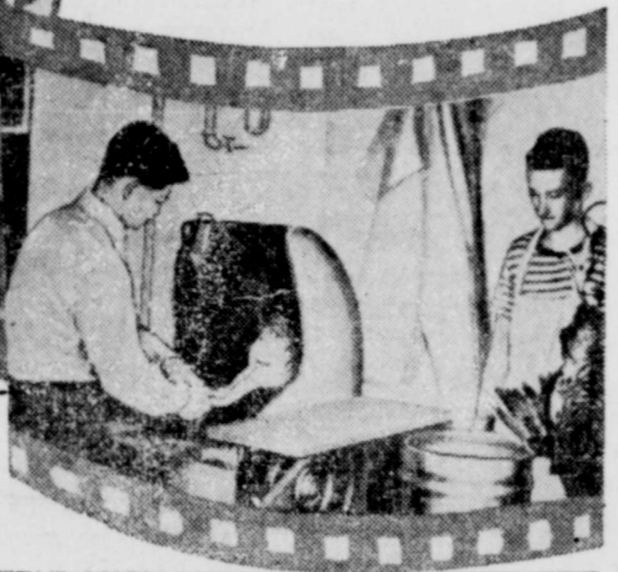

Heaven invites proof. Jesus proved himself to be the Son of God; the apostles proved their ministry as ambassadors of Christ. The Bible has every proof of its divine origin and mission.

Opposition has thrown missiles against its great walls in vain. Hammers have beaten themselves to pieces upon its mighty anvil. All systems that have opposed it have been proved false. So in the light of these facts, we may rest assured that if we stand on the truth of God, we may be able always to prove all things and hold fast to that which is good.

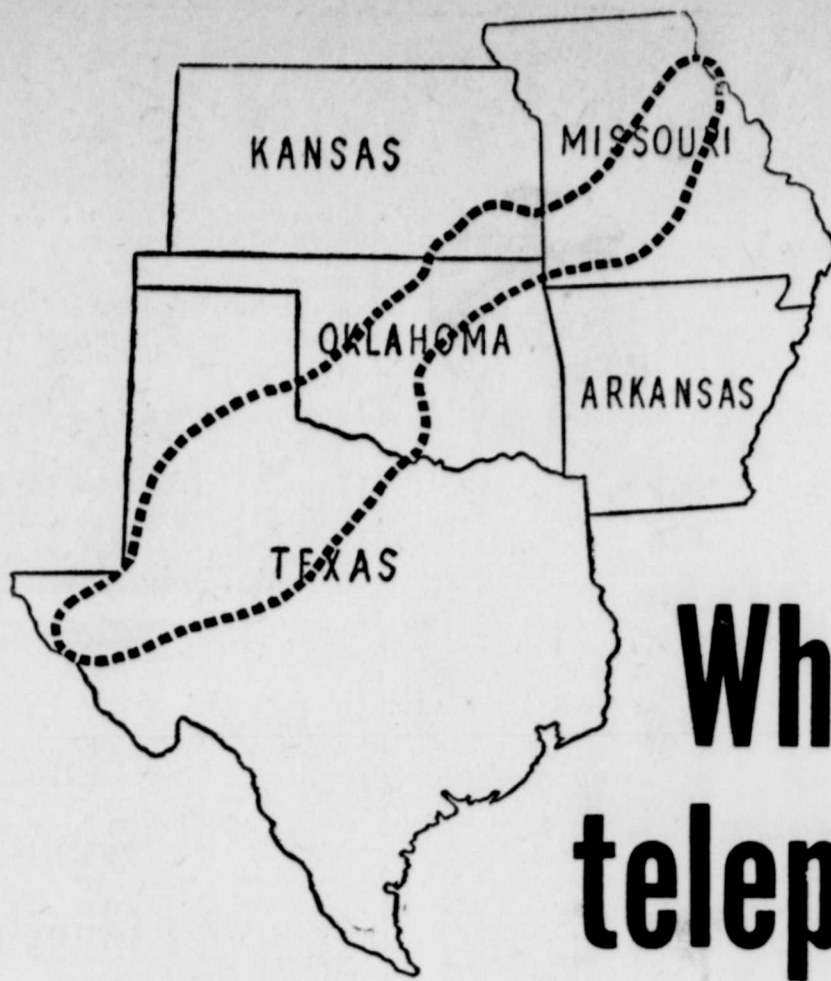

## Where ice hit telephone lines

### DAMAGE EXCEEDS \$2,300,000

Last week's ice and sleet storm struck telephone communications in the South-west the hardest blow they'd received since 1937.

Damage to telephone lines exceeds \$2,300,000 in the area shown on the map above.

Telephone construction men, 3,000 of them, with their trucks and tools, moved into the storm region from all directions.

At the height of the storm 180 communities in four states had no outside telephone communications whatever.

The storm disrupted service for many thousands of telephone users for varying periods. We regret the interruption to service and we sincerely appreciate the patience people everywhere have demonstrated.

The size of the repair job that 3,000 telephone workmen are now tackling can be measured in the damage—108,000

wire breaks, 9,000 poles down, 2,600 long distance circuits out of service, 19,000 telephones temporarily silent.

By states, the money losses are \$600,000 in Missouri, \$380,000 in Kansas, \$570,000 in Oklahoma, and \$750,000 in Texas.

The poles, wire, crossarms, and all the other things needed to restore service are coming into the storm area by train and by truck. They're coming from Missouri, Texas, Alabama, Louisiana, Tennessee, Mississippi, Illinois, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Maryland.

Telephone men began the repair job while the sleet still was falling. Long after emergency service is restored everywhere they'll still be at work until all damaged telephone equipment has been repaired and replaced, and everyone's service is back to normal.

### An American Tragedy

Now and then, a sorry scene is staged in the drama of American life. I refer to the tragic denial of basic American principles by misled persons and groups, acting in the name of religion. It grates on my ears when I hear of it. Though some of these persons are sincere, doubtless, I get plenty riled when I read the news that some church group decided that those principles which have so long brought us prosperity and well-being, must be replaced as behind-the-times.

Here are free Americans, citizens of a land that grants them freedom of religion, assembly, speech—citizens whose founding fathers dedicated this nation to truth. They know that in America, the most liberty is found in doing right deeds. Yet—these who receive so many blessings—yet will they deny the heritage which should be theirs to pass on to their children.

Better Society?  
In New England last June, a group of ministers met and in unanimous agreement called for "change toward the better society." So far, so good. But then, this group denounced the idea of profit incentives! "Monopolistic capitalism," they said. What blindness! In this frame of mind, would it not be easy for them to embrace Communism? This same group called for the creation of "community without loss of individual freedom." What contradictions! What impossibilities! Do you know what community is? It is not individual freedom, not the right to your own decisions, not the exercise of self reliance. That shadowy wording means: state control of everything. "Communism" is common ownership; it is Communism. This is amazing, for a religious group to call for a state dictatorship system — for Communism itself.

Economic Nonsense  
Out in California last year a very large and influential group of churchmen accepted a conference report which lashed out against "the un-Christian motivation of industry by the lust for profit." In simpler terms, this means you are under suspicion if you have ideas about either having or making money. One religious leader present said it was not profit itself, but just the desire for profit, that was opposed. What nonsense for education!

Keep Our Freedoms  
I cannot help wondering why these churchmen say these things. Is it because they have not read the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25)? Can they not see they are following right in line with those who long to destroy America? Do they want a Godless nation, like Russia? Are they the unassigned agents of systems foreign to America? I have not the answer. But I do place confidence in the religious people of America. All together, we must preserve this nation.
