Stage Play At High School Feb. 2

A new and unusual type of theatrical entertainment is offered by Hal and Ruby Holbrook in their repertoire of scenes from the lives of famous personalities entitled "Personality Portraits from Literature and Life."

Their varied repertoire brings to life on the stage such fascinating figures as Mark Twain, Queen Victoria and Prince Albert, Elizabeth and Robert Browning, Hamlet and the Queen, Macbeth and Lady Macbeth, Queen Elizabeth and Lord Essex, and those effervescent young lovers of Shakespeare's "As You Like It", Rosalind and Orlando. The Holbrooks emphasize comedy in their programs, but this lighter touch is effectively balanced with such tragic figures as Hamlet and his Queen mother. All of their scenes are colorfully costumed and characterizations are vividly aided by a series of clever make-ups.

Hal and Ruby Holbrook (who are Mr. and Mrs. in real life) have had a wide theatrical background despite their youth. Mr. Holbrook's theatrical heritage comes to him from his mother, who was in musical comedy under Ziegfeld's management, and his uncle, whose association with the theatre as actor, director, and playwright covered a period of twenty years around the turn of this century.

While stationed in Newfoundland during the war, Mr. Holbrook met his wife-to-be, who was at that time the country's most popular young actress. There they played together in both service and civilian productions. Shortly after arriving in the United States they were married at the Little Church Around the Corner in New York.

Following Mr. Holbrook's discharge from the service, they completed their education at Denison University and appeared together in summer stock theatre. While still in school, the Holbrooks got the idea for their present repertoire of "Personality Portraits." This program has already been enthusiastically received throughout the Midwest. Admission to this entertainment is 15c. The play will begin at 1:30 P. M., Wed., February 2nd.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

(By Congressman Ed Gossett)

Washington, D. C., Jan. 22, 1949—So much has been said about the Inauguration this week, that our comment would probably be an anti-climax. The day before the Inauguration it rained. The day after the Inauguration it rained, but Inauguration day was bright and clear. Many wisecracks were made around the City about President Truman's luck and the fact that he continued to get the breaks. Someone even said they guessed "God" must be a Democrat. The parade was by far the longest and most elaborate ever witnessed in the Capitol City. It was more than five miles long and took more than three hours to pass the reviewing stand. More than 15,000 uniformed persons participated. There were 55 elaborate floats. Texas was represented in the Inaugural Parade by the Cavaliers of San Antonio and by a beautiful, gigantic float under-written and paid for by Mr. Wright Morrow of Houston. Riding on the float were three beautiful Texas ladies: Mrs. Tom Lloyd Bentsen and Mrs. Tom Pickett, wives of Texas Congressmen, and Miss Evelyn Wilson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Wilson of Wichita Falls, Texas. A million people watching the parade were also privileged to see a magnificent air show in which 615 of the Nation's latest and best planes participated.

Congressmen were limited to 7 seats at the Inaugural ceremony. We were happy to have tickets for the following persons: Mr. Ray Nichols of Vernon, Editor of the Vernon Daily Record; Mr. Riley Cross, of Denton, Editor of the Denton Record Chronicle; Miss Louise Mason, of Vernon, who is a student in Washington at the Chevy Chase school for girls; Mrs. S. V. White of Wichita Falls, and her sister; Mr. Bill Booher and Mr. J. V. Boley of Jacksboro; Mrs. Gossett and our oldest son, Glenn. During the last Inauguration in front of the Capitol, in January, 1941, Glenn was an infant and still with his mother in the Garfield Memorial Hospital in Washington.

The Board of Directors of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair and Southwestern Oil Exposition met for a luncheon Monday noon in the Holt Hotel in Wichita Falls.

All officers were re-elected for 1949. They include Dr. Gordon G. Clark, Iowa Park, Wichita Falls, first vice-president; W. A. Krohn, Electra, 2nd vice-president; C. A. Mr. George Gutzman, owner of the Southwestern Glass and Paint Co., Wichita Falls, was appointed on the executive committee.

Dates for the 1949 fair and exposition were set for Sept. 26 through Oct. 1st.

Plans were discussed for an enlarged program of youth participation in the fair. Plans also called for grandstand attractions which will far exceed those of any previous year, with several big-time acts included.

Leo Moore of Electra, Dr. Clark and Mr. McNeil will attend the Texas Association of Fairs and Expositions Convention which will be held at Dallas January 27-29.

Wichita County Fat Steer Show February 12th

The Wichita County 4-H Fat Steer Show was set for February 12, 1949 by representatives from Wichita Falls, Iowa Park, Electra, and Burkburnett at a recent meeting held in the Directors Room of the State National Bank in Iowa Park. The Hereford Barn of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair in Iowa Park was selected as the place for the show, which is expected to attract County-wide attendance. This show is in preparation for the Annual Wichita Falls Area Calf Show to be held February 23, 24, and 25. The high ten calves from this show will be eligible to enter the Area show.

Following the show, those boys not eligible to attend the Area Show will be allowed to enter their calves in an auction to be held to help them sell their calves. Of special interest to the boys will be the fact that \$125 in prize money will be offered to the boys exhibiting at the show along with ribbons designating their appropriate winnings. Each of the four towns represented will contribute in raising the prize money. An Association known as the Wichita County 4-H Show Committee was formed and elected Fred Thompson of Iowa Park as president. Committeemen present included Earl Burch, Wichita Falls; Fred Thompson, and Herman W. Mitchell, Iowa Park; S. Clark Boggs and Leon Rogers, Electra; Paul Browning, Burkburnett and Max Carpenter, County Agent. Those not present but elected to be on the committee were H. A. Mills and J. V. Brookshear, Burkburnett; and Allen Kemple of Electra.

Sleet, Rain, Snow Main Bill of Fare For Past Week

Menu for the Burkburnett area since last Sunday night has been one of sleet, rain and snow, almost around the clock. On this Wednesday morning, approximately 4-5 inches of sleet, with very little snow, covers the ground. Cars without chains find the going pretty slow, especially where streets have little travel to pack the sleet down. Driving in this sleet is very much like driving in sand. Cars just quiver and shake but refuse to budge without aid.

Low temperature for the week has been around 15 degrees, with the high in the upper 20's. Predictions for Thursday are more of the same diet, with a possible break coming Friday. Electric and telephone lines are faring well so long as the temperature remains below the freezing point. At noon Wednesday a light mist was falling but very little ice was collecting on lines.

Cattle in this area were in excellent shape when the cold wave hit two weeks ago, and with the aid of generous feeding, are suffering no real hardship.

WHO SAID THAW?

It takes a January thaw for us to forget the bitter weather preceding it. With a mixture of snow and sleet falling this Wednesday morning, no thaw is in sight here. With the first thaw we'll be so jubilant that perhaps someone will suggest we do not have those old-fashioned winters any more. Scarcely is his thoughts uttered than he is back seeking his muffler and galoshes and ear muffs. Out he goes to shovel snow from the walk. He thought the wind was mild and could almost hear the first robin, when — bang comes a blast that shivers his local timbers. A January thaw brings optimism and hints of what is in the offing, a lovely thing called "Spring". But that season is a long way off when you consider what February and March can offer. And a few of the old-timers may remember what April can offer in the way of cold.

A snowflake is a sight to behold, a star form of amazing detail. The crystals of varied dreamlike patterns are wondrous to see. The crystals may look fairy-like on your coat sleeve, but when banked into drifts that mean shovel and rake, they aren't quite so beautiful. They are more impersonal. As a friend reminds us, when you get enthusiastic over a January thaw, find an oldster to remind you of the big blizzard in March back in '88.

WHAT ABOUT OLEO TAX?

Look to the way the wind blew in Canada. For sixty-two years the Dominion has had a ban on oleomargarine. Their court has now made it legal to manufacture and sell colored margarine in Canada, AND without payment of tax. Since importation of oleo has formerly been forbidden there (except in Newfoundland), it will be some time before plants to manufacture oleo, will be built. It will come, though. Our Congress will have a bill to face, on the subject of oleo taxation. Consumers have demanded the tax be removed as unfair, on both state and federal statutes. We shall see whether the voice of the lobbyist is louder than that of the housewives.

Alaska, with a population of 85,000, is pretty hopeful about being annexed as a state. She began her drive back in 1915, three years after becoming an incorporated territory. Burkburnett will join other cities over the United States on January 30 in an annual celebration observing President Roosevelt's birthday.

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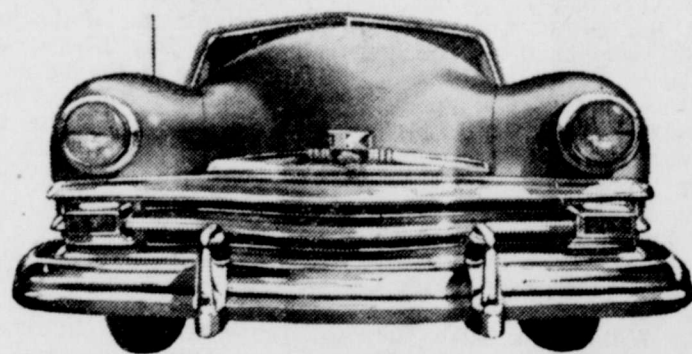

CHAIN STORES:

Food Dollar Chart

Despite the prevalence of many convictions to the contrary, consumers who lay a dollar down on the counter of a chain food store gets food that costs the chain an average of 83 cents.

This leaves 17 cents to the chain with which it must pay all its incidental expenses and 10 cents of this, or about three fifths, goes out in wages to employees of the chain.

IN PAYING 17 cents to the chain the customer thus lays out that amount for the chain's combined wholesale and retail services. After the 10 cents goes to employees, the remainder is allocated in this manner: one and a half cents for rent and maintenance; two cents for warehousing and cartage; a little over one cent for shrinkage, spoilage and theft, and one-half cent for advertising. This leaves from one to one and a half cents net profit to the chain, less income taxes of one-half to one cent.

These figures were developed in the latest in a series of price studies by the family economics bureau of the Northwestern National Life Insurance company.

The survey disclosed that individual markups vary widely, of course, within the store, being much higher than the general 17 per cent average on perishable items like fresh fruits and vegetables, and much lower than average on very competitive staples like sugar.

ACCORDING TO the study result, the average food chain markup before the war was 22½ cents—a third greater than today. Today's far greater dollar volume per store, and therefore per employee, is mainly responsible for the lower handling costs per dollar of sales.

Should either prices or total volume shrink materially, however, the cent or so profit margin per dollar would vanish rather quickly and "red ink" would take its place.

Before the war, the farmer received an average of 40 cents of the consumer's food dollar and 60 cents went for processing, canning, shipping, wholesaling and retaining. Today the farmer gets 53 cents per dollar and 47 cents covers all the various steps in processing and distribution.

LONGER LIFE:

Science Has Key If parents would insure long lives for their progeny, they must marry young.

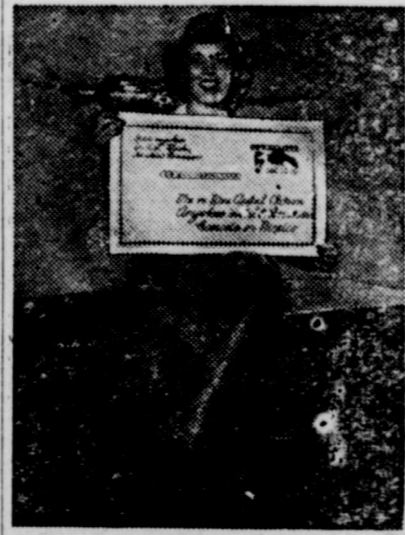
DR. A. I. LANSING of the Washington university school of medicine, St. Louis, reported to the Gerontological society of New York the discovery of a mysterious chemical, called X, which seems to time how fast a human being grows old. "X" is something that parents transmit to their offspring and it is set like a clock, either for long or short life.

The age clock was found in rotifers, but a little human evidence was cited. Rotifers are microscopic water bugs, swimming with long lashes that make them look like whirling dervishes. The setting of the X-clock in rotifers depend on how early they mated.

IT APPEARS, Dr. Lansing stated, that the amount of X stuff in a fertilized egg sets the clock. When there is little X, the rotifer lives long. As parents get older, the eggs contain more X and life is shorter. He also said that the mysterious stuff also regulates growth—as the volume of X increases, growth stops.

The human existence is indirect. Dr. Lansing said. A study by Dr. Louis Dublin, showed a tendency for children of young parents to live longer than those born later. And, it must be remembered, humans come from eggs.

'Yet Without Sin'

Lesson for January 30, 1949

YOU will never feel the current if you never swim upstream. If you are a drifter through life you can hardly know what the word "temptation" means. And Jesus was no drifter. If ever a powerful purpose, devotion to God, a noble mind and a pure heart could set a man free from all temptations, Jesus would have been that man. But he had his temptations all the same. After the great day of his baptism, when the heavens opened and he felt the Holy Spirit as plainly as a bird from the sky alighting on his shoulder, we are told that he was "full of the Holy Spirit." Surely no temptation could reach him now! Yet the Spirit led him to the wilderness where Satan waited for him.

The Devil Is Smart SATAN is a persistent devil. He never takes. No for an answer, he will be back again with the same temptation in another package. It was so with Jesus. We must not think that Jesus was tempted to low and ugly sins. People are tempted on the level where they live.

After the Baptism, if not before, he was fully awake to the fact that he was God's beloved Son, that it was his responsibility to begin the "Kingdom of God;" he knew he had a position and a power that no one else on earth had ever had. The problem was: How should he use this position and this power?

Each of the three temptations in the wilderness had something to do with that problem. Two of the temptations, at least, were not to do anything wrong in itself. Each time Jesus was tempted to choose something less than the best. And choosing less than the best, when the best can be had, is sin.

All Temptation Sounds Good

"TURN stones into bread," the tempter said. And why not? People were hungry all around; Jesus grew up in a land where most people were lucky to get one square meal a day, let alone three. Jesus would be the Divine Leader of the Kingdom, the Founder of the New Age. Why not make it the Age of Plenty? Why not abolish hunger from the earth? It could be done; it sounds good.

So does that other temptation — "Throw yourself down, the angels will see that you are not hurt." Perhaps many worshippers at the Temple expected that the Messiah, God's King to be, would fly down out of a cloud.

Then that temptation which seems at first reading so ridiculous—fall down and worship Satan. It was not so ridiculous as it appears. What did Jesus want but to be King of Kings and Lord of Lords? What difference does it make how we attain our ambitions, if we only reach them? All other world-conquerors had achieved their pinnacles of power by "worshipping Satan," that is by using violence and trickery.

But Jesus, being full of the Holy Spirit, knew that not everything that sounds good, is good.

He saw clearly that not even he could bring in the Kingdom of God simply by feeding people, or astonishing them with aerial stunts, and still less by using those ancient methods of the world-conquerors, the tools of Satan, violence and lies.

Defense Weapon

JESUS met his great enemy and beat him down with a single weapon. Every time, Jesus comes out with a quotation from the Bible, incidentally always from Deuteronomy, evidently a favorite book with him. We have the same weapon at our disposal today, and more besides.

There is nothing magical in a Scripture quotation. The point is not that Jesus had memorized these verses so that he could quote them; anybody could do that even without believing a word of them.

What Jesus did was to make those truths his own, they were part of his mind, actually his own convictions. Do you really want to rise proof against temptations? Do as Jesus did: make God's ideas your own. The sharpest lie will blunt itself against the keen edge of Truth.

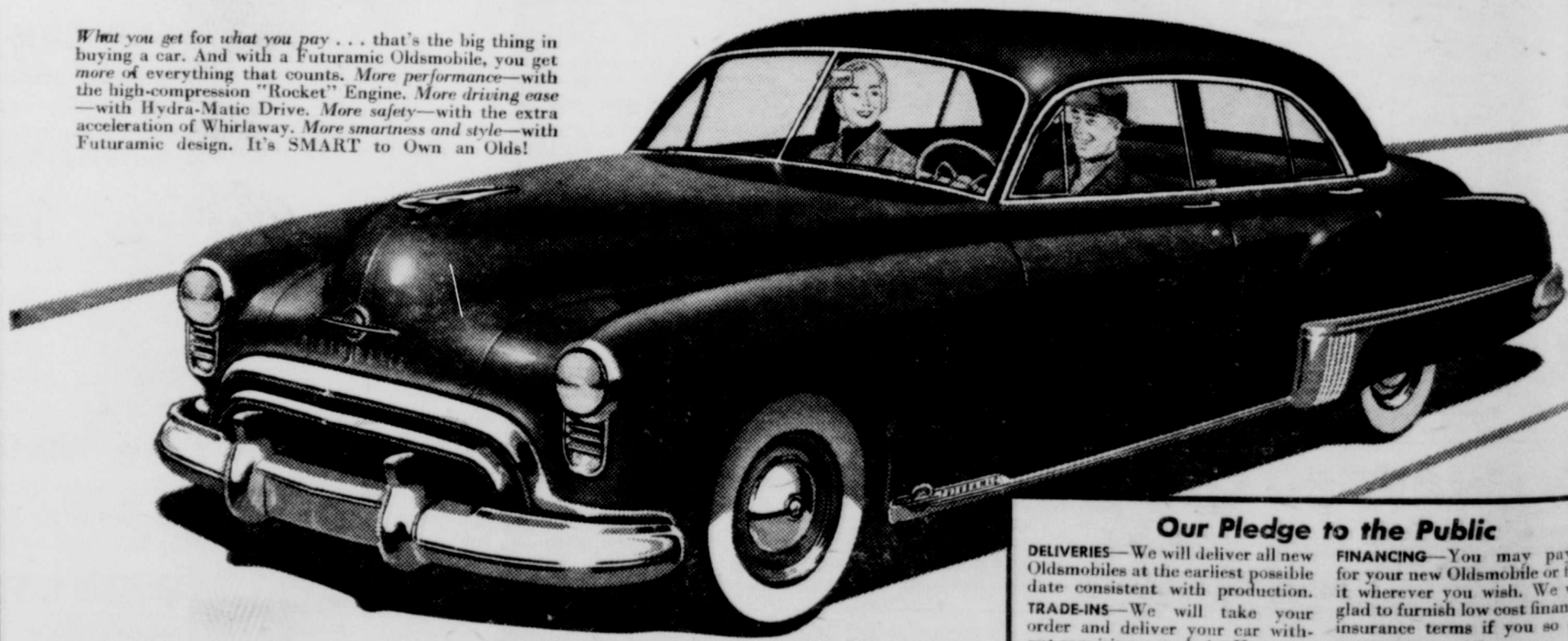

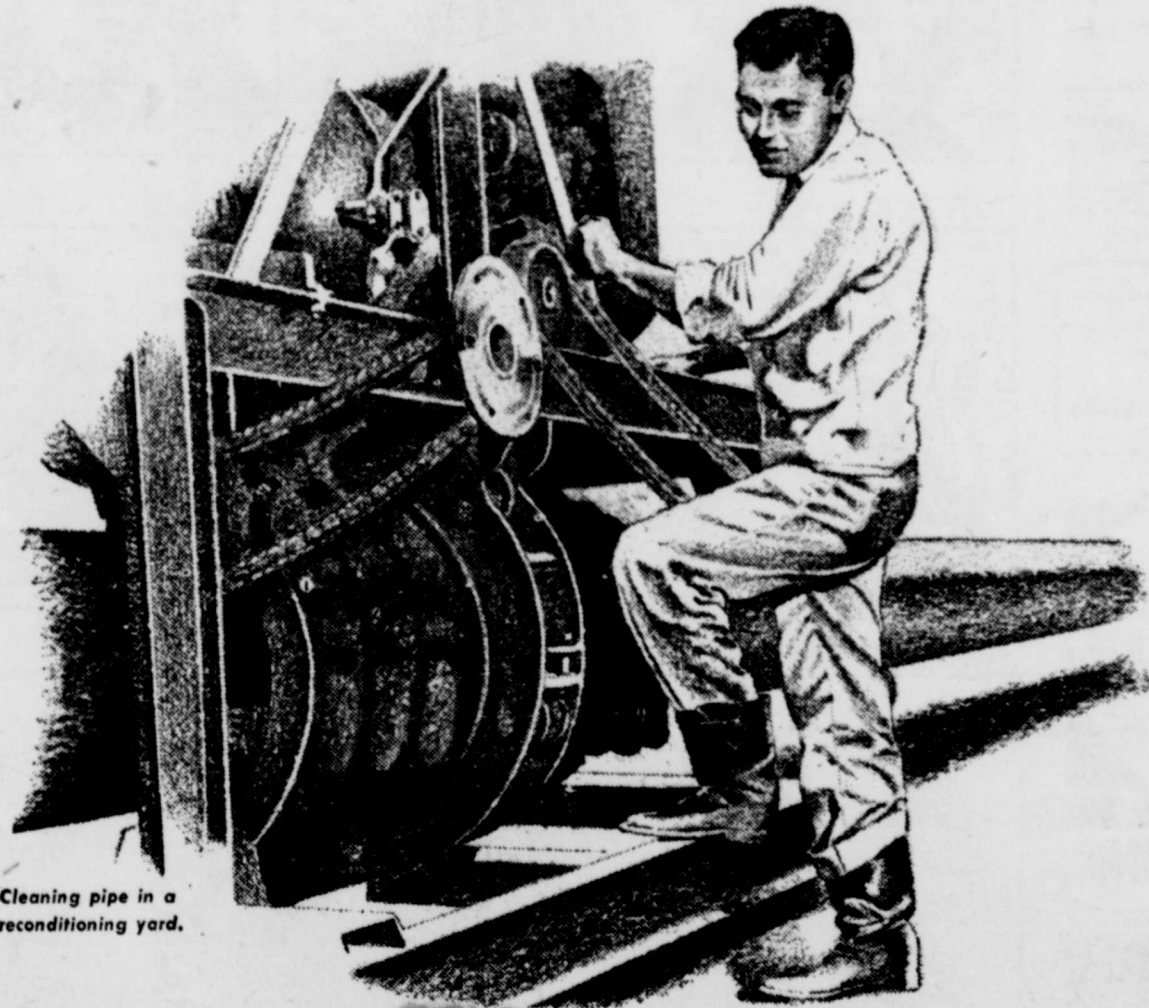
Slim gets a little red and you could see that Doc had him. "And the reason they came here," he goes

TICK CHATS

FORMS AND LICE ARE EGG ROBBERS

Internal and external parasites in a serious problem even during the winter months when poultry producers might think these poultry house pests less bothersome.

Heavy infections of worms, if uncontrolled, create serious loss or loss. Keeping worms down is necessary if layers are going to remain high production through the winter months.

Keep The House Clean

By poultrymen practice an dual-bird treatment at the time they put the birds in the fall. Later, they should give the birds a medicated wormer that is administered in mash.

giving such commercial treatments to the flock, a flock should clean the poultry thoroughly to remove as much of the danger of reinfection as possible. A good disinfectant to eliminate bacteria is available whenever cleaning is done but it should be borne in mind that few disinfectants are effective against worm eggs.

Internal parasites, such as lice, and ticks, infest the skin feathers of laying birds, and there are enough of them to cause great irritation, the loss of their appetites and a drop in egg production.

and loss of weight.

Killing Lice
Lice treatments may be accomplished by cleaning the roosts and applying a nicotine or pyrethrin solution directly to the birds' roosts. This treatment kills lice by releasing fumes which penetrate the roosts' feathers. The warmth of the birds' body volatilizes the fumes.

Another way to get rid of lice is through the use of a louse powder, which is sprinkled onto the birds individually.

Increasing egg production in high laying birds is a difficult job under any circumstances. It becomes more difficult if parasites are robbing the birds of their strength.

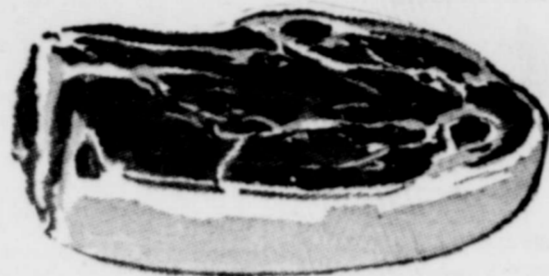

The President has made numerous appearances and numerous speeches during this Inaugural week. In a speech at the dinner of Presidential Electors, he threw a little cold water on the Gossett-Lodge amendment by saying that he was satisfied with the present system. However, I don't believe this to have been a serious remark. All other presidents expressing a view on this subject have advocated electoral reform. In each of his eight messages to the Congress while President, Andrew Jackson's first recommendation was for the abolition of the Electoral College.

The President's Inaugural address was one of his best speeches and was well received. All of us are hoping and praying that he will have a great administration. However, many wise Democrats do not go along with all of the talk that President Truman has a mandate to carry out all parts of the Democratic platform, or that the Congress has a mandate to do certain things, such as a repeal of the Taft-Hartley act. The recent national elections in which we Democrats won, was not any particular mandate.

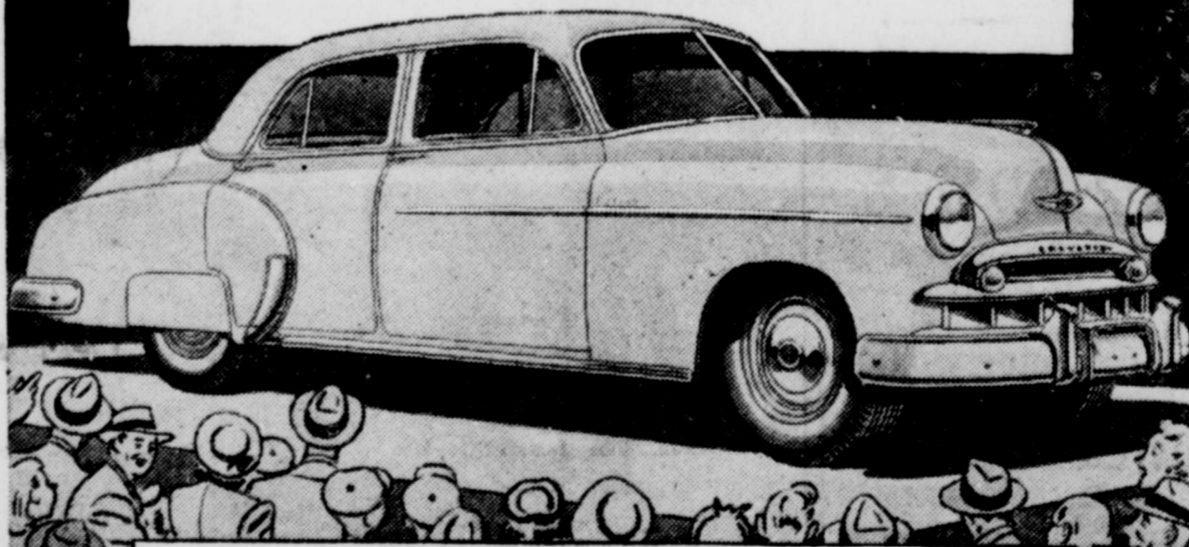

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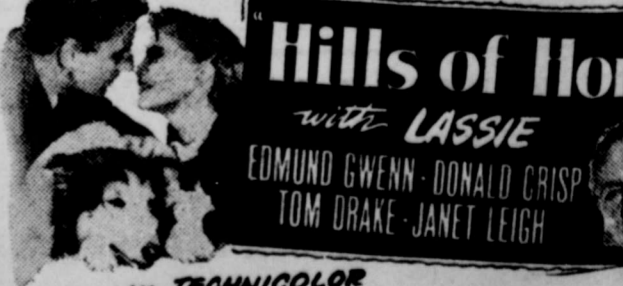
