## OUR EDISON

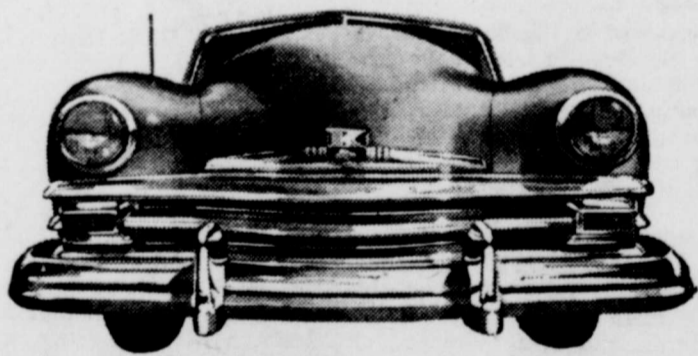

### Good Layers Are Cheaper to Feed

The faster your laying flock fills a case of eggs, the less feed and more profit you'll have in every case.

A flock of 100 hens that is in 40 per cent production will consume about 26 pounds of feed daily. A flock of the same size that is in 70 per cent production eats about 32 pounds. The high producers lay nearly twice as many eggs while consuming less than 20 per cent more feed. Looking at it in another way: A flock of 40 per cent production requires 9 days to fill a case of eggs, while consuming 234 lbs. of feed; a flock in 70 per cent production fills a case in 5.1 days and eats only 163.2 pounds of feed.

### Less Feed Per Egg

It is apparent that a good laying hen, while she eats more than her slow-laying sister, is more economical because she requires less feed to lay each egg. The poultryman's aim should be to keep feed consumption high, thus encouraging high egg production. At the same time, he must be wary of the occasional loafing layer that eats a lot but lays very little. Cull these loafers. There are any number of factors influencing feed consumption. Some of the things you can do to increase consumption are: feed mash and grain often-

er during the day, stir the mash more frequently, provide increased feeding space, and feed wet mash at noon or night. Perhaps a tonic to sharpen birds' appetites will help.

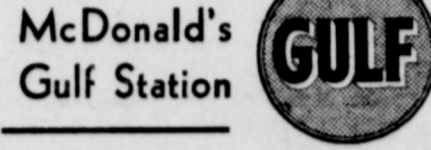
### Quality Feed Preferred

Remember, however, that good egg production depends not only on the quantity of feed consumed, but on its quality as well. Make sure that the flock is getting a balanced ration of properly-blended high-quality ingredients.

Water is important. An egg is about 65 per cent water, so the hen that is unable to get enough water to drink cannot lay as often as it would otherwise. Keep water before the hens at all times, take the chill water, and make sure there is enough space at the water trough that none of the birds is ed away.

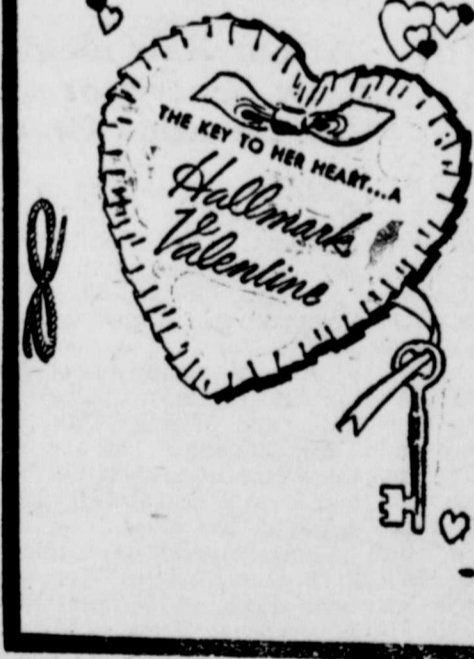

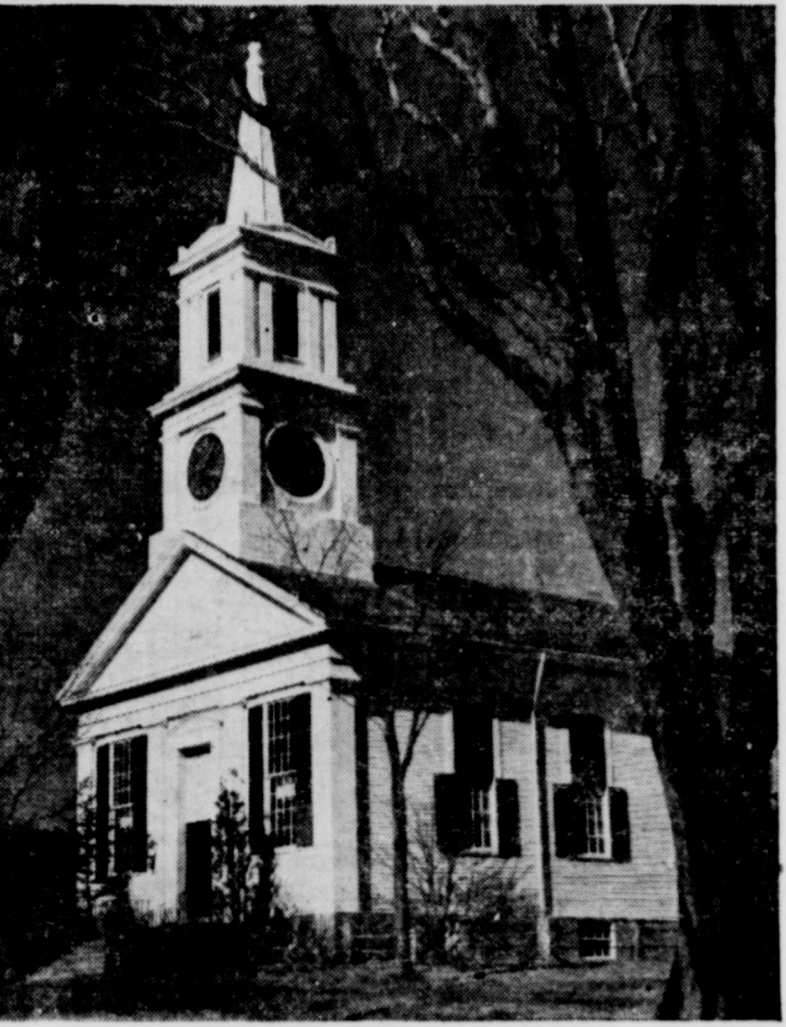
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## The SNAPSHOT GUILD

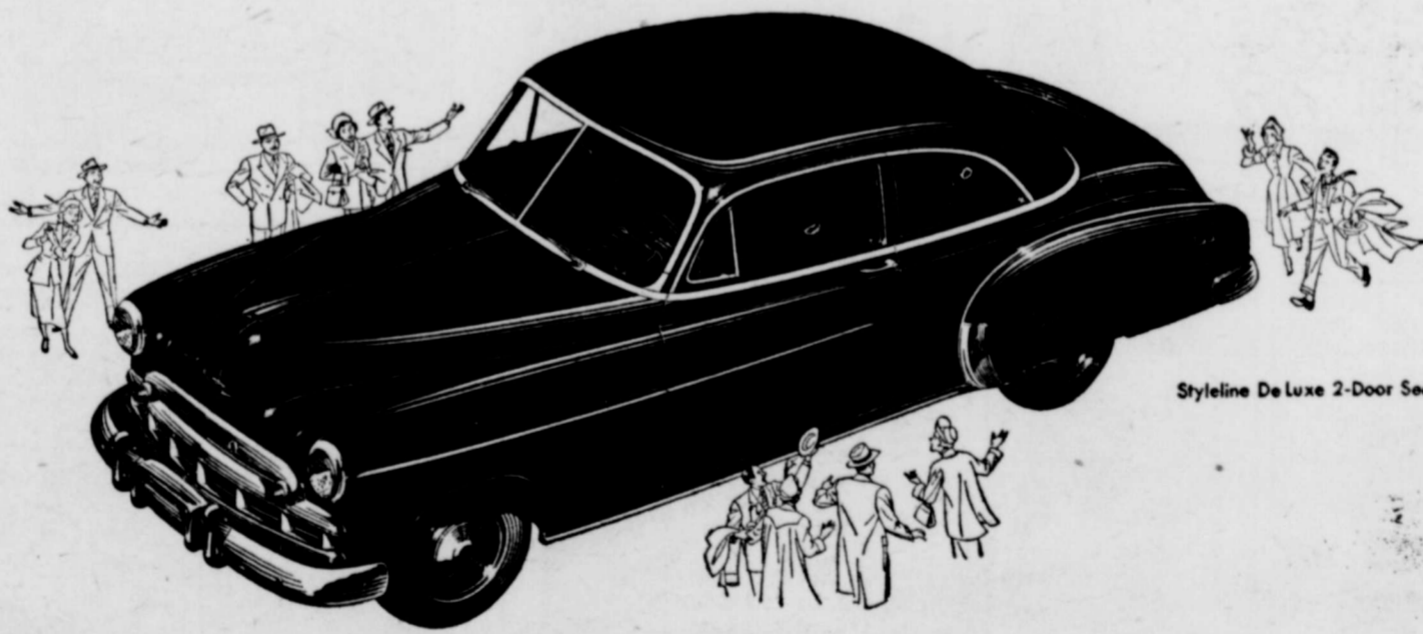

**A Fresh Start for Labor**  
Our unions have been accused of "Communism" many times in recent years. Sometimes the charge has not stood up under close examination. At other times, labor organizations have faced the music and set about the job of cleaning out dangerous, un-American elements. A recent decision of the CIO rank and file to clean house is an example of the latter. Philip Murray and others helping in this unsavory task surely merit our full support.

**Clever But Risky**  
Most of us little know what masters the Communists are at clever organization. They do make good union workers. If they can find a union whose leadership is untrained, or members uninterested, they know how to take over. The Communists want to use labor unions as outlets for their propaganda. They want new recruits. Naturally, they want to have access to union funds. From union treasuries can come paychecks for faithful, advance-agents of Communism!

Moreover, a union base for operations is just what the agents of Communism want most. This gives them a chance to see what they can do to insure failure for the enterprise system. With the reins of union leadership in their hands, it is no trouble at all to make excessive demands upon employers, to stir up unjustified strikes and slowdowns. Industrial espionage for Russia is easy then, and in case of war, sabotage can be undertaken.

**Subversive Boast**  
These are some of the reasons why we must get behind Phil Murray and the CIO in their effort to oust fifth columnists from their unions. More than that, we must become acquainted with the ways of the Communist. You know, American Communists have boasted that a dozen non-Communists stand ready to do the work and the bidding of each party member. This means that well-intentioned persons may find themselves doing things just the way the Communists want them done.

We must be alert for the Communist attitude, as well as for the Communist himself. In every community, good citizens, we must watch for the fellows that want to sow discord and plant the seeds of strife. If there's honest disagreement, or differences of opinion, we are free to discuss these over the conference table. When we're unwilling to do that, we may be boosting the stock of the Communists in our own America.

**Which Team?**  
Here's what I mean by the Communist attitude. A certain California union organizer said he operated in this manner: No negotiations during a dispute until the management is made to look bad to the public, in every way. This labor official frankly stated he would not begin negotiations until the point is reached where management appeared in the eyes of the public to be selfish, greedy, crooked.

Then, said the organizer, when labor was shown to be helpless and in need of protection, he was ready for conferences. Like this labor man, there are those who sometimes fail to see which team they're on. The pity is that so many lend themselves to the purpose of those who would destroy America and all that labor stands for.
