## CHICK CHATS

### SHOP FOR QUALITY NOT FOR LOW PRICE

The chick-buying season is no time to go bargain-hunting. The money you save when you purchase cheap chicks amounts to very little, really, and in the long run bargain birds may prove to be an extremely costly buy.

Start with the best. The wise poultry raiser, with a breeding background of known quality. They may cost a little more in the beginning, but in the end they will bring you greater profits.

Bargain chicks of uncertain background are likely to prove unsatisfactory for several reasons: usually, they will produce fewer eggs, yet will eat just as much as well-bred birds. The mortality rate among low-cost chicks will probably run higher, and they will almost certainly grow less rapidly. They will lack uniformity, the vigorous, well-fleshed appearance of a flock with a good breeding background.

See your hatcheryman and talk over with him the matter of chick selection. Ask him to advise you on the kind of chicks to buy — then order them well ahead of time so that you will get the kind of chicks you want when you want them.

Progressive hatcherymen take real interest in the chicks after they have delivered them to you. They want to know how the chicks do, and they want to be of assistance to the raiser in every matter pertaining to manage-

ment. So, ask your hatcheryman for the latest advice on chick-raising and follow his recommendations.

Have you enrolled in Blue Cross and Blue Shield Group Hospital Service? If not you can enroll at the Farm Bureau office in the Park Hotel in Iowa Park or see one of the directors or workers before March 15th. After that the next enrollment date will be the next March 15th.

Thirty-four workers and directors attended the supper meeting Tuesday night, Feb. 8th at the Baptist Church basement in Iowa Park. Geo. Lewis presided over the business session. **SOIL Conservation NEWS**

Floyd Landes cooperater of Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District planted 16 acres to blackeye peas following wheat harvested last summer. On the 6 acres he sold \$200 green peas and harvested over 600 pounds of dried peas. Cooperator Landes was proud to receive the money from peas but treasures most the increase crop yields following this legume crop. He states "On land planted to Mung Beans 3 years ago, it has shown increased wheat yields and green color by the increased nitrogen the last two summers." He plans to plant both black eye and chinese red peas the coming summer.

Norb Zimmerman and Henry Vaughn have planted Mung Beans as a summer legume the last 3 years. They are of the opinion Mung Beans are drought resistant and will make some seed under adverse conditions.

A Soil Conservation District is a Cooperative, voted on and formed by farmers and ranchers and run by farmers and ranchers and is a legally constituted unit of local Government set-up under the Texas State Soil Conservation District Law. The District Supervisors coordinate the

activities of local state, and federal agencies, which cooperate into a completely itegrated program of soil and water conservation.

According to H. J. Flusche of Electra, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District, Arthur Ramming of Burkburnett was elected as District Supervisor of Sub-division No. five.

Spread all available barnyard manure, as it is one of the most complete and cheapest fertilizers available.

Stock ponds are now in progress of being constructed on farms of J. D. Ashton, Jr. and Mrs. Jess Aston, south of Burkburnett. Diversion terraces have been run to direct water into

these stock ponds. The farmer received the Engineering assistance of Soil Conservation Service on these ponds.

Terraces will be run and constructed on the following farms when weather conditions permit: Charlie Pace, H. L. Shellnut, E. E. Clack, H. J. Flusche, and Ross Schleg.

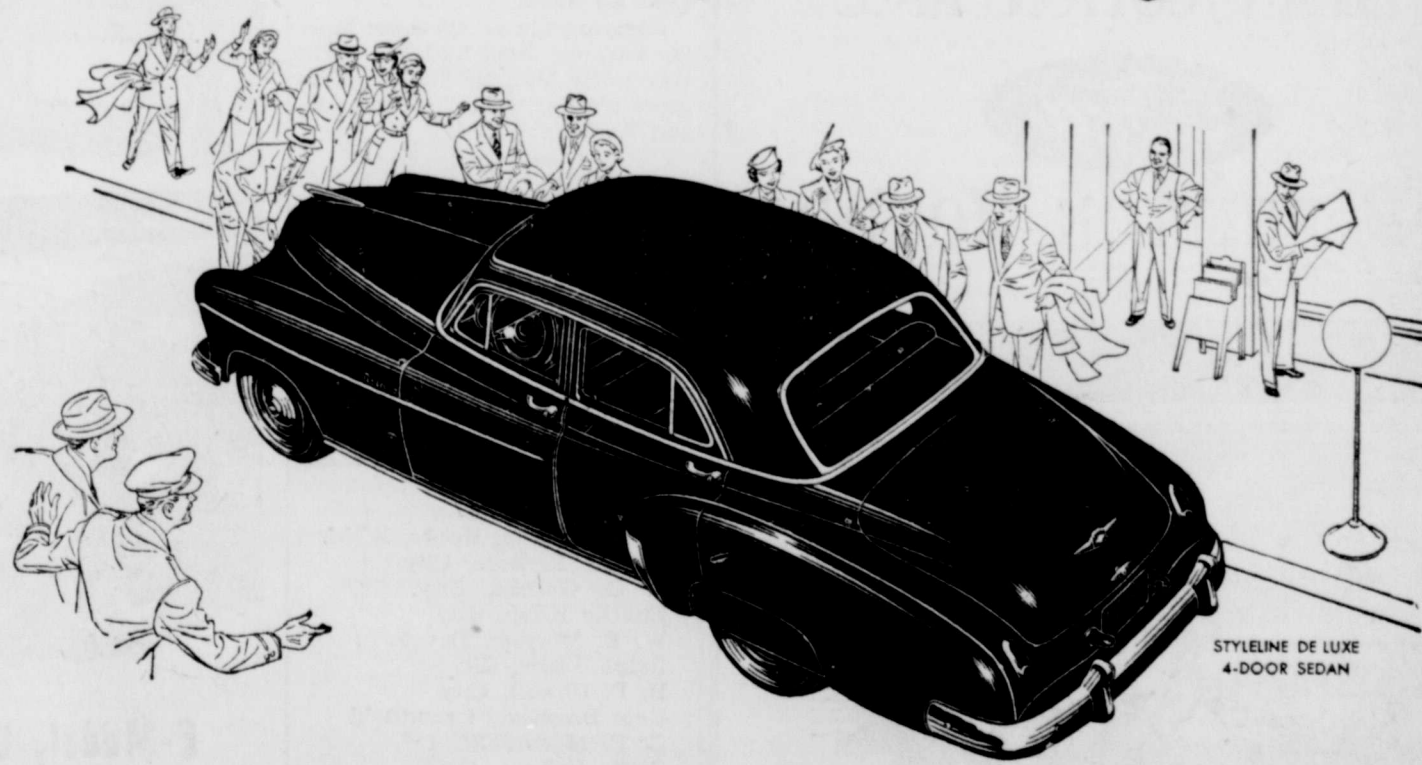

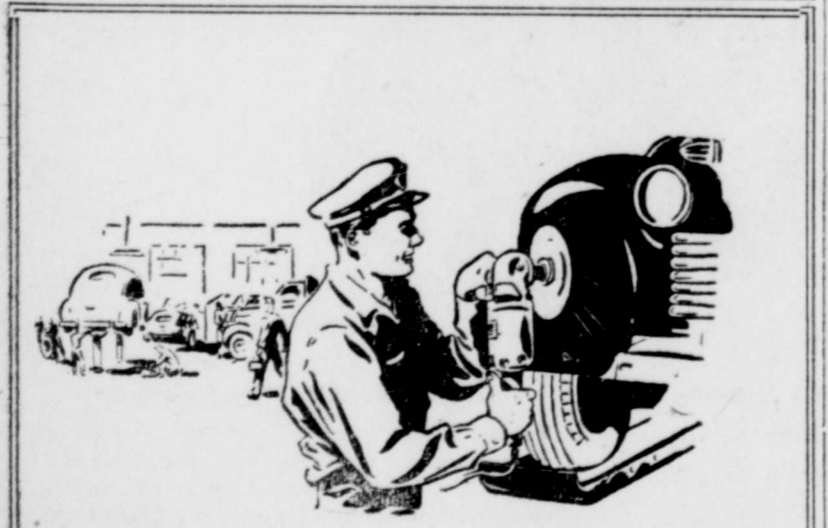

**Growth Of Camp Fire Girls In Burk**

Next Monday, Feb. 21 the Burk Burnett District Council of Camp Fire Girls begins the finance drive for Burk Burnett's part of the 1948-49 budget of the North Central Texas Area Council. This drive is simultaneous with the first anniversary of the reactivation and growth of Camp Fire Girls in Burk Burnett.

There are now five groups with a membership of over 75 girls and 30 adults. These groups are actively carrying on the Camp Fire and Blue Bird program. This program, designed to perpetuate the spiritual ideals of the home and to increase skills in the out-of-doors, is carried on in small groups of 6 to 20 girls with 3 to 5 adult leaders. In these small groups, each girl has an opportunity to participate in all activities, thereby gaining skills in crafts and earning the standards of good citizenship and working toward becoming better homemakers.

In order to promote better leadership for the girls, the Burk Burnett Camp Fire Leaders Association was formed in May, 1948, and there are now between 35 and 40 active members.

The Leaders Association sponsored a Donut Drive last Spring in which the three organized groups at that time sold almost 1,000 dozen donuts. Of the \$250.00 raised, part was rebated to the groups, part given to the

girls in prizes and the remainder retained by the Leaders Association.

During the summer this group of mothers represented Burk Burnett for the finance drive for Burk Burnett's part of the North Central Texas Area Budget of 1947-48.

In the fall, the Burk Burnett District Council Board of Directors was organized to represent Camp Fire Girls in Burk Burnett. Jimmy Boyd was elected president of this board. Burk Burnett has equal status in the Area with District Councils in Wichita Falls, Electra, Nocona, Archer City, Iowa Park and Henrietta.

An area-wide camp was held at Lake Fannin Ranch north of Bonham, Texas. This camp was directed by the Camp Fire professional staff assisted by a group of competent adult counselors. Nine Burk Burnett girls attended Camp Letoli last summer. An even greater number are planning to attend one of the three sessions at Camp this summer.

In order to provide a camping experience for every girl, plans are now being made to conduct a Day Camp in Burk Burnett early in June.

Because of the phenomenal growth of Camp Fire Girls here, Burk Burnett was asked to be the host council for the North Central Texas Area Council Annual Dinner. This annual report meeting is the highlight of the council year, and over 100 attended last year's dinner from all over North Texas.

Camp Fire Girls is an ever growing organization with fine

community support and great promise for the future.

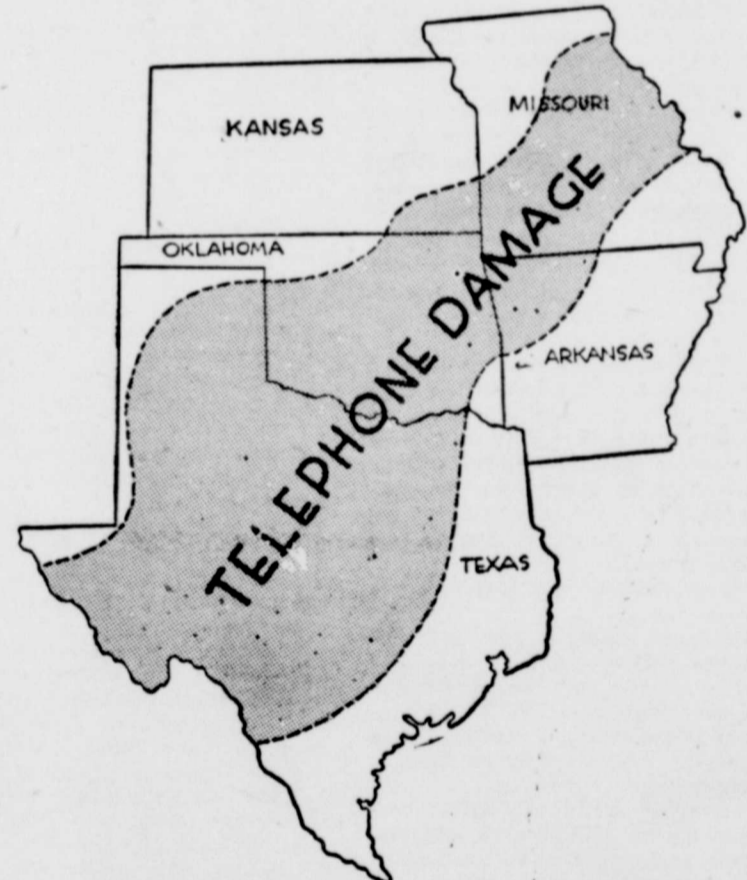

January was the most costly month Southwestern Bell Telephone Company ever has known—\$10 million dollars damage from ice, sleet, floods, zero cold, wind. Winter's paralyzing blows brought the most costly disaster in company history, and also the most extensive.

From San Antonio and Pecos, through most of central and west Texas, diagonally across Oklahoma, southeastern Kansas, northwest Arkansas, and Missouri to Hannibal on the banks of the Mississippi River, new storms caused additional damage every few days. And floods in Arkansas washed out miles of long distance lines. The areas affected are shown on the map above.

These figures show the extent of the damage: 24,000 poles down, 36,000 crossarms broken; 4,800 long distance circuits knocked out; 53,000 telephones temporarily silent; 200 communities isolated for a time.

**Service restored quickly**

Two things made it possible to restore service quickly. First, the diligence and skill of 4,200 telephone men. They came with their trucks and tools from all parts of our company territory and from other Bell System companies—Mountain States, Illinois Bell, Southern Bell.

Disregarding personal hardships and in the finest traditions of the business, these men worked from dawn to dark—from "can" to "can't" as Plant men say—seven days a week, under conditions that were always difficult. Sometimes they could scarcely walk on the ice crust, and their trucks were immovable on slippery highways. But, one

way or another, they got to where they were needed, and they got the job done.

Reason No. 2—the teamwork that characterizes Bell System service.

Western Electric Company, supply unit of the Bell System, marshaled its nation-wide resources. From Western's warehouses or outside suppliers in 45 communities scattered through 21 states, the materials moved, at once.

A steady stream of poles, crossarms, drop wire, cable, insulators, steel strand, tie wire—all the things the storms had smashed—flowed into the ice area. At no time was work held up by lack of supplies.

Wire shipments during the month were more than was required by Southwestern Bell in all of the fourth quarter of 1948 for normal purposes. In addition to wire, thousands of poles, crossarms, and tons of pole-line hardware were moved by truck, by express, and by air into the storm areas.

**Equipment is standardized**

In the Bell System telephone equipment is standardized. The parts that fit in Texas work equally well in Missouri, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kansas, or anywhere else. Thus, even the construction gangs from the other companies found no equipment puzzles—and their own tools worked perfectly.

Bell System teamwork met the challenge of these storms. Most of the service has been restored. But permanent repairs, especially on toll lines, will take months to complete. For every wire damaged by the storm must be retied and "resagged" to meet Bell System standards before the job will be finished.

Pasture Rotation Controls Parasites

A few years ago parasites caused such heavy losses in sheep and lambs in the northwest that some ranchers were forced out of business. Research and investigation by veterinarians, sanitary experts, and sheep men pointed to overgrazing as the underlying cause of the trouble. Rotation of pastures and reasonable growth of grass or sheep and lambs were vital to stop the heavy losses and avoid the devastating parasites. Some ranchers, who practised frequent rotations and the feeding of adequate minerals the year around, were relatively free from parasite losses.
