## Reburial Service To Be Held For Pvt. W. W. Nickens

Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Nickens, Sr., former resident of Burk Burnett and now of McCamey, Texas, have received notice that final services and reburial of their son, Private Wade Warren Nickens, will be held at Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery on April 18, at 11 A. M.

Pvt. Nickens, born at Burk Burnett on March 24, 1922, entered service on May 9, 1941, receiving his training at Ft. Bliss, Texas, Fort Leonardwood, Mo., and Camp Bowie, Texas. He was service with the 46th Combat Engineers in the Southwest Pacific area from Jan. 23, 1942 until his death at Charters Tower, Queensland, Australia on November 18, 1942. He was formerly buried in the U. S. Armed Forces Cemetery, Ipswich, Aus.

Pvt. Nickens is survived by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Nickens, Sr., his seven-year-old daughter Nicky Darlene Nickens, one sister, Mrs. Irene Seignethaler, and four brothers who were all in foreign service. His brothers are A. J. Nickens, Burk Burnett, who was also a prisoner of war in Germany; Frank Adair Nickens, Jr., McCamey; Huey Nickens, McCamey; and Jack Nickens, McCamey.

### City Makes Interest Payment On Time

On March 28 an interest payment of \$5,624.03 was made on Burk Burnett's bonded indebtedness. The payment, due April 1st, was for the first half year's interest. September 1st a like amount will be due, and funds are already in sight for making the Sept. payment. Since the bonded indebtedness was refinanced two years ago, all interest payments have been made on time.

### Indebtedness Reduced

Within the past two years, the City of Burk Burnett has been able to reduce its bonded indebtedness \$33,000.00. This in addition to making interest payments and keeping them up to date.

### \$1,121.94 Saved Yearly

By reducing the principal \$33,000.00, Burk Burnett is making a saving of \$1,121.94 each year in interest. That in itself is incentive enough to keep doing everything possible to cut down on the total amount owed.

### Taxes Apply On Interest

Every penny collected on City taxes goes toward paying interest on the outstanding debt. If tax payments are more than sufficient to meet the interest demands, then the balance applies on the debt itself. In the foreseeable future, Burk Burnett will be out of debt. It will take a long time, but before the refinancing program two years ago, it was an impossibility for the City to ever get out of debt. In fact, it was going in debt more each year. The interest was not being paid regularly.

## QUITE AN INDUCEMENT

Lots of countries are bidding for the American tourist trade. The sight of good old American dollars brightens the foreign eye. Competition is keen and advertising the glories of the Old World with brochures, reaches into our hinterlands. Great Britain has the edge on the other nations though. Through her socialized medicine set-up she informs us that visitors are just as eligible for free medical treatment as the natives. Such is the system in Britan that this medical service includes, false teeth, wigs, and glasses. The French may try to entice with low rentals on chateaus, but what citizens wouldn't rather have an English thatched cottage by the sea and get a tepee and Geraldin's teeth straightened, on the socialized medicine scale.

## MORE FARM OWNERSHIP

A statistic from 1948 is encouraging to those interested in farm ownership. About 72 per cent, or more than seven out of ten farms of this country, were operated by full or part owners, last year. Those who operate land that they rent, in addition to their own, are classed as part

owners. This percentage is the highest since such statistics were first compiled in 1900. Back in 1935, 42 per cent of all farms were tenant-operated. This was the peak. For those who farm their own ground, the more farms so owned, the better. After all, it is natural that when a man is working for his own interest, the better off he is, also the country. As a farmer outside of Burkburnett puts it, "increase of farm ownership is a healthy sign in rural America."

## THE SPINGARN MEDAL

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, award each year, the Spingarn Medal to the American Negro judged to have made the highest achievement in any field of endeavor. When the mediator of the United Nations to Palestine was assassinated last year in Jerusalem, Dr. Ralph Bunche became acting mediator. Through his fair dealings and firmness of purpose, Dr. Bunche has brought about a more hopeful outlook between the Arab and Israel.

Dr. Bunche was born in Detroit and was taken as a child to Los Angeles. Later an honor student and star athlete at the University of California, he brought further distinction to his race by becoming a member of the State department and was associated with the United Nations when it was first formed.

Dr. Bunche is an outstanding American Negro. The honor of the Spingarn is great but the important point is the reason for which it was given him. Working for peace, a position of importance in the international picture, is an example that should bring hope and encouragement to his people.

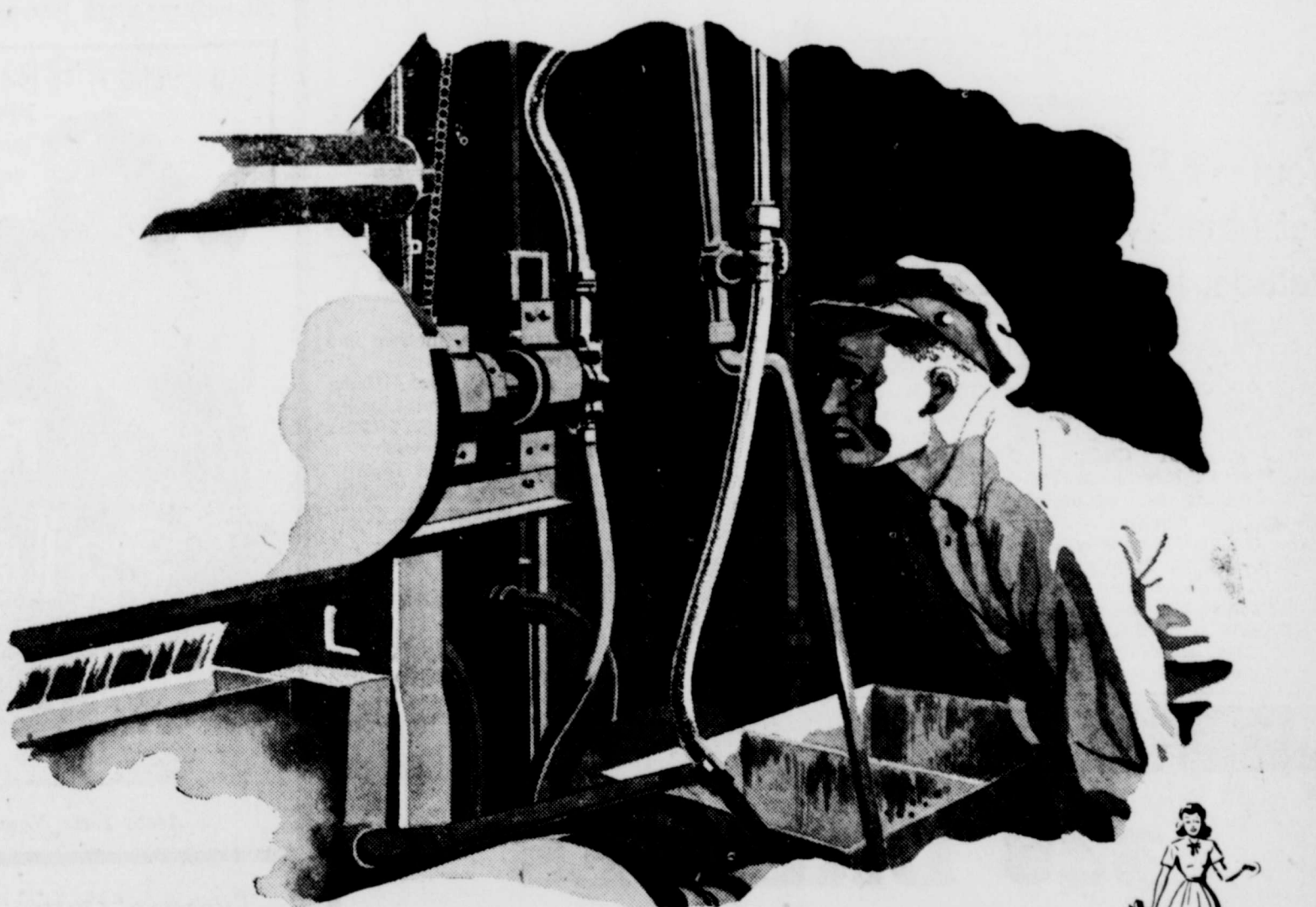

and 21 bushels, the last 3 years. Mr. Zimmerman attributes the increase in yield to terracing contour farming and growing of summer peas as a legume. He also plans to follow up a crop rotation that includes a legume each year.

Fishing is good on farm ponds that have been stocked with the right combination of game fish and fertilized regularly throughout the year. Walter Kasper, a District cooperator, reports that 10 fine bass, some weighing over 2 1/2 pounds, and 12 good crappie, have been caught on two different fishing trips to his pond the past week. He fertilizes his pond with phosphate and chicken manure. Other cooperators who are following a good fish management program in the same community are: Wilbur Prechel who has 2 ponds, R. W. Ramming who also has 2 ponds, and some of the Foster ponds.

A terrace outlet channel has been completed this week on the E. O. Mullin's farm. The channel will be sodded to bermuda grass.
