Paul was ready for every emergency of life. He was ready to die. The most of us are ready to live, ready to work, ready to go on a vacation, ready for pleasure, ready to eat, ready to sleep; but how many of us are ready to die? When Paul landed at Cesarea, he was told by a prophet of the dangers that awaited him in Jerusalem. The brethren tried to persuade Paul not to go to Jerusalem. But Paul said, "What mean ye to weep and to break mine heart? For I am ready not to die only, but also to die at Jerusalem for the name of the Lord Jesus" (Acts 21:13). If duty demanded it, it was more blessed to die than it was to live.

Jesus laid much stress upon being ready. "Therefore also be ye ready; for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh" (Matt. 24:44). The five foolish virgins were not ready for the coming of the bridegroom. They got ready when it was too late. The man with one talent was not ready for the coming of the lord of the manors.

When the time came for Paul to die, he said, "For I know ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith; henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, shall give me at that day; and not to me only, but unto all them also that love His appearing" (Tim. 4:6-8). Paul was not pessimistic in the face of death. His hopeful anticipations were based upon the promises of God which he had spent his life in obeying. He knew that the promises of God would not fail. So he had no doubt about the crown that was laid up for him. Let us live so that when it comes time for us to die we will have no doubt as to the crown that is laid up for us. This can and does come only as a result of obeying the commands of the Lord.

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Spillways have been constructed to prevent wash out of dams on the O. W. Prechel, and the Walter Kaspar farms. These farms are located West of Burkburnett.

The Foster Ranch of the Clara community, a co-operator of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District, and with the technical assistance of the Soil Conservation Service personnel, has just completed the construction of three farm ponds.

Three co-operators of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District, E. O. Mullins, Walter Kaspar, and O. W. Prechel, are shaping gulleys to allow grass to grow to stabilize and for use as a terrace outlet channel.

Some of the co-operators of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District who are getting land leveling done at the present are H. C. Adams, Ben Richards and Shem P. Cunningham. Dan Roberts has some 50 to 55 acres of his leveled land seeded to clovers such as Ladino, black medic, white dutch, hubam and birdsfoot trefoil varieties. Others planning to level some land as soon as possible are Travis Smith, Rufus King, Wm. Ryan, Phillips Cunningham and the Munger Farm.

Terraces have been completed on the H. L. Shelnett farm and

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Commissioner H. H. Haynes of the Electra precinct, has shaped 2000 feet of his roadside ditch to provide a terrace outlet clearance with enough capacity to prevent gulley erosion. Mr. Shelnett plans to seed the channel to Johnson grass and native vegetation. Mr. Shelnett is a co-operator of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District.

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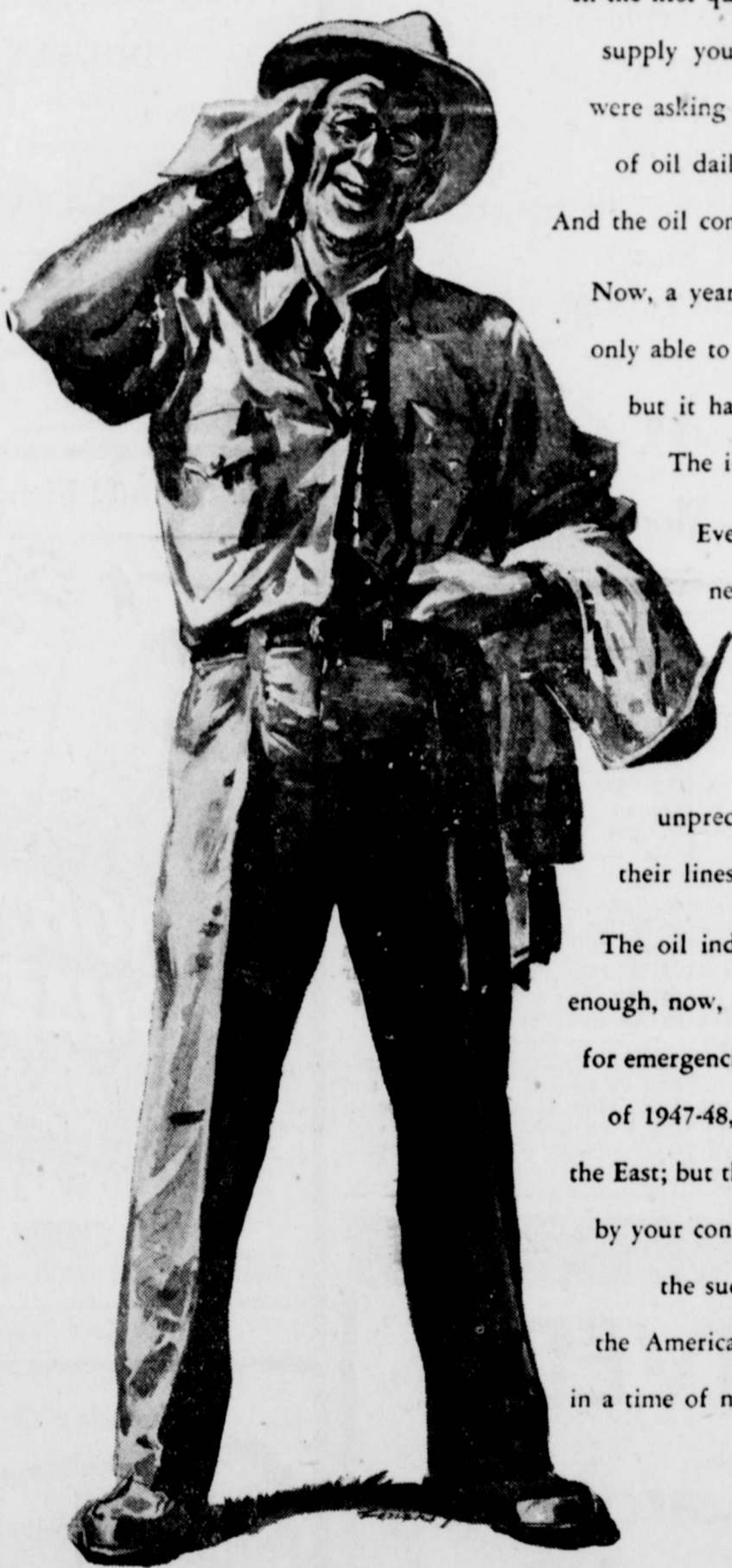
