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SCHOOL'S END

In some localities the key clicks the lock on school house doors in May, in others it comes in June. But, whenever heard, the youth of America desert the desk and text book for a vacation and respite from study. School's end is also graduation for many who have completed years of education to reach commencement time and the receipt of a diploma. The graduate is again in line for oratory on the larger life that lies in wait, the future that holds great promise and success. Youngsters view the school year ending as a time for congenial association with fellows, for pleasure and play until next fall when they return to their studies. For the graduate it is the prologue that has ended, the play is about to begin, the drama one of seeking a job to exercise his talents, to find his position on the stage called life.

The diploma is a fine piece of achievement but the diploma is not a marketable product. It may help to start one on a career that will lead to fame and fortune but to tackle the job successfully takes more than the diploma. Cultural training, scholastic background, vocational guidance, are all fine and a step to a goal, but devotion, service and sacrifice come from within the graduate.

Statistics dealing with economic conditions here do not encourage the Burk Burnett graduate to expect easy going in the field of employment. It challenges and warns

that jobs are not as plentiful as the job-seeker might hope. There will be many applicants in the waiting room. They tell us that prospects are less than last year, with colleges having a record number of graduates. Life's pathway will not be a bed of roses, but for the resolute, unselfish and high-minded young man and woman, there will be achievement and a measure of success through clean, hard work.

USING MORE WATER

Each year Burk Burnett citizens use more and more water. In the last two or three years, the consumption here in summer months has doubled. Spring rains bring life-giving quantities to growing things, and we have had more rain than usual this spring. Hot dry days that we know will follow will find many of us taking water into our own hands to keep lawns and gardens refreshed—if that water is available.

When water is to be had by just turning the faucet, we think little of its essential value, as it comes so easily. Its importance can be best appreciated by that man who has been without it, that farmer who depends upon it for his crops. Again we need to be warned that undue waste and excessive draining can lower the water levels to an alarming degree. The water level of the supply used by Burk Burnett is down several feet.

Steps are being taken to tap new supplies for this city's users. Prospects now look encouraging. In the meantime conservation is wise. Years ago it seemed that Burk Burnett would always have plenty of water. But, the town is growing, and water consumption is greater. Every effort is being made to secure adequate water supply for this summer, and next summer. But let's just forget the idea that our supply is unlimited.

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SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

A diversion terrace 1500 feet long has been run on the Stanley Williamson farm Northeast of Iowa Park in the Williamson Conservation Group. This diversion terrace will direct water to a stock pond and into a natural drain.

Conservation plans have been completed on the G. H. Gwinn farm of the East Iowa Park Conservation Group and the Travis Smith farm of the Valley farms this week. These long time plans cover crop rotations, terracing, leveling of irrigated land, stocking of pastures, growing of soil improving crops, etc. Any farmer completing above conservation plans will greatly improve the fertility and value of his farm.

Vetch is now in bloom and the prospect for a good seed crop is very promising at this time. Some of those planning to harvest seed are W. O. Prechel, Henry Vaughn, N. J. Zimmerman, V. I. Seiler and John Story.

Native grass pastures are looking good at this time of year. It has been found that the best time of year to stock a pasture heavy is from early spring to June 15th. Grazing a pasture or range in this manner helps eliminate weeds and annual grasses, especially if some of the cattle are sold or moved to another pasture to permit the pasture to rest during Summer months. R. W. Ramming and G. H. Wwinn buy steers only in fall, graze them on wheat and native pasture through winter and spring or until about June 15th and sell all cattle. Both of above farmers' pastures are definitely on the road to improvement by the grazing method.

Lassiter served with B Co. 1st Marines as an automatic rifleman and was stationed at Tsingtao in Northern China. The 1st Marines, a component part of the famed First Marine Division commanded by Major General G. B. Erskine, was sent to China in 1945 to disarm and repatriate the vanquished Japanese troops occupying that country. When the task was finished they remained to protect American lives and property in China against the Communist forces.

Pfc. Lassiter is presently stationed at Camp Joseph H. Pendleton, Oceanside, California, home of the First Marine Division.

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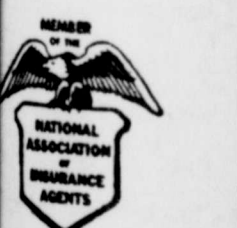

WHAT CHURCH SHOULD I JOIN

Hence to be added to the church they believed in Jesus Christ, repented their sins, and were baptized.

Then what church should I join? Absolutely none. You may be able to join some denomination or club; but man has ever joined the church of Jesus Christ. There is only one way to enter Christ's church, and that is for the Lord to add one to it. There is only one condition which He will add one to it, that is for one to obey the gospel of Jesus Christ as did those on Pentecost. So this is true every one should be interested in obeying the gospel so that they will be added to the church that purchased with the blood of Jesus Christ.
