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LETTER TO THE SENIORS

(Too many graduates are told in so many words, that their High School diplomas will open all the locks of life's problems. The following article is so different from the untruths usually recited to seniors, we just couldn't refrain from publishing it. We swiped it from the Hamlin Herald).

After 12 long years you are ready to graduate from high school and go out into the larger world along the devious pathways that you might choose. Some of you will enroll in college, some of you will find immediate employment and take post graduate courses in that greatest of all universities, the School of Experience; while still others of you will establish homes and take your places immediately in the society that has been built up by another generation—and which will not accord you the welcome you think you deserve.

This week will come that big moment you have awaited during the past years of hard effort in classes. During this week each of you will walk self-consciously across the stage and receive a diploma. It will attest only the fact that you have passed the first milestone on the road to life's preparation.

Many of you will sit uncomfortably, attired in cap and gown and pay polite attention to the boring words of various speakers, who will pour out platitudes that have become trite by constant repetition.

You will be feted and honored and congratulated during the next few days—and then you'll be promptly forgotten.

Many words of good advice will be given you — but you won't take them. It is human nature to ignore the experiences of others, and to want to explore and investigate for one's self. Some of the things you'll be told will be true, and many of them will be only partially true. It is for you — each of you — to determine for yourself the counsel you wish to heed, and to ignore the rest.

There are some who will tell you that the learning you have received will be a solid foundation upon which to base your lives. That statement is not true. Education is not a solid foundation, it is only one stone that goes into the construction of a foundation for your life.

With that education you must mix some character, a consciousness of your social obligations to others, and a deep and abiding respect for your God and for yourself. Then, and only then, will the foundation of your lives be solid.

It is true that you will need schooling. It is true that no man can acquire too much education, but it is also true that an educated mind without an accompanying character is not an asset, but a distinct liability to society.

Make of your education the cornerstone in the foundation of your life. But after you have placed the cornerstone, then build around it the many other stones needed for a balanced edifice.

It takes character and personality and culture and ambition as well as education to insure you that the weeks and months and years spent in class rooms shall not have been spent in vain.

Each senior that will receive a diploma this year will have a place in society—a place of usefulness and of service to his community. Each of you are sorely needed in a world that is wearied and worn from strife and shedding of blood.

It is your privilege and duty to find your proper place in the world, and then to contribute your part toward the making of a better world for those who soon will follow you.

The generation you will succeed has made a sorry mess of the world. Twice within the past generation has the face of the good earth been saturated with the blood of young men and women. Many times during the past quarter of a century has the present generation muffed its chances to create peace and order and happiness in this troubled old planet. And now, this generation is ready to drop the reins of events from its tired hands, and it is your responsibility to pick them up. It is your privilege to attempt to reshape the world and to recreate the thoughts of yourselves and your fellowmen into constructive channels, rather than channels of destruction.

The schooling you have received has been without much cost to you. But it was not a free gift. It has cost a tremendous price, and it is now your privilege to repay that cost. You will not be asked to repay it in dollars and cents, but you will be asked to repay it in the manner in which you live, and the type of service you render to your country. Don't permit that great cost to be dissipated by letting your lives and your talents go to waste.

Without doubt you will face many disappointments. You will be disappointed in the struggle for physical survival, and you will be disappointed when the illusions you have builded and tended so carefully begin to crum-

ble and crash in the dust at your feet. You will be disappointed when you learn that the diploma you prize so much will not be an sesame to the world.

It is even likely, that the world, itself, will be sorely disappointed in you, and it is probable that you will fail to attain the goals that have been set for you by dotting friends.

But regardless of the disappointments you meet, and the discouragements that beset your pathway; regardless of the failures you make and the bitter moments of disillusionment you may know, always remember that there is no force under heaven that can defeat your purpose in life but yourself. There is no one who can determine your destiny but you, and until you have learned the art of self-mastery, no other education will be of much value regardless of the number of degrees that might attach to your name.

Go then into life. Go with the best wishes of your friends and the prayers of your loved ones. Go with the abiding sense that God will aid those who prepare themselves and trust Him. If you do this, all will be well with your future.

AIR MAIL SERVICE

As far back as 1910, a Texas senator asked for consideration of a bill calling for an investigation to determine the feasibility of air mail service. 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

He gave them the Holy Spirit to guide them in all truth and to protect them from error in revealing His Word (John 14:16-17; 14:26; 16:13). There is no evidence in the Scriptures of this divine authority ever being delegated to anyone else. Divine authority ended with the word and revelation of the apostles (Revelation 22:18).

We believe that Christ's name, word and authority should be considered above every other name, word or authority. We know from His word that without due respect to His name, His word and His authority no man can reach heaven.
