Quarter Million Bushels of Wheat Harvested Here

Up until Thursday noon less than 250,000 bushels of wheat have been brought to Burkburnett elevators. A check with Mills & Fleming Independent Grain Dealers, Burkburnett Gin and Elevator and J. Frank Kelley revealed about the same story—farmers are getting just about one-half the yield per acre expected a week ago, and in some cases, about 10 bushels per acre less than estimates immediately before combines start cutting.

In some instances fifty per cent of the stalks are down on the ground; in others, it just isn't turning out as good as it looks like it would. Rains last week on ripe fields caused lots of the stalks to bend and let the heads rest on the ground. Then Saturday night another hard rain with plenty of wind knocked still more of the stalks down.

All in all, the wheat picture around Burkburnett is not a good one. Some farmers claim when they pay for combining, hauling, and other expenses, they will just about come out even—and that doesn't include a penny for the work they themselves put in on the crop. Probably between a fourth and a third of the acreage in this area has been combined. There are lots of combines and trucks to handle the crop in record time. Fields are being cut just as fast as the ground gets dry enough to support the heavy machines. Storage is still a big problem. Farmers who have any storage facilities at all are using them. Portable 1,000 bushel granaries are being built and sold as fast as constructed across from the Mills and Fleming elevator.

LONGER LIFE

When our system of free enterprise is discounted, we might stress an important item that is often overlooked in argument. All babies born last year have a better chance for longer life. Three-fourths will live to 60, one-half to 72 and, this even if we have no further improvements to add to our life span. Of babies born in 1900, three-fourths lived to 24 and one-half to the age of 58. Control of disease especially child diseases, through research in medicine and science, improved practice in diagnosis, discovery, active public health and welfare services, higher living standards, add up to prolonged life. This is found in our system that makes such progress possible.

NOT TOO ROSY

Many firms, large corporations, line up graduates during the final school year, for future jobs with their concerns. This year recruiting of graduates is 30 to 50 per cent fewer students than last. Business houses filling executive training posts vacated due to war, need few graduates for replacement. SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

A diversion terrace 950 feet long has been completed on the Mrs. P. C. Chenault farm in the North Burk Conservation Group. The terrace was constructed with a whirlwind owned by Norb Zimmerman.

A complete coordinated conservation plan has been worked out between Stanley Williamson and the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District the past week. Stanley is principally a dairy farmer and plans to plant sown crops on all the cultivated land. He plans to follow a 3 year rotation in which one-third of the land will be planted to a legume each year. The pastures will be fenced and a rotation system of grazing followed. Some land is being retired to pasture and will be seeded to Buffalo and Grama grass. Vetch and Rye are looking good on this farm at present. He plans to plant Chinese Red peas as a summer legume on approximately ten acres. Fish have been requested for his stock pond.

Gale Lowrance of the East Iowa Park Conservation Group is planning to plant Chinese Red peas when the weather condition permits. He plans to inoculate the seed before planting. Soon after grain harvest he plans to complete the terrace system on this farm.

An irrigation system is now in process of being staked out on the Orville Bullington farm South of Wichita Falls lake. The area irrigated will be planted to cool weather grasses of Bromes, Perennial Rye, Alta Fescue, Orchard Grass, Alfalfa and Clover for pasture and hay crops. Fred Parish is operating a large Brown Swiss Dairy on this farm with Mr. Bullington. The irrigation system will be constructed by a maintainer owned by B. J. Brown of Henrietta, Texas.

How's Britain Now?

Current news reports suggest that the British are still having a tough time, though things seem a little better with them lately. Actually, it is high time for signs of recovery. How much better off England would be right now—how much sooner she would have come out of the kinks if she had kept safe her traditional freedoms—that no one knows. But if the English mind and spirit come out of these dangerous experiences unscathed, it will surely be a miracle. (There are those who will give more credit for improvements to the Marshall Plan and to the generosity of the American taxpayer than they will to Britain's labor government.) The sad thing about it is that the Englishman is still the worse off, having given up much of his heritage of freedom and liberty.

Mess of Pottage

The swap has netted a poor mess of pottage indeed. England's experience is the lesson of the century for America. There was the dentist, for example, who took his own life because he found it impossible to operate his office as the government ordered. His suicide note cited too many forms to be filled out for the government and declared he could not do his work and the red-tape too.

What about small business? Take filling stations (petrol there). From a London newspaper: "After two years of deliberations, a committee of 13 men has reported to the government on the technical considerations which should govern the number, capacity, and distribution of petrol stations." Imagine! That is the result, when people hand over their individual initiative to government.

How to Make Tea

Under the heading "First Warm the Teapot," an item in a British newspaper advises that the food ministry is sending out an expert who will visit restaurants in Tottenham and educate the restaurant staffs on the subject of how to make tea! As it is now, the English people have not learned to make tea.

Some of these seem a bit ridiculous. They are. Like the report of demands for "free" wigs having risen under socialized medicine to more than 200 a week—at a cost of more than \$4,000,000 yearly. It is reported also that "Application Order No. 2" will entitle hairless men and women to the nationalized wig cleaning and dressing service, once every two months. From cradle to grave, indeed!

Liberty in Flight

In Froxfield, England, K. J. Kilford was building a house. He wanted a round hall window in his new home. But the "area planning committee" said no; the window must be rectangular. "A round window would be out of place in a rural area," the panel declared. Commented Kilford: "There is no individual liberty today." That happened in England.

The whole British story of snarling bureaucracy may remind readers of wartime experiences in America. It indicates, too, that government control clashes with individual freedom. Shall we in America be able to keep our freedom?

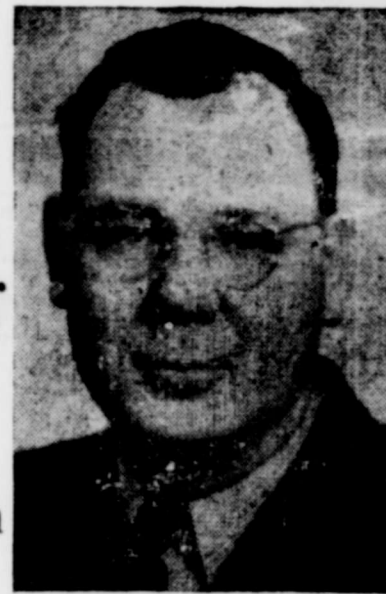

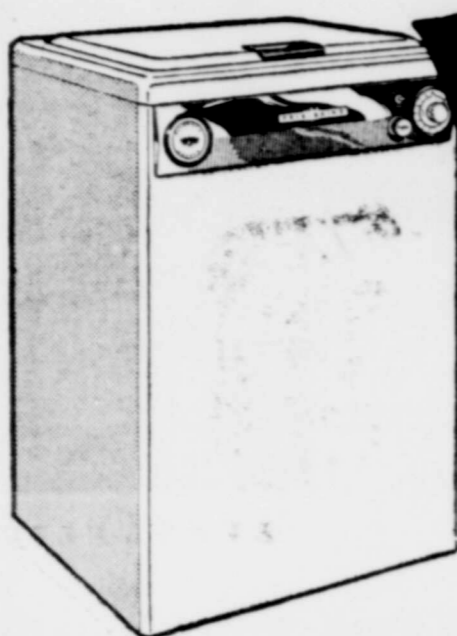

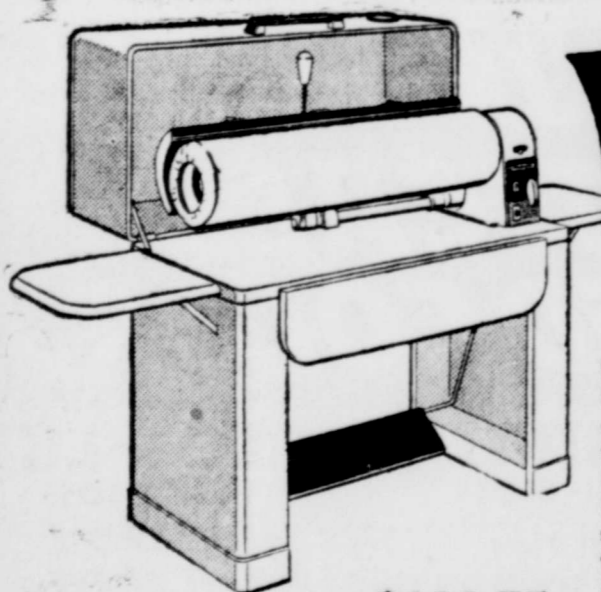

Washington News Letter

Congressman Ed Gossett

Washington, D. C., May 27—There is no question but what we have many trained communist agents at work in this country. This means that we should all be more careful about the people we permit to come here. This week, the House will debate a new DP bill by Congressman Celler of New York. This bill will permit the entry into this country of most of those who still remain in the DP camps of Europe, including a hundred thousand who came out of Russia 18 months after the war was over. This week, I have received letters from leading ministers in the Baptist and Methodist denominations, asking me to support this bill. I, of course, am very much opposed to it. Since half of my family are Methodist and the other half Baptists, I have felt free in writing both these religious leaders and frankly expressing my opposition. Congressman W. R. Poage, of Waco, wrote similar letters to these ministers. Two paragraphs from Congressman Poage's letter are as follows: "I value your opinion on these matters very much, and always hate to find myself in disagreement with you, but in all frankness my observation of most of the Displaced Persons which Congressman Celler wants to bring into the United States, has led me to the definite conclusion that they would certainly be no asset to this country. There are undoubtedly many people in Europe who would like to come to the United States, and who are suffering from a great many handicaps in Europe. Among this group are many fine and worthwhile people, but there are surely many very undesirable citizens among the group."

"I recognize that we are told these immigrants will be 'screened', but I am sure we must all agree that the 'screening' would be no better than the individuals who do the job. I think it is perfectly evident that what is intended by the change is the law is to bring in a lot of people who could not meet the qualifications of the old law. Primarily these people are from East and Southeast Europe. Their philosophy of life is entirely different from ours . . . I have seen some of them in concentration camps in Germany and Austria. Many of them utterly refused to work. I cannot see where the United States would be benefitted by bringing these people in, but I can very clearly see where the United States and the world at large would be hurt by lowering the quality of American citizenship. If we ever come to a point where our people have the same outlook on life which these people from Southeast and Eastern Europe have, we will have no better country than they have. There is nothing wrong with Europe at the present time except the Europeans . . ."

Another reason for being careful about those we bring into this country, is that we find it almost impossible to get rid of those whom we discover to be a menace to our society. For several years, I have been trying to get the Department of Justice to de-naturalize and deport one Gustavo Duran who came to this country in the early 40's, and became a naturalized citizen. Gustavo Duran was the head of the secret police in the Spanish Republic forces. He was placed there by the Russians and has a long record as an international Communist. Shortly after he was naturalized he went to work for our State Department and has since that time held some important government job.

For several years, a number of Congressmen, including myself, have been trying to get one Constantine Georgies deported. He came to this country in February, 1936, as a Greek priest. He is a proven pervert and has been run out of a number of communities because of his conduct. It is admitted that he came in under a false passport. He has insulted women in various congregations and was known to patronize a colored house of ill fame in one of the communities in which he lived. Still, by numerous appeals and technicalities he has remained in this country.

The record of Harry Bridges is another case in point. He came into this country from Australia and while denying his Communist Party membership, he has fomented trouble and followed the Communist Party line. His stooges are now busy wrecking the economy of the Hawaiian Islands, according to reliable information. He is the

master of the International Longshoremen and Warehousemen's Union and has completely tied up the ports of the Hawaiian Islands. In 1940, I voted for a bill to deport the said Harry Bridges. His deportation was recommended by the Justice Department but he was able to remain. Now he has been indicted by a Federal Grand Jury in San Francisco and charged with perjury and conspiracy. If convicted, he will again be subject to de-naturalization and deportation. Authorities are quite sure that a number of unsolved murders and attempted murders in this country are the work of Communists. The shooting last year of Walter Reuther, famous President of the United Auto Workers Union, was supposedly the work of Communists. The recent assault on his brother is thought by authorities to be the work of Communists. The Communist program is to destroy the social and economic foundations of this country.

Why Name Calling?

The calling of names is a propaganda technique based on delusion and trickery. It has been common in politics for a long time, and has done its part to give politics a bad reputation among the people in general.

Americans are accustomed to a certain amount of this in election campaigns. But surely we have not come to the place where we expect it in the halls of Congress. In legislative sessions, when serious national problems are being discussed, it is a bit disturbing to hear so much name-calling. Any American has the right to disagree with another and to speak out his mind. But it is not necessary always to discredit those who disagree with us.

Freedom Is Fragile
The worst thing that has happened in America in the last twenty years has been the tendency to divide our people into class groups. Our country has long been known as the "melting pot," where immigrant lads and backwoods boys can become bankers and industrialists. High born or low born, rich or poor, in America it never really has mattered. The important thing in America is that a man may plan and live out his own dream.

Some folks apparently have forgotten that these freedoms of ours are fragile and perishable. Unless we attend to the keeping of each of them, it is possible to lose them all. The building of class consciousness is one of the very worst things we can do to our American life. It could be the entering wedge of all kinds of "isms," any one of which in time might well put us in chains.

Unwholesome Effect
The term "big business" is used as name-calling by unthinking persons and by those who have isms up their sleeves. Name-calling of business, big or little or any size, can have nothing but an unwholesome effect upon the American scene. A U. S. Senator was quoted in the press recently as saying: "It appears that big business would rather risk a continued inflation of prices than balance the budget through increased taxes."

You see, all the people of the nation are paying about a third of their total income in taxes. Must anyone who believes that taxes should not be raised be placed on the receiving end of a name calling campaign? One Senator on the Senate Labor Committee keeps branding as "fascist" certain of those who oppose increased taxation.

Public Opinion
Does this mean the Senators cannot make out a reasonable case for increased taxes? Does it mean that they can defend the case for higher taxes only by hanging ugly tags on those who oppose tax increases?

If we must try to turn labor against management—if we must turn the public in general against employers who are providing millions of jobs at the highest wages ever earned—then I am afraid we have reached a level that signals the end of our American way and our high standard of living.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD



Pictures of people at work will be among your most successful snaps. A plain background such as the sky will help to make your subject stand out.

Picturing People at Work

ONE of the surest methods of making natural, lifelike snaps of your friends is to picture them while at work—engaged in their actual jobs or in some hobby or home activity to which they are devoted.

The reason that pictures of this type work out well is, of course, two-fold. For one thing, your subject is far less likely to be camera conscious when doing some common, everyday chore. A second point is that a subject's activities help to tell something about him.

Pictures of people at work should be made at close range, generally speaking. A close-up, of course, provides a "big" picture of your subject. And it helps to show clearly what he's doing. So for pictures of this type, shoot from 4 to 10 feet away. Or 6 to 10 feet away if you're using a fixed-focus camera such as a box camera.

There's no problem in posing

your subject for pictures of people at work. Their natural working position will take care of the pose automatically. This is true whether you're picturing Mother engaged in clipping the garden hedge, Dad as he paints a screen, or your high school brother polishing the car.

It's equally true of pictures indoors—Mother rolling out the crust for a pie or Dad as he fixes a broken lamp plug.

But while posing is easy it's wise to look beyond your subject. By doing this you can check the background and make certain that it includes no elements which will mar your picture—telephone wires, scraggly bushes, trees which appear to sprout from your subject's head. Pictures of people at work, like other pictures of people, are always best when all attention is concentrated on the subject with no distracting background details.

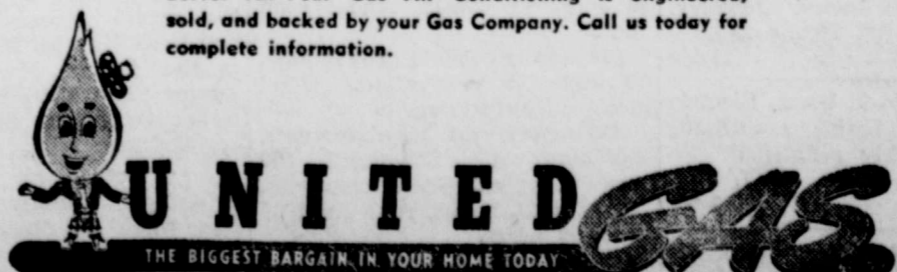

1. The Research Farm of the Ralston Purina Company has found that chicks do best when they are started at a temperature of 90°. This temperature should be dropped 5° a week until it is down to 60° where it should be held as long as the chicks need heat.

2. Yes, provided that the cow has inherited the ability to produce large amounts of milk. Milk secretion is continuous, and when the udder is filled to capacity the nutrients for making milk return to the body. By milking more often, more milk is made.

3. A germ, Hemophilus gallinarum, which gains entrance into the nasal chambers is considered the primary cause of this disease. In the milder form the disease may be unnoticed. In more severe cases, accompanied by sneezing and gasping, there may be numerous deaths, and affected birds may go off feed and gradually "waste away."

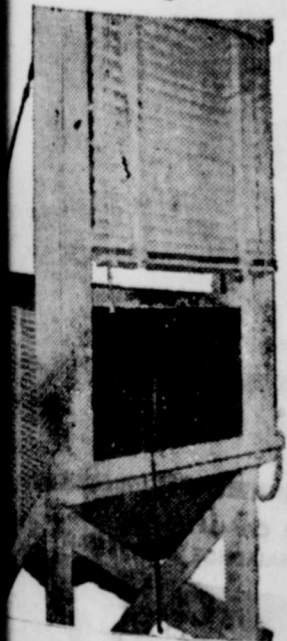

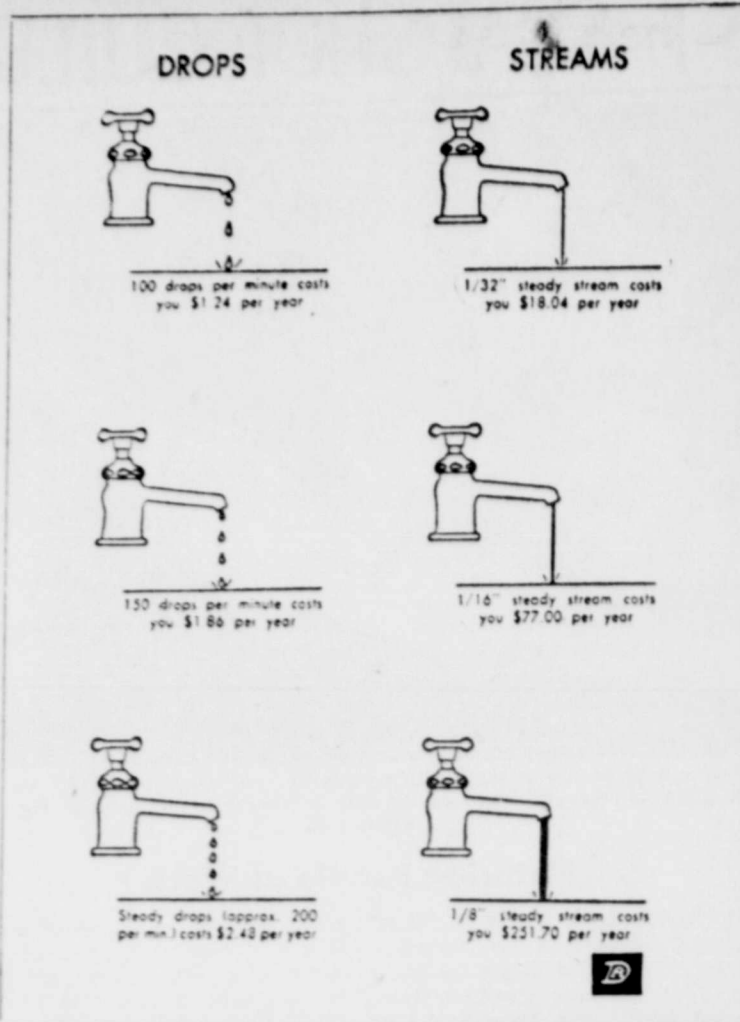

Water leaks are expensive—far more expensive than most people realize. The cost of leaking faucets is shown by the illustration. Figures are based on a water rate of \$2.50 for the first 1100 cubic feet for three months and \$2.30 in excess of 1100 cubic feet for three months. This is the cost of cold water. Leaking hot water faucets are even more expensive because of the cost of fuel used to heat the water. If there is iron or other mineral in the water, leaking faucets will stain and discolor plumbing fixtures. Many leaking faucets can be repaired with a new faucet washer. Others may require a new seat. Many, however, are beyond repair. It has been estimated that 24,000,000 faucets in American homes are obsolete and outworn and should be replaced.

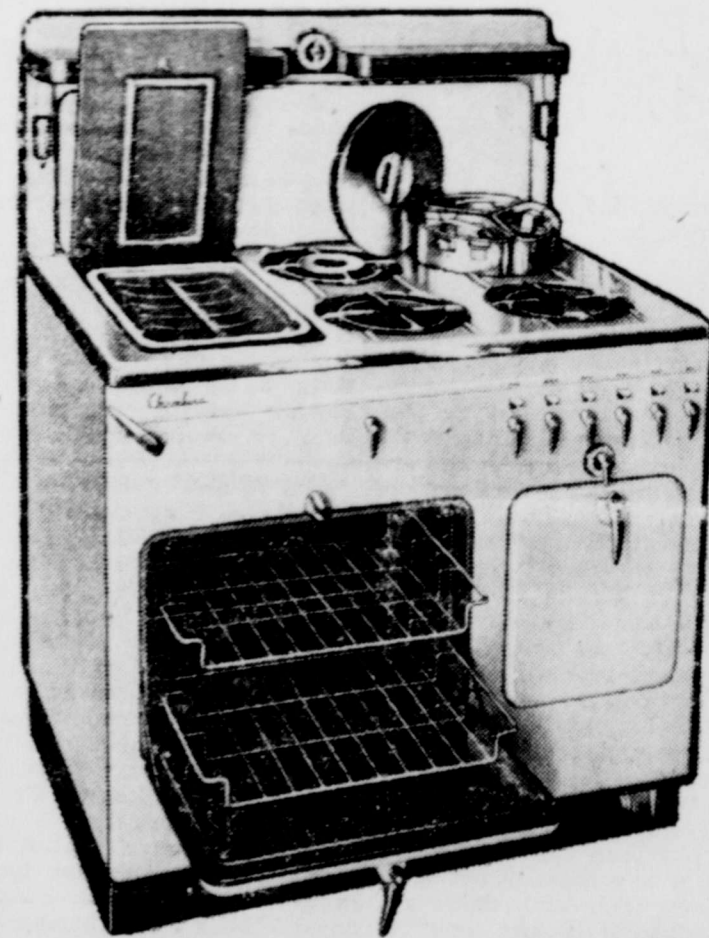
