## BE ALIVE ON THE FIFTH

Hundreds of people are killed every year by accidents during the Fourth of July holiday. That plain fact is borne out year after year by figures from the National Safety Council.

WHY ARE THEY KILLED? It is easy to advance a lot of deeply philosophical reasons. The hurry-up world we live in. The adventurous, take-a-chance American spirit. The animalistic discourtesy of man to man.

But there is no need to do any heavy thinking on the reasons for the holiday death toll. The reasons are quite simple, really. For one thing, more people are driving automobiles. When more cars are on the road and they are traveling farther, the chances for accident go up proportionately.

During this holiday, some parents permit their children to play with fire and explosives that on any other day would bring swift and certain retribution. Even adults, not satisfied with the machine gun splatter of firecrackers, have been known to rig up lethal concoctions of dynamite.

The tonic of celebration leads to excesses in exercise, eating, exposure to sun. All of these things contribute to Fourth of July deaths. And it would be simple to prevent such accidents.

Don't take a trip just to be going somewhere. There are many delights near home. Drive slower. Don't become impatient at unimportant delays. Be courteous to other drivers and pedestrians. Be temperate in your swimming. Keep an alert eye on children. Take your family to a public fireworks instead of risking tragedy by personal handling of explosives.

These are the simple things that will ensure delight in a summer holiday—that will bring you home relaxed and refreshed, that will see your children safely in bed to dream of the day's pleasures. These are the simple things that will make this Fourth of July mean joy instead of tragedy.

Kipling said it: "Teach us delight in simple things and mirth that has not bitter springs."

## Bomber Sprays Burkburnett With DDT Solution

Tuesday morning a large bomber, loaded with DDT, made twenty some runs over Burkburnett, spraying to eliminate flies, mosquitos and other insects.

Spraying started in the south part of town, the plane making its run from West to East, releasing two large streams of DDT fog. The spraying plane, traveling some three or four hundred miles per hour, passed over at about fifty feet above the ground. One trip across would cover about one block. A fast fighter plane, several hundred feet over the town, followed above the sprayer, giving directions.

Wichita Falls, Electra, Iowa Park also have been sprayed by this method, in Wichita County's all-out fight against polio.

In addition to the plane spraying, individuals are asked to keep a close watch about their garbage cans and spray them with hand sprayers.

The body of 2nd Lieut. Henry Joe (Stanford) McPherson, is due to arrive in Burkburnett Sunday morning. Full Military services will be held at 3:30 Sunday afternoon from the Church of Christ with Sam Reed officiating, assisted by Loye C. Ruckman, minister of the Church.

Lieut. McPherson entered active duty in February, 1943. From Sheppard Field, where he started his training, he was sent to Big Spring where he was commissioned a 2nd Lieut. in November of the same year. He arrived in England April 1, 1944 and participated in a number of bombing missions before June 22 when he was shot down in a B-24 over LaHarve, France. He was first buried by civilians and later re-buried in a Military service.

Burial will be made in the Burkburnett cemetery under direction of Owens and Brumley Funeral Home. Frye-Vaughn American Legion Post No. 264 will conduct the Military Service.

Lieut. McPherson was the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. McPherson of Burkburnett.

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## IT STANDS TODAY

July Fourth is Independence Day, when the people of the United States celebrate with oratory, parades and firecrackers, their declaration of liberties. The Fourth was inaugurated on the hard fought grounds of oppression and injustice from Great Britain. Minutemen of Concord and troops at Valley Forge died in the cause against tyranny. Since then the fires of freedom have been lit by England. She too has fought with equal courage and intensity and passion against oppression and injustice. Great Britain and America have fought side by side to preserve independence and unity.

We celebrate July Fourth each year, in the name of free men everywhere, in honor of the right of self-determination. Brotherhood is not to be separated from independence, however. In 1775, at that Concord bridge, there sounded a shot that was heard 'round the world in the name of freedom. These shots have been repeated in later years, by other bridges the world over. Today, by our

Concord bridge stands a tablet which reads: "Here began the separation of two kindred nations now happily long united in peace." So is brotherhood and independence, interwoven to form a more perfect union, to forge a stronger link.

## AND ON THE OTHER HAND

Inconsistency is a human failing, in society and in business. A recent instance presents itself as a lesson on inconsistency in business. Oleomargarine has been a bone of contention for a long time. What to be done about banning of the sale or taxation of colored margarine through Congress and state legislatures.

Unilever, Ltd., of London, England, owns Lever Bros., the American soap manufacturing business. It recently bought Jelke Co. of New Jersey, manufacturing oleo. The Jelke Co. most naturally is urging a repeal of laws that tax or ban the sale of colored oleomargarine, on the basis of free enterprise and competition, as well as for the best interests of the public. This sounds reasonable to most Burkburnett readers. BUT, Lever Bros., a member of the "family", has succeeded in winning a court decision over a competitor who made red soap. It seems that using red in soap manufacture has been "traditional" with Lever Bros. Lever Bros. acquires a monopoly in the use of red color in soap. Jelke Co., fights to lift a ban against using yellow coloring in oleomargarine. It is just how the wind happens to blow, isn't it?

## Washington News Letter

Congressman Ed Gossett

Washington, D. C., June 24—Among those who listened to my recent speech delivered to a Conference of Rural Women of the State of Maryland, was a German Countess by the name of Eltz. She is one of a group of 60 Germans brought over here by our military government to study American life and habits. Recently the American Military Government has inaugurated a program of bringing groups of Germans here to learn of American ideals. If trying to Americanize Europeans is a good thing, this seems to be a better way than trying to send Americans over there for such purpose.

However, our point is this: Following my speech, Countess Eltz came to my office to commend my views and to tell me more of the terrible problem of the expellees. At the Yalta Conference in February, 1945, Mr. Roosevelt had as his confi-

dential adviser, Mr. Alger Hiss, now on trial for aiding communists while a member of our State Department. Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Stalin at that time entered into a secret agreement authorizing the expulsion of German people from areas occupied and controlled by the Russians. This agreement was later ratified and confirmed in Potsdam, in August, 1945, by Mr. Truman. Had Mr. Roosevelt been in the vigor of good health, he would not have listened to such bad advice at Yalta. Had Mr. Truman not been so new in the game of International diplomacy, he probably would not have agreed to the Yalta compact at Potsdam. At any rate, as a result of our agreement, the Russians and their satellites behind the iron curtain forcibly drove out and expelled from their homes approximately 20 million German people. Most of these people were farmers. In many instances, the lands from which they were driven had been in the hands of their folks for a thousand years. They were driven from Yugoslavia, Hungary, Poland, East Prussia, and the Baltic countries. Bear in mind this was done after the shooting was all over. Most of it occurred in the winter of 1945. Around 5 million of these people died in a few months, of starvation, disease, and from freezing to death. Trains manned by Russian and Polish troops, and by satellite mercenaries were often in route for weeks, with people crammed like sardines into every available car. Soldiers would go through the trains and throw the bodies of frozen children, and others, through the windows. There are still around 14 million of these expellees who were dumped into the American and British military zones in which 1-3 of all the housing had been destroyed. They live in caves and hovels, under indescribable conditions. In the vast majority of cases, the only crime of which these people had been guilty was that of being of German-Ethnic origin. Under the IRO Constitution, people of German-Ethnic origin cannot be classified as displaced persons.

The Morgenthau plan announced about a year before the war was over, was also a colossal blunder. It too, was sold to an ailing President who was not aware of its disastrous effects. The Morgenthau plan was one to destroy all German industry and to reduce Germany completely into an agricultural state. Some think the announcement of the Morgenthau plan prolonged the war many months and cost many American lives. When you add to the Morgenthau plan, the Yalta agreement you have most of the reasons for our terrible problems of Central Europe at this time.



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## Keep Safety In Mind July Fourth

Going somewhere over the Fourth of July?

If you are, then plan your trip safely. But even if you stay home, keep safety in mind for the Fourth of July holiday — one of the most dangerous week ends of the year.

That is the advice of the National Safety Council, which is coordinating a nationwide campaign to hold down the usual upsurge in accidental deaths during the Independence Day celebration. One hundred and thirty national organizations, as well as state and city public officials, are cooperating in the effort.

Motor vehicle accidents lead the list of holiday hazards, the Council said. Drowning from swimming and fishing accidents is the second biggest risk. Other deaths are due to fireworks and firearms, sunstroke and heat exhaustion, food poisoning, falls and miscellaneous accidents.

The death toll for the month of July last year was 8,700, the Council said. While it is impossible to determine the exact number of deaths from all causes occurring during the Fourth of July holiday, the Council said the total was well above the average for other days of the month.

The Council expects more pleasure-seeking holiday motorists to pile into more cars and roll up more miles during this one week end celebration than ever before in the nation's history. More than 33 million motor vehicles will be on the move during the holiday. The increasing number of new cars on the road and the substantial rise in gasoline consumption this year indicate a heavy death toll — unless everyone is fully aware of the holiday hazards and thus

Under the Morgenthau plan, thousands of German factories have been completely torn down and moved into Russia. Now, we are trying to rebuild some of these industries as a means of providing a livelihood for people we cannot continue to feed and also as a means of combating communism.

Following my Maryland speech I received a letter from a student in the University of Maryland who is a Lithuanian and a veteran of World War II. He, too, agrees with my views that we are rewarding many undesirable persons while ignoring many desirable ones. He points out that many Lithuanians in our DP camps were members of the Nazi SS, and carried out mass pogroms against the Jews. Says he, "they are not anti-communists but war criminals who are not wanted back home." He is supported by abundant evidence.

We continue to listen to sob stories and to shed crocodile tears about a half million so-called DP's whom we continue to feed, clothe, and house. No one tells the story of the expellees.

"There are two ways to hold down deaths during a holiday period such as the Fourth," said Ned H. Dearborn, president of the Council.

"One is for police, beach guards and others who have some authoritative control over public safety to be especially alert and vigorous in their enforcement of sane rules of public behavior.

"The other is for all of us to recognize that holidays are danger days, and to drive a car, walk across the street, swim, fish or otherwise conduct ourselves in a safe and prudent manner.

"If everyone would keep in mind the words 'Take It Easy on the Fourth—Be Alive on the Fifth', this Fourth of July would bring much less tragedy and much more pleasure."

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## SNAPSHOT GUILD



Supplementary flash in daylight will help you to lighten shadows such as those cast by a broad-brimmed or peaked hat.

### Flash Plus Daylight

Our readers has asked the use of flash outdoors—supplementary flash, as "When," he writes, "is recommended for daylight and what should I know about it?"

Take up his questions in a look at the answers. One isn't too hard. Outdoors you can use flash to brighten dark shadow—perhaps more important than your subjects in fully lit pictures.

For instance, you may want to make a picture of a girl in a broad-brimmed hat, yes; but shadows her face. So you'll use flash. It reaches in under and brightens the natural

know about it?" Let's try to answer that briefly.

First, you should always remember that the small flash bulbs used by most amateurs (the No. 5 or SM) are not much help in shooting a subject 20 or more feet away.

And second, you'll want to use a different exposure than for flash shots at night... one that will bring the light from the flash lamp somewhere in "balance" with the daylight so that the background does not "go black."

A good rule to follow is to use the exposure which you would normally use for shots in daylight just as if you hadn't planned to add flash. This gives good rendition of highlights, backgrounds, and sky areas—parts of the picture where the flash has little or no effect. Then use your flash at "half-strength."

And this isn't difficult. All you need do is drape a handkerchief over the flash gun's reflector so as to cut down on the light. One or two thicknesses will cut it enough, save when working extremely close in where three folds may be better. Or, if you have an extension flash unit, you may work close up but have the flash lamp 10 or 12 feet from your subject to the rear of the camera.

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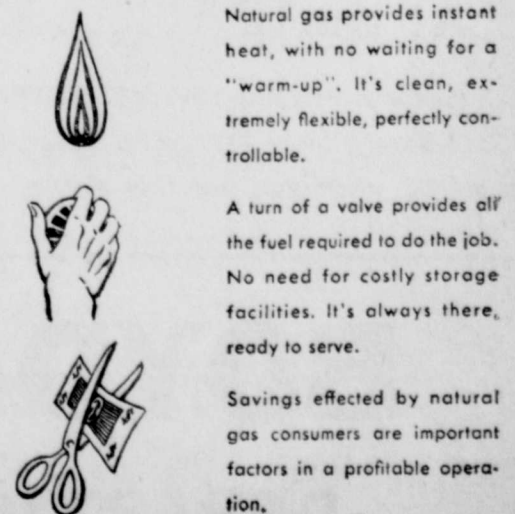

## 22nd Millionth Chevrolet Built

Detroit—Production at a pace comparable to peak levels in company history was reported by the Chevrolet Motor Division as it turned out its 22,000,000th vehicle.

The milestone model was reached, W. F. Armstrong, general manager, announced, within 10 months of the 21,000,000th, despite the fact this the period included a plant shutdown for extended new passenger car model improvements.

The latest production feat brought Chevrolet's output in the postwar years to well over 3,000,000 passenger cars and trucks. The 19,000,000th car was built December 5, 1946, the 20,000,000th on November 13, 1947 and the 21,000,000th on August 30, 1948.

Thirteen plants located in important automobile markets contributed to the 22,000,000 figure, said Armstrong. With the St. Louis plant leading the way with 3,350,000 units, the official gave the following approximate cumulative totals for the other plants:

Atlanta 1,100,000; Baltimore, 1,100,000; Bloomfield, N. J., with 1,500,000; Buffalo (prewar) 1,300,000; Flint 2,150,000; Janesville, Wis., 2,100,000; Kansas City 1,500,000; Los Angeles (newest assembly plant, opened Feb. 1948) 80,000; Norwood, Ore., 1,800,000; Oakland, Calif., 1,600,000; Tarrytown, N. Y., 3,000,000; and Canada, 1,300,000.

## T-O Fair to Open Monday, Sept. 26

Iowa Park, Texas, June 27—The Texas-Oklahoma Fair and Southwestern Oil Exposition is scheduled to open its gates on Monday, September 26 and continue through Saturday, October 1, at the fair grounds in Iowa Park.

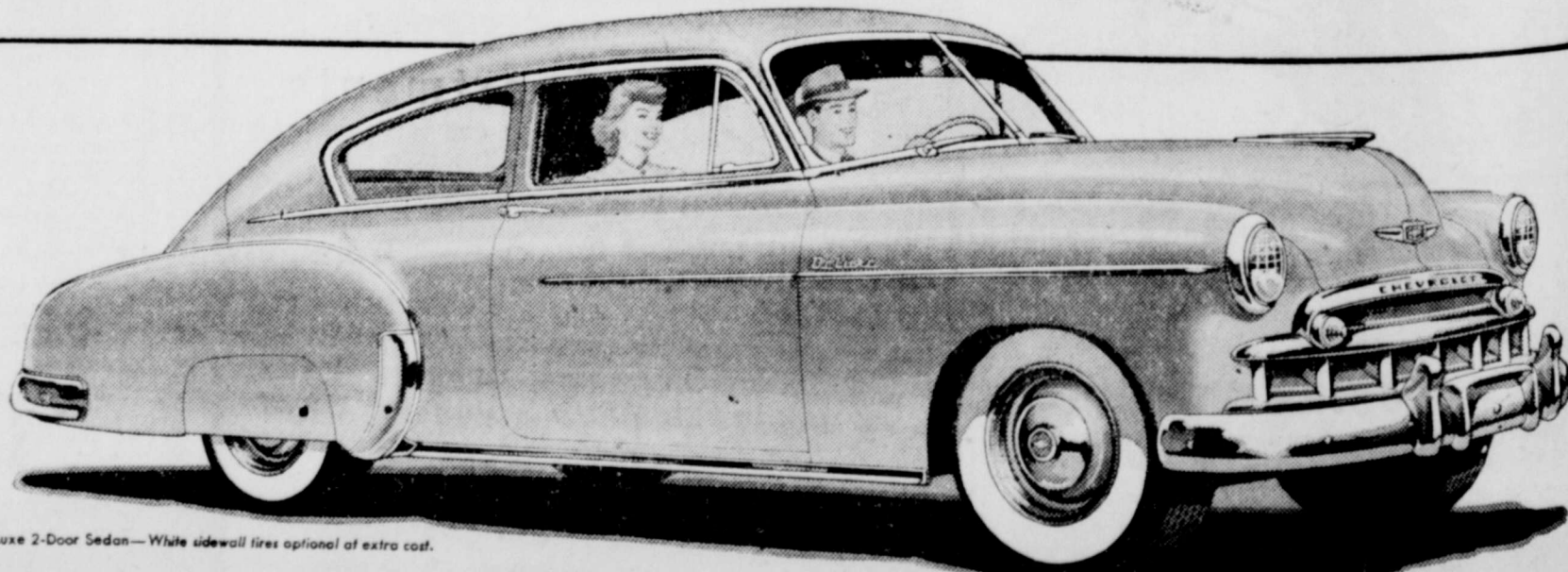

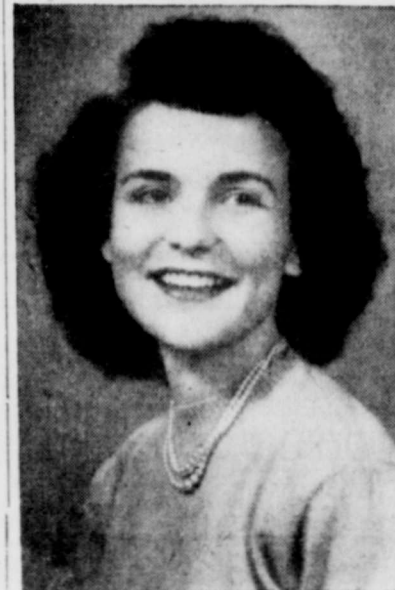

(John 3:5). That does settle it. It is an impossibility, said Jesus, for anyone to enter the kingdom of heaven without having been born again. To explain to Nicodemus that he did not mean the physical birth Jesus made the statement in Verse 5. Yet, in spite of this, many today endeavor to show that the birth of water and the Spirit refers to both the physical birth and then a new birth later. This simply cannot be true for Jesus denied it to Nicodemus. Read carefully John 3:1-5.

God's people today are referred to as the church, the kingdom, and the family of God. Since physical birth inducts us into our father's family, so God calls the process by which we are made into God's children, a NEW BIRTH OR A BIRTH OF WATER AND THE SPIRIT. But what is that process? (To be continued).
