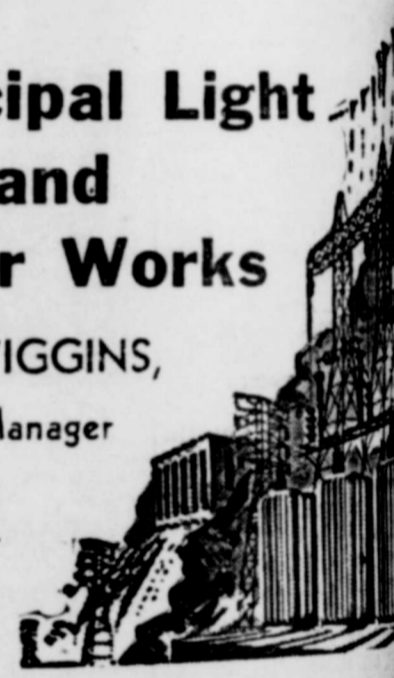

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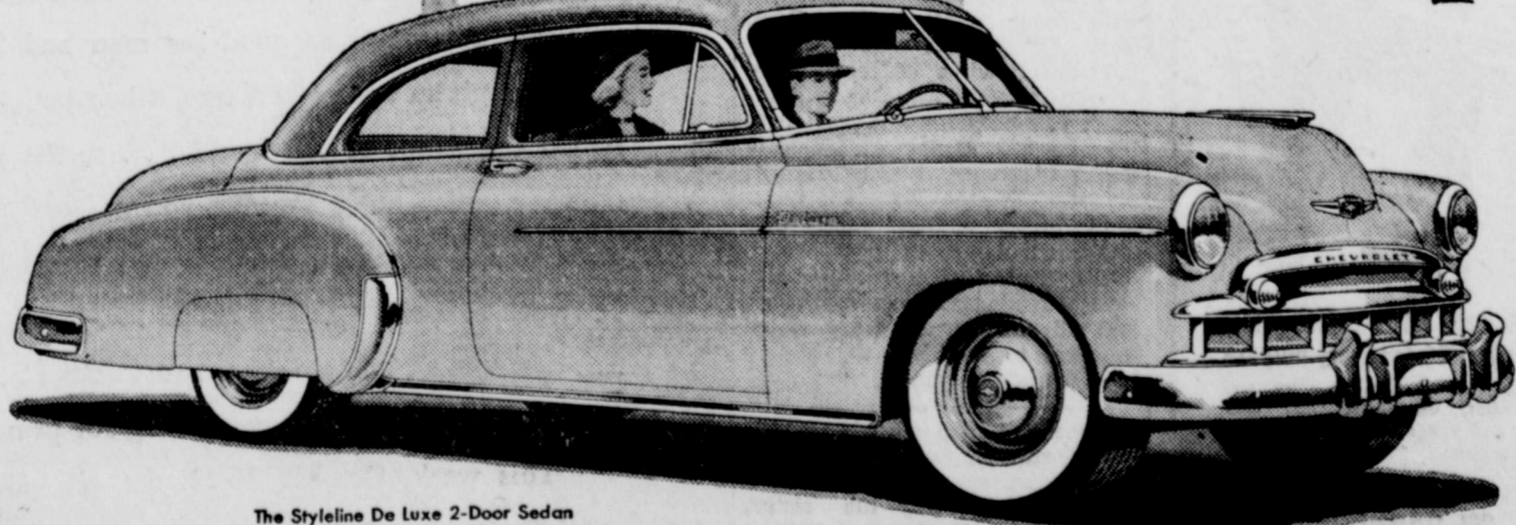

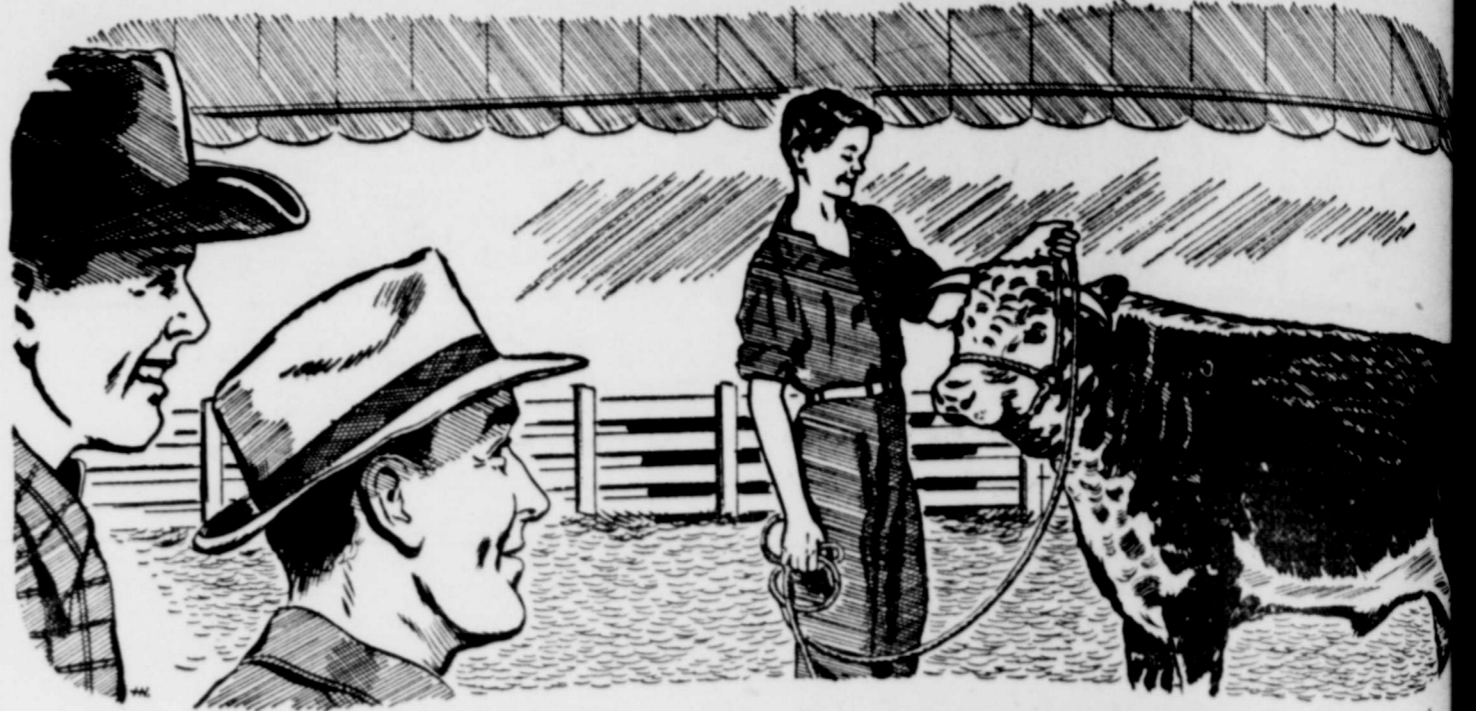

THE WAY THAT IS SAFE

Last week we drew the conclusion that it is safe to accept the Bible as the revelation of God. Let us notice and also reach the safe position in regard to two other great points.

1. ETERNAL SALVATION. Regarding this problem, also, there are two accepted positions: one that all will be saved, the other that only the obedient will be saved. The Bible teaches that obedience is necessary to salvation (Jno. 3:38; Mk. 16:16; Rom. 6:17). The man who obeys follows that safe course for even if the unbeliever should be saved, he has lost nothing by obeying. The person who believes that all will be saved and therefore makes no effort to obey is on doubtful ground. Before him is always the possibility that God will not save the unbeliever. When before God's judgment these two men stand and the believer's position is true, he has gained everything and lost nothing. If his position is even found to be wrong, he has not been made the worse for having believed. The other man, however, has gambled. When he is proved wrong what has he gained? Absolutely nothing! Everything has been lost.

2. BAPTISM. Again the two sides are represented on this point. One denies its essentiality to salvation, and the other declared it is essential. I Peter 3:21 reads "... which also after a true likeness doth now save you, even baptism . . ." Almost everyone agrees that baptism is commanded. The problem is: "Is baptism for the remission of sins?" If it should be proved essential, he has lost his reward for having failed to obey one of God's commands. God's spokesman said that it was for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38). It is safe to be baptized.

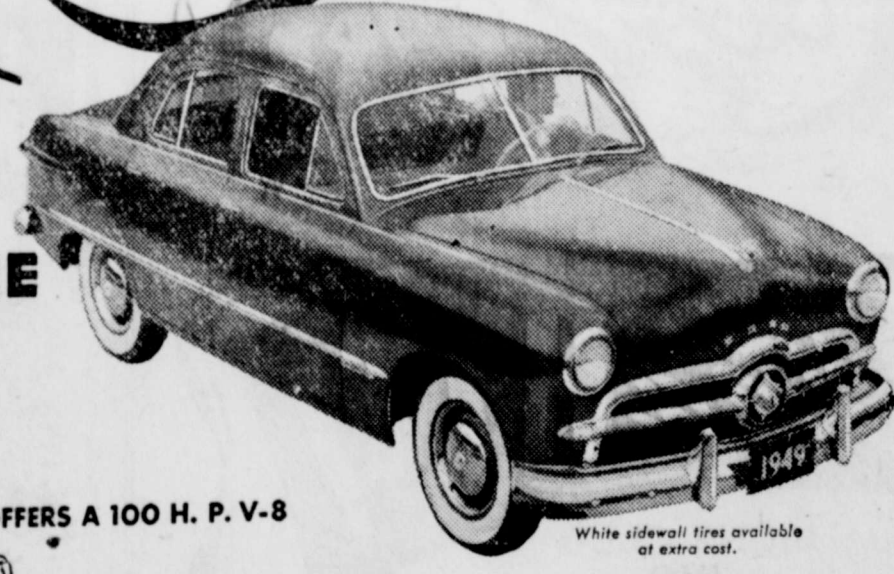
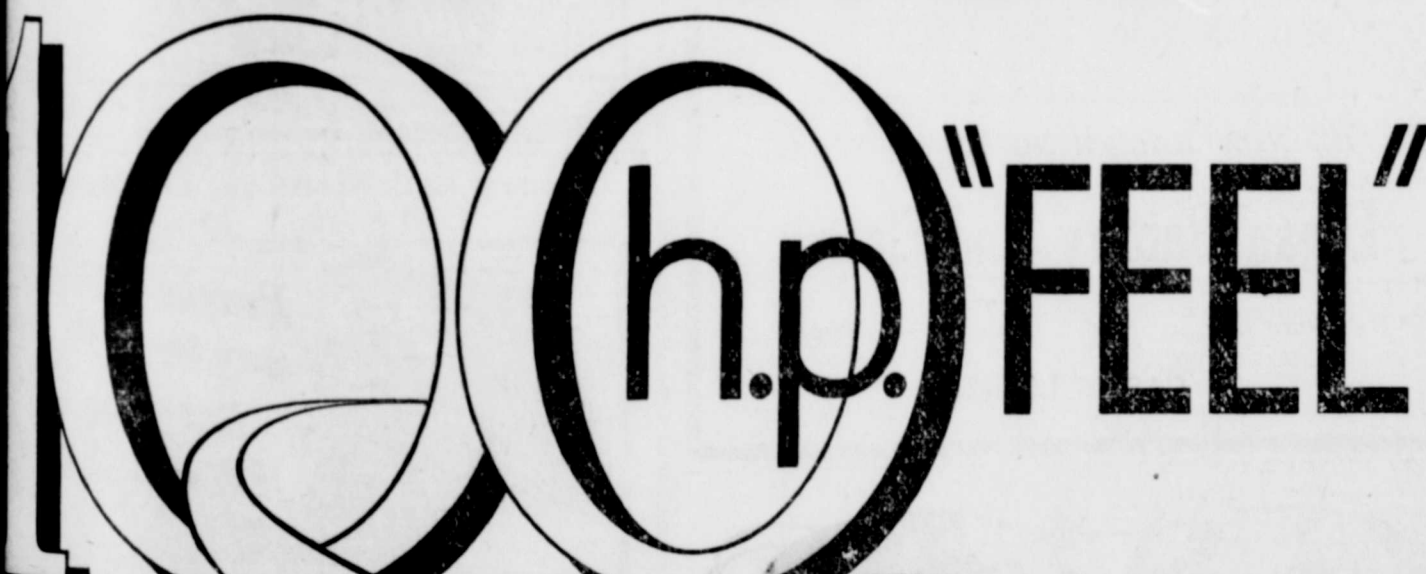
As to the mode of baptism, two positions present themselves, one that it is sprinkling, pouring or immersion: The other that it is immersion only. As far as we know no one denies that immersion is scriptural. Affusion or sprinkling, on the other hand is questionable. Paul says that baptism is burial (Romans 6:4). To be safe, then, why not be immersed? You will then have lost nothing and you are infallibly safe.
