## BEGIN AT HOME

Our Secretary of State speaks to nations of the Western Hemisphere, to try to establish peace amongst themselves. Overthrows of government in Central and South America is a menace to democracy, a threat to the welfare of the hemisphere. But, what about peace at home as an example to give emphasis to our speech-making for democracy? This country has a nation-wide strike in the steel and coal industries. Can a government condemn uprisings in other countries while they have such controversy between labor and capital, within their own boundaries, that they are endangering their own economy? Perhaps the smaller nations to the south of us, would respect us more, pay more attention to our advice, if we were to set a better example for controlling disorder.

As a local citizen rightly asks, "why can't disputes such as this with coal and steel, be settled before striking? Can't a lawful process take place? Isn't it possible to come to terms without effecting the entire operation of a nation?" You give him the answers, we can't.

## FOR YOUR GOOD

Despite the figures that the death rate from tuberculosis, was lowest in United States history, the number of new cases is on the increase. There is a decline in

deaths from tuberculosis but an alarming number of new cases. In 1947 there were 133,000 new cases reported to health authorities. In 1948 there were 145,000. Health authorities estimate that about 500,000 Americans have tuberculosis but that only half of them realize it. Improved living conditions, public health check-ups, better hospitals, new methods of treatment; have helped check the death rate. X-ray surveys made in many cities are turning up new cases that would perhaps not have been listed. The person who has tuberculosis, finds it out when it is in its earliest stages and stands a far better chance of recovery. If we are where these free X-ray clinics are held, we might co-operate to cheat a disease killer. Many industries, schools, clubs, are offering the service. Meet it, don't fight it.

## A WOMAN'S PLACE

From Senator Margaret Chase Smith of Maine, comes a suggestion that she feels will definitely win the 1952 election for her party, the Republicans. This is to nominate a woman either as President or vice-President. Senator Margaret Smith is not interested in the job herself, but feels that the office should go to a woman to bring about certain victory. Now, many men are opposed to women in politics, so there would go their vote. As for women, they don't always stick together to support a woman, and how can we be sure they would back a woman candidate for President or vice-President? Ask around here and you'll have an argument on your hands.

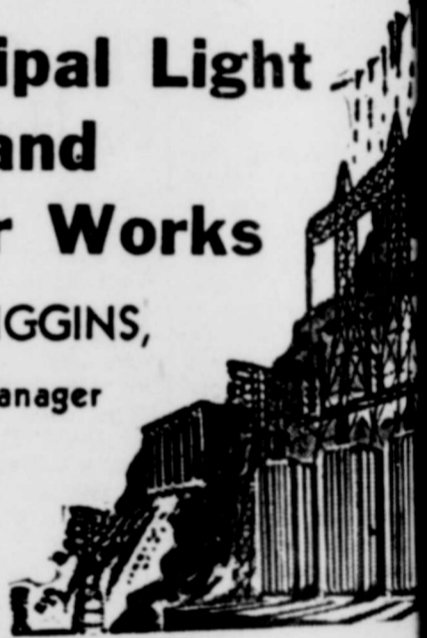

**Your Layers 13-Hour Day**

October the day light has decreased to the point where egg production of the poultryman is affected. Artificial lighting in his house is necessary to offset the effect of short winter days, many farmers equip their poultry with electric lights on them on either early morning, or at dusk, or through morning or evening to account for a 13-hour day is considered by most raisers of eggs and experience has shown that this probably is the right balance of feeding time and roost-

**Helps Birds Thrive**  
Lighting is an important factor because it helps maintain proper body weight, tends to hasten maturity for late-hatched pullets, and has the effect of bringing breeders back into production—all these in addition to lengthening the daily laying period.  
In the case of early pullets which begin to lay in June or July, artificial lighting is sometimes used when the birds' body weight cannot be maintained by known feeding methods.  
Usually molting will appear earlier in a flock housed without lights than in one provided with lighting equipment. Flocks of high-production birds have been kept at 50 per cent production or better for 12 or 15 months by the use of lights.  
**"Alarm Clock" System**  
Most poultrymen find that the most satisfactory lighting method is to turn the lights on at about 3:00 A. M. Usually, this is done by the "alarm clock" system or some similar method.  
Under the evening lighting plan, birds get up at dawn and lights are turned on until 7:00

P. M. or as long as is necessary to make a 13- or 14-hour day.  
Morning or evening lighting should be discontinued when the days become longer in the spring.  
**86 Acres Under One Roof at Willow Run**  
The interdependence of agriculture and industry was brought into sharp focus in a recent statement by Clay Bedford, executive vice-president in charge of manufacturing for the Kaiser-Frazer Corporation, during a farm radio interview with Med Maxwell at the sprawling Willow Run, Michigan plant.  
Maxwell, a widely traveled farm commentator, made the interview for the Wayne Feeds, "Let's Go Visiting" program, broadcast regularly over leading farm radio stations throughout 32 states.  
Willow Run, second largest building of its type in the world covers 86 acres under one roof, and in Bedford's words: "... to put it in farm terms, we produce better than 240 completed

autos per acre!" In producing these cars, enough cotton is used to take the total production of more than 10,000 acres. Thousands of bushels of soybeans are also required for the manufacture of auto paint and various plastic parts.  
"Each auto coming off the Willow Run Assembly line utilizes about 10 yards of cloth, mostly wool, which means a substantial market for the wool crop sheared from thousands of sheep."  
About 30,000 persons are connected with the manufacture, servicing and distribution of

Kaiser-Frazer cars. Bedford pointed out that this requires an annual pay roll of nearly 90 million dollars, most of which must be spent for food, clothing and shelter, providing a huge additional market for farm products. "Using the average figure of 3 1-2 acres per person, it takes the output of 105,000 acres just to keep our employees fed and clothed," Bedford said.  
The auto man explained that while the farmer is dependent on industries like that at Willow Run for a steady market for his products, industry is likewise dependent upon the farmer for a market. "About 50 per cent of our sales are to farmers, and people from farms and rural districts make up about 92 per cent of our employees. We are very conscious of the common destiny of farmers and industry," Bedford concluded. "The better we understand each other's needs and operations, the better we contribute to a happy, prosperous nation."

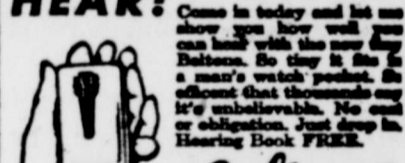

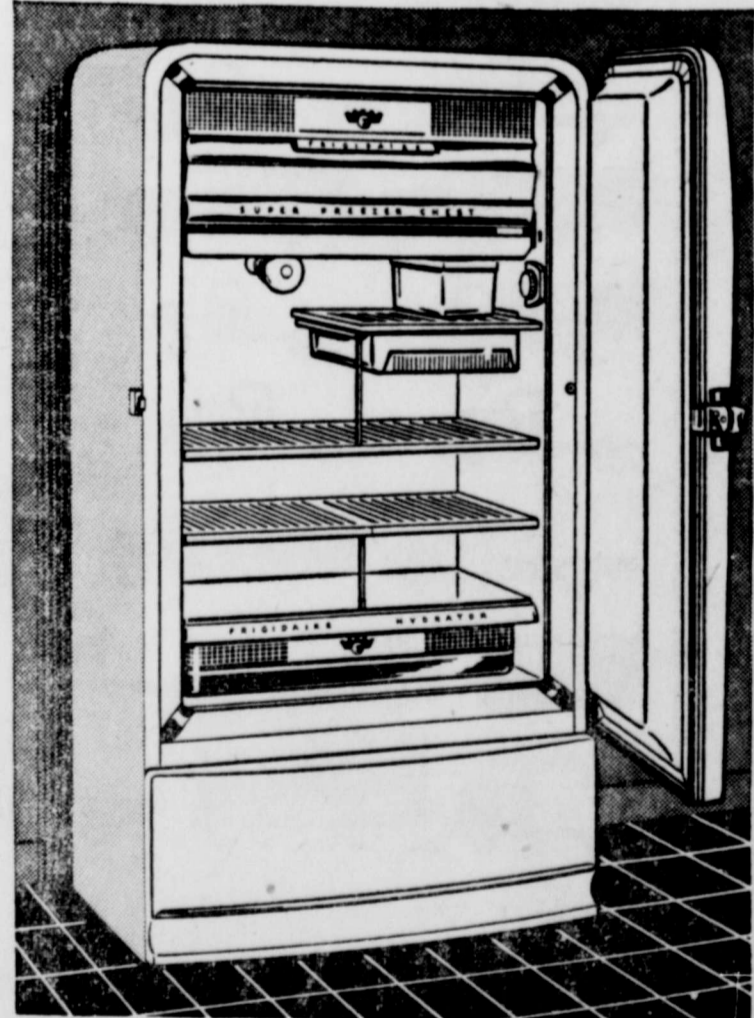

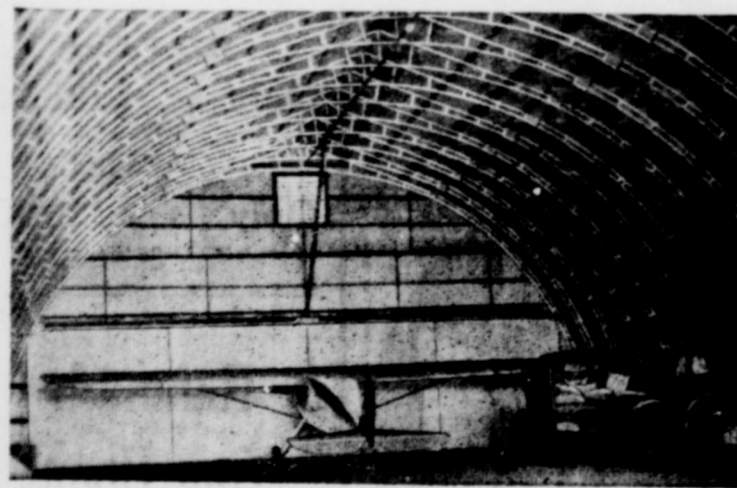

All new irrigation ditches are constructed above ground level to permit good head of water. The alfalfa will be used as a soil improving crop and for hay. Irrigation land offers a great opportunity for ranchers to raise their own hay.

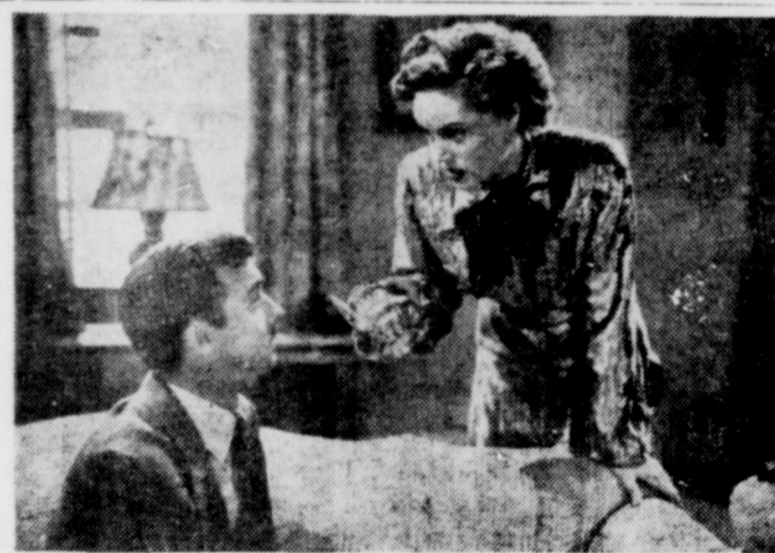

The outcome of the meeting was the football game as we know it today. The game became cleaner, faster, safer and grew to a tremendous popularity. There have been only minor changes of the rules and regulations since that time.
