Tony Ximenez, the famous Cuban artist, better known as "King of the Pen", gave the townspeople a real treat by bringing to the First Methodist Church, a complete exhibit of his famous drawings.

Senor Ximenez comes from a family of notable musicians, and possibly because of this fact his pictorial compositions are varied and dramatic, with a definite feeling of rhythm and good balance. His technical approach is free and sure, and there is no doubt left in the observer's mind that the artist knew what he was about when he takes his pen in hand and reproduces the subject he is drawing.

It was this writer's good fortune to be on hand when Senor Ximenez sketched a landscape depicting the character of the land surrounding Burkburnett, and quite a treat it was, to watch his hand executing the sketch in a matter of minutes. It might be added that the writer now is the proud possessor of that particular picture.

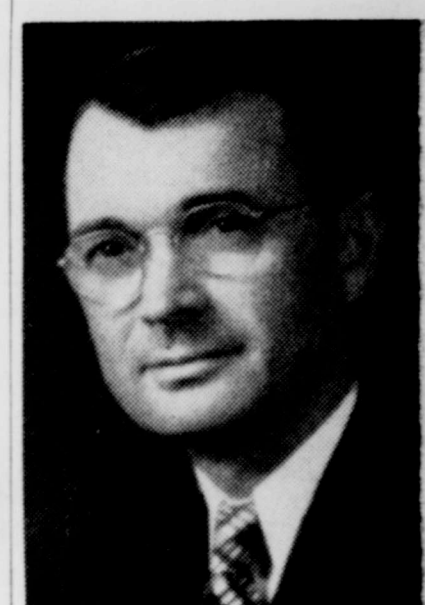

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## PLANNING A CAREER

Planning a lifetime work is a major step that many young people face as they reach their late teens.

There are many types of good jobs open to young men and women in our country. In considering careers, they probably want to think about the various kinds of work and then pick one that seems most appealing and suitable. But equally important is planning how to advance in a chosen work.

Recently we ran across some good advice for young people on how to go about planning a career. It was given by Paul Garrett, vice-president of General Motors, in the recently published "Betty Betz Career Book".

Mr. Garrett's article dealt specifically with jobs in a field in which he himself has pioneered—industrial public relations. But his sound thinking on how to plan and work step-by-step toward a definite goal could be applied to other careers as well. Here is what he said:

"If I were in my teens again and my goal were a good job in the public relations department of a big industrial company, I hope I would have the good sense to plan my campaign this way:

"First, I would make sure I was fitted for that sort of work. I would ask myself especially, do I like people; do I like to meet and be with people; do people like me and like to be with me?"

"Second, I would get the very best education I possibly could, with particular emphasis on economics. If I could afford it, I would supplement my other studies with a course in journalism. My summers I would spend working in plants to get some grit in my hair and dirt beneath my fingernails.

"Third, my first real job would be with a newspaper, if they'd have me. I wouldn't assume that my course in journalism had taught me all there was to know about the newspaper business. I would assume that nowhere could I get a better start toward my chosen profession.

"Fourth, I would also want to tuck away some experience in an advertising agency or with a firm handling general public relations.

"Fifth, then I would look around for my company. I would take my time. Once I found it, I would plan to stick with it, grow with it."

Mr. Garrett said there is always a place in industry for youth with ability. "The need is great for young men and women who can develop a knowledge of how to tell the public about industry," he said, and "can learn to help guide industrial management in shaping its policies to build better public relationship."

## EVERYBODY BENEFITS

Whatever the size, there are few towns but that have literary clubs, cultural groups, meeting to hear and discuss books, to study current events. Study groups speak well for a community, enrich their own lives. Many things come and pass. Civilization has offered much that was popular and then faded, but man's love of books has persisted through the centuries. It is a vital force that has permeated the globe, enriched lives in homes of pomp and homes of poverty. Libraries flourish. Even those who live in remote areas are served by the bookmobile. It is a fellowship to which many in Burkburnett belong, the order of devotees of literature.

Children around Burkburnett HAVE begun their yearly sprucing up in manners and habits, preparing their politeness campaign as a forerunner of Christmas. Small tots are already asking questions about this fellow Santa Claus and are being answered as have been children time immemorial. ## SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Hollis Atkinson, dairyman on the Wichita Falls-Kamay Road, is planning to level, border and plant to alfalfa 40 acres. The alfalfa will be planted next fall. Irrigation laterals will be elevated above natural ground to insure a good head of water. Concrete checks will be installed in the laterals and tile turnouts will outlet the water from laterals into the borders. The alfalfa will be used for hay and pasture.

D. O. James, cooperater of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District, is now in process of leveling 20 acres of irrigated land on his farm 1-2 mile South of Iowa Park. The land leveled will be bordered and planted to clover this Spring and followed by alfalfa in the Fall. Permanent tile turnouts and concrete checks will be installed on this farm.

Arnold Holtzen and Elvie Welborn have planted Dixie Wonder Peas as a winter cover crop on their farm East of Clara. This is a new cover crop to this area. This legume differs from the Austrian Winter Peas in the respect it will take seed most of the years. This crop along with other crops on these farms is entered in the Bridwell Soil Builders Awards program.

A few of the farmers who have entered the Bridwell Soil Builders Awards program the last few days are: Norb Zimmerman, tenant on the Van Lesley farm who has entered in the following divisions: winter legumes, summer legumes, pasture improvement, and conservation on the whole farm; Walter Muriusky and Oscar Klinkerman, tenants on the Ray Hirsch farm who have entered in the division of winter legumes, summer legumes and conservation on the whole farm; Herbert Kiesling, tenant on the C. Birk farm has entered on the winter legumes, summer legumes, pasture improvement, and conservation on the whole farm.

You don't have to be a land owner to enter—anybody, boy, girl, tenant or land owner is eligible to enter. Most of the above farmers are using as check plots on their legume test, different rates of applying phosphate on an acre basis, or increase yields of legumes following legumes over first year legumes, applying of different rate of phosphate with

different amounts of barnyard manure, and test on check plot by applying ammonium nitrate. These are just a few of the many tests farmers are trying on their own farms to check on the benefits of legumes and what rate of fertilizer on per acre basis would be best to use to increase growth of legumes. Enter today, you may receive application blank at the Soil Conservation District office in Iowa Park.

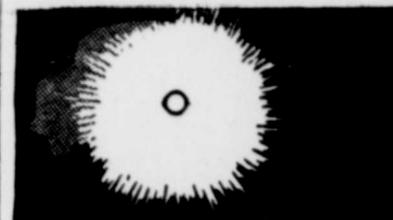

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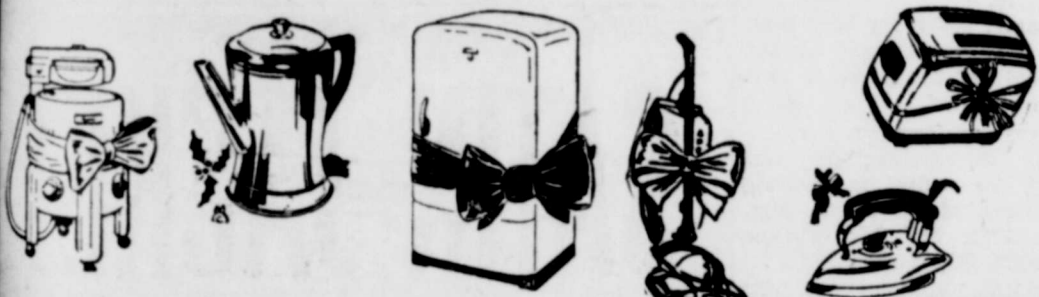

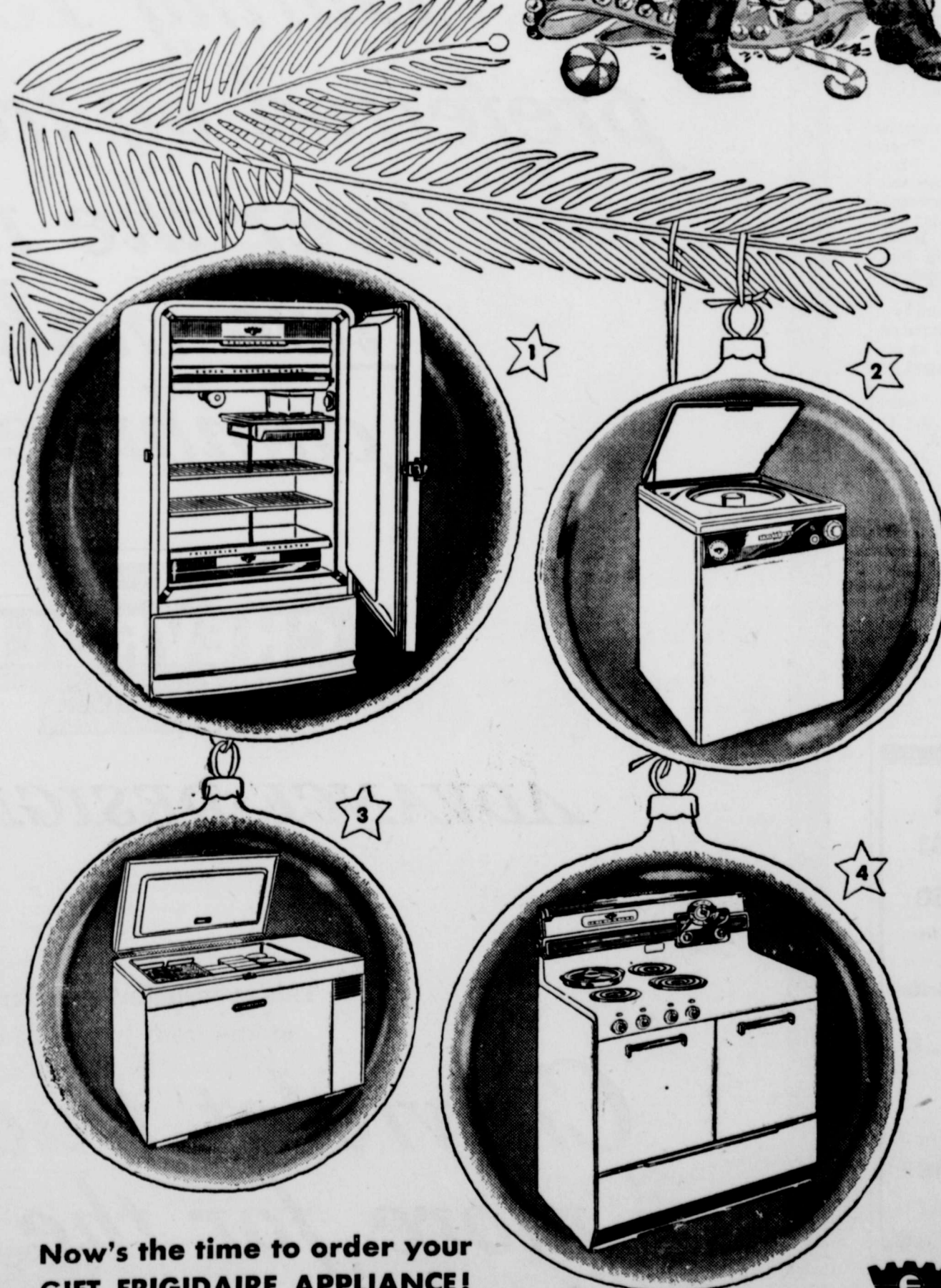

Members of the Burkburnett Future Farmers of America have treated about 100 peach trees for peach tree borers this month. The treatment consists of cleaning all trash and weeds from around the tree trunk and breaking the crust of earth for a radius of about 15 inches around the tree. One-half to one ounce of paradichlorobenzene crystals are then placed in a circle one to two inches from the tree trunk and covered with earth making a cone shaped mound about the tree. After about six weeks, the mound should be torn down and the residue of crystals removed.

Ethylene dichloride emulsion may be used to control the borers by applying the diluted solution around the tree at the rate of one-fourth pint to the tree for 2 to 4 year old trees.

Either treatment should be applied between October 15 and November 20th.

Some evidence of San Jose scale has also been found here and it is probable that some brown rot exists. For control of these pests, a good dormant spray is commercial oil emulsion at 3 per cent strength. The oil should be mixed with water according to the manufacturer's directions. This spray should be followed with a mixture of 4 lbs. lime, 2 lbs. zinc sulfate, wettable sulphur 3 lbs., lead arsenate 1 pound per 50 gallons of water when one-half of the blossom petals have fallen.

For heavy infestation a more rigid spraying schedule will be necessary.

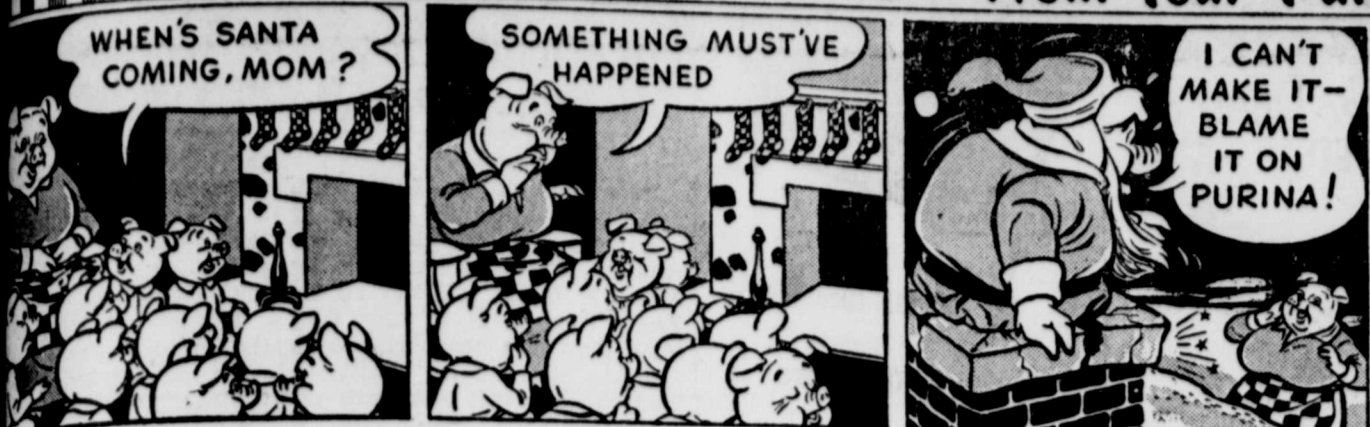

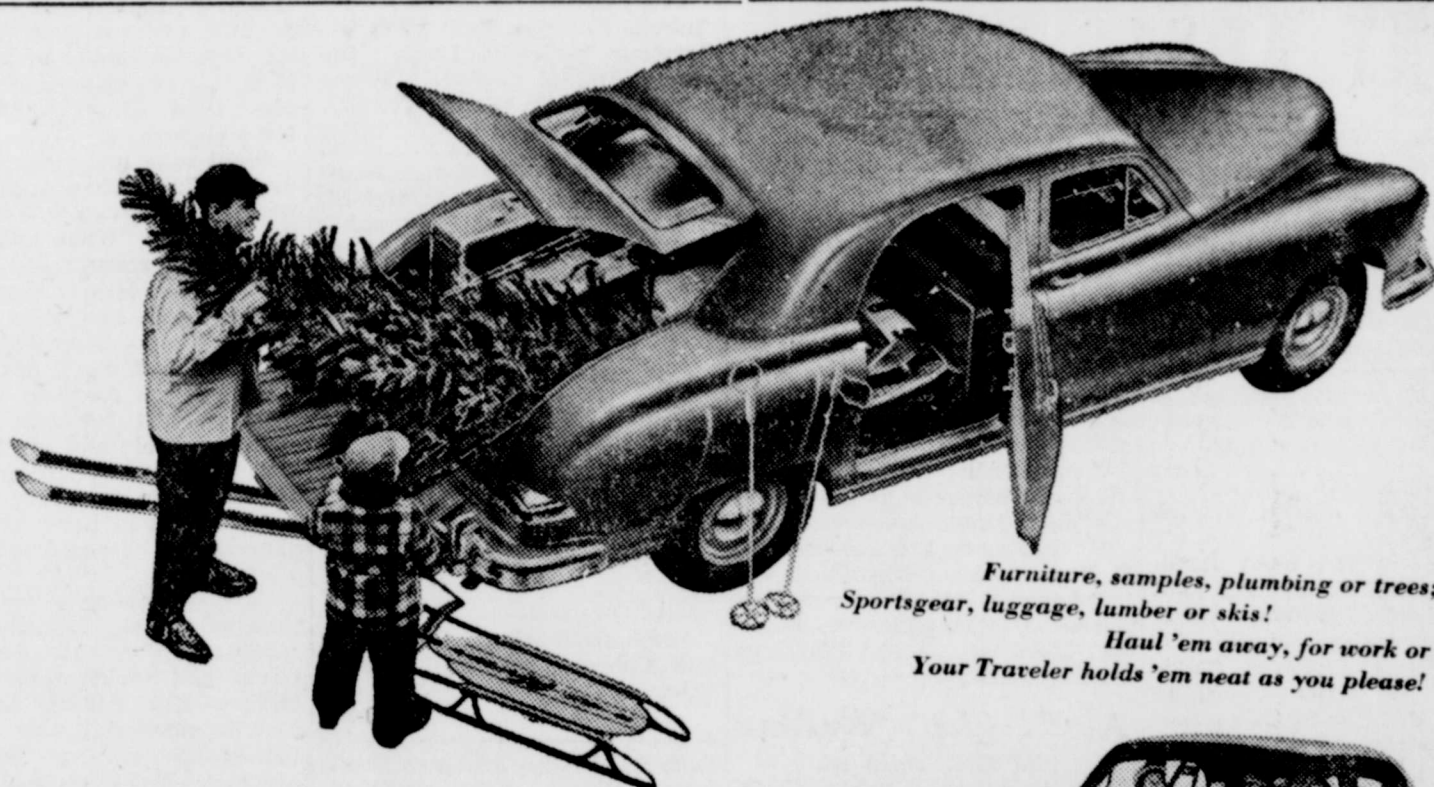

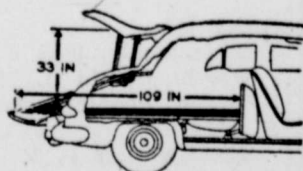

2. What can be done to prevent sows from mashing their pigs?

All farrowing houses of every type should have a guard rail around the sides and back of the individual pen used by each sow and her litter. This rail should be 8 to 10 inches from the wall. Guard rails are of great value in keeping sows from rolling on their pigs.

3. How long should a cow be dry before she is due to calve?

A cow should be dried off about 60 days before she is due to calve. It is therefore necessary to keep accurate breeding dates. The Ralston Purina Company, St. Louis, Mo., issues a "Time Saver" herd record card, which may be obtained free of cost from any of its dealers. This handy card may be hung in the barn and has blanks where breeding and calving dates may be jotted down.
