New Plymouth Car To Go On Display Thursday, Jan. 12

The 1950 Plymouth car, with important styling changes and improvements for safety and riding comfort, will go on display in dealer showrooms throughout the country January 12th. Burkburnett Motors, local Plymouth dealer, will have two Plymouths on display Saturday. There are new lines in the silhouette which give the new Plymouth a longer, lower, more streamlined appearance. The changes are readily apparent whether viewed from front, the rear or side. Rear fenders, which are bolted on for economical removal in case repairs are necessary, have been restyled and lengthened. A larger rear window on club coupes and four door sedans, slightly greater over all width, and alterations on the rear deck provide a longer, heavier, road-hugging appearance for all models. The grille has been simplified and made more massive. It consists of 2 large horizontal bars with a curved down top member and a single vertical bar at the center. Above the grille the Plymouth nameplate appears in larger block letters, and a bigger, more colorful medallion has been placed over the nameplate. Described as "Packed with value and ready to prove it," the new Plymouth was characterized by D. S. Eddins, president of Plymouth, as "The greatest car value we have ever offered the public."

"When we speak of value," Eddins said, "we mean that we have combined beauty with sensible styling, that we have achieved big-car performance with small-car economy, and that the mechanical excellence of which we have always been proud has maintained its high level."

The front and rear tread have been increased, a factor which increases stability, eases tire loading stress on curves, and enhances the car's general appearance. Thirty-two per cent larger than on previous models, the new rear window increases visibility and its lines blend into the car's new streamlining motif. The window is set in a newly designed locking rubber seal. There are larger bumpers on both front and rear. In addition to providing greater protection for the grille, rear deck and fenders, the bumpers add materially to the general appearance of massiveness.

The theme of simplicity which has been carried out in the medallion and name plate on the front have been continued in the ornamentation of the rear deck. The block-letter name plate, the license plate light ornament, the license plate recess, and the T-shaped luggage compartment handle are styled to accent the car's low, sleek lines. Combination tail lights and stop lights are set into each rear fender. The redesigned instrument panel provides new backgrounds of transparent gunmetal on spun aluminum for the gauge dials, speedometer, radio dial, and clock. The gunmetal finish is also used on the radio grille screen. There are larger rotary switch knobs which are easier to operate.

Jr., all of Amherst; six grand children, and five great-grandchildren. Other survivors include three sisters, Mrs. Sallie Johnson, Rocky Ford, Colo.; Mrs. Mollie Fuller of Ft. Worth, and Mrs. Dona Ellis of Dallas.

A Few Words and Facts About Polio

By GEORGE McCLARTY, Chairman Burkburnett Drive The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis was founded by our late President, Franklin D. Roosevelt, a victim of the disease himself. The disease is on the increase, and a greater need for funds exists. A part of the money raised is devoted to research, which we are almost sure will bear fruit or more results within a few years. Until now, most of the funds had to go for relief of suffering patients and treatment. We handled over 70 cases this past year, far more than ever before. We spent all our local funds and received \$1,500 from National Headquarters, and used \$2,000 of our reserve fund, which was earmarked for equipment, and this must be replaced in the polio ward at the Wichita Falls General Hospital. You might say that Polio nearly reached the epidemic stage in Wichita County last year. (Over \$90,000 was spent in San Angelo and the immediate community last year, and as you know it was one of the worst epidemics of Polio in the United States.)

The drive is made independent of any other drives, made once each year, in January, and is largely carried on in our local community through efforts of our schools, teachers and pupils, not only in their gifts, but through their education of their parents to give to this worthy cause.

This year as in the past, a letter asking for funds will be mailed to each mailing address in town and rural community, and when the letter is received, open immediately, place dimes, quarters, or dollars in enclosed envelope, and drop in the Post Office. The return letter will be addressed and stamped, all you do is place the money in the envelope, seal and drop in the Post Office or give to your local carrier. Bear in mind these facts. Polio is terrible. All you have to do is look about you for a victim, to make you mindful of what a terrible thing it is. It costs lots of money to give relief and treatment to those with Polio. I think it much better for us to give to these endeavors from our heart, rather than see the Government take over, and raise funds for these things through taxation.

THE FIGHT AGAINST GOOD FOOD

Just why any food—produced by the farmer or the dairy industry, or others, should be outlawed seems to be ridiculous. Suppose political groups should make a campaign against butter and try to outlaw it?

No one seems to "take up arms" against butter. Your Washington correspondent rises to remind you that 30 years ago there was as much difference between good butter and bad butter as you could imagine—and yet the dairy industry raised the rank and quality of good butter—just as the margarine manufacturers have advanced the quality of good, excellent margarine.

Thirty-two States have legalized the manufacture and sale of yellow margarine. Ohio took the matter to the polls and voted last November by 1,282,606 to 799,473 to legislate pre-colored margarine. Nine States have gone the same way in two years. There has been more tom foolery than common sense in the ways and methods by which the fight has been carried on to outlaw margarine, notwithstanding the fact that it is being used in the same manner as a food by the poor and the rich on their dining room table.

FOR SERVICE RENDERED

It used to be that a pension was a reward for long and faithful service to an occupation. A man retired in dignity into later life, his productive years over. When a bill became law that gave pensions to congressmen, it was or should have been, with this purpose in mind. But, when a former congressman serves a penitentiary sentence for defrauding the government during office, receives his pension during prison sentence and later for his entire life, the pension plan is wrong. If another congressman is sentenced to prison on a charge of fraud in office, serves his time and then later on his 62 birthday starts to receive the lifetime pension, the pension plan is wrong. We agree with the man who says the congressional pension law needs an amendment, that it be stipulated that no pension money from the federal treasury, in excess of contributions made by the individual concerned, be paid to any public official who is found guilty of violating his trust. This adds dignity to a reward for loyal and faithful service and renews our regard for the rightful purpose for which the pension idea was intended.

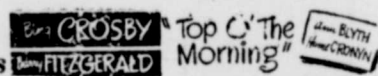

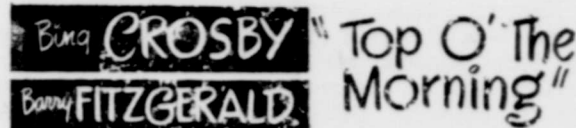

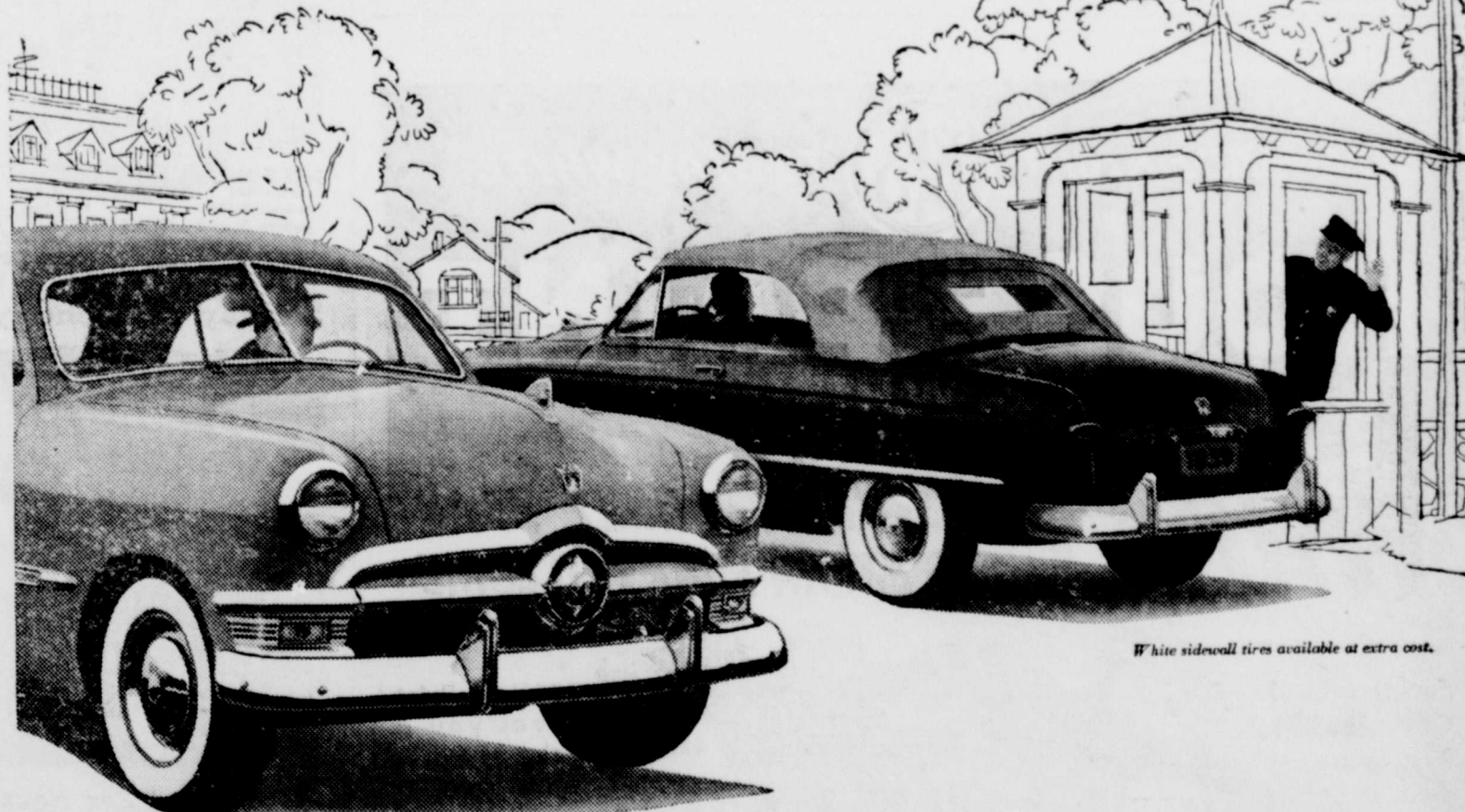
