## OUR LINCOLN

Abraham Lincoln is the symbol of Americanism. Born in a log cabin at Hodgenville, Kentucky, February 12, 1809, Lincoln rose to great heights until struck down by an assassin's bullet in 1865. No man in all human history, has risen to such an estate, nor was his climb an easy one.

Born on a grim frontier in dour poverty, struggling to give himself an education, he knew the way as hard. The early loss of his mother, his first true sweetheart, affected him deeply. The death of his boyhood love, the girl he wished to marry, left a great scar. A failure as a store keeper, later a failure as a congressman after a flitting political success, a poorly paid country lawyer, a defeated Senate aspirant, he finally reached the office of President of these United States. He almost lost a war by picking the wrong leaders, according to his critics. He lost his young son and was unhappily married. He lived his 56 years through which ran a vein of exceeding bad luck. His overcoming of adversity, his wisdom and endurance, is an example to us of man's struggle to conquer his lot, improve his standards. May we all profit from his courage, his hope and his aspirations.

## Doesn't Pay The Bills

Mr. Truman evidently knew that an election-minded Congress would never pass a bill that would levy increased taxes on income for the small and medium-income brackets. He asks for reduction in excise taxes on transportation of property and persons, long-distance telephone and telegraph communications, retail excise taxes that include luggage, handbags, toilet preparations, etc. These latter taxes, lightened or removed, is supposed to stimulate business activity, which it did effectively when tried in Canada. But, in making these tax reductions, the money lost is proposed to be made up by increasing the rate on corporation, gift and estate taxes. Would the proposed increase on corporate income tax fill the national need? Taxes so collected wouldn't come within \$5 billion of striking a balance of income and outgo for the fiscal year of 1951!

## EVERYBODY HAPPY?

A reader tells us that social security kills enterprise. He believes if government payments were boosted as high as many ask, it would mean paralyzing man's endeavor. Human nature being such, social security would be the excuse for folks to do as little for themselves as possible. It would mean no practicing of thrift and saving for old age. It would mean children would feel no responsibility for caring for their parents. It would kill self-reliance in a man and pay benefits to triflers who never have felt a duty in life. Our local friend may well question the consequences of such paternalism.

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## Telephone Co. to Spend \$28,700 On Expansion Here

More telephone service is in store for Burkburnett as a result of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's construction program here, according to C. C. Kirby, district manager of the company.

The telephone system here will be expanded through the addition of more poles and cables to the outside telephone network, to be erected this year at a cost of \$28,700, Kirby said.

Telephone workmen will extend lines to serve customers in the south, southeast, west and east sections of the city, Kirby explained.

One of the principal areas to be served by the new additions is the south and southeast areas, lying roughly between the Wichita Falls highway and the new Oklahoma cut-off road between College and Tenth Sts., and as far south as the Oaklawn addition. Families living along the Oklahoma cut-off road also will be served when the new cable network is in place, Kirby said.

The new cable extensions also will enlarge present telephone facilities throughout the south section lying west of the M-K-T Railway and along the Electra highway.

To the northeast, still more poles, wire, and cable will be added in the vicinity of the Oklahoma highway (U. S. 277-281) to bring telephone connections to residents in that vicinity.

The planned expansion of Burkburnett's telephone system will require the erection of 175 new poles and the stringing of 28,300 feet of cable and 12 miles of wire.

"It's a big job, requiring large amounts of materials, manpower, and money," Kirby said, "but it is part of our program to meet the continuing demand for telephone service in Burkburnett."

As evidence of the city's growth, the district manager pointed out that there are now more than 1,000 telephones in

service here, or more than double the number in service before the war, when there were only about 370 here. More than 400 have been added since the war's end, he said.

"Burkburnett's growth has created many telephone problems, Kirby continued, "but we are furnishing more service than ever before, and the new additions, when completed this year, will allow us to provide even more at that time."

The anti-trust lawyers are "still determined to destroy A. & P.," the ad continues, but it adds—"Everything that has happened since this suit was filed proves that the American people don't want A. & P. destroyed." The ad cites how supplies, unions, competitors, news papers through editorials and people "in all walks of life" have rallied to A. & P.'s support.

"The housewives of this nation, whose patronage has made this company big, are buying from us in increasing numbers and increasing volume," the ad says. "Apparently most Americans do not want to let the anti-trust lawyers in Washington blow the whistle on any businessman who does a better and more efficient job and grows big

### A & P Contends Anti-Trust Lawyers Are Wrong Again

Inflammatory and damaging allegations made in a suit against the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co., at Dallas, Texas, were so baseless that the Federal Judge "threw the Anti-trust lawyers and their case right out of his court," the company will say in advertisements this week end. The advertisement scheduled for publication in 2,500 newspapers throughout the nation, was the third in a series discussing former court cases where Federal Judges found that was no evidence against the company and administered stinging rebukes to the Anti-Trust lawyers. In the Dallas anti-trust suit, the ad states the anti-trust lawyers "made practically the same allegations they are making today" in their current suit to break up the 90 year old food store chain. Federal Judge W. H. Atwell, the ad states, ruled that the Dallas case "should not even be tried" because the indictment "contained inflammatory statements he would not allow to be presented to a jury."

"If I thought I was presiding over a court and that I might have to sentence some person because he was a great big fellow, or because he was a lilliputian, I would feel like resigning," the ad quotes Judge Atwell. "God knows we don't want it ever to occur in America that the size is going to determine whether a man is guilty or innocent."

Judge Atwell, the ad also says, told the anti-trust lawyers "if the indictment is not good then it is better to find out before an expensive trial than it is after an expensive trial. I

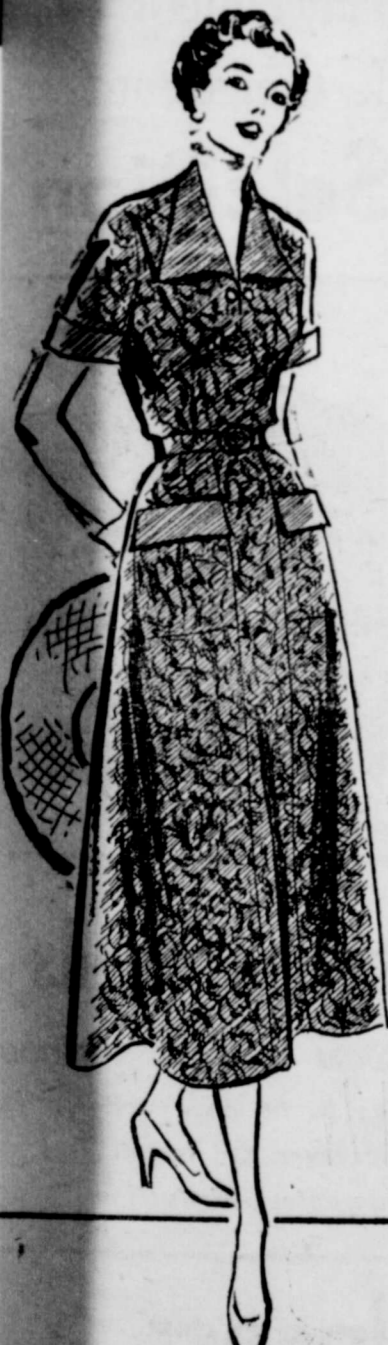

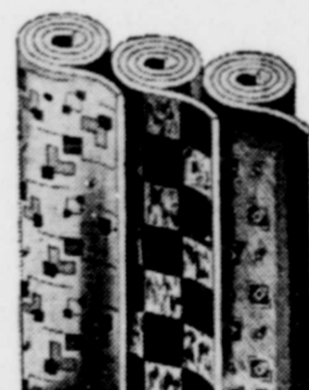

*"But, as was said a long time ago, you can't make brick without straw, and you can't make a case without facts."*

So here were two cases in which the anti-trust lawyers made seriously damaging charges against A&P, in which the judge decided that there were no facts to support those charges.

Today, we want to tell you about the third time—this time in Dallas, Texas—the court decided against the anti-trust lawyers.

## The Dallas Anti-Trust Suit

In 1942 the anti-trust lawyers went out to Dallas, Texas, 1,400 miles from the homes of most of the defendants, and instigated criminal charges against A&P.

Everything that has happened since this suit was filed proves that the American people don't want A&P destroyed.

A deluge of letters from people in all walks of life and thousands of editorials in newspapers and magazines convince us that the public has faith in A&P.

The housewives of this nation, whose patronage has made this company big, are buying from us in increasing numbers and increasing volume.

Our suppliers, whom the anti-trust lawyers allege we have exploited, are rushing to our support.

Labor leaders, mindful of the fact that A&P employees enjoy the best wages, hours and working conditions, are taking a stand against the suit.

Even many of our good competitors, who the anti-trust lawyers allege are hurt by our competition, have taken ads to tell the public that they don't like this attack on A&P.

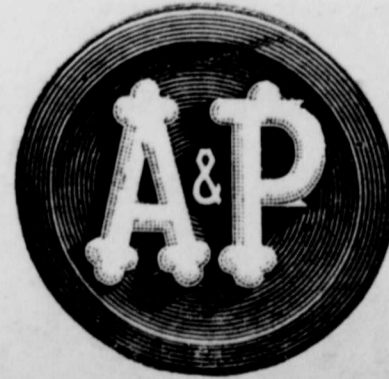

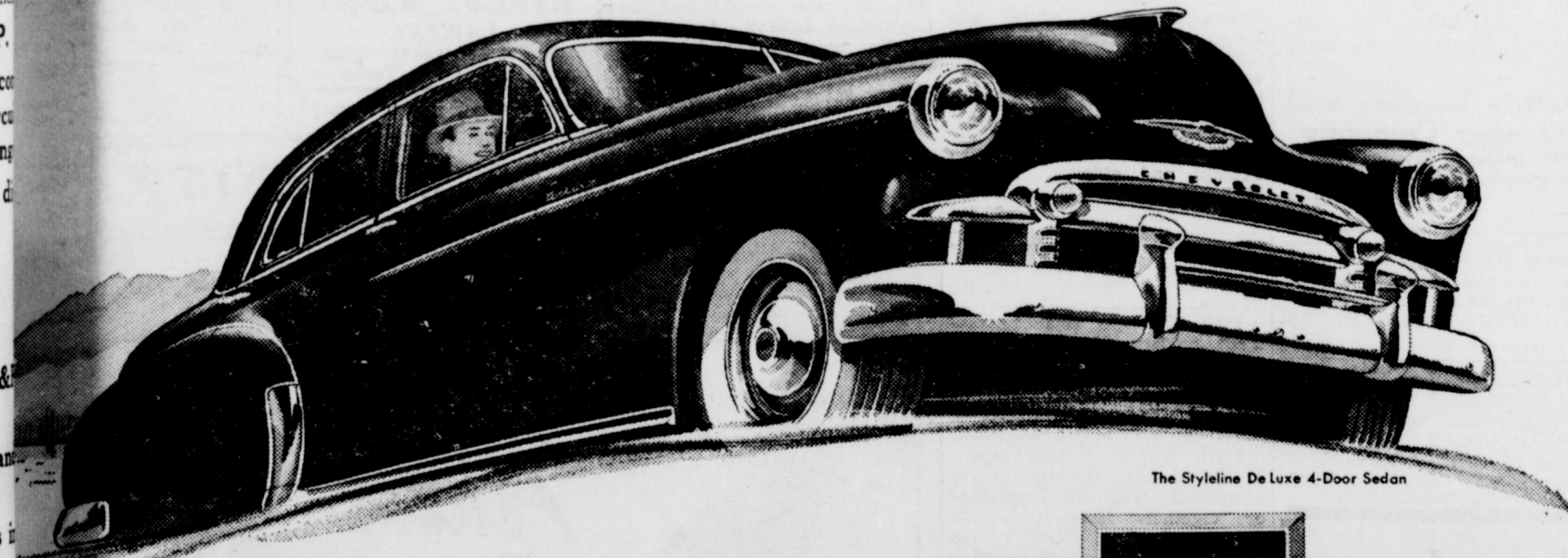
