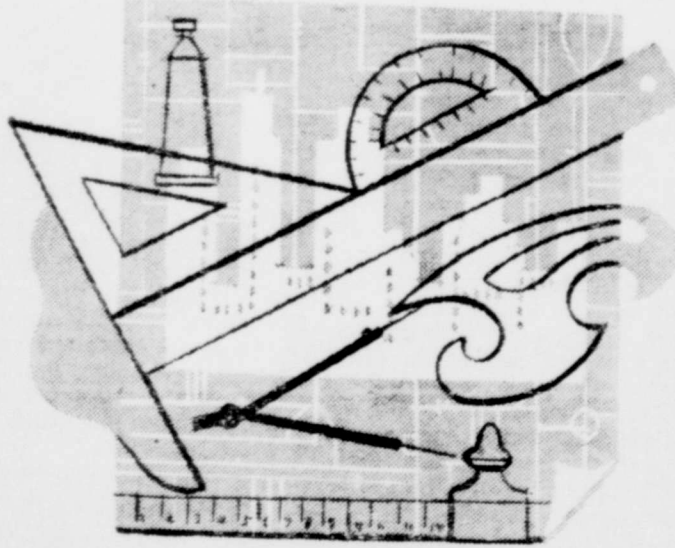
"Like all other work in the field of atomic weapons, it is being and will be carried forward on a basis of consistent with the over-all objectives of our program for peace and security.

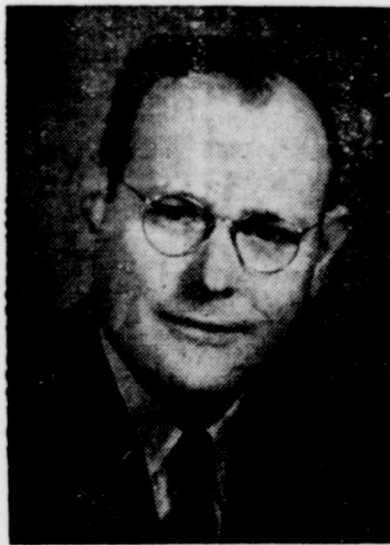
J. V. Brookshear and Harold VanLoh of the Farmers State Bank attended the Bankers' Convention in Dallas Monday.

Washington News Letter

(By Congressman Ed Gossett)

I was made very happy this week when the Senate by a vote of 64 to 27 passed the Gossett - Lodge Amendment to abolish the Electoral College. It is my hope to get this Resolution acted upon in the House within the next few weeks. If we secure a two-thirds vote in the House, the Amendment will then be submitted to the State Legislatures for action. If and when ratified by three-fourths of the State Legislatures, it will then become a part of the Constitution. In my opinion, it is one of the most badly needed reforms in our whole structure of government. Under the present system, the big cities of New York and Chicago largely control national politics.

A great many of my friends in Congress, both Democrats and Republicans, keep asking, "how will this Amendment affect our party?" The real question is, how will it affect our country?

Under it, elections will be fair, honest, and accurate. One votes for whomever he pleases and his vote is counted. Any party that cannot survive under such a fair and democratic system, does not deserve to survive.

Some of the Republican leaders who oppose this Amendment seem to me to be stupidly shortsighted. The Republican party at this time is a sectional party. It cannot survive as a sectional party. If and when this amendment becomes law, the Republican party can become a national party by writing a platform that will appeal to people throughout the nation.

Southern States will greatly benefit because they will no longer be kicked around by the Yankee politicians in both parties. For years, to our sorrow, and embarrassment, the South

has been used as a sort of whipping boy.

Today, the headlines in the Washington papers screamed of the British scientist giving H-bomb secrets to the Russians. In today's mail I got a letter from a very fine lady, deploring our President's decision to develop the H-bomb, said to be far more devastating than the Atom bomb. These things, of course, are terrible to contemplate. However, it has long been my conviction that we got into World War I and World War II, primarily because our enemies thought; first, they could bluff us; or, second, if they couldn't bluff us, they could whip us. The town bully never started a fight with a fellow whom he knew he couldn't bluff or couldn't whip. No aggressor is going to attack us unless he thinks he can win.

A friend of mine who claims to be well informed in the premises, says that Russia can now defeat America hands down—that they can practically wipe us out in thirty minutes. Our military experts disagree with this conclusion. They reply that if Russia had this power, she would unquestionably use it. They feel that when Russia is confident of the ability to destroy America, she will turn the dogs loose.

Thus, it seems that our only hope of peace is to be so strong that no nation will dare attack us. It's too bad that certain "pinks" in our government have tried to betray us heretofore.

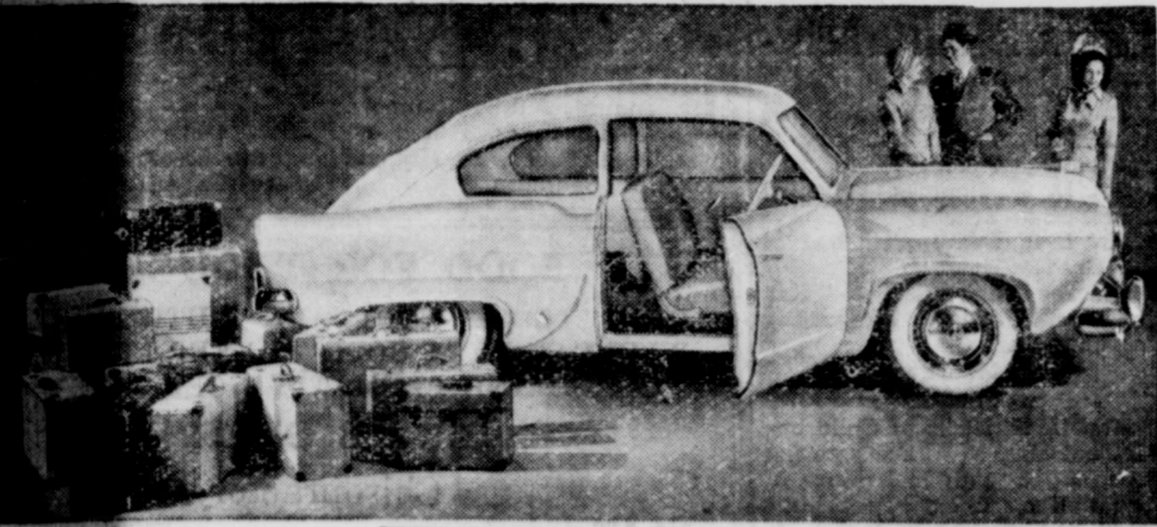

Mrs. Gilbert gave a program on "How to prepare a Balanced Diet."

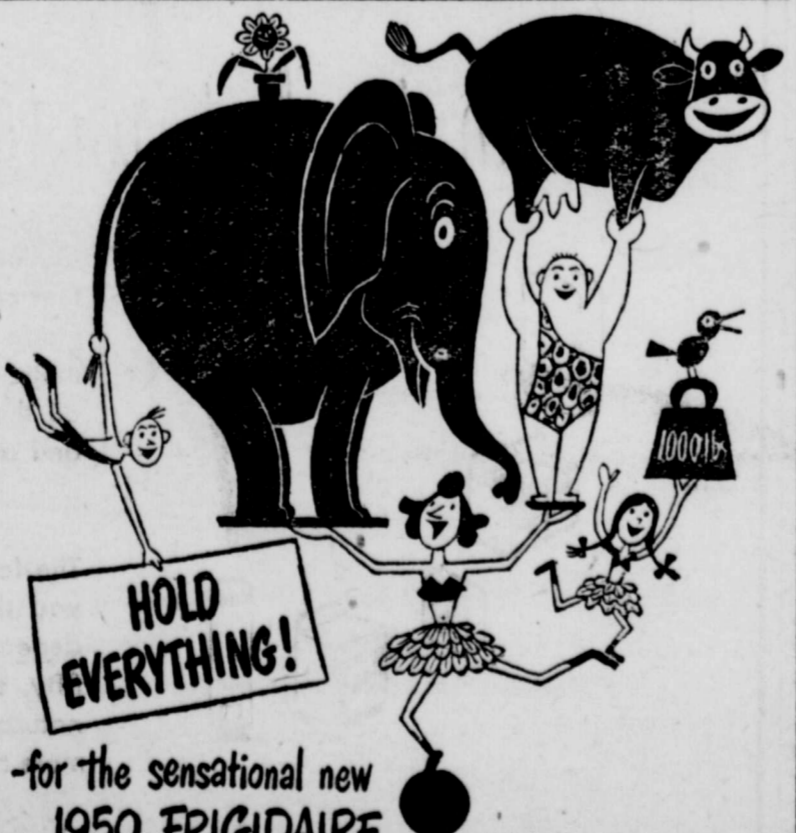
Recreation was directed by Mrs. Dureward Redman. A Penny Drill was held, with Mrs. Elvie Welborn winning the prize.

Hello Harry and John: Enclosed find check for renewal. Seems like a very short time since I mailed the 1949 check. You fellows are still doing a good job on the Star. There is still a big fight for the paper every Tuesday at our house. Also seven or eight Texas families up and down the street borrow it for a word from home.

We have had a terrific winter here. Our Japanese current has shifted off shore for the second year and our weather has had a very definite tinge of the Yukon. We still have snow drifts seven feet deep and believe it or not, the noon day whistle for Dec. 27 was heard only today at 2:10 P. M. The sound finally thawed. I've been sleeping between two grizzly bears all winter to keep from freezing. They must have had a hell of a winter at Amarillo — Amarillo? Wait till I get the Texas Almanac — Amarillo! We are still manufacturing toilet paper. Lots of it — three machines, each running a sheet one hundred fifty-four inches wide, traveling at an average of four hundred feet per minute. That, twenty-four daily, seven days weekly. I wondered for a long time what it could be used for. So much of it, that is.

Take it easy fellows. My regards to mutual friends (if any) and thanks for every past favor.

in point is the tragic plight of America's unwed mothers — those pathetic youngsters between the ages of 12 and 19 who live in shrouds of shame. More than 100,000 such girls become mothers out of wedlock each year, and the problem cannot be solved merely by ostracizing them. Girls in this situation are not "bad". More often than not they are normal, wholesome kids who succumb to unfamiliar emotions.

Some of these girls are fortunate to have a sympathetic family or friends to whom they can turn for understanding. But others are not so fortunate. They must depend on the help and guidance of strangers. There are some institutions for unwed mothers, and most of these places do a good job. But their ability to help is limited, for all they can do is care for these girls until their children are born. After which these unfor-

tunates are on their own, and confused as they must be, too many of them fail to rehabilitate themselves, for they feel they are unloved, unwanted members of our society.

A girl who has had a child out of wedlock has suffered from a great emotional shock. She needs the right kind of guidance and advice desperately. And it is up to us to give them that advice.

Recently, Hollywood made a motion picture called "NOT WANTED", playing at the Palace Theatre Sunday-Monday, which tells the story of one of these girls. It is an important motion picture because it handles this extremely delicate theme tactfully; tells its story as it should have been told years ago. Too long has the tragedy of America's unwed mothers been covered with shame and disgrace. Here is a picture about unwed mothers which should be welcomed by the public.

"NOT WANTED" is not a message picture. Primarily, it concentrates on entertainment, but it does not compromise on the story it has to tell. Screen star Ida Lupino, who co-produced with Anson Bond, and Film Classics, which is distributing the picture, are to be commended for giving the public an honest, truthful picture on this subject.

We think every American should see this picture, and from it try to gain greater understanding of these 100,000 girls who yearly make this one tragic mistake, a mistake that could be made by someone you know.

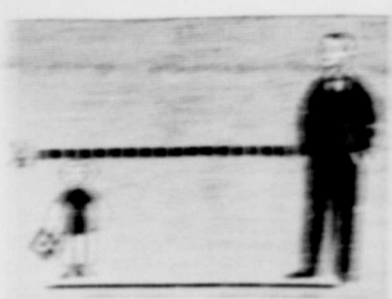
"MAKING" VITAMINS

NEW YORK, N. Y.—A lamp shining powerfully than the direct rays of the sun actually "makes" Vitamin D. So powerful is the lamp that it converts a substance containing no Vitamin D into one with about 40 million units of Vitamin D per gram.

Vitamin D, known as the "sunshine vitamin," is essential to the sound development of taller men and women. It is Vitamin D which enables the human body to make full use of bone-building calcium and phosphorus in our food.

It is estimated that more than 10 per cent of Americans, including those who give extra Vitamin D either in the irradiated product created by powerful lamps or in pharmaceutical laboratories, or in the "extra" Vitamin D may be deficient in the constantly increasing frequency with which our children have rickets and the growing prevalence of sound bone structure and sound teeth. For without plenty of Vitamin D bones do not develop strong, healthy, full-sized, straight legs.

Exact knowledge of Vitamin D is relatively new, but it is known that more than 1,000 years ago Scandinavians, fishermen, before going to sea, drank a juice containing irradiated fish livers.

Medical laboratories. These organisms and substances become very fastidious reservoirs of Vitamin D. Small fish eat these organisms and they in turn are eaten by larger fish and eventually they in turn become food for the cod in their breeding areas such as the Newfoundland Banks. The livers of cod fish then store the Vitamin D the fish have eaten.

This theory, however, is not accepted as the only answer as to how cod liver oil gets its Vitamin D. To the contrary, experiments have shown that livers of fat which have been heated by irradiated food and which have been kept in the dark contain some Vitamin D. It is therefore held that these fish have within themselves the means of actually "making" Vitamin D.

In the human body, Vitamin D is created naturally by exposure to the sun, much as it is created by irradiation processes in the laboratory, or by the sun's irradiation of substances floating on the surface of water. Because clothing, cleanliness, and habits of indoor living combine to deny our bodies the exposure to the sun they would get in a state of nature, many physicians recommend extra Vitamin D for adults as well as for children and infants. For the baby who is formula fed and whose, according to the medical profession, extra Vitamin D is absolutely essential.

To an infant cod liver oil, like all other foods, apparently has no taste at all. For adults, there are now agreeable, non-flavored preparations which mask any unpleasantness in taste.

School Expense Up Only 1-12c of Each Tax Penny

Texas' rapidly growing public school system is eating only one-twelfth more of every tax PENNY than the total expended ten years ago.

The surprisingly small increase in appropriation of the total tax dollar in the decade starting with the 1939-40 school year is due to several factors.

The total government cost for all purposes has increased tremendously in the decade.

Public schools this year will cost an estimated total of \$188,222,582 in revenue derived from state and federal funds.

During 1939-40, which was the last normal year prior to World War II, Texas had 1,077,367 children attending school.

That huge under enrollment, plus better school facilities and more capable teachers, account for a great part of the added cost of operating our schools.

"Texas indicated their desire for better schools, what they approved the Gilmer-Kilkin bills which re-organized our school system and set higher standards, but I am pleased that the increased cost takes a little more of the total tax dollar than it did ten years ago."

"But to sum it up, Texas now has a vastly improved school system, which makes for better citizens and a more prosperous state, at a total increase in cost of only a little more than one mill, a twelfth part of every tax penny that amounts to a twelfth part of the cost of the average cigarette."

these grasses established. Some of the farmers who have planted cool-weather grasses are: L. J. Lane, Shem Cunningham, Rufus King and Orville Bullington.

The best mixtures for seeding ranges and upland pasture are: Bluestems and Sideoats gramas, or a mixture of gramas and Buffalo grass. The mixture should be sown in the early Spring or late Winter, so they can get a good start before the dry Summer months set in.

One acre of Weeping Love grass on the Pete Rogers farm, in the Cooper Community, is proving very successful. He plans to plant several more acres of Love grass in the near future.

When seeding grasses we must

remember that they need fertilizing and cultivating just the same as other crops. The present time is a good time to sod open drains, terrace outlets, and terrace outlet channels to protect them from erosion. The better grasses for this use are Buffalo grass and Bermuda grass. Bermuda grass being the easier to establish. When sodding these grasses now they should be well covered with soil to protect against freezing.

Well established, sodded terrace outlets and channels, may be seen on the farms of Arthur Peyton, O. W. Prechel, George Streit, Ed Muller, E. E. Welborne, R. W. Ramming, Jacob Roessler, and Oscar Klinkerman.

Bermuda and Buffalo grasses may be seeded, but better results are obtained from sodding.

Farm - District Cooperative Agreements of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District and Hollis Atkeison on 900 acres of land, and J. Carl Greene on 145 acres of land were approved last week in a meeting of the District Supervisors in the Chamber of Commerce office in Electra, Texas.

Applications for Soil Conservation Assistance signed by Roy M. Folsom, Charles, E. Skelton, and T. J. Pace, were also approved during the Supervisors' meeting.

Hollis Atkeison has completed a 40 acre level border irrigation system on his farm located on the Wichita Falls Kamay Road. Mr. Atkeison is planning to seed this land to perennial grasses, using a mixture of alfalfa, alta fescue, wild rye, and orchard grass.

W. B. Hamilton of Wichita Falls has completed a 42 acre level border irrigated system on his T-Bone Ranch. He is going to seed the land with perennial grasses and alfalfa for pasture.

Wymore Downing, whose farm is located on the lower Charlie Road, has begun preparing 26 acres of land for level border irrigation. He is doing the leveling with his own equipment. Mr. Downing is planning to plant this land in Madrid clover.

Roy D. Thompson, Lee Trigg, and Fred Lewis are constructing approximately one mile of new irrigation ditches on their Valley Farms, southeast of Iowa Park.

Farmers who have applied for assistance from the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District are: Lloyd Griffiths, 27 acres, on Pecan Road east of Wichita Falls; Mrs. Mae M. Mathis, 56 acres, and Elbert Lemons, 75 acres, in the Wichita Valley Farms; and Albert Wolf, 200 acres, North of Pumpkin Center.

H. C. Obenhaus has completed a 1400 foot diversion on his farm 6 miles west of Clara. This diversion was built to increase the drainage area above one of his stock ponds.

Walter Kaspar has completed a 1300 foot terrace outlet channel on his farm 3 miles West of Clara.

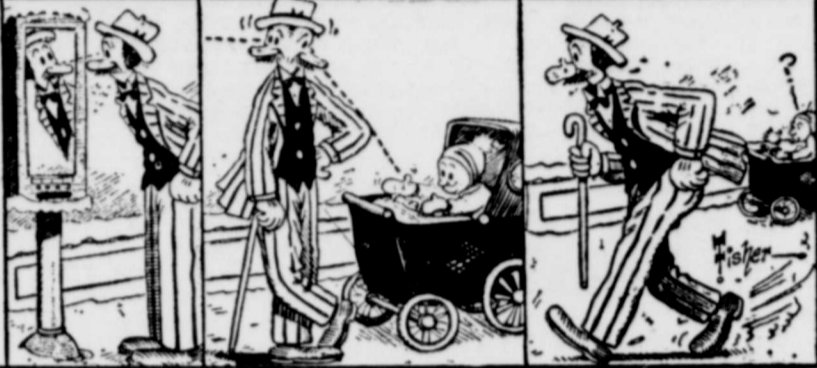

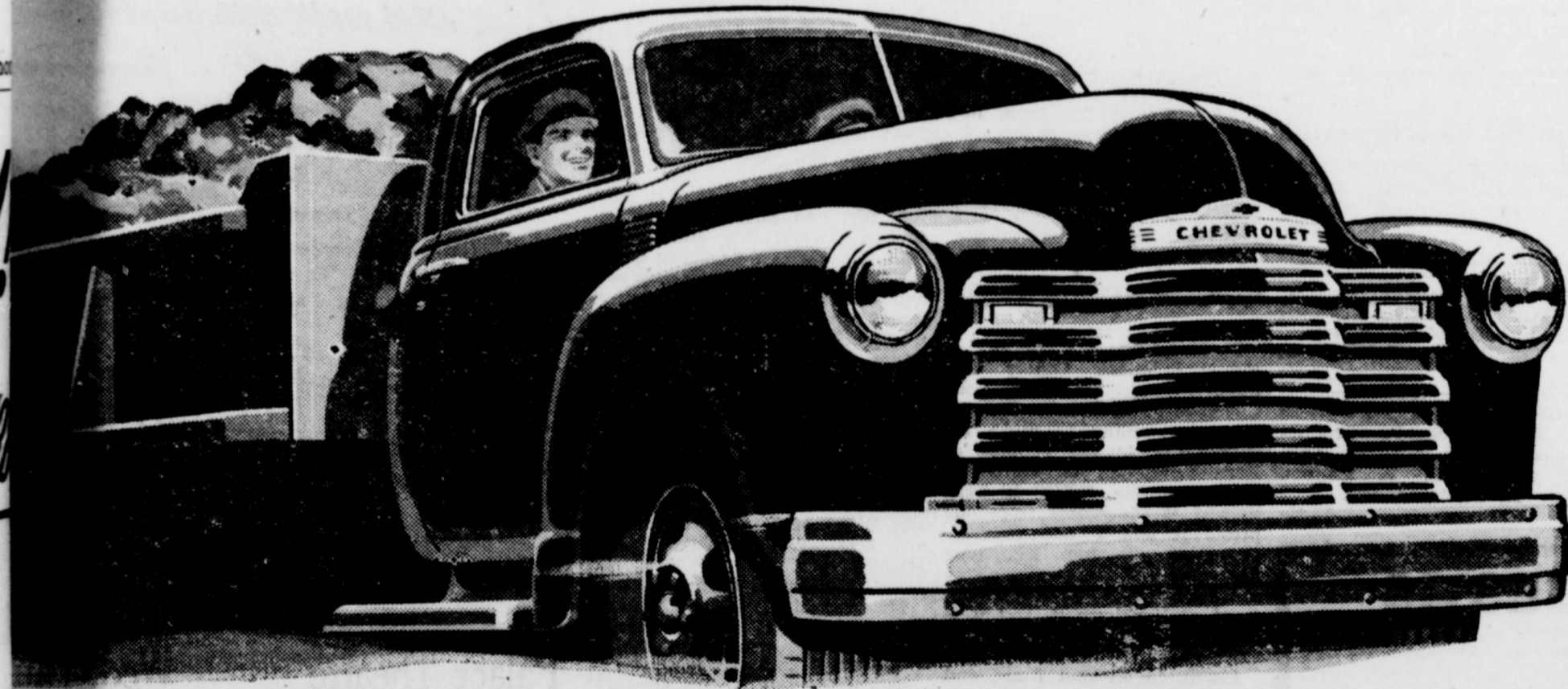
