Builders May Be Penalized On FHA Loans

Builders of homes in Burk Burnett have been warned they may be penalized on FHA loans because of low standard plumbing and electric wiring practices. The Dallas FHA office has instructed inspectors to make a very thorough inspection on homes applying for FHA loans, and if plumbing and wiring is below the minimum builders code, to penalize the applicant up to as much as 50 per cent of the amount of the loan which could be reasonably expected if the house met all code standards. In some instances the penalty may be decided thus: An estimate would be made on the cost of tearing out all defective plumbing and wiring and making the installation to meet minimum standards. This estimated cost would be deducted from the amount of the loan. Minimum FHA standards are very lenient. They are barely what any home owner would expect in a house. The critical points seem to be foundation, plumbing and wiring. One house recently inspected had nine square turns or 90 degree angles in the plumbing underneath the house. Also some of the electric wiring was touching on wood. FHA loan on this type of house would be very low, if a loan could be secured at all. Your builder does, or should know, the minimum standards accepted by FHA. See that these standards are met in order that you get the full amount of FHA expected loan.

Tax The Untaxed

A Denver Post columnist, Bruce Gustin, recently wrote on the wartime excise taxes which are still in effect. He said, "Secretary Snyder's suggestion for repeal of the 20 per cent tax on baby oils, powders, lotions is fine. Cutting the 20 per cent tax on furs, luggage, handbags, jewelry and cosmetics to 10 per cent would be a big help. So would repeal of the three per cent tax on freight charges, cutting the 25 per cent tax on long distance telephone calls to 15 per cent, and reducing the 15 per cent tax on railroad, bus and airline tickets to 10 per cent. But more relief should be given.

"Certainly the transportation tax should be repealed. . . Any punitive tax on business in peace time is abhorrent. The 15 per cent tax on local telephone service and the 20 per cent tax on theatre tickets should be repealed, also.

"Secretary Snyder also proposed that the corporation tax of 38 per cent be boosted to 42 per cent on business income in excess of \$25,000. That would be an economic crime. If revenue lost through repeal or reduction of excise taxes must be provided, the way to get it is by 'taxing the untaxed'. Take away the exemptions of giant co-ops, educational institutions and other organizations which are operating business and industrial enterprises on a tax-free basis in competition with heavily taxed private business."

The excise taxes are an unjust and unnecessary burden on every consumer, every retailer, and on workers and producers in many important fields. Reduction in percentages would be only a halfway measure—total repeal is the proper action. The sooner we get rid of them, the better off the country will be.

Should We Make An Attempt?

Since the announcement that we would develop the hydrogen bomb as a weapon of defense there has been near hysteria through the land. Whether we are the sole possessors of such knowledge, we do not know. Men may have successfully planned to destroy themselves in foreign laboratories, also. Bearing in mind the danger of such fearful equipment, there is much sentiment in favor of our country making an effort to come to an understanding with Russia on atomic bombs. Russia has not proved herself dependable or trust-worthy since the end of the war. The Soviets may seem willing to reach an agreement with us, but can we trust them as being sincere and co-operative? Some feel, here, that in building up our strength through great power, we can hold back aggression and through such power compel agreements on atomic bombs. Meanwhile Russia is spending triple what we are spending of national wealth on armament. She has 40,000 tanks to our 7,000. She is speeding up production of jet fighters and long-range bombers, has 7,000 planes including 300 heavy bombers of our B-29 type. This is a challenge to power, is a threat to civilization. For the sake of civilization, we might try a conference, not as an act of appeasement but as an attempt at peace. We haven't forgotten what happened through appeasement with Germany and Great Britain.

The Little Business

"Small business" has been a political football for years. Much has been said of protecting its interests over "big business". What size is a small business? Some feel that it is any that is not recognized as a trust. The Department of Commerce defines it as a manufacturing concern with fewer than 100 workers; a retail store, hotel, or wholesale house with annual net income of sales less than \$200,000, amusement park, construction firm and so on, where a yearly business is less than \$500,000. A member of Brookings Institute gave, in a government report, any business with less than 100 employees or sales less than \$1 million a year. Most of us here have a small business, according to the above, but the majority of us are not as interested in how they define small business as in what they do to defend it.
