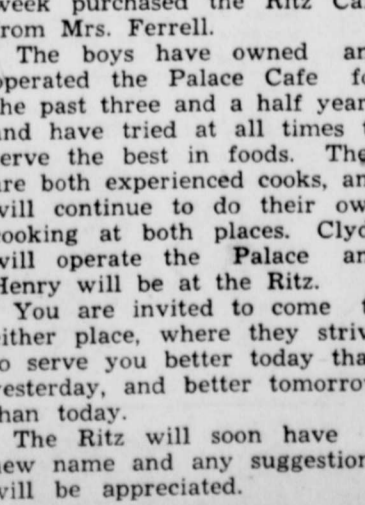

QUESTIONS OF LOYALTY

It is fair, impartial and the truth to state that the charges of disloyalty in the State Department and in other branches of the Government are very much exaggerated. You can hardly pull off a World War without being convinced that there are traitors and spies in our Government.

Undoubtedly Uncle Sam has been just the least little bit too lenient with Communists and traitors. They are part of the spawns of wars. But it is almost entirely certain that Secretary of State Acheson who has more direct control over the foreign policy of the United States than any Cabinet officer, is 100 per cent loyal and very careful not to crucify anybody whom he believes is loyal to the Government. The criticism of Acheson is that he has insisted that his friend Alger Hiss, a former State Department official, recently convicted of perjury, is not a traitor to his Government. Acheson says what he believes, and nobody thinks he would willingly defend a spy, in his own Department of the Government.

Acheson and his top assistant Hoffman are doing a good job in establishing the major test of the United States postwar foreign economic policy along lines that are likely to have the unified support of Congress and the State Department.

But the job is not a simple one. Questions of tariff, spending, money and the establishment of peace will undoubtedly remain as "unfinished" business long after the next National election in the United States.

CLEAN UP YOUR OWN YARDS

Two hundred and seventy-five cities in the United States wants the Government to clean up their slums. Whole flocks of cities across the country are pushing the Federal Government to put up the dough for the removal of filth, and development of cities that range in population from 5,000 to more than one million.

At the rate folks are going, some of these chiseling communities will be asking Congress to put poor people at work raking up backyards.

And think of this, Congressman Davis of Georgia wants Congress to start an "all-out" campaign against gambling. He asked his fellow legislators for \$40,000 to make a full inquiry. That statesman is only playing with small change. He should go to the White House and invite Mr. Truman to get into the game—with his millions.

WE'RE DOING BETTER

Quoting statistics is usually with regard to something that costs us, for a loss rather than a gain. However, the National Safety Council gives some encouraging statistics. In 1949 we set our best safety record, even though the number of dead and injured in automobile accidents was still greater than the losses and injuries of World War I. One out of every 16 persons suffered a disability injury last year. After automobile accidents come home accidents with a 3 per cent drop. Occupational accidents are third. In home accidents, falls that kill head the list, burns, drownings and firearms follow in order. We might concentrate on these and when the 1950 report is due, show marked improvement in our own record around here.

TRACE THE SOURCE

Sometimes you wonder how it started. One of the best known terms, perhaps THE best known, is O. K. There have been various theories introduced of its beginning, from the Greek, French, German, Finns, Danes and Choctaw Indians. None of the explanations have been correct, according to H. L. Mencken, who, in a past issue of the New Yorker, writes that O. K. goes back only to 1840, to Martin Van Buren when he was running for re-election. He was called "Old Kinderhook" and there was an O. K. club formed by his supporters. This made the phrase popular and it has never died, reaching into all parts of the world. We should give credit to Martin Van Buren for being O. K.

Preston Smith, Lubbock Solon Announces for Lieutenant Governor

Preston Smith, 38-year-old Lubbock business man, entered the political arena this week by announcing his candidacy for Lieutenant Governor.

Smith is a three-term veteran of the Texas House of Representatives. He was first elected in 1944 to represent District 119.

During his service in the House, Smith has been for four years a member of the appropriations committee. He has also served on the sub-committee on higher education. He is a firm believer in the application of sound business methods in the operation of the state government.

Born on a Williamson County farm, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. K. Smith, he stayed with farm life until 1931. He is the seventh child in a family of 13 and has six brothers and six sisters.

Much of his career in the House has been devoted to championing the cause of Texas' rural people. He was author of the rural hospital bill and co-author of the rural telephone bill, and also has been active in the fight for farm to market roads and soil conservation.

Smith has been a supporter of all veteran legislation.

Of his hospital plan, Smith says, "This measure will go a long way toward solving the doctor shortage in small communities. If the counties will vote bonds for hospitals and then lease them to some of the young doctors just out of college who have no financial means to build their own hospitals, the younger men will not be so inclined to go into the large towns where facilities are available."

Commenting on his race for Lieutenant Governor, Smith said, "Much of Texas' population is centered in rural areas and small communities. Unless you have lived on a farm or in one of the very small towns, of which there are many in the state, you can't realize how much is needed in the way of worthwhile legislation for the rural areas. Texas needs the services which the rural population needs better facilities for day to day living. As Lieut.

Governor, I will continue my efforts to see that this important segment of our population receives as many needed improvements as possible, along with other necessary and important legislation."

Smith also authored the bill, in the House, which would require all boards, bureaus and state agencies that spend state tax money to hold open meetings and to advise the press in writing in advance of such meetings. The measure passed the House but did not get thru the Senate.

Smith has been a Lubbock resident for 18 years. He has been in the theatre business since 1936.

His schooling includes a diploma from the Lamesa High School and a degree from Texas Technological College in Lubbock where he studied auditing and accounting.

In 1935 Smith joined forces with another Smith—Miss Irma Smith by name—who is now Mrs. Preston Smith. She also is a Texas Tech graduate, born and reared in the state. The Smiths have two children, Preston Michael, 9, and Jan Lauren, 5.

A member of the Methodist Church, Smith is also active in the Kiwanis Club and is a 32nd Degree Mason.

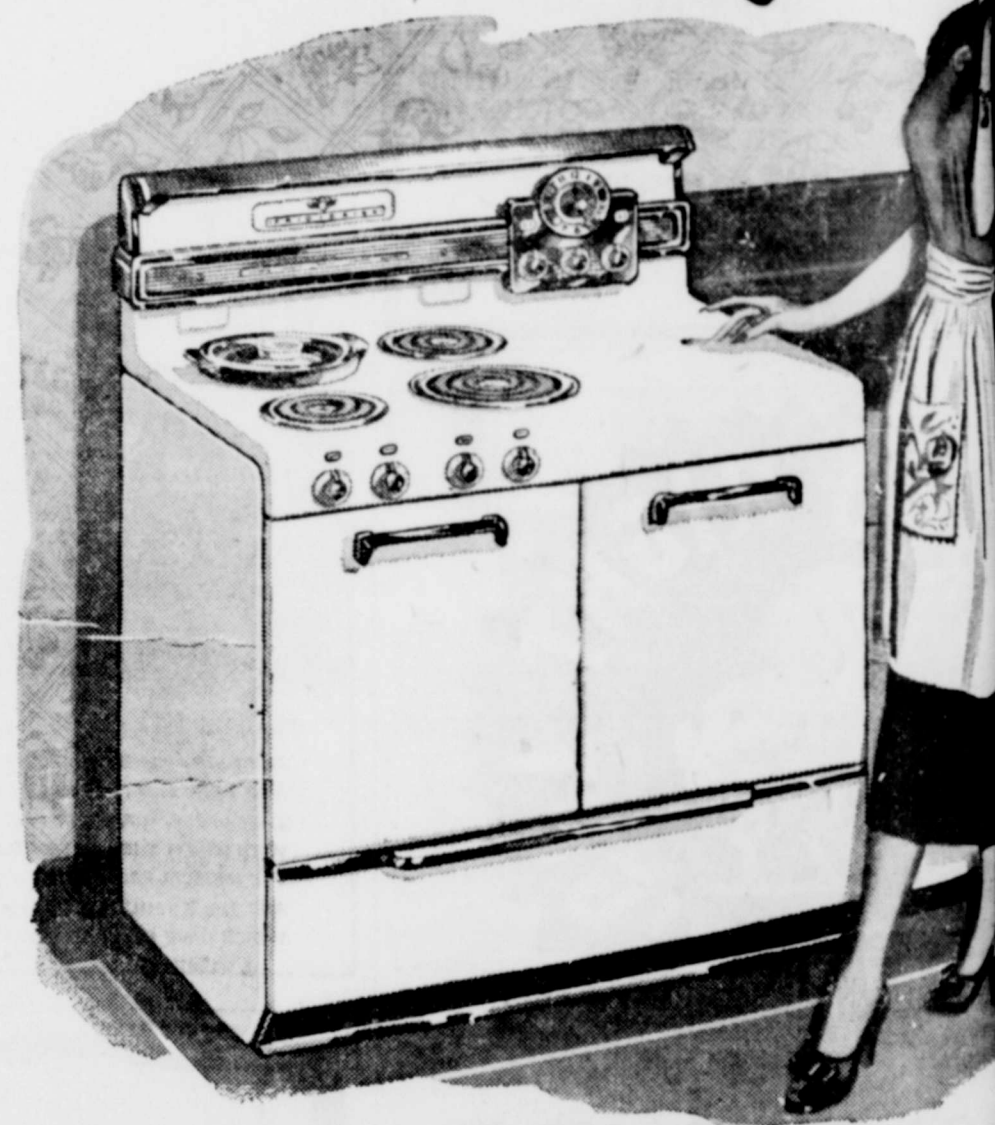

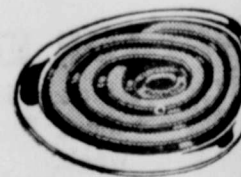
