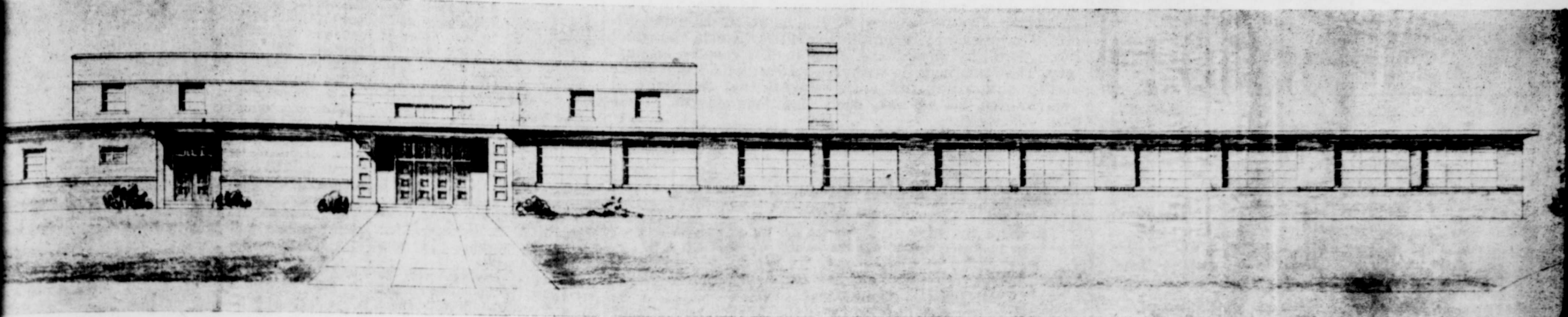

office. The class rooms are to be 22 x 30 feet in size to accommodate approximately 36 students per room. In these class rooms would be put modern equipment and the desks will be the movable type and modern lighting facilities will be put in each class room. Instead of having

lockers in the hall, each room will have individual lockers in the back.

The gymnasium will have a seating capacity of approximately 1200. The playing area of the gymnasium will be a regulation court 50 x 94 feet. In planning the gymnasium, roll-away or

push-away bleachers will be used to provide for two additional courts crosswise for P. E. classes.

Also in the gymnasium set-up a Home Economics department has been planned joining to one side of the gymnasium with a modern kitchen and living room

facilities. Also in the construction of the gymnasium both boys' and girls' locker rooms will be provided and women's lounge and toilet, men's lounge and toilet off the corridor of the entrance to the gymnasium. All of the proposed structure will be in one unit located be-

tween the grade school and the high school buildings. The class rooms and gymnasium will be constructed in such a manner that the class rooms can be closed during night activities and will not be open to the public.

The proposed cafeteria building will be constructed on the grade school property, an overall structure 77 x 54 feet, will have a dining room large enough to seat approximately 244 students with modern kitchen facilities in the building.

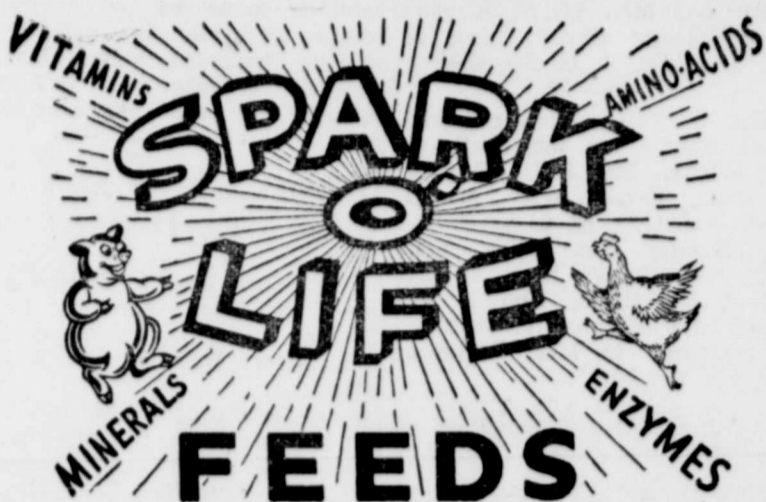

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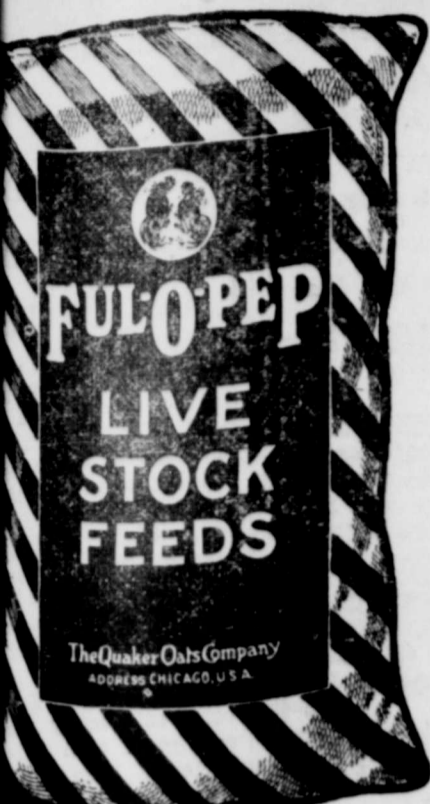

Qualifications Set Forth for Voting In Bond Election

 Dear Mr. Davis:

At the request of Mr. Leroy Jeffers of Dallas Union Trust Company, we wish to advise you as regards certain questions which we understand have been raised in connection with the qualifications of those who will vote at the school bond election to be held in your district on April 6th.

The first question, we understand, is whether a person who rendered his property last year and has not rendered it this year is qualified to vote. We answer this question in the affirmative. So long as the person has taxable property and even though he has not rendered it this year, it still is available for taxation and it would be assumed that the tax assessor would render it for him in case he did not personally do so. Also unless an earlier time is established for rendering, the property owner would have until April 30th in which to make his rendition. The fact that he has not done so before that time would not

disqualify him from voting at an election held prior to such time.

We understand the second question is whether a person who did not render his property last year but who has duly rendered it this year is eligible to vote. We answer this also in the affirmative.

We understand that the third question is with respect to the final date on which renditions may be made under the law. As above indicated, this date is April 30th unless an earlier time has been established by order of the Board.

You will understand, of course, that in answering the above we have assumed that the property owners otherwise qualify as to age, length of residence and payment of poll taxes.
