## FHA Loans Made Easier to Obtain By Appointment of City Inspector

In the past Burkburnett home builders have had difficulties and delays trying to obtain FHA loans. On houses already built, FHA appraisers found plumbing and wiring not to their satisfaction. On proposed homes, FHA complained that Burkburnett had no plumbing and electrical code, and no inspector to see that minimum codes were observed. They were only half right. Burkburnett does and did have plumbing and electrical codes on the Ordinance books, but did not have an authorized inspector.

## Almost 3 Inches Rain Fell Here Last Week End

Unofficial reports are that almost three inches of good slow rain fell on Burkburnett and this area last week end. The last previous moisture was on February 16th. Everything was dry; exceedingly dry. But the rain fell in an ideal fashion—slow and steady so that the dry earth absorbed almost every drop that fell for many hours.

Wheat, which had suffered a little from lack of moisture, was suffering more from green bugs. Some fields, or parts of fields had already been plowed up because the green bugs had destroyed great patches in some fields and in some they had mowed all of it down to the ground.

After the rain wheat literally jumped up two or three inches and headed out, seemingly overnight. Some farmers claim they will make only five bushels per acre if wheat matures without further difficulty. Others think maybe they will make up to 10 bushels per acre. However, we believe all farmers will harvest much more wheat per acre than they suspect.

## O. B. Reynolds Dies At The Wheel Of His Automobile

O. B. Reynolds, 48, died Tuesday morning, apparently of a heart attack, while driving an automobile from his home to Wichita Falls. His car veered from the pavement, struck a tree and crashed into a parked automobile owned by M. F. Peters of Burkburnett.

Reynolds, manager of the Reynolds Chevrolet Company here, formerly was employed as a salesman for the Fox-Randel Motor Corporation in Wichita Falls. He lived at 1712 Lucille in Wichita Falls prior to moving to Burkburnett about a year ago.

Highway Patrolman John L. Croft, who assisted in the investigation, said the accident occurred about 7 o'clock. The 1949 Chevrolet sedan which the victim was driving ran off the pavement about two miles south of Burkburnett, scraped a small tree, plowed through the yard at Ken Elderton's home, knocked down a fence at Peters' home, struck Peters' 1948 Kaiser sedan and finally stopped against a large mesquite tree.

Rolled 684 Feet  
Croft said the car rolled 684 feet from the time it left the pavement until it came to rest against the tree.

Albert J. Lloyd of Sheppard Air Force Base said Reynolds passed him shortly before his car left the highway. Lloyd said Reynolds' head seemed to have been bowed as his car passed. Riding in the vehicle with Lloyd were two other Sheppard airmen, Herman H. Knight and a man identified as Private Sinclair.

Elderton, owner of the first home almost struck by the car, also is an employee of Acme Chevrolet Company.

## A SPLENDID OPPORTUNITY

A reminder to ex-G.I.s comes from the Veterans' Administration, that the veterans educational and training program runs out on July 25, 1951. The only exception to this deadline is for the veterans discharged after July 25, 1947, and the veterans who enlisted or re-enlisted under the armed forces voluntary recruitment act.

The GI Bill requires veterans to start their training by July 25, 1951, or four years after discharge from service, whichever time is later—five years is the maximum schooling available under the program.

There has never been in our history, anything to equal this GI Bill of Rights. Those who are eligible and have not taken advantage of the opportunity it offers, should think it over. The final date seems a long time off, but if the V. A. feels it necessary to warn now, we believe it important enough to remind young men through the Star columns.

## MAN'S RETREAT

Civilization persists through the years in adhering to its books. Catastrophes and holocausts, depressions and prosperity, plus all the facets of living, pass into history, but the love of books stays on. The trend in reading does change however, with environment, current events, weather, reflecting on our choice. There is a range with historical fiction, psychological problems, war plots, international intrigue, and non-fiction covering a wide field of thought. Behind the contemporary writers are the old standbys of yesterday, the classics, the volumes of the sacred, the ever-popular novels of

decades ago. However, the best-seller list of any generation includes works of spiritual content. When a world is at peace, man perhaps does not feel as great a need of literature of a spiritual cast. But when man is seized with hopelessness, when the future outlook is foreboding, when the present is not promising, restful thought and comfort for the soul comes from reading spiritual works.

This is a truth that the ages have not changed, nor would any of us deny it worth.

## NOT ANOTHER DUST BOWL

For 13 years the wheat farmers of the Southwest have had fair crops and good weather. This year they anticipated a bumper crop but due to ravages of drought, dust storms and insects, the crop shrinks. Rain is still sorely needed, especially in the old dust bowl area. Already some 10 million acres of winter wheat are deteriorating. In Oklahoma alone, a million acres of wheat is reported lost. Drought brings insects and windstorms. The dry top soil is whirled away to make dust clouds that reached as high as 10,000 feet.

Remember the "black blizzards" of the 1930s. They have not returned but those economists who worry over a wheat surplus, won't need to do so if this section has any example of the remainder of the wheat belt.

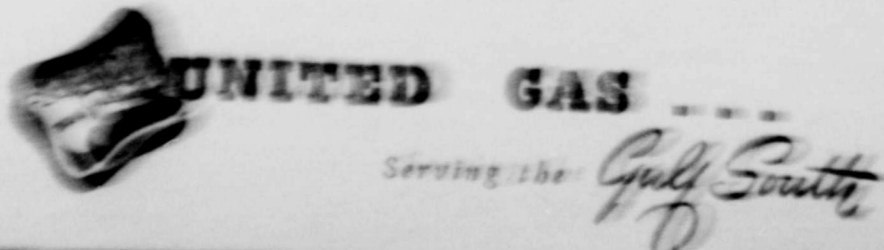

#### CHICK CHATS

By Clark Gresham  
**MANAGE RANGE FLOCK CAREFULLY**  
Since birds usually go on range when they are six weeks of age, or as soon thereafter as weather permits, it is advisable for the poultry raiser to prepare for certain difficulties that may arise. By this is meant—the elimination of obstacles that may hinder the growth and general health of chickens while they are on range.  
The range period is an important stage in the chicken's growth. It is during these months that birds are expected to build up body strength and develop into sturdy, ready-to-lay pullets. They should come off the range as well-feathered birds in the best of condition, capable of holding up under the strain of high egg production.  
**Anticipate Difficulties**  
But to realize such a flock, the poultryman must anticipate certain problems. For example, he should take precautions to prevent lice, worms, unfavorable weather conditions, diseases, and various other irregu-

larities. By overcoming such difficulties the poultry raiser can practically assure himself of a healthy flock of laying birds for fall housing. Here are some of the things a poultryman can do to keep his flock in good health:  
Grass is food, and a good range will provide up to 10 per cent or 15 per cent of the birds' food requirements. Some of the better range crops are clover, alfalfa, perennial rye grass, timothy, and ladine clover. Mow the range frequently to keep grass cut short at all times.  
Provide plenty of shade. If there are no trees, shade can be created by planting a few rows of corn or sunflowers. Shelters are another good source of shade.  
**Move Hoppers Daily**  
Move the hoppers every day to avoid contamination of the soil. Do the same with waterers. Both feeders and waterers should be cleaned and disinfected regularly.  
Examine a few birds periodically for lice, and, when needed, get a good delouser from your local dealer. In case of mite or tick infestations, there are commercial preparations which may be sprayed on the roosts and other surfaces to control these parasites.  
Should worms become a problem, consult a poultry specialist on the best type of treatment to use.

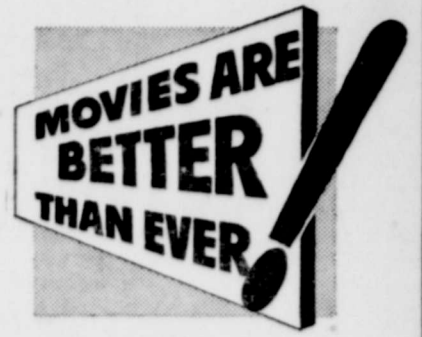

Washington  
News Letter

(By Congressman Ed Gossett)

The House gets back to serious work on the 18th, following a so-called Easter recess. On my motion, the House Judiciary Committee has agreed to vote on the so-called Tidelands bill on Thursday, April 20. It has been my duty, as well as my privilege, to serve on the Judiciary Committee as spokesman for the States in this matter. The bill is long and complicated. It probably will not be passed by both Houses of Congress during this session. We will have to do the work all over again in the next session of Congress, for regardless of what the Supreme Court may decide Congress must eventually settle by legislation the tidelands controversy.

Many of us are happy that Harry Bridges, the notorious red labor leader of the West Coast has been convicted of perjury growing out of his naturalization proceedings of some years ago. There seems little doubt that Harry Bridges has long been a communist. Certainly he has been of much help to the cause of communism. During my first session in Congress I voted for a bill to deport the said Harry Bridges. Had we got rid of him at that time we would have avoided a great deal of trouble including the recent serious shipping strikes in the Hawaiian Islands. Harry Bridges came originally from Australia. Rumor now has it that even if he is de-naturalized and ordered deported Australia will not accept him back. We have been unable to deport a number of bad characters because the countries from which they came would not allow them to return. It seems to me that our State Department should be able to compel these countries to accept the return of these people. There are many ways in which we could bring enough pressure on them to compel their accepting the return of such individuals.

For the first time, in this session of Congress we are trying to pass a "one package" appropriations bill. That means that all of the major appropriations are included in one bill instead of in ten different bills as has been the practice. The bill now before the House for a vote carries the appropriations under the following heads, or chapters:

District of Columbia  
Legislative Branch  
State, Justice, Commerce and the Judiciary  
Treasury - Post Office  
Labor - Federal Security  
Agriculture Department  
Interior Department  
Independent Offices  
Civil Functions (Rivers, Harbors, and Flood Control by the Corps of Engineers)  
Defense Establishment (Army, Navy, Air Force)

The biggest items in this bill are 13 billions for the defense establishments and six billions for the Veterans Administration. The approximately 19 billions recommended for the defense establishment and the Veterans Administration is approximately 2-3 of the total amount carried in the bill.

There has been considerable eyebrow-lifting hereabouts over the recently published fact that England is currently operating on a balanced budget. In fact, the British not only have balanced their books but show a surplus of something over 100 million dollars. On the other hand, we will operate this current fiscal year with a deficit of 5 or 6 billion dollars. At least 1 billion of this deficit went to the British.

Two Republican members of Congress have hit upon a unique way of publicizing and protesting our deficit financing. These members, Cole and Kilburn, both of New York, sign all of their letters in red ink. We get numerous letters urging us to support the Hoover Commission Report. While I enthusiastically supported the creation of the said Hoover Commission hoping its recommendations would result in a greater economy and efficiency in government, I now find that a good
