Building Boom Just Around Corner?

In the first three months of the year, 270,000 home units were started. This is 59 per cent above the 169,800 units on which construction was begun in the same period year of 1949, the previous record year in home-building.

So builders are well on their way to exceeding the annual record set in 1949, when 1,025,100 dwellings were started.

Housing starts spurted in March in practically every section of the country. A survey by the Federal Reserve Board shows that one million people "definitely" plan to buy new homes this year.

Builders are also stepping up construction of apartments, most of which are occupied on a rental basis.

Potatoes As A Political Problem

The Senate has received "top-political orders" that white potatoes must be protected by the payment of Government subsidies. President Truman leads the band in favor of potato subsidies. In case Congress does not approve a new system of potato controls that are acceptable to farmers all Government price props on potatoes will end with this year's crop.

It is a matter of general interest to learn that the potato price props have cost nearly half a billion dollars since the war.

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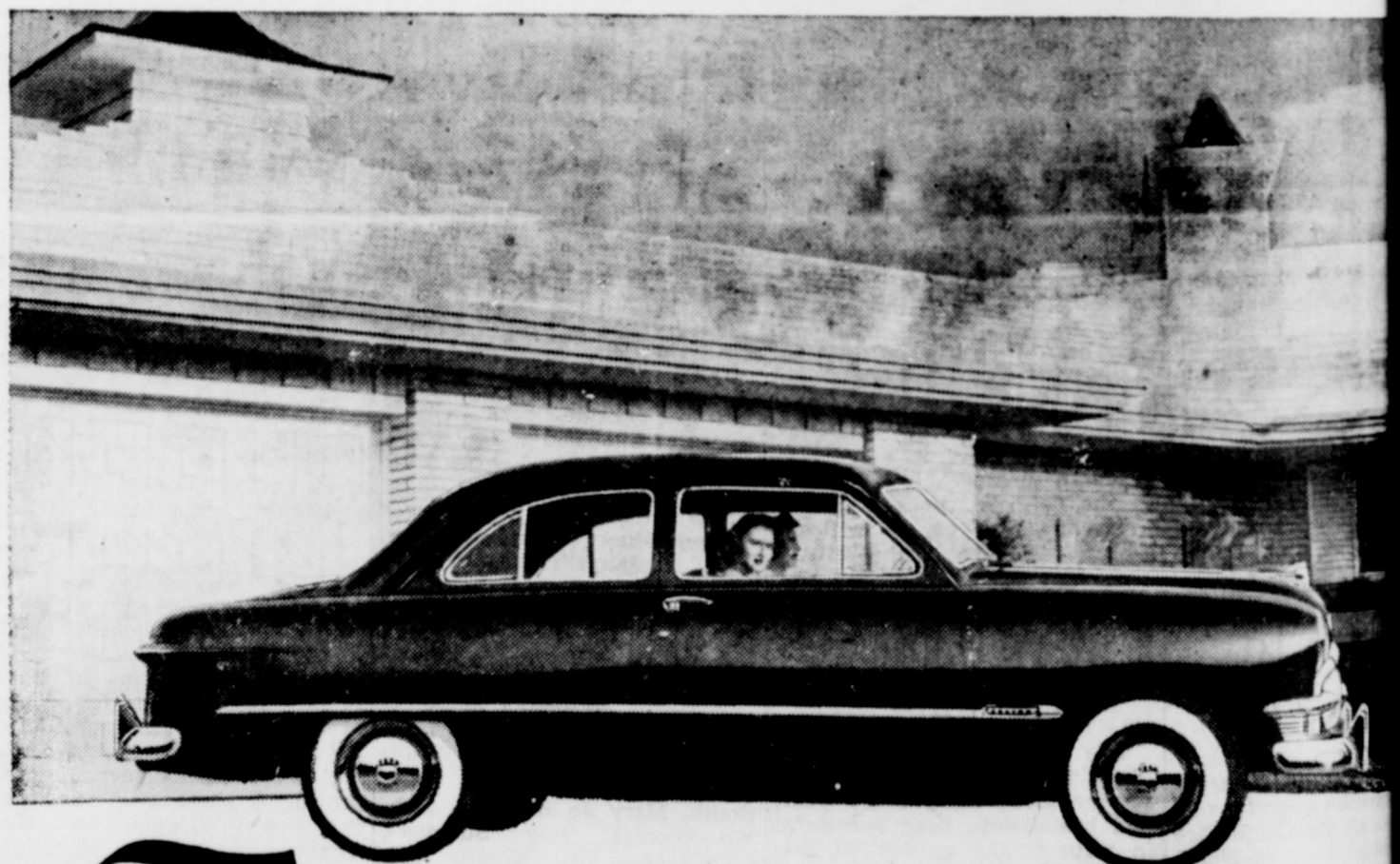

CHICK CHATS

By Clark Gresham

RAISE PULLETS THE RIGHT WAY

Rate of growth, or physical development, of growing pullets is governed to a great extent by the care and management given to the birds. Management details during the first three months are particularly important, since it is during this period that chickens get off to a good—or a bad—start. A good start largely determines the degree of physical development.

Management duties are numerous, but the successful poultryman sees to it that no details are overlooked. On the other hand, he is alert for shortcuts in poultry raising, pointers that will make his job easier and his birds more profitable. Some practical methods highly recommended for raising growing pullets are included here.

Early Roosting
Before chickens are a month old it is advisable to train them how to roost. Place one or two poles across the back part of the brooder house or pen, and one or two feet from the floor. Such an arrangement makes it easier for the chickens to jump up on the poles and keeps them from crowding into the corners. Early roosting spreads birds out so that they have extra breathing room and more space to move around in. As a result, birds grow better.

During warm weather, clean sand, shavings, peat moss, or straw make the best covering for the brooder house. Unless it gets extremely dirty or wet, it is unnecessary to clean such a building more than several times a season.

To prevent possible infestation from red mites—and other poultry pests—the perches should be painted with a good roost application.

Space Between Houses
Sometimes, when more than one colony house is in use, too many pullets will roost in one house. To prevent this happening the buildings should be placed at least 100 feet apart. This helps keep the birds evenly distributed. It is not advisable to house more than 125 growing pullets in a colony house or range shelter. And always maintain good ventilation because hot nights make it even more important for birds to have fresh air.

It is usually desirable to move range shelters several times during the season. This is necessary because many times accumulations of droppings make the area unsanitary, or wide areas of grass around the shelter are destroyed. The droppings should be cleaned up after the shelter is removed.

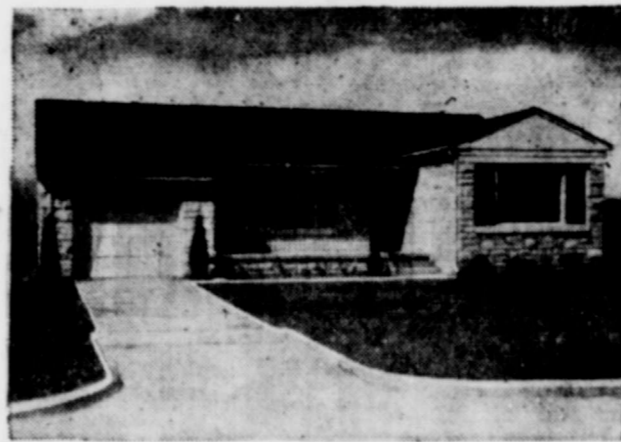

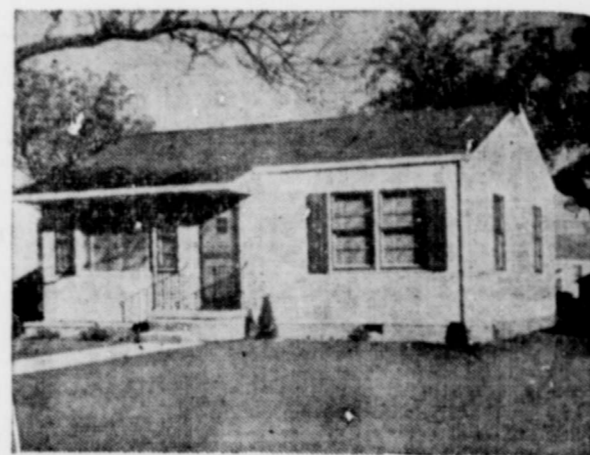
