Funds are still urgently needed by the Wichita County Red Cross Chapter in order that the blood bank at Wichita Falls may remain in operation. The amount needed is still some \$5,800. Burkburnett is still behind with her quota, as is Wichita Falls.

Some wonder why the bank must be closed if the money is not raised to the full amount set aside for Wichita County. The County Chapter has certain obligations, such as taking care of Soldier family needs, etc., which it must meet first, and then if funds are still available blood bank, and other undertakings may be sponsored. The doctors of the County have underwritten the amount needed for the blood bank, but they, like a great many other citizens had previously made their contributions to the Red Cross, and they rightly expect some help on the blood bank.

No Charge for Blood
Contrary to the belief of some people, the Wichita County Blood Bank has never charged one penny for any blood that came from that place. Those receiving the blood, or their friends or relatives are expected to replace all blood used, but in the event it is not replaced, no charge is made against them.

If Wichita County lost its blood bank, people needing blood would find that the commercial charge runs from \$40.00 to \$80.00 per pint. Another big reason for keeping the bank is the availability of blood when it is needed. No request for blood in the past has been turned down. Sometimes the supply was very low of certain types, but always, the bank was able to furnish blood immediately. If the plasma was not available many lives may be lost because of the delay in securing donors. According to doctors, patients needing blood badly cannot wait as much as an hour.

If you haven't made a Red Cross contribution, do so now. The need is urgent. Your life or that of a very dear one may be lost if the blood bank goes.

There is a possibility that next year the blood bank may be made a regional center. In that event, most of the operating expense would be borne by the National Red Cross organization. But until that time, the expense must be met by Wichita County people.

The paper also stated that Tollie H. McKown and Hugh Frank Brown, have accepted contracts as head coach and assistant football coach respectively, at Beeville. Both Brown and McKown are former Burkburnett residents and members of the Regional Foot Ball team from Burkburnett High.

Brown is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Delmar Brown of Burkburnett. He received his B. S. degree from East Texas State Teachers College where he played at a line position with that team. His work at Falfurrias the past season was outstanding.

This would be an economic blow and a sentimental loss. Those who are blessed with oak trees, should take every means possible to protect them.

SOMETHING IS WRONG

When high school students stage a riot such as happened in New York, in protest over failure to raise teachers' salaries, something is wrong. When high school teachers didn't get the amount of an increase they demanded, teachers, through their unions, refused to oversee after-school activities, such as dances, sports events. WHO SAID FREE DELIVERY!

A bookkeeper of the Post Office Department, with no political strings to tie him in knots, might reveal a lot of expensive habits of the Department, that would go far to reduce the deficit. Franked matter is one big item. The Department says we have to cut the deficit by increased postal rates, fewer postal workers, one delivery a day, windows closing at noon, etc. We don't like being inconvenienced if the need is unnecessary and ill-advised. We hunt for waste and for why. That little three-cent stamp on our letter is a small cost for delivering it, perhaps thousands of miles. But the incoming mail that gathers on the desk includes stacks of letters without stamps—franked mail. It comes from government services, from representatives of government, and much of it is never opened. Ask a small town postmaster how much of the mail is franked and he will surprise you. Not that we think the government should pay postage on its own mail, but we do think that tons of it that flood the mails every year, could be eliminated. That three-cent stamp you put on your letter goes to pay for this free delivery. Brochures, pamphlets, cards, questionnaires, letters and booklets, pour into the postoffice, sent through the government's franking privilege.

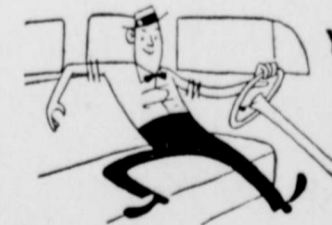

Warn against waste of natural resources, preach for conservation, and your warning and sermon are soon forgotten. But, read this story, being circulated widely, you might carry your point. A farm journal, the Farmer-Stockman, printed a picture of a deserted farm and gullied field, offering a \$25.00 prize for the 100-word description. Here is the winning entry, quoted by Outdoor American:

"Picture show white man crazy. Cut down trees. Big tepee. Plow Hill. Water wash. Wind blow soil gone. Door gone. Window gone. Whole place gone. Squaw, too. Papoose gone. No chuck-away. Pigs. No corn. No plow. No hay. No pony. Indian no plow land. Keep grass. Buffalo eat grass. Indian eat buffalo. Hide make tepee. Make moccasin. No make terrace. No build dam. No give a damn. No hunt job. No hitch hike. No ask relief. No shoot pig. Great Spirit make grass. Indian no waste thing. Indian no work. White man he loco."

Gone But Not Forgotten

Steel and cement have replaced many a landmark country's growth, traditional and historical memory of yesteryear. One of these disappearing, as old-fashioned, is the old covered bridge. The covered bridge used to be an American invention to prevent oxen and horses from being frightened when crossing water, a crossing to protect the timber, but China covered bridges that are 2,000 years old.

The covered bridge, in this country, was first financed by individuals and tolls and then communities over the maintenance costs and crossing became toll-free. On the walls of the old covered bridges were posters to attract a boy in crossing on his way to school. There were ads that told of circuses, fairs and auctions, liniments and liver pills, of tonics and chewing tobacco. Most of the covered bridges have passed into oblivion, we now and then are reminded of them through photographs, paintings and the few that are still remaining in some sections of the country. So goes the old new, the picturesque crossings of a less speedy world of horse and rig for steel girders and concrete to carry the traffic of heavy trucks and fast moving passenger cars.

Ramsey An'ounces Fot Lt. Governor

Ben Ramsey of San Augustine, who has a long record of service in both houses of the Legislature, today formally announced his candidacy for lieutenant governor of Texas.

The late East Texan resigned this spring as secretary of state in order to prepare to make the state race. He was appointed secretary of state in January, 1949, by the late Governor Beauford Jester and continued to serve under Governor Allan Shivers when he took office.

Ramsey began his political career in 1930 when he was elected to the House from San Augustine County. He served in the House for four years and in 1940 was elected to the Texas Senate, where he served eight years.

The East Texas Senator has always been held in high regard by his fellow members of the Legislature, regardless of differences in voting, and the Senate demonstrated this in 1947 by electing him President Pro-Tempore of the Senate.

Ramsey, born and reared in San Augustine County, has been a leader in the advancement of rural electrification in the state. For the past ten years he has been attorney for the Deep East Texas Electric Co-operative, and during this time this pioneering rural utility has grown into one of the largest and most financially sound in Texas.

Ramsey said he is running for lieutenant governor because he is convinced that the thinking people of Texas must take a more active interest in their

state government, to solve their own problems in their own way. Ramsey has been a consistent supporter of improving educational opportunities in Texas, and the farm-to-market road improvement program.

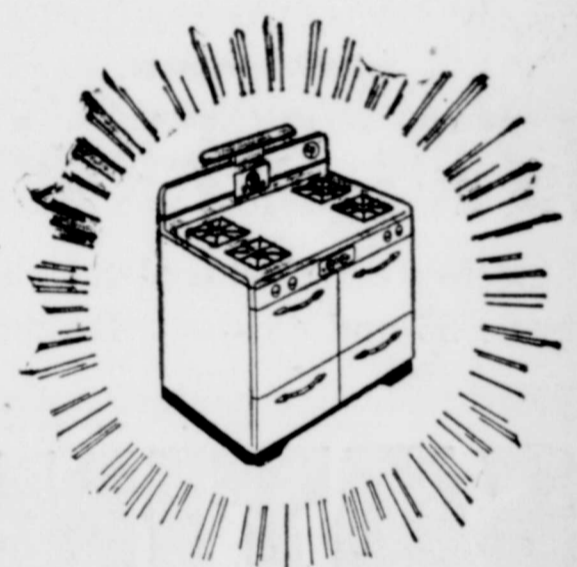

Grow Your Birds On Clean Ground

Do your chickens run on clean ground? Is your young stock separated from older birds? Perhaps you can truthfully answer "yes" to these questions. If so, you have included two essentials of successful disease control in your poultry-raising program.

But, on the other hand, if you have not provided clean ground for your birds, and have not separated young birds from the older ones—you are increasing the chances of disease striking your flock. And here's why.

Soil Contamination

Many common poultry diseases and parasites, such as coccidiosis, leucosis and worms, may be spread over the yards by droppings from birds. When the same ground is used regularly for several years, great numbers of germs and worm eggs accumulate in the soil. And since germs live from one season to the next in the soil, it is quite likely that birds will become infected.

To have clean ground each year, a land rotation system should be practiced. The ideal plan is to have three ranges. Each range can then be used once every three years. An acre of land should be allowed for each 600 growing chickens. This should give the birds plenty of green food during the entire growing season.

Clean ground is not the complete answer for disease control, but poultrymen know that birds started in a clean house on clean ground do much better than chickens raised under other conditions.

Separate Birds

The danger involved in mixing young birds with old ones has been definitely proved. Old birds harbor disease organisms and often are the principal

cause for diseases transmitted to young birds.

To cut down the spread of disease from old to young stock, the following prevention precautions should be observed:

1. Never allow old and young stock to mix or even use separate parts of the same building.
2. Dispose of the droppings and litter frequently.
3. Have caretakers change boots, rubbers, or shoes, before going from old stock to young stock.
4. Never use equipment (such as crates, implements, feeders) of the old stock in the pens of young birds.
5. Burn all carcasses of dead birds or dump them in a disposal pit.

The Woffords served light refreshments to the girls, Peggy Terry, Paula Stevenson, and Patsy Austin.

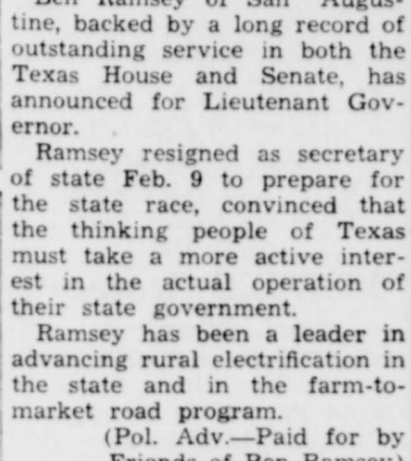
Birthday Dinner

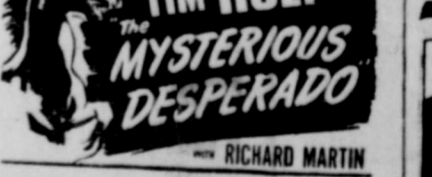
