Holman Formal Announcement For Commissioner



In announcing for re-election as your County Commissioner of Precinct No. 2, I first want to express my deepest appreciation to my friends and voters for the privilege of serving you the past years as your Commissioner; for the honor and the confidence you have manifested in me; your hearty cooperation given me in the discharge of my duties.

The time has come for you to choose your Commissioner for the next two years. I submit to you my application for re-election on my past record of service rendered. I have built 33 concrete bridges; approximately 50 miles of black top (asphalt) roads. There is not a wooden bridge in the precinct on the main roads; some few side culverts have served right-of-way for Highway 277 from Red River bridge to the North Sheppard Field gate. I helped to secure the widening of East Third Street, Avenue D and West Third Street to 48 feet. I have the rock in the yard to black top six miles of road this year. We are working to the point of black topping all mail route and school bus roads as fast as possible. We work on the budget plan and our yearly increase allows us to construct about six miles of road per year.

As of April 1, 1950 Precinct 2 Road and Bridge Fund has a cash balance of \$61,592.39.

We have secured two Farm-to-Market Roads in this precinct; No. 1180 eight and one-half miles and No. 369, eight miles.

Again I want to thank the voters and county employees for their help and support in helping me to perform my duties.

In conclusion, if you want a continued and efficient administration and approve my past record of service as your Commissioner, I will be deeply grateful. I cannot see every one in person and I take this means of asking you for your support.

GET LAYING HOUSES READY

It won't be long before those early hatched pullets will be ready for the laying house, because if you don't house pullets before they are five months old, they often start laying on the range. That's why you should be getting your laying house into shape. If you plan to repair, remodel, or even build a new laying house this summer, now is the time to get started.

Consideration and planning are essential to the proper construction of a poultry house. Hastily put together houses, with little or no thought given to location, size, shape, or weather proofing, frequently result in very unsatisfactory quarters for birds.

Prevent Dampness

One of the most common faults of a laying house is dampness. Usually, damp poultry houses can be remedied with the addition of proper insulation and an adequate ventilating system. If your laying house is often laden with moisture, check the insulation. Fill side walls with dry material that will not redily con-

duct heat and cold. Also, insulate the ceiling and floors. Insulating concrete floors may prove helpful in making your laying house dryer and healthier.

When you install a ventilating system make sure proper adjustments are made to bring fresh air in and carry foul air out. Your pullets will need plenty of fresh, healthy air.

Make House Roomy

Above all, provide your layers plenty of space. Don't overcrowd the poultry house. Allow from 300 to 400 square feet of floor space per 100 birds, and a minimum of 32 feet of hopper space for the same number of birds. And furnish at least one nest for every five layers.

Also watch the amount of window space placed in the house. Permit just enough to provide light in the main parts of the building, because excessive window space results in overheating in summer and loss of heat in winter.

For convenience, it is advisable to build shelves inside the house for restoring medicines, small pieces of equipment, and egg mash. And remember to make doors wide enough to permit entrance with large equipment. These factors save time and labor and help you raise poultry efficiently — not haphazardly.

Pierce Brooks For Lieut. Governor Opposes New Taxes



Pierce Brooks, Dallas business man, has opened his campaign for Lieutenant Governor with a declaration that he is opposed to any new taxes until the State's financial affairs are put on a sound and sensible business basis and waste and extravagance are eliminated from the operations of the State government.

Brooks declared in his opening campaign that the State is facing the worst financial crisis in its history.

"It is overspending its prospective income at the rate of \$6,000,000 per month," he said, "and reports from Austin say that in addition to the \$500,000,000 the State is spending this year an additional \$150,000,000 in new tax money will be needed next year."

The Dallas business man candidate pointed out that the cost of the State government has increased more than 500 per cent since 1935, while the cost of the Federal government, aside from the cost of World War II, did not increase that much.

Brooks said that only by the election of a business man to the Lieutenant Governorship can the people of Texas be assured of a direct and vigorous attack on the runaway cost of government, "and that man," Brooks continued, "must be completely free from entangling alliances, political obligations, cliques, clans and groups which grew up when men stay in office too long."

Turning to old age pensions Brooks said:

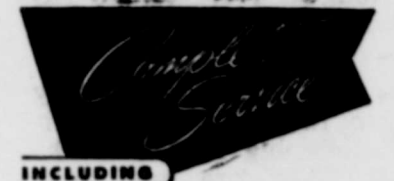
"I want to find out why the State is short-changing the old folks, cutting old age pension checks while thousands of state owned automobiles are burning up half a million dollars worth of gasoline, oil and tires on vacation trips, hunting and fishing trips, and shopping tours."

Brooks has served as president of the Texas Safety Council since it was organized in 1933. He is now serving his second term as chairman of the Board of Stewards of the Tyler Street Methodist Church in Oak Cliff. He has devoted much time to civic affairs. He once went 12 years without missing Sunday School. Under his lay leadership the Tyler Street Methodist church has just completed an extensive program.

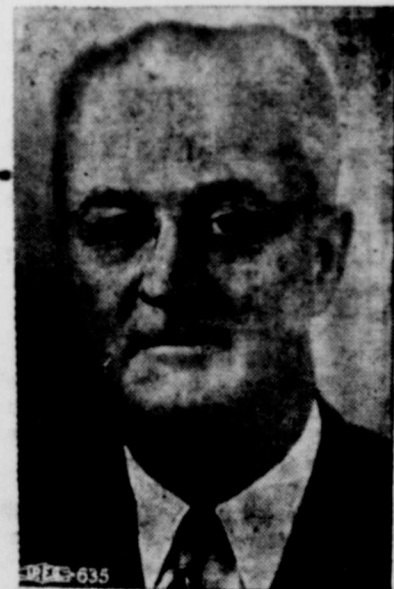

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

Snapshot around the Picnic Fire

OF COURSE, you always snap pictures when you go on daytime picnics—the situation couldn't be better for casually snapping your family and friends.

But what about those evening picnics, when people gather around an open fire to roast wieners, marshmallows, or broil steak? If you leave your camera at home, you are missing a wonderful opportunity to get pictures of your friends that are really different. You have all the elements for real drama in these shots—the dark background, soft shadows, dimly lit faces, and, of course, the fire itself.

Flash photography is your medium for pictures around the fire. If your camera is synchronized for flash, you will use the flash attachment and shoot your pictures just as you would on a sunny day outdoors. If you own a camera that is not synchronized for flash, you can use a hand flasher. These are very easy to operate. If you use the hand flasher, all you do is put your camera on a tripod, log, or some other solid support, open the shutter for a time exposure, set off the flash, and close the shutter. Or perhaps you can persuade a friend

to set off the hand flasher for you. Your pictures will be most effective if the light from the fire falls on your subjects at the same angle as the light from the flash bulb, so that faces will appear to be illuminated by the fire alone. In this type of picture taking, you will find that composition presents no problem at all. Not only does the fire provide a strong center of interest, but also there will be no distracting background to worry about.

Since you will be composing your shot in semi-darkness, it is a good idea to have someone at each end of the group hold a match or flashlight. This way you can be sure that everyone is included. Exposure will be based on the standard lamp-to-subject distance of regular flash photography. However, to insure a nighttime, firelight effect, you simply drop a handkerchief over the flash holder. This will soften the light somewhat, so that again the fire itself will provide most of the illumination in the final print.

Next time you are on a picnic, try some of these firelight snapshots. They are easy to make and add real punch to your picture collection.

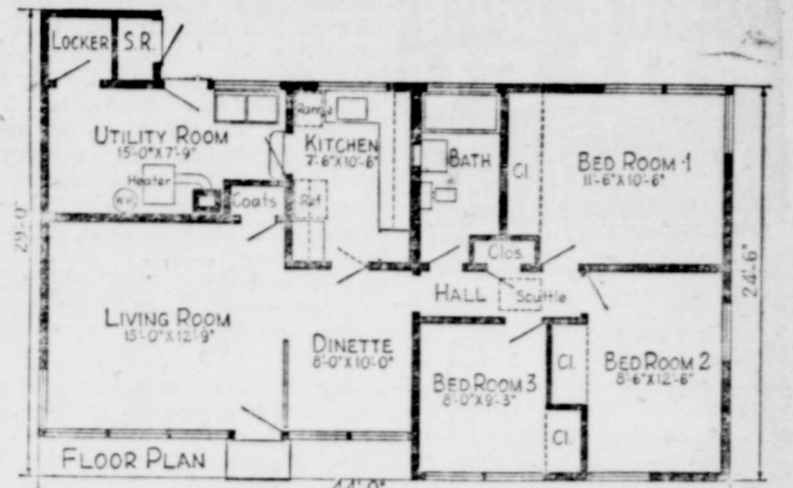
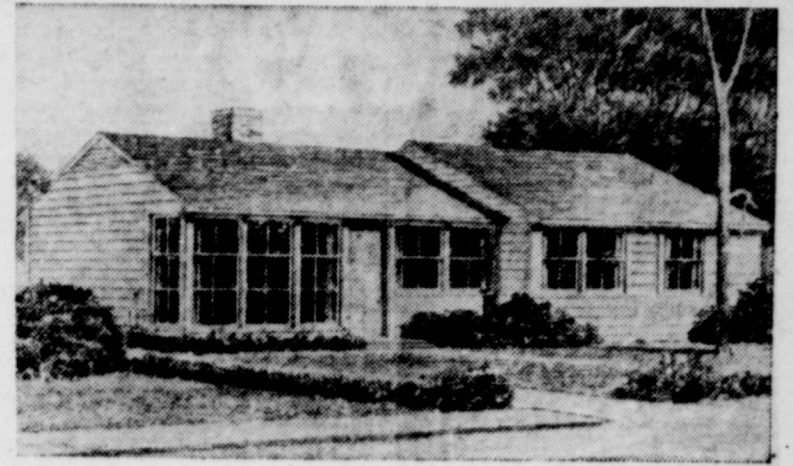

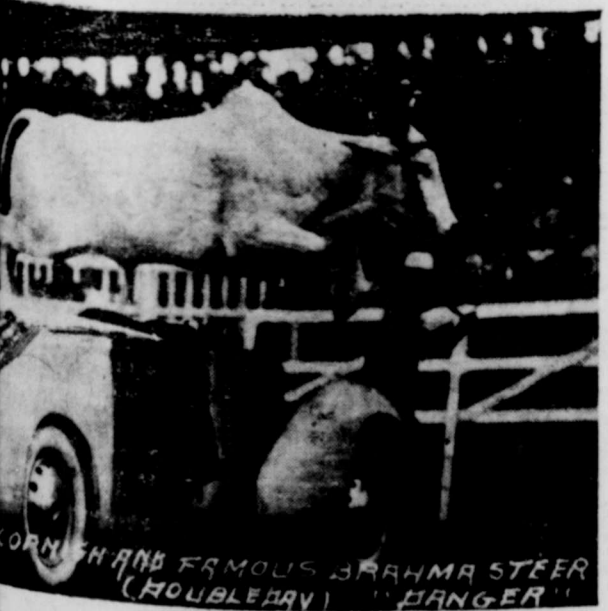

Flush Door Like Desk Top; All Wood Finishes Suitable

To understand what a "flush door" is, think of a desk top. Besides size and shape, the only difference in appearance is that both sides of a flush door are faced with attractively grained hardwood veneers.

Flush doors, like most desk tops, are made of hardwood plywood. Doors of this kind are being used in homes to a steadily increasing extent.

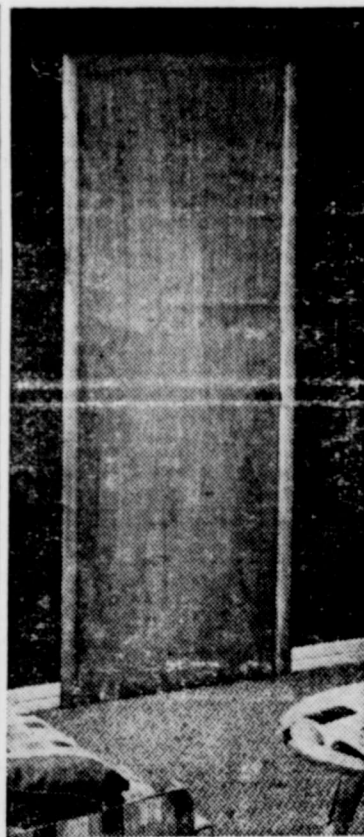
The intrinsic beauty of wood veneer is one reason flush doors are so well-liked. For maximum smoothness, flush doors are bel-sanded at the factory. This enables the home-owner to select any method of wood finishing—wax, lacquer, stain and varnish, shellac or paint.

Flush doors resist sagging, warping and buckling. Plywood gains these qualities from its cross-grain construction, in which the grain of one layer of wood runs at right angles to the grain of adjacent layers.

Some flush doors have solid cores and some are the hollow-core type. Hollow-core doors are as much as 40 percent lighter than standard panel doors, which have recessed surfaces instead of being entirely flat and smooth.

Despite its name, a hollow-core door is not completely hollow. Interior construction often consists of many small compartments, permitting the door to be light in weight without any sacrifice of strength or durability.

Flush doors are easy to clean. There are no dirt-catching moldings as there are in panel doors. Wood veneers of handsome grain and texture are needed only for the surfaces of a flush door.



Flush door attractively faced with wood veneer fits charmingly into decorative scheme of living room.

Because interior sections can be made of less attractive but equally durable woods, manufacturing costs are kept low. Flush doors are in the same price range as panel doors of comparable quality.

Answers to four questions in a letter to him in this week's Star clearly on "fair and equitable" assistance system in



dependent blind? My answer is yes. "Your second question is, 'Will you or will you not do all you can to have a constitutional amendment submitted to the people to be voted on at the earliest possible time?' My answer is, I will.

"Your third question is, 'Will you or will you not, if ceiling is removed, support a law raising such payments?' My answer is: This is a matter entirely for the Legislature, but I will be happy to see the Legislature pass such laws as it feels fair and just in all the circumstances.

"Your fourth question is, 'Do you or do you not favor the State taking a lien on whatever property the old folks may have?' My answer is, I do not."

In his letter to Yates, Gov. Shivers pointed out that, as a member of the State Senate in 1935, he wrote and sponsored the first old age pension law that Texas had. Shivers also was a co-author of the 1941 tax bill which to this day provides revenue for the old age assistance program.

Ben Ramsey, Former Secy. Of State In Race For Lt. Gov.

Ben Ramsey, candidate for Lieut. Governor and former Secretary of State, last week completed another chapter in his person to person handshaking tour of the state.

Ramsey found considerable interest in his program for economy in government, blacktop roads to every farm home, soil and water conservation and rural telephones at reasonable rates.

Ramsey, a 46-year old country lawyer from San Augustine in East Texas, has been conducting soil and water conservation experiments on his own farm near San Augustine. Several classes of students studying conservation have visited the farm to observe the results of the experiments.

Ramsey is campaigning for the office of lieutenant governor, the presiding officer of the state Senate, on the basis of his experience. Ramsey served in both the House and Senate before he became Secretary of State, a position he resigned in February in anticipation of making the

race for lieutenant governor. He was elected to the House in 1931, the same year he received his license to practice law. He served two terms and was then elected to the Senate in 1941. In 1947 he was elected president pro-tem (assistant presiding officer) by his fellow senators, in recognition of his leadership. Ramsey retired from the Senate in 1947 and in 1949 he was appointed Secretary of State by the late Governor Beauford Jester. Ramsey continued to serve as Secretary of State under Governor Allan Shivers, resigning in February.

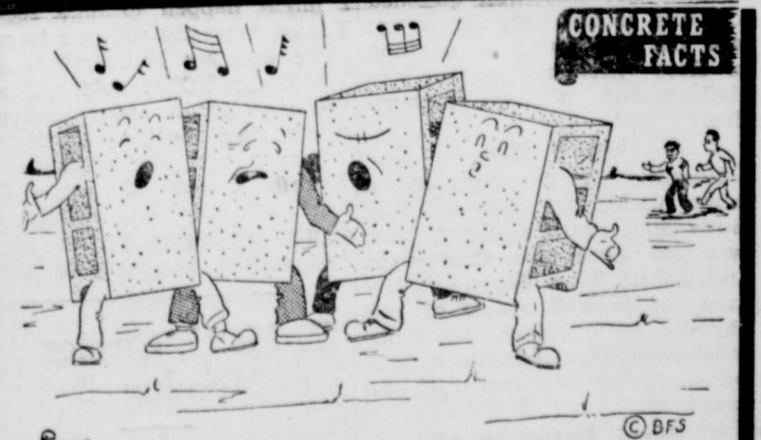

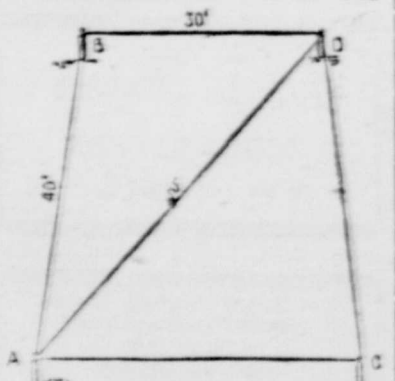

Staking Out Building

This quick, easy and accurate method of staking out a building so that the corners will be true



right angles is suggested in American Builder magazine. A hypothetical building measuring 30 by 40 feet is used as an example. First, figure the diagonal of the building. The diagonal will equal the square root of the sum of the squares of any two adjacent sides. In this example, the diagonal is 50 feet.

Next, drive stakes A, to mark one corner. Drive a nail in the center of the top of the stake. Then place stake B, with a nail in its top, exactly 40 feet away. To establish the corner at D, measure 30 feet from B and 50 feet from A. For C, measure 40 feet from D and 50 feet from A. The diagonal from C to B should be 50 feet.

After attending Texas University, Mr. Butts entered the Air Force in October, 1942 as a private. In April, 1943, just six months later, he became one of the youngest, most efficient 1st Sergeants in the entire Armed Forces which rank he held until being honorably discharged in the latter part of 1945 (after spending more than two years overseas). While overseas he received one of the Army's highest decorations, the Bronze Star, and was cited by General Cross for "Outstanding meritorious achievement above and beyond the call of duty in connection with military operations against the enemy." In addition to the Bronze Star, Sergeant Butts earned seven battle stars. In his capacity as "Top Sergeant" of a "Flying Fortress" Squadron, he had charge of all administration over some six hundred enlisted men and one hundred and twenty officers, and endeared himself to the hearts of his men due to the fair, impartial manner in which he exercised his duties without regard to rank or position.

Experienced Administrator

With the personnel of Sheppard Air Base now very much a part of our family of citizens here in Wichita County, a man is needed who understands and can handle these young Americans whom fate has placed in our midst.
