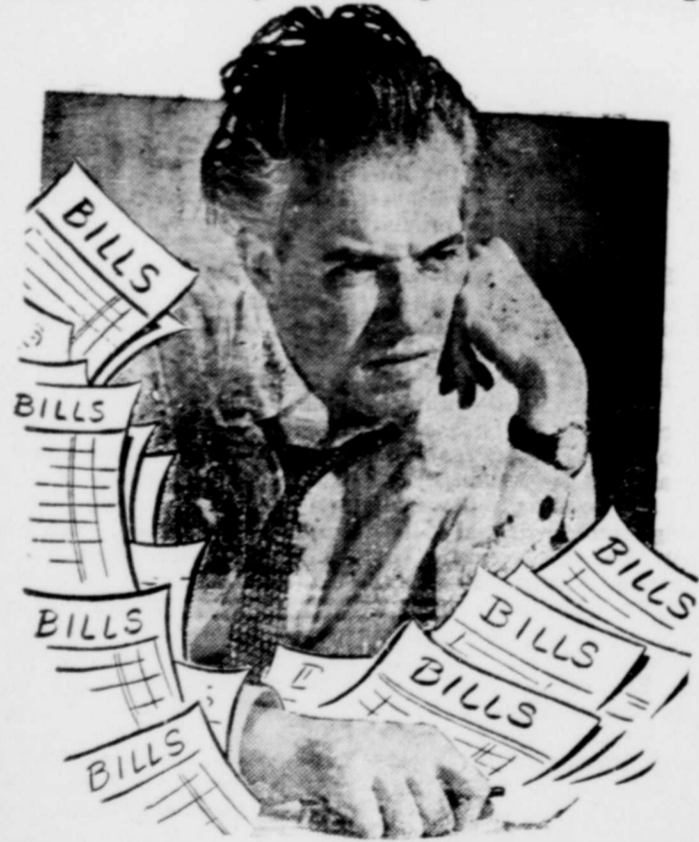
HERE WE GO AGAIN!

The quotations on crude rubber have been rising for months and are now at the highest point since 1927. There is a run on tires whether the buyer needs them or not. It is the old story of hoarding. The Korean war caused people to think of a rubber shortage and took themselves off to the market to buy a fat tire or two or four. However, we have a pretty safe reserve supply of crude rubber on hand, are in a far better position today to produce synthetic rubber than ten years ago. So, it's rather foolish to boost cost price and diminish current supply by hoarding, when no emergency exists.

REMEMBER WHEN?

"Why don't ya sell it and get a horse," was a cliché that is still used, proof that the shout, though dulled by time, isn't dead. The advent of the horseless carriage gave birth to the jest. It is still a gag though the motor car industry has almost eliminated need for it. For the first time more automobiles than horses are owned by American farmers. Only a year ago the balance was in favor of the horse, with farmers owning 5,300,000 automobiles and 5,898,000 horses. This year the balance has shifted to the car, with farmers owning 5,800,000 cars and 5,310,000 horses. Those grayed and bald tops around here who remember back when they too yelled "get a horse", are living to see the poor horses last stand.

YOU SAID IT, MAC!

Numerous Germans have confidence in gains for themselves by playing the Russians against the Allies, openly criticising our Occupation policies, blaming us for present problems in Germany. The U. S. high commissioner in Germany, John J. McCloy, won the approval of certain industrial leaders of West Germany at a meeting, by answering a German critic who complained about high occupation costs and high taxes, dismantling and failure of Western Allies to solve the refugee problem "because of the Roosevelt and Churchill agreements." Here is McCloy's reply:

"Don't forget that America's high taxes are the result of German aggression. Don't forget who started this war. Whether or not you gentlemen here are responsible personally for it, remember the war and all the misery that followed it—including your own—was born and bred in German soil and you must accept the responsibility. Why didn't you mention the Marshall plan? Why didn't you mention the aid we are giving the refugees while you stall? Why don't you recall how the occupied countries lived under your occupation? Don't weep in your beer. Think of the good things that come to you."

This is an answer that receives an ovation from us though we are far removed from the German critic in Dusseldorf and from our Commissioner McCloy.

THEY FINALLY PASSED IT

In 32 of the states, housewives have now been emancipated from the payment of a special penalty state or Federal Government tax on colored margarine. It was back in 1860 that a French scientist was commissioned by his government to develop foods to relieve shortages among the poor. He set out to find a way to make butter-fat from vegetable ingredients. His research was a rough equivalent of butter and a far cry from our present margarine, but it did start a new form of nutrition. Then began the fight by butter producers to outlaw margarine. For years Congress and state legislatures discriminated against it, even during wartime when scarcity meant the rationing of butter and its price soared as high as \$1.00 a pound.

Butter and margarine are similar in skim, salt and moisture contents, are different in that butter is about 80 per cent animal fat and margarine is 80 per cent vegetable fat. Dairy states criticize the championing of the margarine cause. It is not that the majority of people are against the dairy farmer, but that as a service to the public, especially those who have to count food costs, the removal of the tax on colored margarine, is beneficial. There is a place for butter, a place for margarine and, in simple justice, the outcome suits us—better nourishment for all, those who must count pennies and those who don't count nickels.

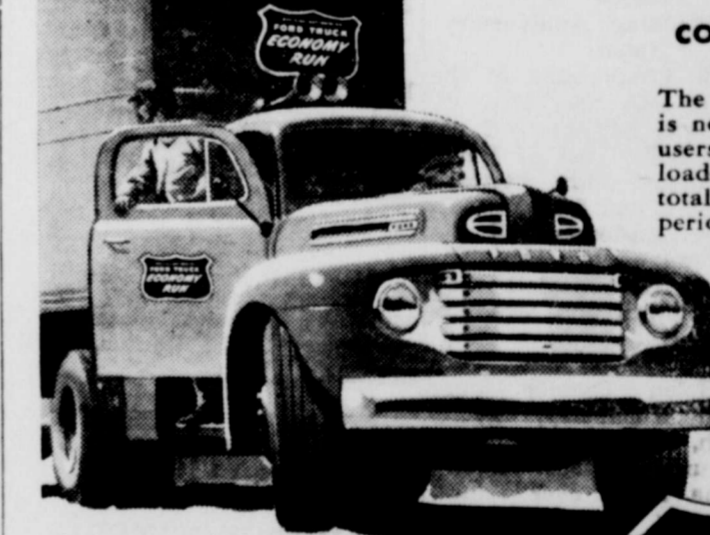

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Pierce Brooks Appeals for Votes For Lt. Governor

Pierce Brooks, Dallas insurance executive who led a field of 11 opponents in the first primary, opened his runoff campaign for lieutenant governor with a charge that his opponent did nothing as a legislator to halt "the runaway cost of state government."

"My opponent was a member of the Texas senate from 1941 to 1948 when the cost of our state government increased approximately 500 per cent and he didn't or couldn't do anything about halting the runaway cost of state government. If he didn't or couldn't do anything about it then, what can the people expect him to do about it now?"

Brooks also charged that his opponent made no effort during his eight years as a senator to comply with the law providing for legislative redistricting after each federal census. The Dallas county candidate said he always has been a staunch advocate of redistricting.

Brooks hailed the result of the first primary which he led, as convincing proof that the people of the state want a lieutenant governor who is completely free from entangling alliances and political obligations and who won't be dominated by "a certain group of money hungry and power thirsty individuals who are seeking to control the office of lieutenant governor through the election of one of their key men."

Brooks said that "any man who gets into public office with

the all-out support of any special group must pay for that help, one way or another, when and if he goes into office." "My sole allegiance," Brooks said, "is to my God and the people of Texas."

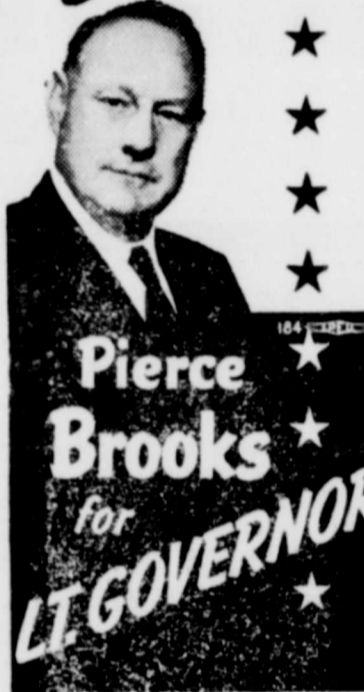

Personal Hygiene To Fight Polio

In addition to the general instructions for community sanitation which are important in preventing poliomyelitis, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, today issued an urgent warning to every individual in Texas to practice strict personal hygiene to protect his own health and that of those about him.

"Of course, cleanliness and personal hygiene are ordinarily taken for granted," Dr. Cox said, "but at this time with the incidence of Polio having reached a total of 1395 cases, I would like to re-emphasize some personal sanitary measures to help in preventing the spread of this crippling and often fatal disease."

The State Health Officer then stressed the importance of scrupulous cleanliness of the person. Frequent bathing and immaculate clean clothing are vitally necessary. Oral hygiene with thorough brushing of the teeth and the use of a mild antiseptic are recommended. The nasal passages should be kept clean and dental defects corrected immediately.

Sanitation and thorough cleanliness in the home are instinctive with the average housewife, but at this time their importance to health must be re-emphasized. Home sanitation includes those taken-for-granted measures as washing the dishes in hot soapy water and rinsing them in hot clear water; keeping sinks, bathtubs and fixtures scoured clean and rinsed with a mild antiseptic solution; sunning and airing bed clothes, ridding the home of flies, rats and roaches which, since Polio is believed to be a filth-borne disease, are suspected as being responsible for transmission.

"If good personal hygiene is combined with good community sanitation and hygiene, it is hard for any disease to get a foothold," Dr. Cox said, "With such a dread disease as Polio prevalent in the state, no precaution should be overlooked and no bars should be left down for its entrance."

They want to see your pictures, but they don't want to sit in the dark for a long time while you fass and fumble with the projector and screen or look for your slides.

This can be avoided by a minimum of planning. Experiment on the family, or set up the projector for a trial run some time when you are alone. Then you will know exactly where to place both screen and projector when you are putting on a show for guests.

The next thing, and as far as I personally am concerned, the most important, is that you organize your slides by subject matter and put them in a logical sequence. I won't attempt to tell you how to do that—it depends on the nature of

your pictures and how you want to show them. When this is done, however, be sure to file them so that you can find the slides you want when you want them.

There are available in photographic departments and camera shops a wide variety of metal file boxes of the proper size.

As I indicated earlier, one of my pet peeves is having to sit in the dark while one of my friends exclaims, "I do want to show you the pictures we made of the old flower woman in Mexico City," and then fumbles through numerous little boxes of slides, finally selects one, and murmuring something about the vividness of the reds and greens, proudly slips into the projector a very ordinary shot of the family at the beach two summers ago.

Perhaps I have been guilty of a little exaggeration, but do be a good showman.

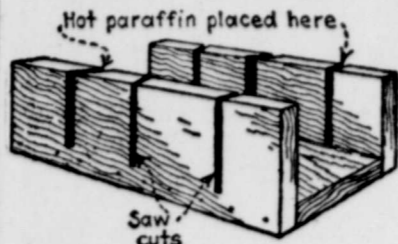

Lubricating Saw

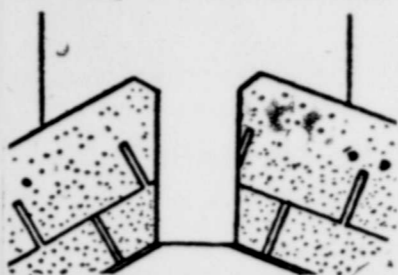
This way of keeping a saw lubricated is suggested by Amer-

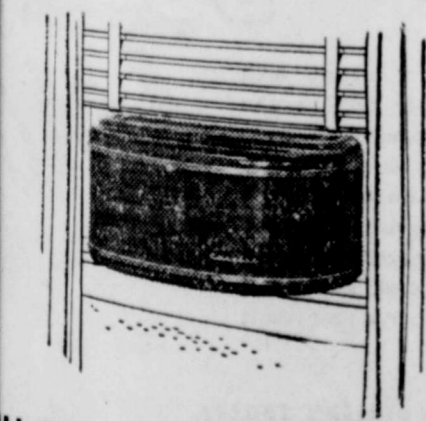

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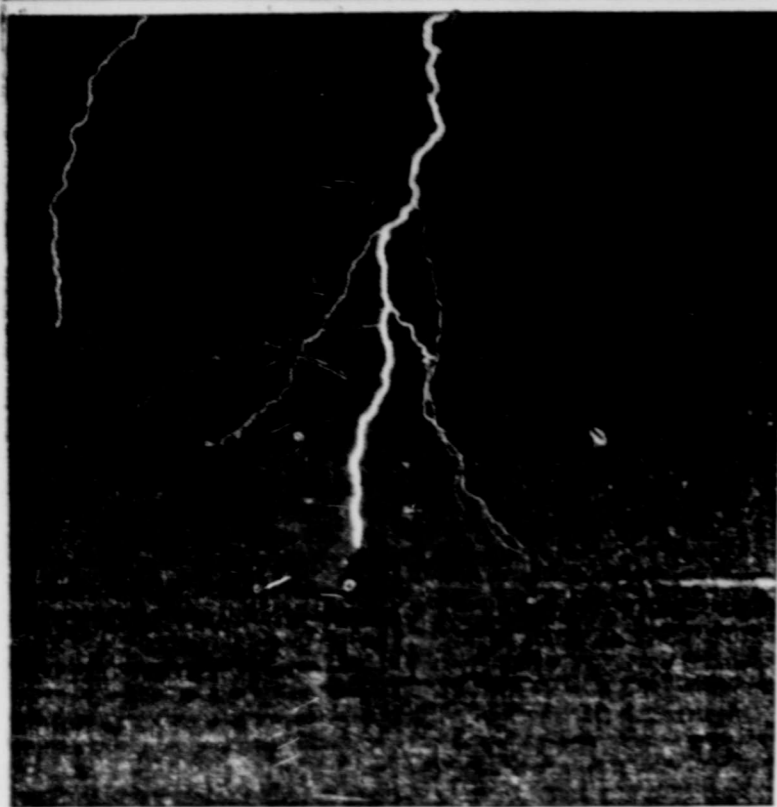

A simple time exposure will make dramatic lightning shots.

Nature's Fireworks Make Dramatic Shots

WHEN it comes to putting on pyrotechnical shows, all honors go to Mother Nature when she etches the night sky with jagged bolts of lightning. She puts the Fourth of July fireworks displays to shame and, at the same time, gives you an opportunity to make some truly "different" pictures that will inject a dramatic note into your snapshot collection.

Spring, with its inevitable night thunderstorms, is the best time of year for making these pictures. My enthusiasm for lightning pictures stems largely from the fact that of all the unusual picture possibilities they are among the very easiest to make. Furthermore, you can make them with any camera equipped for time exposure.

Actually, the whole procedure is as simple as this—all you have to do is place the camera on a solid support, with the lens toward the lightning, and set it for a time exposure. You needn't worry about the lens opening, because the vividness of the lightning will insure a picture at any setting.

If the weather is merely in the

threatening stage, you can set up your camera outdoors. When it is raining, you can keep both yourself and camera dry by simply shooting through a window.

You can't go far wrong on the length of exposure, either. You'll determine it on the basis of how many flashes you want in the picture. You may close the shutter after the first flash, or leave it open so that several flashes register on the same film. If you choose to leave it open through many flashes, you'll end up with a fantastic, highly intricate maze of lightning lines. Of course, you won't have a true picture of a single flash, but you'll have something that is, to say the least, unusual.

Sheet lightning is the only variety that isn't photogenic. It merely illuminates a broad expanse of sky. But even it has a redeeming feature in that you picture interesting silhouettes of buildings and trees in its light.

As a spring tonic to add sprightliness to your photographic album, I heartily recommend dramatic lightning shots. —John van Gulder

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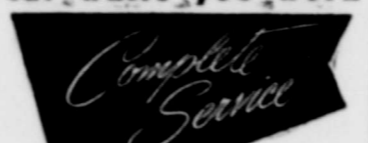

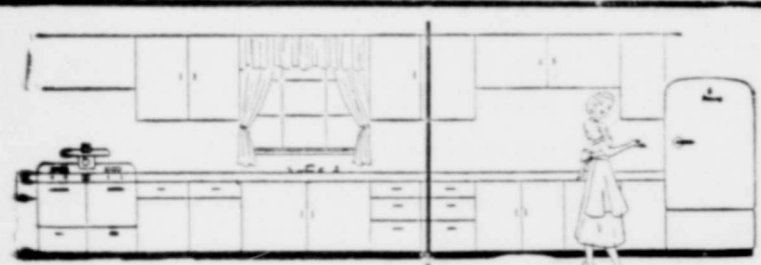

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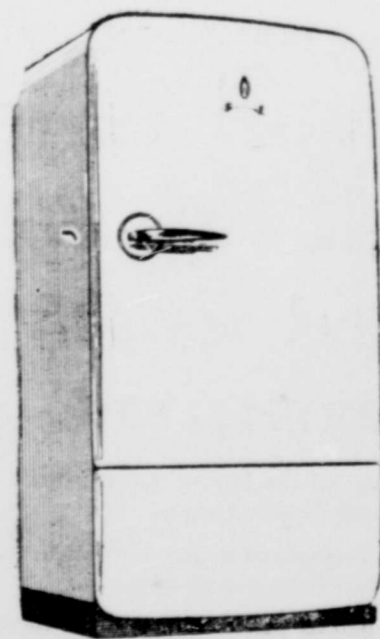

CHICK CHATS

WHAT ABOUT SURPLUS BIRDS?

Poultry raisers continually face the problem of disposing of surplus cockerels, pullets and undesirable layers. It requires considerable "doing" to utilize these surplus birds and realize their full value. However, a poultryman can usually accomplish a certain amount of success with such "extras" in a flock if he devotes some time and thought to management, growth, and marketability of the birds.

Whatever the age may be, as soon as sex can be detected, cockerels should be separated and removed from the pullets. They should never be denied feed, however. They should receive the best quality starting mash and should also be given the best quality growing mash.

Selling As Broilers
The weight of cockerels more or less determines when they should be sold. With this in mind, the raiser should watch both birds and market carefully. If the market is favorable, perhaps he can dispose of the birds as broilers. This is the logical time to do so, because most persons need the room for their pullets anyway. If birds are sold at this time, they should be given a fattening mash a week to 10 days beforehand.

If the raiser wants to sell surplus birds as fryers, it will be necessary to keep them until they weigh 2 to 3 1-2 pounds. For this purpose, it is best to maintain birds in small pens, where they can run outside in the fresh air and sunshine. This helps develop a much better color in faces and combs of the birds.

If a grower wishes to keep cockerels for roosters, he must feed them until they weigh 4 to 6 pounds. In order to make the best birds, they should be raised on the ground.

Non-Layers
Non-layers are another problem. At this time of year the number of non-layers tend to increase, especially among old hens. Watch carefully for these birds. When they stop laying, remove them from the laying flock immediately.

Once non-layers have been removed, it is best to crate feed them. In this way, a raiser fattens his birds faster and readies them for quick, profitable marketing. Birds fatten faster this way because of the lack of exercise.

Cull your birds wisely and market surplus pullets, cockerels, and layers. It will help your birds show a better profit when the flock expense is deducted at the end of the year.

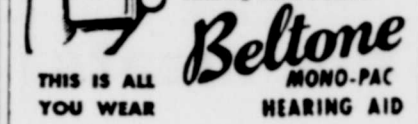

New Home, Magazine Says

Planned storage space is a distinct "must" in the planning of a new home, says American Builder, most widely circulated building industry magazine. The publication defines planned storage space as storage walls, built-in cabinets, wardrobes, drawer cases and closets. American Builder concedes that "most experts agree two-thirds more dead storage space can be provided in a basement than on the first floor for an equal expenditure of money." However, the magazine adds, "These same experts are also agreed that the smaller amount of storage space on the first floor is preferred to the larger amount in the basement because of its convenience and accessibility to the occupant. This all sums up to the fact that planned storage space is here to stay." Many built-in storage units are made of hardwood plywood, a material with characteristics that are highly desirable for the purpose. Because of the way the plywood is constructed, it is highly resistant to warping. This means that the large number of doors found in built-in units are not likely to pull out of shape and stick or refuse to close snugly. Another excellent quality of hardwood plywood is that delicately figured wood veneers are used as facing. The natural beauty of wood makes attractive home interiors. Although some built-in cabinets are designed expressly for certain houses, American Builder
