Mrs. Huisinga, a World War II bride from Czechoslovakia, was guest of Francis Kauer, program chairman, and told of her country and its people and their treatment behind the iron curtain and in prison camps during the war. Erna, who escaped from the Prison Camp after three weeks, has been in the United States only fifteen months, and in Burkburnett all but three weeks of that time. Her husband is stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base.

## Cemetery Lots Need Clean-up

The Burkburnett Cemetery is in a very unsightly condition, due to the heavy growth of grass and weeds that cover the lots, walks and driveways. If you have a cemetery lot in Burkburnett, have you been out lately to see how it looks? If you haven't been in the last week or so you will be shocked at what you see. Grass and weeds shoulder high; grass burrs everywhere.

The City of Burkburnett, with no financial aid from those who have loved ones buried here, or who have purchased lots in the local cemetery, has been trying its best to keep the weeds and grass cut this summer. But the City has neither the money nor the men to spare on this work. Exceptionally wet weather this summer has made it impossible to keep the premises presentable without some help, both financial and manual.

Paul Browning, president of the Chamber of Commerce was out to the cemetery the other day, and after viewing the situation came away determined that something must be done. The civic improvements committee of the C. of C. has been asked to perfect some sort of cemetery association to solicit and collect funds for the much needed work of keeping the weeds and grass under control.

If you have lots here, go out and look at them. If you can't do the work your self, send in your contribution to pay someone else to do the work. P. A. Wiggins, City Manager, says he has received only \$5.00 all during 1950 to be applied on cemetery work. That wouldn't go very far fighting the growth this year.

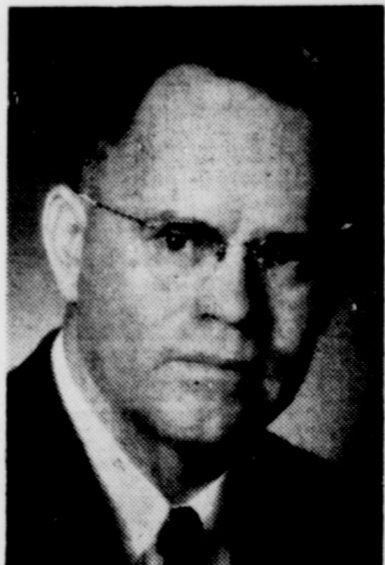

loses birds to disease. In the first place, a poultryman must become a student of disease problems. Any grower who ignores the disease factor in poultry raising is certain to be handicapped in his efforts sooner or later.

The successful control of poultry diseases and parasites depends to a great extent on the prompt diagnosis of such diseases. Quick recognition of the disease enables the poultryman to curtail its spread in the flock and keep down the losses.

**Observe Birds Carefully**  
Too often the raisers believe killing ailing birds is the best policy, feeling that by eliminating sick birds they can prevent further spread of the disease. Actually, however, it is best to separate sick birds from the other poultry and observe them for additional symptoms. Following observation, a post mortem examination should be performed.

If a poultryman is to make a success of his enterprise, he owes it to himself to become familiar with the symptoms of poultry diseases. All diseases have distinct symptoms. By learning to recognize these symptoms quickly and accurately, the poultry raiser often can detect diseases early and head off discouraging outbreaks.

**Disease Symptoms**  
Some common symptoms and the various ailments which they frequently characterize are as follows:

General unthrifty condition—Examine birds for external parasites, such as lice, mites, ticks, etc. Also internal parasites. Examine birds' droppings for the roundworms or segments of tape worms.

**Lameness**—Lameness in turkeys may be due to range paralysis, bumble foot, scaly leg, rickets, fracture or bruises.

**Diarrhea**—This may be caused by digestive disorders, cholera, coccidiosis, fowl typhoid or worms.

**Bloody droppings**—These may be due to coccidiosis, enteritis, or worms.

**Gasping**—Gasping symptoms usually indicate disorders in the wind pipe or larynx. 'Colds' coryza or roup may also be responsible for the same symptoms.

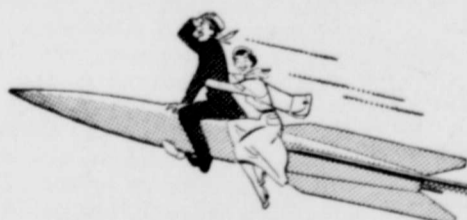

# The SNAPSHOT GUILD



Cherry Blossom Time

Cherry blossoms are an excellent background against which to picture the graceful charm of delicate blossoms.

**Cherry Blossom Time**

Cherry blossoms in full bloom seem to have a special magnetism that draws the camera.

Wait for the best of the cherry blossoms, the Washington cherry blossoms, are that forms in mind in many more cameras than I think of lovely spring days at the Tidal Basin, with amateur photographers so numerous you wait your turn for the best shot of the Jefferson Memorial with flower-laden branches. When you are snapping pictures of the decorative cherry trees, a few basic points on photography it will pay to remember.

When selecting your subject, look for rather than quantity. Huge blossoms seldom photograph as well as a simple grouping of single flowers. Get just as close to your subject as your camera will allow, or use a close-up attachment. Lens opening should be small (f/22) to insure a range of focus sufficient to record details. With the slow shutter speeds that go with these apertures, you may prefer to place your camera on a tripod rather than run the risk of picture-ruining camera movement.

Lighting is always an important consideration in picture taking, but especially so in picturing blossoms. Since shadows are essential for reproduction of the flower form, side lighting is desirable. Therefore, avoid the noonday sun. If possible, and do your black-and-white shooting in mid-afternoon or in the morning, say after ten o'clock, when the light hits one side of the blossoms. A hazy day, with light clouds veiling the sun, provides good light for either color or black-and-white film.

The background is very important, too. Obviously, any clutter will detract attention from the delicate blossoms. The sky is usually the best natural background, even if you have to assume a worm's eye view level to get it. Otherwise, all I can say is—the plainer and simpler the background, the better your flower pictures will be. A K-2 or G Filter will darken the sky and make the blossoms more attractive by contrast.

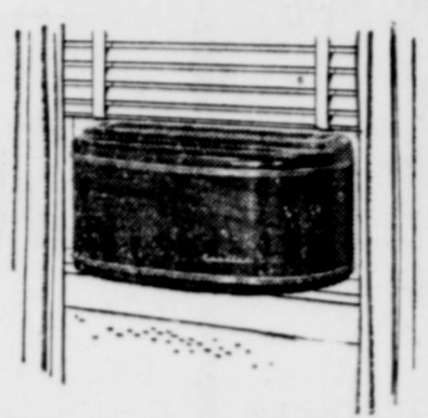

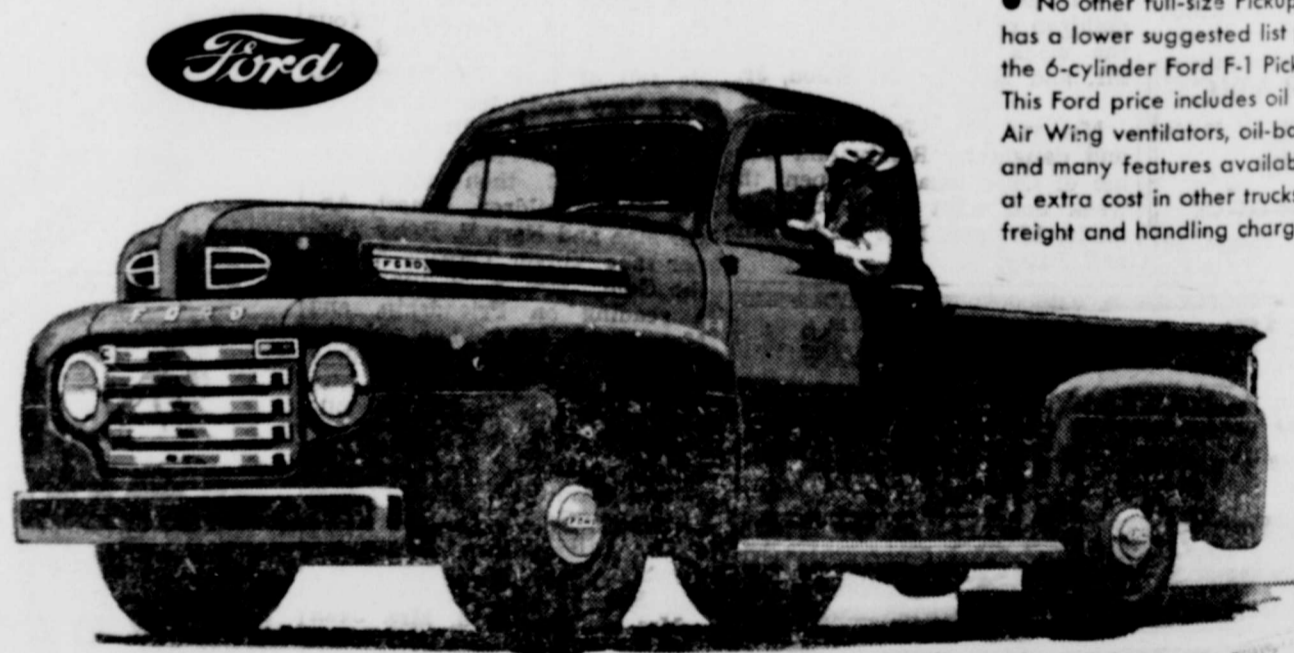

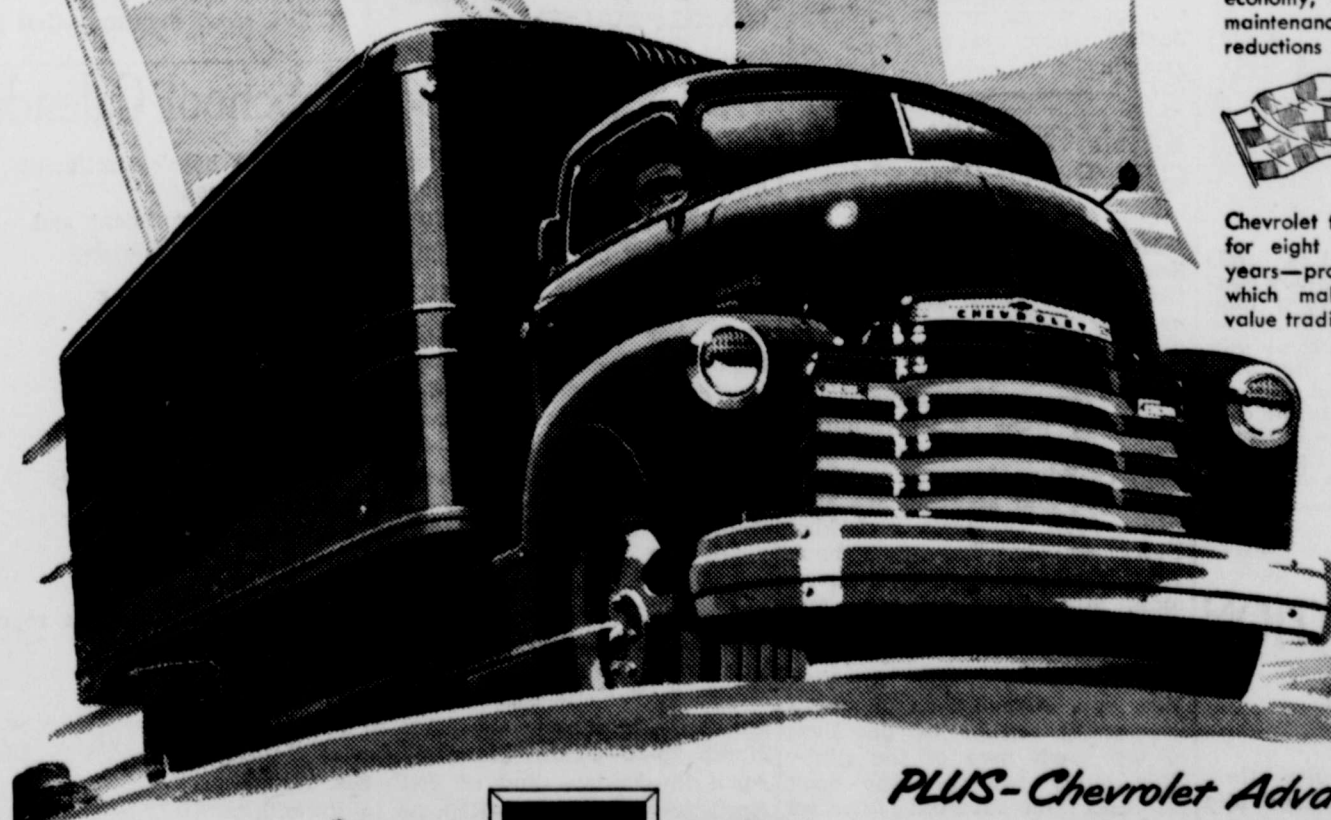

# The SNAPSHOT GUILD



When spring arrives, there are hundreds of new picture possibilities for you camera fans.

## Pictures for Spring

CAMERA fans, have you noticed that touch of spring in the air? You know, I believe photographers enjoy the arrival of this new season even more than other folks. It means that the great outdoors again becomes a theater of operations for picture-taking activities of many kinds.

First of all, the longer daylight hours mean that the snapshotting day is much longer than during the short, dark days of winter. And more of the days are sunny and clear. Nature improves the scenery, too, by refreshing the whole landscape in bright, fresh colors for the new season. She adds the bright greens to the trees and later adds the brilliant and fragrant blossoms of the trees and shrubs. And since everything does look so attractive, it is an excellent time to try some landscape pictures.

Of course, other things happen, too. People who have been pretty much confined during the cold weather take to the outdoors just as soon as they can. Gardeners begin putting out in the "back forty," golfers begin sputtering on the back nine, and the youngsters take to the

baseball diamond with great gusto. This is wonderful for you because there are pictures galore in these ambitious new activities of spring.

One of the first things that you camera fans should do is to see that your equipment is in good order for the busy snapshotting months ahead. Perhaps a bit of spring housecleaning is in order in the camera department. This doesn't mean tinkering with the internal mechanism, however. If there seems to be a bug in the mechanism somewhere, take the camera down to your photo dealer and let him advise you as to what steps to take.

Check over those accessories, too. See that your tripod is in good working order and that your shades and filters are clean and set to go for the busy season ahead. It would be an excellent time to check over and replace equipment that has become damaged or broken, too.

Why not plan your picture taking ahead this year so that you don't miss the highlights of spring? It is without question one of the most colorful seasons—be ready for it.

## SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Now is the opportune time for farmers who will have idle land during the coming winter and early spring to make plans for a cover over such land for protection from water and possible wind erosion.

With the month of July being one of the wettest in many, many years, might lead one to believe that no danger exists. But with a few weeks dry weather and high winds can evaporate the excess moisture very rapidly to a point where soil blowing can occur.

Where land is now planted to grain sorghums for seed or feed purposes at least 12 to 14 inches

of the stubble should be left on the ground for soil protection, and the more crop residue that can be left on the soil the better assurance of full soil protection during the winter and early spring.

Where land is now clean tilled and no plans for seeding to small grain in the fall, a good cover of winter legumes will pay big dividends from a soil improvement standpoint and will furnish excellent protection from wind or water erosion. Farmers planning to seed winter legumes will probably save money and be assured seed during harvest time.

Farmers and ranchers planning to retire land now in cultivation and seed to grasses next spring are urged to plant a cover crop now such as sudan or sorghum to remain on the land during the winter and spring to serve as a protection to the young grass seedlings during their early stage of growth.

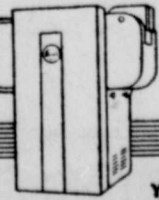

# TELLING the SIMPLE STORY



MANY of us smiled at the farmer in Pearl Buck's story of the Good Earth. It seemed to us most strange that a man should buy his coffin ahead of time and take grim satisfaction in looking at the fine box in which he was to be buried. Perhaps many of us are as strange in our American refusal to think about death at all. The old adage "as sure as death and taxes" should have put us in the frame of mind to look forward to our own death and to make some preparation for it. Too many of us, however, are like the proverbial ostrich; we dig our heads down into the sand and assume that while death will overtake everybody else, by some strange shift of good fortune, it will never knock at our door. We are "foolish virgins" as Jesus called the people who made no provision for the coming of The Great Day, because the hour was uncertain.

ONE of the SIMPLEST STORIES ever told is the one told by Jesus to the Disciples on how to be saved. How to be ready for death. He made it so simple that even a "little child" can understand. Let us not take lightly the responsibility of telling this simple story! May we be conformed to right; subject to, and influenced by the moral laws of the Supreme.

### A "Scratch Dallas" Campaign Started For Run-off Voters

A "scratch Dallas" campaign in the August 26th run-off election has been organized on a statewide basis. Emmette Alexander of Marble Falls announced today.

Alexander, a businessman and civic leader who is sparking the drive, described it as an effort to decentralize the power held by Dallas County in state government and to strengthen representation of other areas in the government.

He noted that four out of five run-offs in the election have candidates from Dallas County.

"As a plain citizen interested in good government, I firmly believe that one big city should not be given that much representation," Alexander said.

The four run-offs which have Dallas candidates are two for the Supreme Court, one for the Court of Criminal Appeals and the lieutenant governor's race. In the lieutenant governor's race are Ben Ramsey of San Augustine County in East Texas and Pierce P. Brooks of Dallas County. W. A. Morrison of Milam County in Central Texas and Robert L. Lattimore of Dallas County are campaigning for a place on the Court of Criminal Appeals.

In the Supreme Court races are Fagan Dickson of Bexar County in South Texas and Will Wilson of Dallas County, contending for Place 1, and Meade F. Griffin of Hale County in the Panhandle and George W. Harwood of Dallas County, both seeking Place 3.

"There are already five justices on the Supreme Court whose homes are within 128 miles of Dallas," Alexander said. "If the two Supreme Court candidates from Dallas are elected, then seven of the nine justices on the state's highest civil court will be Dallas representatives."

The "scratch Dallas" drive will be conducted through advertising, news releases, word-of-mouth and personal letters, Alexander said.

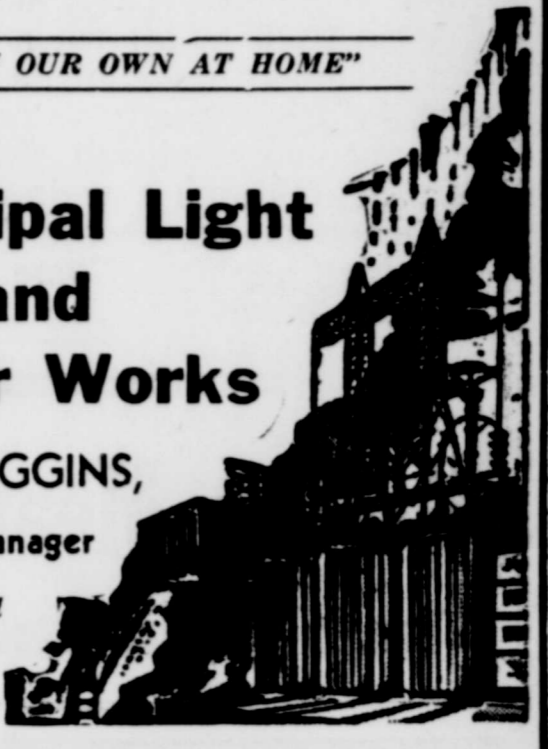
