## Australia And The United States

During the last war American servicemen who came in contact with Australian people, said they were more like Americans than any other people in the world.

The way the Australians feel toward us may be reflected in the following editorial which appeared in the Sydney, Australia, Daily Telegraph:

"If the gentlemen in Canberra have the vaguest idea of this nation's best interest, they will announce that Australia will support the hard-pressed Americans in Korea with a division of land troops and more fighting planes. The reasons should be obvious to every Australian who remembers how we felt in 1941 when this country lay wide open to invasion. If the Americans are swept out of Korea and Formosa, the Russian front will be triumphant throughout Asia. Whatever friends we have still on the Asiatic continent will desert us. Then Australia will be far out on a lonely limb.

"What saved us from battle on our soil and conquest in the last war except American help? Can we expect similar help again if we let the Koreans murder Americans in another Dunkirk without doing everything we can? The Americans are closely watching all the peoples who have given flowery lip service to the U. N. and have received in return generous U. S. aid. If they sit on the sidelines now, while Americans die in an outnumbered struggle, many American people will argue they would be wiser to spend their money on themselves and let the rest of the world sink. That might be a foolish, emotional reaction, but it would be understandable.

"We are told that some British people enjoy the spectacle of Americans fighting while Britain for once is

at peace. That is a stupid satisfaction. For only one thing keeps Britain or any of us at peace at this moment and that is Russia's fear of American industrial strength backing up a solid British-American front. They would have their happiest day of all time at the Kremlin if the Korean struggle ended with Americans feeling that Britain and her dominions had let Americans down. For that would damage the only military and political combination which may draw a line to Russian ambitions. To forestall this blow we and the rest of the British Commonwealth must give as generously as we expect Americans to give when we are in difficulties. This is a moment for action which counts only the needs of our friend."

## Shall We Await The Blow?

The Communists always claim that theirs is a perfectly legal party, like the Democrats and the Republicans, and that they have a constitutional right to carry on their activities.

What that position actually means was well described recently by Judge Learned Hand of the Circuit Court of Appeals. He was speaking for a unanimous Court upholding the conviction of the 11 Communist leaders in New York last year. He said: "They claim the constitutional privilege of going on indoctrinating their pupils, preparing increasing numbers to pledge themselves to the crusade, and awaiting the moment when we may be so far extended by foreign engagements, so far divided in counsel, or so far in industrial or financial straits, that the chance (of successful revolution) seems worth trying. That position presupposes that the (First) Amendment assures them freedom for all preparatory steps and in the end the choice of the initiative, dependent upon that moment when they believe us, who must await the blow, to be worst prepared to receive it."

Communism is not a political party. It is a revolutionary movement owing total allegiance to a foreign government. Its sole aim is to destroy us.

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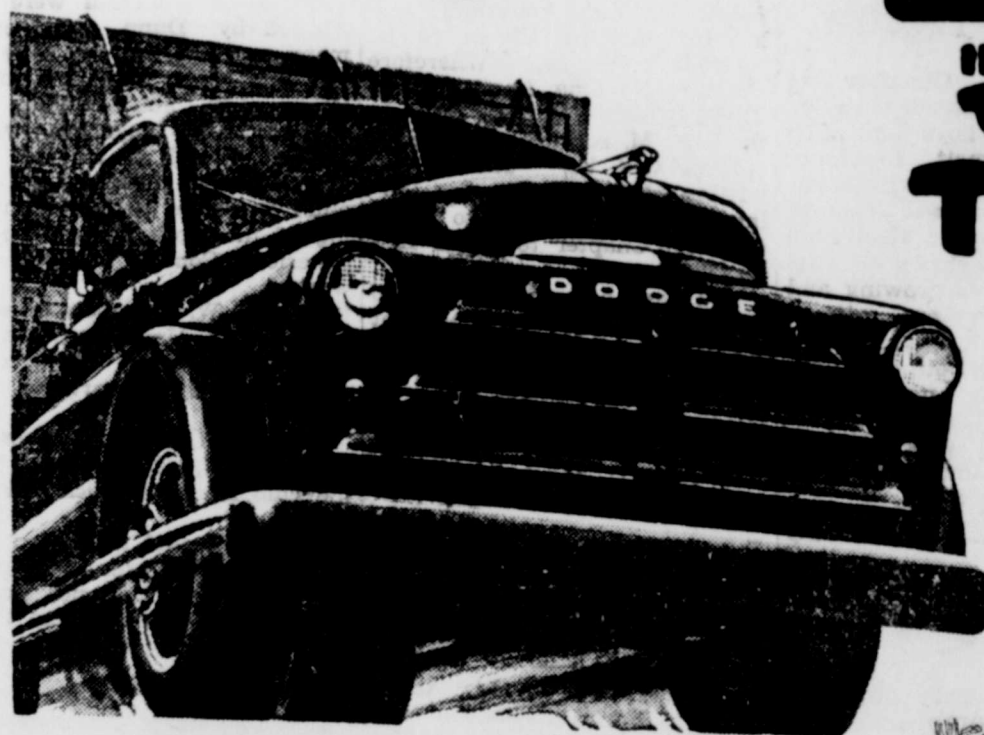

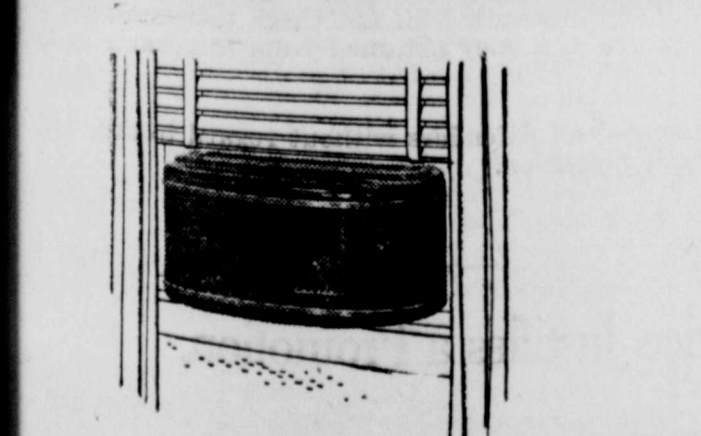

## Spray Insect Breeding Areas

Perhaps you have noticed an increase in the number of flies, mosquitos, fleas and other insects around your poultry houses and hen houses lately. As usual, this is the time of year you can expect such pests. Because insects do multiply quickly, they can soon make the area your birds run in very unpleasant—not only for the birds, but also for you, or the person working with the flock. Regardless of the insect count on your poultry farm, now is a good time to begin spraying. Spray fly breeding areas, such as manure piles and droppings pits, with a good insect killer. Sprays containing DDT or Chlor-dane are being used with a high percentage of effectiveness. Also spray feed rooms and wherever insects are likely to congregate.

**Disease Carriers**  
Birds pestered by insects naturally become uncomfortable, but they can also become diseased. Insects are ideal carriers of disease and many damaging poultry diseases are transmitted to healthy birds in this manner. The common house fly may be used as an example. This fly acquires its nourishment by sucking up liquid foods. Like other insects, it usually breeds in filthy places, but it may also be found around drinking waterers, under poultry houses, and near feeders. Poultry eating flies frequently become infected with worms. Even the house fly, as harmless as it may seem, is known to be an intermediate host for two of the common tapeworms that infest chickens. It carries infection on its feet and mouth.

**Blood Sucker**  
Another destructive insect frequently an inhabitant of the poultry premises is the mosquito. The mosquito is a blood sucker and attacks the head of the bird. It may carry the infection of dry pox from an infected bird to a non-infected bird and is the kind of disease carrier known and referred to as a "carrier host." The mosquito begins its life cycle in water puddles, drains, and other places where water stands.

Pierce Brooks, Dallas insurance executive, took his aggressive campaign for lieutenant governor into East Texas this week and told supporters that he was supremely confident of winning the Democratic nomination for lieutenant governor on August 26th.

Brooks said he was greatly encouraged by the tremendous number of pledges of support he had received in East Texas. "The groundswell for Pierce Brooks which started out in West Texas has swept into East Texas," he said. **Wilson Leaders  
Predict Victory**

Backers of Will Wilson, candidate for the Supreme Court, are quick to contend that the district attorney from Dallas is about to become one of the new members of the Texas Supreme Court.

"When voters from all over Texas gave Wilson a commanding lead of more than 85,000 votes in the first primary, they proved their confidence in him," says a release from the Wilson camp. "And as the only veteran in the race, he received the overwhelming support of Texas veterans and their families."

The dispatch, released from the Dallas office Monday, calls attention to Wilson's fight against organized crime, stating that "Wilson returned from combat in the Southwest Pacific to win a race for district attorney over five opponents and then took the lead in the battle against organized crime. This brought him national recognition. As a consequence he was one of the five district attorneys in the entire United States invited by the U. S. Attorney General to attend a national conference against organized crime."

This week Wilson struck at CIO labor lobbyists by announcing that "On July 31 the secretary-treasurer of the CIO in Austin issued a letter to all members of the CIO-PAC stating that the CIO is committed to the support of Fagan Dickson against Will Wilson."

Said Wilson: "This shows the lengths to which the big labor bosses, who are actively supporting my opponent, will go."

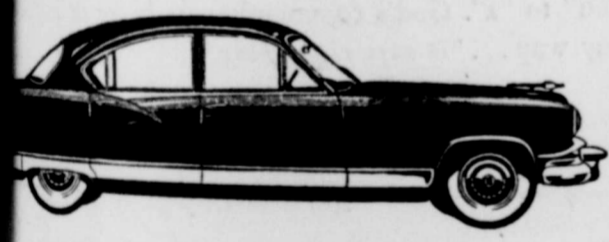

tions and rodeos, on front porch-  
es and sidewalks, on farms and  
ranches, before civic clubs and  
in law offices.

Dickson, an attorney with 21  
years' experience, was winning  
ever-lasting support from his  
fellow-lawyers, according to re-  
ports from his headquarters.  
Typical reaction was expressed  
in a letter from Center, which  
said, "Each attorney of the local  
bar with whom I have had the  
opportunity to talk is actively  
supporting Fagan Dickson."

Wrote another: "The Brown  
County Bar Association has just  
had a meeting and it endorsed  
your candidacy unanimously ex-  
cept as to two members." "With  
one exception, the lawyers of  
Wharton County are all for  
you," said another.

Dickson has the endorsement  
of 15 past presidents of the San  
Antonio Bar Association, of  
which he himself is also a past  
president.

Stressing his own record and  
qualifications, Dickson says:

"My experience, both as an  
attorney practicing in San An-  
tonio and as a peoples' lawyer  
in the Attorney General's Of-  
fice, has been in civil law. On  
the other hand, my opponent's  
chief legal experience has been  
as district attorney in Dallas  
County, dealing in criminal

The country boys' campaign  
to "scratch Dallas" in the Aug.  
26th run-off election is sweep-  
ing the state, Chairman Em-  
mett Alexander of Marble  
Falls said today.

The Marble Falls business-  
man who announced plans last  
week for the revolt against  
Dallas County's control of state  
government, said he had re-  
ceived hundreds of letters, tel-  
egrams and phone calls in sup-  
port of his plan.

The plan calls on Texans to  
vote against the four Dallas  
County candidates in the five  
statewide races, to elect their  
four opponents and to thereby  
strengthen representation of  
other areas in the government.

"The reaction to our drive to  
decentralize the power held by  
Dallas County in state govern-  
ment has been more than satis-  
factory," Alexander said. "And  
we expect it to snowball into  
victory by Saturday.

"We are not running any one  
man. We have picked the op-  
ponents of the four Dallas  
candidates because we do not want  
Dallas to boss the entire state  
and because we think the out-  
of-Dallas candidates are equal-  
ly as well qualified for the dif-  
ferent state offices."

Alexander said Texans in all  
parts of the state, especially in  
the small towns, were working  
for the "scratch Dallas" idea.  
The Dallas County candidates  
and their opponents are Pierce  
Brooks of Dallas and Ben Ram-  
sey of San Augustine County,  
for lieutenant governor; Will  
Wilson of Dallas County and  
Fagan Dickson of Bexar Coun-  
ty, for Supreme Court, Place 1;  
George W. Harwood of Dallas  
County and Meade F. Griffin  
of Hale County, for Supreme  
Court, Place 3; and Robert L.  
Lattimore of Dallas County and  
W. A. Morrison of Milam Coun-  
ty for Court of Criminal Ap-  
peals.

Alexander said an eight-mem-  
ber committee, including Mayor  
R. O. Smith of Marble Falls and  
M. C. Winters, Johnson City  
rancher and merchant, vice-  
chairman, were pushing the

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
