## Burk Stampedes Archer City Team In 31-0 Run-Away

Bulldogs and Wildcats don't mix very well, though it seems Bulldogs are tougher, judging from football games this year and last. In last year's contest the Bulldogs were just a little bit tougher; this year they were decidedly on the upper hand.

Last Friday night's game at Bulldog Stadium saw Quarter Back Lee Keen pilot his gang to a 31 to 0 decision over the boys from Archer City. Keen, who seldom calls signals to put him in possession of the ball, turned in a superb game last Friday. He completed four passes for 136 yards out of five attempted passes. One was intercepted. To offset the pass he had intercepted, Keen intercepted an Archer City pass and ran 59 yards for a touchdown. His playing would be considered excellent in anybody's league.

The ball toters usually get all the credit in a football game, but their glory is made possible only by linemen and backs, knocking holes in the line and blocking out would-be tacklers down field. Last Friday all the Bulldogs were turning in fine performances in their respective positions.

**Scoring Order**

With one minute to go in the first period of play, Burk recovered the ball on their own 44 yard line. Keen carried 22 yards for a first down on the Wildcats 34. He then heaved a pass to End Bill Reasoner who galloped across the line for a touchdown. Keen also kicked the extra point.

In the middle of second quarter Burk grabbed an Archer City fumble on Burk's 18. Little Edwin Draper made 16 yards in one try. Keen again connect with a pass to Bill Reasoner which was good for 66 yards counting the run for a touchdown. No more extra points were kicked for the night.

The third quarter was scoreless, but the last one was good for three touchdowns for the alert Bulldogs. Martin Leimer romped 54 yards to pay dirt behind good blocking most of the way. Another fumble for Archer City was costly. Burk recovered on the Wildcats 25. A line play moved up to the 18, from which point Cleo Askins wiggled his way through across the goal line. With just one minute before the final whistle was to blow, Lee Keen reached 'way high to bring down an Archer City pass, after which he evaded tacklers for 59 yards and another 6 point score.

**Game at a Glance**

In the statistics department Archer City looked good. Their only trouble was, they couldn't cross their opponent's goal line.

In yards rushing A. C. rolled 175. They also led in first downs, 8 to 6. In passes they were outshadowed. From 12 attempts they completed 3 for a total of 24 yards, had one intercepted and 8 incomplete. Burk tried only 5 passes. Four completed for 136 yards, with one intercepted.

This Friday night the Bulldogs are loafing—no game is scheduled. Next Friday night, November 3, they play host to Crowell—a tough one.

## KILLING A PRIVILEGE

When hunting seasons open, sportsmen take to field and woods, marsh and stream. The true sportsman abides by restrictions, considers rights of other by preserving an amiable farmer-hunter relationship. Unfortunately all hunters aren't sportsmen. The signs that read "No Trespassing" or "No Hunting" were probably put there by farmers who met up with the hoodlum hunter, the kind who cuts wire fences, tramples crops, and kills stock. More land is restricted each year, more counties have passed "No Sunday Hunting" laws or closed the county entirely, all because of the ill-mannered gun-toter. Some sportsmen's clubs issue hunter's cards to members and will stand for loss to the farmer through carelessness of these members. Such clubs are few. If today's hunter wants to preserve the right for future generations, he will report the enemy hunter to authorities.

## HUMAN VALUES

Why should older workers be "junked"? More pressure is being brought to bear to force older people into retirement, though they may be willing and able to work. The problem of what to do about an old age when the working span is supposedly at an end, troubles anyone who is concerned about human values. Private pension plans more fully developed each year and on a wider scale, make it more difficult for middle-aged and older men and women to find new jobs. Unfortunately for the morale of the older person, today's work-a-day world is not geared for tomorrow's aged. Older men and women are not necessarily mentally or physically in-

capable of continuing to serve society and themselves through employment. Many of them make reliable employees for additional years. The Social Security Law stipulates that the old-age insurance benefits be paid only to those who quit their jobs at the age of 65 and so those who keep on working will get nothing back from the premiums they have paid through the years in the form of the withholding tax.

We should not penalize the older man and woman who prefers to work. It is a tragic situation, a great human problem, and it is of concern to everyone who is aware that time does not stand still for anyone.

## EVERYBODY'S DOING IT

Fruit, nut, potato and apple growers got together and organized to publicize their product and boost sales. Now the onion growers, feeling that in onion—we mean union—there is strength, are uniting to put breath into their neglected vegetable and bring tears to the eyes of those who have underestimated the onion's culture and health value. If everyone would eat onions they would not object to an onion breath. If onions make you weep, maybe a good cry would bring emotional relief. You'll see literature soon, telling of the nutritional value in onion soup, onions fried and creamed, onion salad and sandwiches. We wish to state to the recently formed committee for the furtherance of onions, that around in these parts there are already many seasoned campaigners.

## A FAMILIAR RING

"The Russian nation must be constantly on a war footing to keep the soldiers warlike and in good condition . . . in the interests of aggrandizement and increasing the prosperity of Russia. No opportunity must be lost of taking part in the affairs and disputes of Europe, especially in those of Germany, which, from its vicinity, is of the most direct interest to us.

"Poland must be divided by keeping constant jealousies and confusion there. The authorities must be won over with money and the assemblies corrupted so as to influence the election(s) . . . We must get up a party of our own here, send Russian troops into the country and let them sojourn there so long they may ultimately

find some pretense for remaining there forever . . ." The above was not issued by Stalin, but comes from the will, dated 1725, of Peter the Great. It has a familiar sound, be it imperialist Russia or Communist Russia.

**CHICK CHATS**

By Clark Gresham

**Shut The Door On Flock Colds**

Do your best to prevent the appearance of colds in your laying flock this winter and you will enjoy more profitable egg production. Colds can practically ruin a whole laying season. Production may fall off 50 per cent and more within a few days after a flock suffers an outbreak of colds; and the condition may persist for several weeks.

**Insulate and Ventilate**

Usually, colds result indirectly from errors in management or faulty construction in the laying house itself. When the poultry raiser permits his flock to become chilled, or when he fails to remove damp spots in the litter, or makes no attempt to plug up cracks in the walls or to replace broken window panes—if he is guilty of all of these, then he is inviting an outbreak of colds. A cold, and damp and drafty laying house is the ideal environment for a cold epidemic. So eliminate those conditions with proper ventilation and insulation.

Once the disease has appeared, the sick birds should be isolated. Infected chickens at first have a nasal discharge of water consistency; later it becomes sticky. There may be some swelling on the face, wattles, and skin of the neck. Difficult breathing and coughing may be noted. While mortality is not usually high, the birds go out of production and often become culls.

**Drugs for Control**

Good results are being obtained in controlling infectious coryza (colds) by using sulfathiazole products, which most poultry medicine dealers can supply. The use of inhalants or nasal washes will frequently give affected birds temporary relief by loosening congestion in the upper respiratory passages.

Recovered birds are apparently immune to the disease. However, since they still may carry the infection, it is advisable to keep them separated from the younger stock.

Colds and coryza should not be confused with other respiratory diseases, such as infectious laryngotracheitis and bronchitis. With these conditions, there is considerable coughing, gasping, and similar symptoms that more or less distinguish them. These are virus diseases and can be partially prevented by vaccination.

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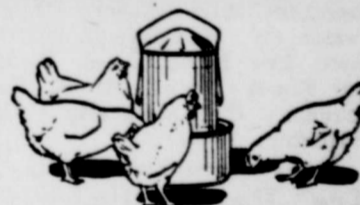

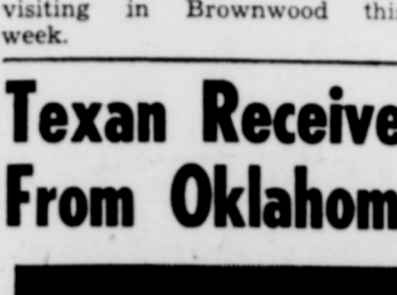

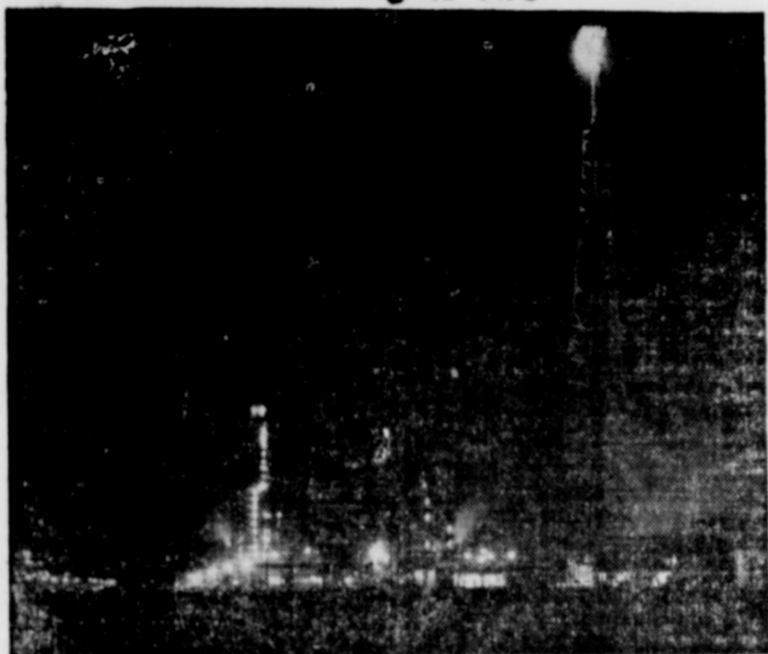

Miss Ball is the daughter of the family for which Bob serves as butler, and she dislikes him almost as much as does her father, Jack Kirkwood. Only socially ambitious Lea Penman is pleased with the addition of a "fancy pants" to her household. However, when Bob, armed only with a stetzel bottle and a pair of speedy legs, stands up to two-gun Bruce Cabot, he wins Lucille's love and howls of laughter from the audience.
