SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Farmers who are considering expansion of their cotton acreage in 1951, with the lifting of Government cotton restrictions, may undo much of the good conservation work they have

accomplished unless they choose their cotton land wisely and take steps to protect it.

Some timely recommendations for farmers planning to increase their cotton acreage are:

1. Plant cotton only on land that is suited to cotton. Cotton land should be productive enough for a profitable yield, and not easily eroded.
2. Plant legumes or other winter cover if sufficient mois-

ture is available on land to be planted to cotton in 1951. Such crops prevent erosion and step up cotton yields from 25 to 100 per cent. Where sufficient moisture is not available for planting of cover crops, allow as much crop residue as possible to remain on top of the soil to prevent soil erosion.

3. Keep cotton off of land where cotton root rot is common.

Farmers co-operating with the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District, can secure information from the local soil conservation office as to soils best suited for the growing of cotton on their farms.

On sandy soils easily subject to wind erosion, the growing of strips of corn or grain sorghums with the cotton, greatly helps to protect the soil from wind erosion.

Re-enlistment Of Marine Reserves Now Being Taken

Major Edward L. Bale, Jr., Officer in Charge of the Dallas Marine Recruiting Office, announced today that his office has received instructions which permit the re-enlistment in the U. S. Marine Corps Reserve, in grades up to and including the rank of Sergeant for assignment to immediate active duty, in the cases of ex-marines.

"A man who served in the U. S. Marine Corps and was discharged as a Sergeant, may now apply to any Marine Corps Recruiting Office for re-enlistment in the U. S. Marine Corps Reserve, and reappointment to the rank of Sergeant, for assignment to immediate active

duty", the Major explained. "Men accepted for enlistment under the provisions of these instructions from the Wichita Falls area, will be assigned to Camp Joseph H. Pendleton, California for duty, except in the cases of men with job specialties in Marine aviation, who will be assigned to the Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro, California for duty. Men re-entering the Marine Corps to take advantage of this opportunity will be required to re-enlist for an "Indefinite Period." This program is restricted to male personnel, Major Bale added.

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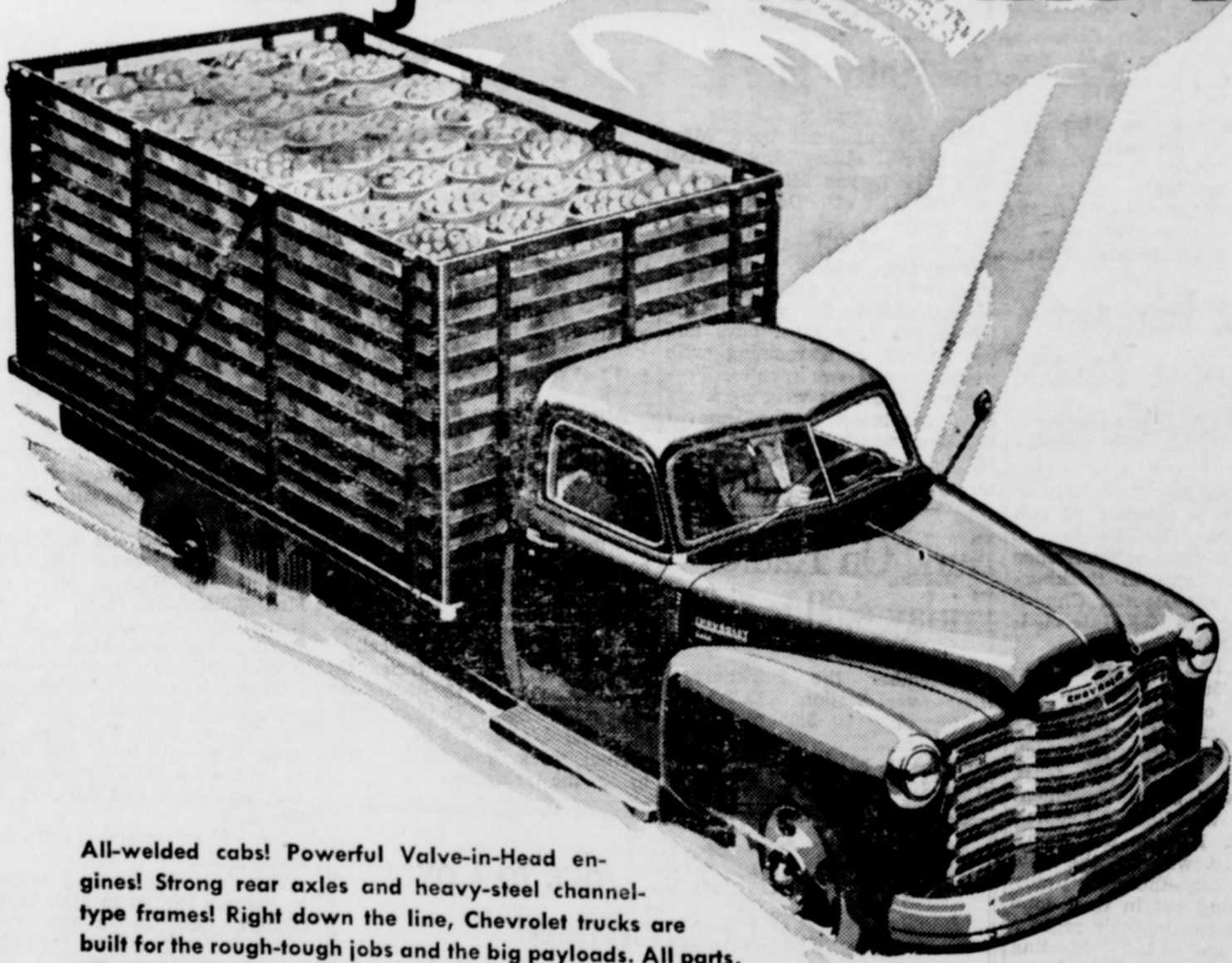

Newcastle Also Strikes In Fall

Sudden attacks of Newcastle in the fall and winter months are not unknown. In fact, a high percentage of Newcastle outbreaks have occurred during September, October, November and December during the past few years.

When Newcastle disease strikes a flock at this time of year the results can be disheartening as well as damaging, since the birds commonly come down with the disease just after egg production gets underway. With Newcastle putting a flock out of action for 5 to 6 weeks, a raiser's entire laying program is interrupted, and his egg profits sink far below expectations.

How About Vaccination? The control of Newcastle disease is largely a problem of sanitation and vaccination. Although vaccination for the disease is recommended at an early age, birds in production can be vaccinated without ill effects.

Of course, this has been a risky practice up to this time, but with the introduction of a new, mild strain of live virus for use as an intranasal vaccine, most of the risk has been eliminated.

Newcastle vaccine of the intranasal, live virus variety is for use on birds of all ages, day old chicks right on up to laying birds. It produces effective immunity and does not harm chick growth or affect egg production in layers.

Not Too Late If you have not vaccinated your flock against Newcastle, and the disease is prevalent in

your community, you can still vaccinate with intranasal, live virus vaccine, without endangering your birds or reducing egg production. Since Newcastle is swift-striking and gives little warning, it is wise to vaccinate now, before the disease appears in your locality.

You can use intranasal vaccine by simply dropping a dose of it in the upper nostril of each bird. Immunity is quickly obtained, in one day in most adult birds. And there is no danger of spread of the infection.

For those raisers who prefer the wing-stab method of vaccination, which is the same as fowl pox vaccination, various wing-web vaccines are now available. They also produce effective immunity, but they are somewhat restricted in their usage.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox State Health Officer

The Texas State Board of Health has elected Dr. Geo. W. Cox of Austin to his eighth consecutive two-year term as state health officer.

The vote of the nine member board was unanimous in favor of keeping Dr. Cox in the post he has held since 1936, the longest tenure in the 70 odd year history of the State Department of Health.

Dr. O. B. Kiel of Wichita Falls, chairman of the board, called Dr. Cox, "outstanding among the health officers in the nation."

"The job he has done in his capacity is remarkable," Dr. Kiel said. "I speak for the whole board when I say Texas is fortunate to have such a man as Dr. Cox heading its public health activities."

In addition to Dr. Kiel, present board members are Dr. S. D. Coleman, Navasota; Pat J. Cavanaugh, a San Antonio pharmacist; Dr. John H. Mitchell, Tyler; Dr. A. W. Rogers, Corsicana; J. P. Burden, San Angelo; Dr. T. C. Terrell, Fort Worth; Dr. B. E. Pickett, Corizo Springs; and Dr. L. S. Oates, Center.

Dr. Cox aligned himself with the public health movement in Texas throughout his professional career. He is a former member of the State Board of Health. His medical degree was conferred at Tulane University. Some of the highlights of his tenure as the leader of State public health activities are:

A reduction of typhoid fever rates of 97 per cent; a 96 per cent cut in malaria mortality; 43 per cent reduction in syphilis

is death tolls.

The common diseases of childhood—scarlet fever, whooping cough, diphtheria and measles—have been so sharply curtailed that last year the combined death rate from these four causes was less than one-third that of diphtheria alone 15 yrs. ago. Influenza and pneumonia deaths have also fallen off sharply since 1937.

A 500 per cent increase in the number of local health units has occurred under the administration of the veteran health chief who strongly advocates decentralization of the state's health facilities "so people can get to them."

He is a past president of the United States-Mexico Border Public Health Conference, a diplomat of the American Public Health Association, American Medical Association, and the Texas State Medical Association. He is also director of the Division of Emergency Medical Services and Public Health within the framework of the State's civil defense organization.

The dollars' and cents' cost of tuberculosis in this country is conservatively estimated at \$350,000,000 a year.

That is high tribute to pay a disease.

It is particularly high tribute to pay a preventable disease. Even so, it is only a small part of the cost of tuberculosis. The worst toll exacted by this disease cannot be computed in dollars and cents. It is paid for in suffering, in the pain of separation for months, perhaps years, from loved ones, in the sense of frustration when careers are interrupted.

The costliness of tuberculosis lies in the fact that it is a chronic, long term, communicable disease. These characteristics explain both the financial burden and the physical and emotional suffering it causes.

TB has a slow onset, thus too frequently it is not recognized and diagnosed until it has a firm hold on its victims. Recovery is then a slow process. During the period when the patient is under treatment, he is deprived of normal family life, of earning a livelihood, of following a chosen vocation.

Yes, TB comes high. Better, far better, than paying the cost of TB would be preventing TB. This is not an impossible task. We know that if all the people who have TB but who are unknown to health authorities—and it is estimated there are at least 250,000 in this country—were diagnosed and placed under proper treatment, within a reasonable time we could eradicate TB, and, eventually, the tremendous costs it exacts.

For the sake of our financial and human resources, it is obviously sound economy to prevent TB. And each of us can help bring this costly disease under control by supporting the campaign against TB in our community. We have an opportunity today to show our faith in the eradication of TB in a very tangible way. We can buy Christmas Seals, sole support of the Wichita County Tuberculosis Association in its year-round campaign against the "white plague."

Through Christmas Seals, we can cut down the tribute to TB.

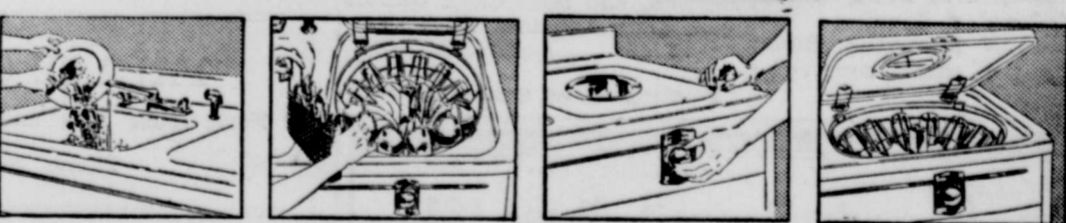

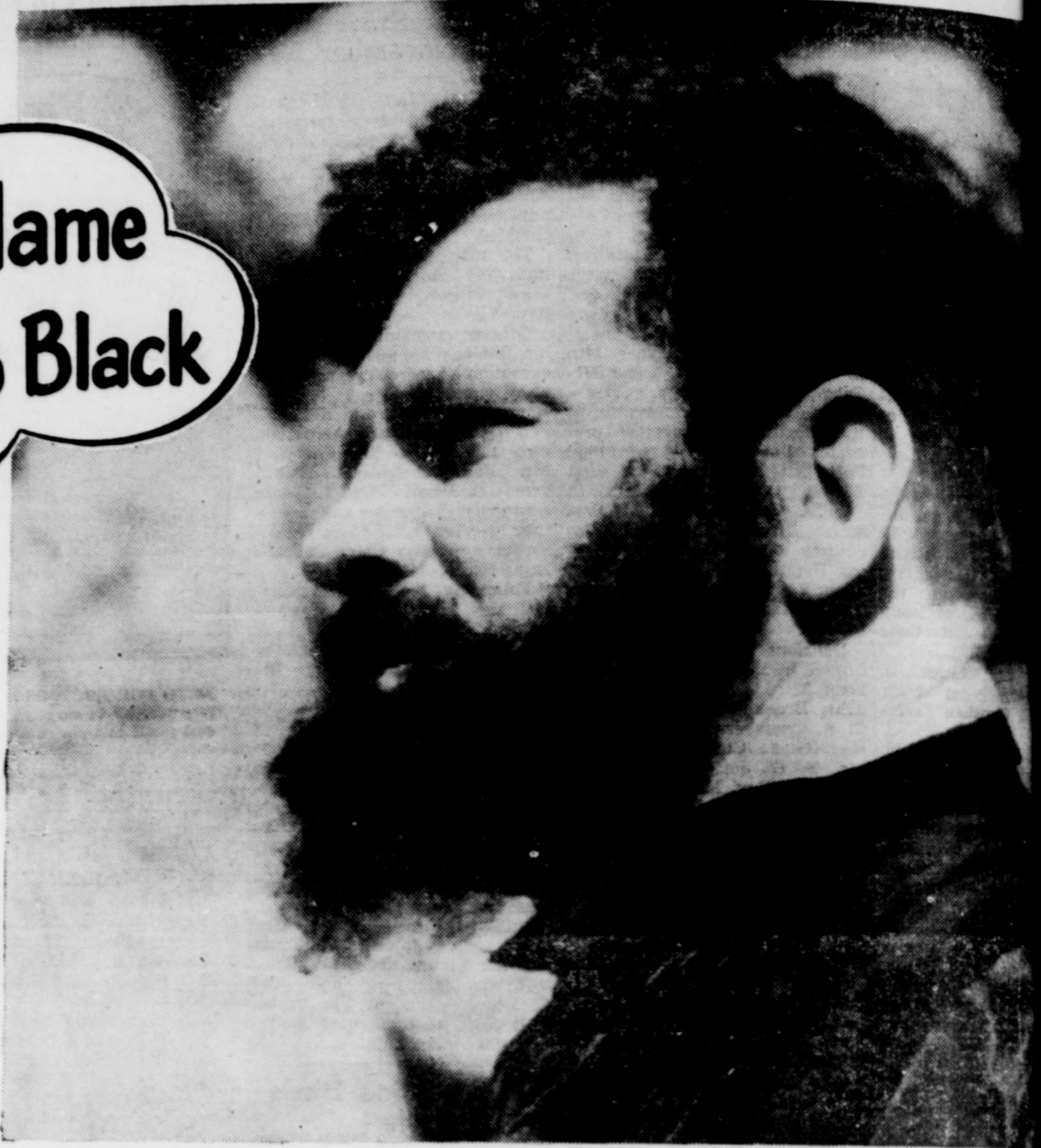

\$6.89 Paid For Million Dollars Worth of Surplus

Investigations by the Senate Armed Services Preparedness Subcommittee have disclosed how the Air Force paid \$63,000 to repurchase valuable equipment which had been sold by the government as surplus for \$6.89.

This was announced today by Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, (D-Texas), Chairman, who said: "Since its creation, the Senate Armed Services Preparedness Subcommittee has devoted considerable time to efforts to halt the unwise sale of valuable defense materials as surplus. We believe that substantial progress has been made toward establishing more prudent and more realistic policies.

"In all our investigations, however, this case of the Air Force spending \$63,000 to repurchase equipment which had been sold by the government for \$6.00 is perhaps the most astounding case of short-sightedness that we have encountered. We hope that this incident will impress upon all agencies dealing with surplus the great necessity for exercising the utmost caution and care in their transactions."

The case mentioned by Senator Johnson is this: In 1946, a former Naval Officer returned to his home in East Texas and began buying small quantities of surplus goods from the War Assets Administration to improve his farm. These goods he bought included blacksmith tools, building materials, carpentry tools, tractors, etc. His total purchases were less than \$3,000.00.

While bidding on this equipment, he found an item offering for sale Air Craft "Computers." The man explained: "I had in mind that these instruments were small circular cardboard computers which might be used in civilian life for calculating land areas, etc., in a similar manner to a cheap slide rule.

So he filed a bid for about 5 cents each on these items. Some time later he was notified that his bid had been accepted and he was urged to move the "computers" promptly.

"At that time," the purchaser reports, "I told the contracting officer over the telephone just to send them up to me parcel post if he was so anxious to get rid of them."

The officer informed the man that would be impossible, since there was about an acre of them stored in the open. Wondering what he had gotten, the man rushed to San Antonio and found he had about 168 serviceable unused Air Craft Parralax Computers—electric fire control instruments—of the very latest design and model. The packing slip disclosed that these Computers were valued at \$7,200 each.

For a total of \$6.89—about 5 cents for each \$7,200 machine—he had bought computers worth \$1,209,600.

When the purchaser explain-

ed to the officer that he had no intention of buying this type "Computer" when he bid—and had no idea of their value—the officer told him that he was bound by contract to accept these machines and dispose of them. So, the Computers were carried away to the man's East Texas home.

He kept the machines stored in a warehouse and eventually wrote the Air Force Procurement office in Washington to explain that the machines were available if the Air Force ever became interested.

Within a short while, Air Force officers arrived to inspect the machines. The Procurement Section, Wright Field, Dayton, Ohio, then entered into negotiations and offered \$63,000 for these computers. The offer was

accepted. The purchaser estimates that in addition to the \$6.89 he paid for these computers, storage, crating, shipping, etc. cost him \$4,000. The man offered this comment:

"The thing may be summed up by saying that the disposal agency was delighted to unload what they thought was a heap of junk on an unsuspecting country boy and that the Colonel in charge of the purchasing agency and the personnel at Wright Field were delighted to repurchase this equipment in brand new condition at a cost which saved the taxpayer one-half million dollars."

Senator LeBlanc Offers \$10,000 To Boost Advertising of the South

Louisiana Senator Dudley LeBlanc offered to donate \$10,000 as the first contribution to get an Advertise-South Campaign rolling nationally. He made the offer in an address before the Dallas Advertising League, and said "and there's plenty more where that came from." The South, said Senator LeBlanc, should use the methods of advertising and promotion he had used as a "country lad" who parlayed a \$2,500 borrowed shoestring into today's \$7,000,000 Hadacol organization in less than two and a half years. He disclosed he had turned down a \$10,000,000 cash offer a week ago for his Louisiana-made Hadacol tonic business. "So you see if one man—a country lad with only the idea of wanting to get ahead—could do that with one item," said LeBlanc, "what couldn't we do if all of us got united in the South?" "By a concerted effort, using advertising, the South could induce our northern cousins to bring their manufacturing industries into our midst," he added. Senator LeBlanc's plan called for establishment of "a non-profit organization of some type" with a huge southern advertising "War Chest" to come from funds appropriated by various State Legislatures, plus contributions from private corporations. "I know and feel sure," LeBlanc told his audience of Texas advertising men, "being a State Senator myself, that you would have no difficulty in obtaining an appropriation from all of the various states of the Southland." Senator LeBlanc spoke to an audience of almost five hundred of the largest in the Ad League history, including guests from civic groups. The Senator reported that \$200,000,000, and said he would like to see \$100,000,000 worth of advertising materials are available in 1951 if materials are available.

Senator LeBlanc Tells How to Sell South
