S.S. Representative To Be In Burk November 30

He will take claims of retired workers, dependents and survivors; issue social security cards; and distribute informational leaflets explaining phases of the amended Social Security Act.

Mr. Tate calls attention to the provision in the new social security law for the payment of monthly insurance benefits to the wife of a retired worker, regardless of her present age, if she has a child under 18 in her care. Under the old law, such payments were not made until she became 18. Women who meet this requirement should file new claims for insurance payments, says Mr. Tate.

LATE IN NOVEMBER

SAME SONG—SECOND VERSE

In 1946 a former Navy officer studied a sales list of surplus goods offered by the War Assets Administration, to buy in small quantities items to improve his farm. Seeing aircraft "computers", thinking they were cardboard calculators on the order of a slide rule, which could be used for computing land acres, he sent in a bid of 5 cents each. The bid accepted he suggested the computers be sent him parcel post, and learned this was impossible for they covered an acre of ground. No wonder a Senate sub-committee is investigating and criticises the Air Force procurement officials—a value of \$1,209,600, sold for \$6.89 and purchased back for \$63,000.

Builders Awards Offer to Farmers

The annual J. S. Bridwell Builders Awards program offering \$5,000 a year to conservation farmers in Clay and Wichita Counties, will be climaxed December 8, with an Awards Banquet in the Woman's Forum in Wichita Falls. Mr. Paul H. Walser, Chief of the State Soil Conservation Service will be the principal speaker.

Approximately 500 persons consisting mostly of farmers and ranchers are expected to attend the banquet. Cash awards and

honors will be bestowed on winners in the first year's contest. The 1950 winners in the J. S. Bridwell Soil Builders Awards program were among the area's most progressive farmers.

They demonstrated that it was possible to maintain soil fertility while earning a cash income. None of their soil building projects was a sacrifice financially. First place winners — John Williamson, John Wesley, E. G. Muller and Ronald Lattimer of Wichita County; and Ermine Berend of Archer County—will receive \$150 each. Solon Downing, winner in the legume grass division, will get \$125 first prize.

All of the five winners in each division will receive cash and honors at the Awards Banquet. These are winners in all divisions judged to Saturday: Irrigated summer legumes—John Williamson, Solon Featherston, Fred Staber, Ed Gensler and Shem Cunningham. Non-irrigated summer legumes—Ernie Berend, Herbert Detmer, Sylvester Wolf, R. S. Thompson and Edman Poirot. Legume grass irrigated pasture — Solon Downing, Rufus King, Louis McCarthy, L. J. Lane and Fred Staber. Irrigated Winter Legumes—

John Wesley, J. J. Stone and Solon Featherston. (Only three made in this division). Non-irrigated winter legumes — E. G. Muller, R. S. Thompson, Macon Boddy, George Streit, Brine Berend and Nord Zimmerman. Special Crops — Ronald Lattimer, Jerry Gee, Jack Stewart, M. C. Disiker and Howard Taylor. Pasture and range improvement awards will be named this week, and conservation practices on whole farm, five in each of the three counties, will be named next week.

Approximately 100 farmers from the Burkburnett area have entered the contest.

BETTER HEALTH

by Geo. W. Cox, M. D. State Health Officer

Among the most frequent causes of sinus trouble are infections of the nose and throat like the common cold, influenza, measles, scarlet fever, whooping cough, and diphtheria, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Exposure and chilling of the skin, poor diet, fatigue, allergies, infected teeth or tonsils, enlarged adenoids or other nasal obstructions also may cause sinus infection.

Blowing the nose violently, diving or swimming with the nose under water may force infectious material into the sinuses. Frequent use of sprays, oils and antiseptics in the nose may injure the mucous membrane and bring on sinus infection.

General resistance to sinus infection can be built up by observing the rules for good physical and mental health. Get plenty of rest, good food and exercise. Protect your body from sudden changes in temperature and from exposure to extreme cold or heat. Don't expose yourself to infections, since colds and other infections of nose, throat and chest are often forerunners of sinus trouble.

Rest in bed and medical care for respiratory ailments are wise precautions against complications.

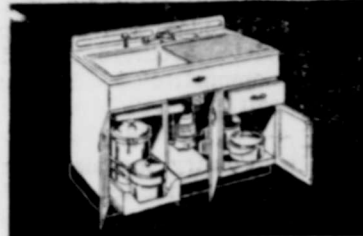

CHICK CHATS

MANAGING THE LAYING FLOCK

A well located and well built laying house is a sign of good management—and it will go far in giving the poultry raiser maximum egg production and a saving in labor. But it's inside the laying house where good management really pays.

Yes, a healthy flock of pullets quartered in a good laying house is a good beginning but there is much more to be done before that laying flock begins to bring in the profits.

Watch Layers Closely
Once the flock gets into heavy production, a poultry raiser should visit and observe his birds with great regularity. Of course, much of this can be done during the egg gathering trips to the laying house, but all too often many raisers neglect to look over the birds even then. By being constantly alert, a poultryman can spot layers out of condition or showing signs of a contagious disease. He can then separate such birds from the rest of the flock, treat them, and do whatever is necessary to restore their good health—without endangering the other birds.

The poultry raiser should also keep the house well ventilated, so that litter does not become damp and cold. Keeping the house warm and dry is highly important to successful and profitable egg production.

In addition there should be plenty of feeders and waterers, at least 1 ft. of feeder space for

every 4 birds and one 5 gallon waterer for every 100 birds. It is important to have enough nests to prevent dirty eggs, so allow 1 nest for every 5 birds.

Keep a Clean House
Naturally, you should maintain strict sanitation. Clean and disinfect waterers and feeders regularly. And keep clean nesting materials and well-stirred litter in the house at all times. Above all, keep your flock comfortable in a clean laying house.

Here are some additional pointers to keep in mind.
Cull the flock regularly.
Use artificial lighting to provide your layers a 14 hour working day.
Follow feeding schedules closely. Do not make sudden changes in your management program.
Arrange all laying house equipment conveniently.
Check birds regularly for lice and mites.
Keep the house free of drafts. Gather eggs in wire baskets. Give birds regular worming treatment.
