## City Faces Water Shortage During Next Summer

Burkburnett faces a certain water shortage next summer if immediate steps are not taken to secure an additional source of supply. Present estimates are that the demand could reach some 500,000 or 600,000 gallons per day more than existing facilities could produce.

Last year, one of the wettest ever experienced here, was a life saver so far as the City water supply was concerned. Little, if any, yard or garden watering was necessary during the past summer. Because of the extra amount of humidity in the air most of the time, air conditioners used very little water. As a result, last summer's consumption of water was hardly as much as during 1950.

Yet, in face of all the favorable circumstances last summer, the supply was never much ahead of the demand. One hundred or more new water customers were added during 1950. Prospects are that another 100 will be added early during 1951. That all adds up to a certain water shortage, regardless of the wetness of the summer.

City Commissioners have been poring over the matter for several months. They know the seriousness of the situation, but as yet have not come up with a solution. This matter, so vital to the growth and existence of Burkburnett, needs the best thought of its solid citizens.

The Council is open for suggestions. The certainty of waterless days or half days is not a pleasant thing to ponder over.

## Men With Dependent May Now Enlist In The U. S. Air Force

Male applicants from civilian life who have dependents may now be accepted for enlistment in the U. S. Air Force according to SFC Boyd L. Sullivan of the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting Office, Room 215, Federal Bldg., Wichita Falls, Texas.

Under this recent directive men with or without prior service may be enlisted or reenlisted provided they have no more than two dependents. Men enlisted who have dependents will be entitled to payment of the new family allowance. Prior to this change, only men

who were authorized to enlist in grades of Staff, Technical and Master Sergeants were eligible to reenlist with dependents.

Sullivan pointed out that Air Force monthly quota restrictions permit on a first come, first served basis. Applicants without prior service must be between the ages of 17 to 35, mentally and physically qualified. Qualifications for men with prior service are the same with the exception of age.

**CHICK CHATS**

**TIPS FOR**

When your laying stock goes into production, it will be for you to give extra attention to flock management. Without proper care and management, your flock may fall behind the high rate of production you expect. But with the right kind of management, your birds may far exceed your expectations.

During December keep a close watch over your layers. Be alert against irregularities in the management errors immediately. This month make sure the following management pointers. It may save a flock from a disease outbreak or a slump in egg production.

**Keep Litter Dry**  
Litter represents a dan-

gerous threat to any flock of chickens. That's why you should remove all wet litter around the water fountains. Always add a small amount of fresh litter to replace the old. Then, to lengthen its life, stir all the floor litter every few days.

Also watch the laying house ventilation. Remember that some air movement is necessary at all times, so don't close the house too much during cold weather.

During winter water warmers should be provided to keep water from freezing. If water is piped into the house, be sure that pipes are well insulated against possible freezing damage. Provide at least one 5 gallon waterer for each 100 hens and clean the containers often.

**Supply Grit**  
Chickens need a steady supply of grit in winter as well as in summer, so keep grit in hoppers before the chickens at all times. In this way, the flock can make its own rations as to the amount needed. The important thing is to encourage heavy

egg production. To produce well, layers need plenty of grit, oyster shell, or other sources of limestone and calcium.

It is also important to maintain feed consumption. As an aid in stimulating appetites, many poultry raisers add a poultry tonic to the feed. Appetizers often aid digestion and keep layers active and productive. A good appetizer also tends to balance rations and frequently acts as a restorative treatment for run-down or convalescing birds.

By applying the above suggestions and poultry tips to your flock, you can give your birds further assurance of a healthy disease-free laying period. Manage those layers carefully and build up your profits.

Insect damage to the 1950 cotton crop in Texas amounted to approximately \$107,035,000, destroying 11 per cent of the total harvest, according to an unofficial preliminary estimate compiled by the National Cotton Council, George G. Chance, chairman of the Texas unit of the Council, said here today.

Insects kept approximately 456,000 bales of cotton and an estimated 187,000 tons of cottonseed off the market this year. Based on average prices, this lint would have brought Texas farmers some \$91,119,000 and the seed would have meant an additional profit of \$15,916,000, the Council spokesman said.

"Throughout the Cotton Belt" Mr. Chance said, "an estimated 16.5 per cent of the crop, valued at approximately \$598,565,000 was destroyed. In dollars and cents, losses in 1950 were second highest on record, exceeded by only by 1949 when damage amounted to more than 617 billion."

Chairman Chance announced that the National Cotton Council will hold the fourth annual Cotton Insect Control Conference in Memphis, December 7-8, to discuss insect damage in Texas and other Cotton Belt states. This conference at the Hotel Peabody will bring together state and federal entomologists, representatives of the insecticide industry, agricultural education workers, and cotton industry leaders to plan an integrated program of cotton insect control for 1951.

**Mail Holiday Cards Now**

It may be 20 days until Christmas, but now is the time to get those greeting cards ready for mailing.

Post out-of-state cards by Dec. 15 to insure delivery before Christmas. Greetings for local delivery should be mailed at least a week before the 25th.

Put three cent stamps on the cards. "First class mail receives preferred handling, transportation and delivery — and that means a lot at the peak of Christmas rush. The extra penny may insure that your greetings will arrive several days, and perhaps even a week before slower third class mail."

Cards with three cent stamps will be forwarded if the addressee has moved and if he has filled out a change of address card at the post office. If he has not filled out the proper card or if the address is otherwise incorrect, the three cent stamped letter will be returned to the addressee, since the postal department no longer has a directory service. Getting the missent letter back depends upon one thing, of course — a return address clearly written on the envelope.

If you disregard the postmaster's appeal and use two cent stamps anyway, the flap should be tucked in but the envelope cannot be sealed. You're not permitted to write a holiday message to your friends on the card, either — just sign your name.

Christmas greetings that carry only a two cent stamp go at 3rd class or advertising circular rate and receive circular treatment Hardage said. Postal regulations specify that only one attempt be made to deliver third class mail. If the address is wrong—the card is dumped in the dead letter office.

There's one other regulation: a minimum postage of three cents is required on envelopes smaller than 2 3/4 by 4 inches or larger than 9 by 12 inches, whether sealed or unsealed.

Stockmen Are Urged to Control Cattle Grubs

Now is the time to control Cattle Grubs in your cattle, according to the Agricultural department of Burkburnett High School.

Nearly one-half of the cattle today on Texas markets are grubby. Grubs and heel flies cause losses in many different ways.

The heel fly, a large bee-like fly terrorizes cattle in spring, causing them to run or stand in water for a long period of time. No practical method has been found for killing heel flies, keeping them away from cattle, or killing the eggs they lay on the animal's legs.

The eggs hatch out in about a week or less, and the tiny grub bore through the skin and into the muscles and other deeper tissues. There they start feeding and growing, constantly moving about. Gradually during the next 8 or 9 months they work upward through the animals body to the animals back where each grub cuts a breathing hole through the skin, around each grub a cyst forms, and in this the grub remains and continues to grow for 5 or more weeks, the grub turning brown in color, working its way through the skin drops to the ground, works its way into the ground and

comes out in the spring as a heel fly.

Each year in Texas, grubby cattle are discounted 1/2 to 1 1/2 cents per pound on an average of \$3.86 per head or enough of meat lost to feed 4,600 soldiers for 1 year. Besides being a loss of meat and money, Grubby cattle require about 15% more feed than cows free from grubs. In dairy animals they can cause a reduction in milk from up to 25%.

The Grubs begin to appear in cattle in late November or about the 1st of December. Treatment should begin as soon as the syst are noticed and the grubs have cut holes in the back. The treatment should consist of a spray or dust, baths have about the same effect if properly done. As a spray use about 7 1/2 lbs of Ratenone of 5% powder to 100 gallons of water. This should be sprayed on the cattle with a nozzle pressure of 300 to 400 lbs. At this rate about 3 to 4 qts. are used per animal. Care must be exercised to hold the nozzle 12 to 14 inches from the animals back.

As a dust, dust backs of animals thoroughly with equal part by weight Cube or Derris (5% Rotenonil) and wettable sulphur. A fruit jar with 15 holes in the lid, 1-4 inch in diameter is best for applying the dust. Rub dust into hair with finger tips. About three treatments at 20 day intervals are necessary.

Remember this does not control the damage already done, but the primary purpose is to dispose of as many of the grubs as possible, decreasing the supply next spring, since most of the heel flies you have each spring are the ones the same cattle fed the year before.

For any other information concerning Cattle Grubs consult the Vocational Agriculture department, Burkburnett High School under the direction of Mr. Ralph Davis, Superintendent and Mr. Douglas, Principal.

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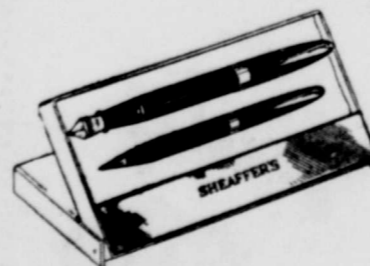

### Yule Trees Can Greatly Increase Fire Hazard

That Christmas tree you are planning to set up in your home could be a major fire hazard unless you take a few precautions, the National Board of Fire Underwriters warns.

Tests made by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc., demonstrated that Christmas trees of average size are easily ignited and burn furiously. The blaze could easily start a dangerous fire in the home.

Engineers of the National Board offer the following suggestions for making your Christmas tree safe:

1. Choose a small tree. It will be less hazardous.
2. Wait until a few days before Christmas to set up your tree.
3. Keep the tree outdoors until ready to set it up.
4. Place the tree in the coolest part of the house.
5. If a radiator is near the tree, shut it off.
6. Do not use cotton or paper decorations unless they are flame-proofed.

7. Do not place electric trains around the tree.
8. Do not use candles. Use electric lights instead.
9. Make certain wires are not frayed. Choose lighting sets bearing marking which indicates listing by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc.
10. Do not plug or unplug the lights beneath the tree.
11. Do not leave tree lights burning when no one is in the house.
12. If needles near the lights turn brown, change the location of the lights.
13. When needles start falling, take the tree down and discard it.

### Yule Decorations Can Be Dangerous Fire Experts Warn

Safety as well as beauty should be a consideration in your choice of Christmas decorations,

the National Board of Fire Underwriters advises.

Combustible decorations contributed to one of the worst fire disasters of modern times, when 9 people died at a Christmas party in Newfoundland in 1942, the organization points out. Many home fire tragedies have also resulted from this cause.

Non-flammable decorations of glass and metal are now generally available, the National Board says. Families can also obtain "snow" for use around the Christmas tree which will

not flare up when touched by a flame.

The organization emphasized the importance of selecting the Christmas tree lights which bear evidence of listing by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc. Candles should never be used on the tree or around the house, and decorating the tree with cotton or paper is also extremely dangerous, the National Board observed.

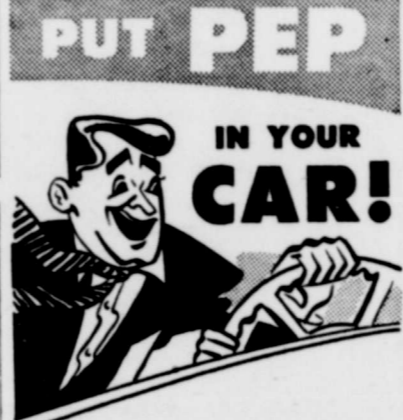

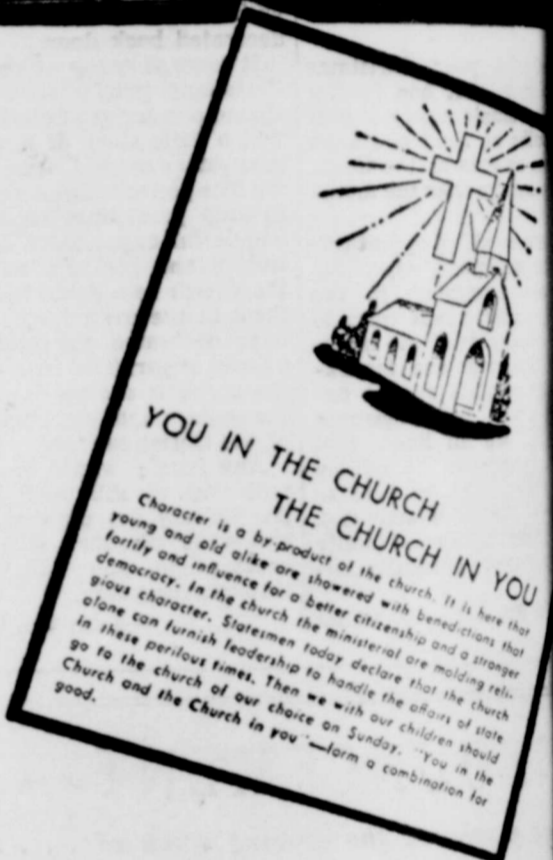
# STRONG HAND of the LAW

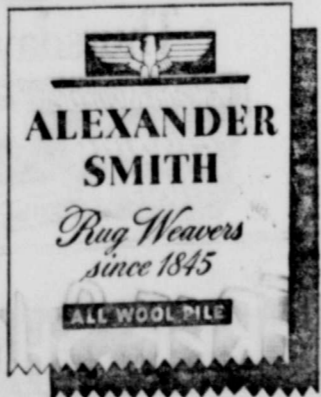

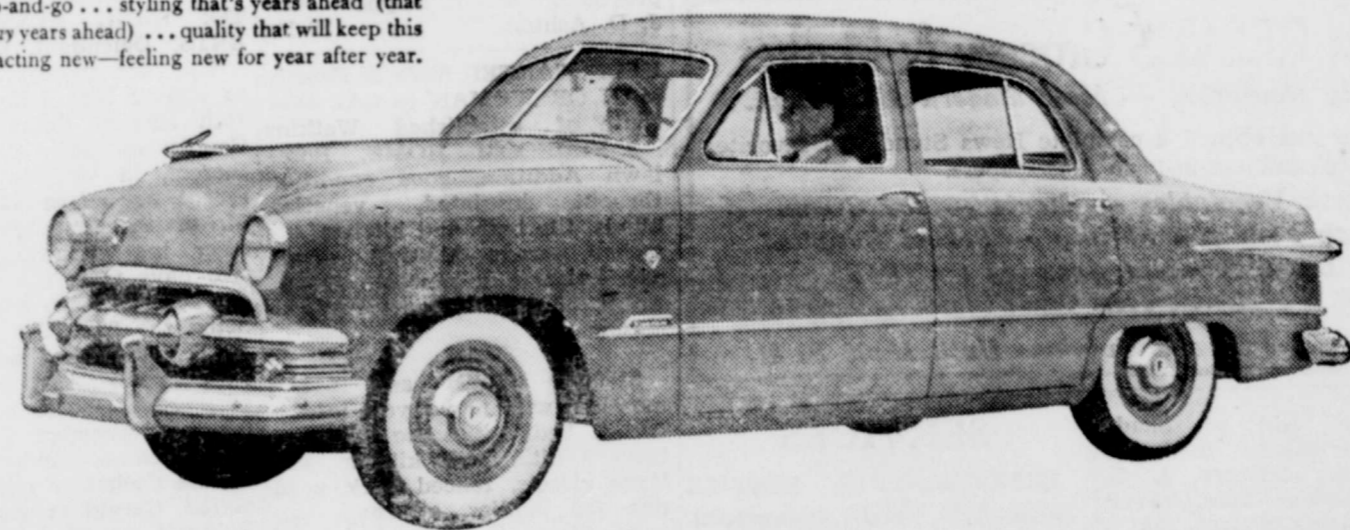

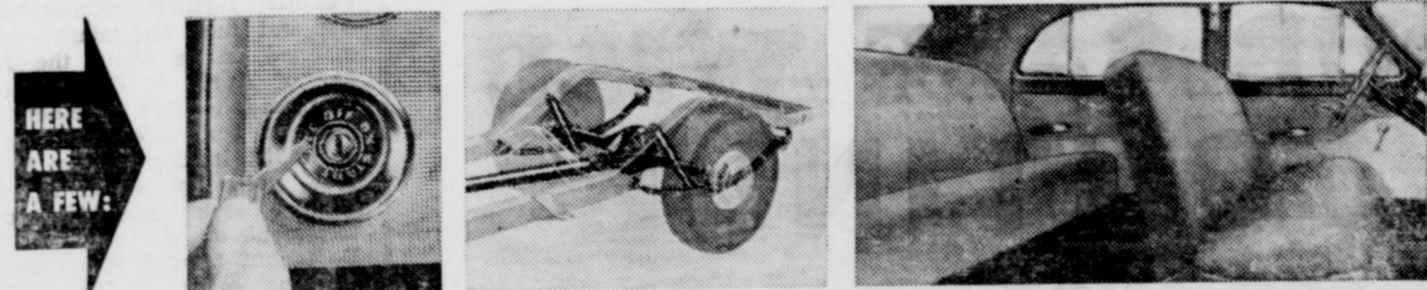
