Another \$50,000 Sale at Livestock Barn Last Sat.

Livestock sales at the Burkburnett Auction Sales Barn last Saturday again exceeded the \$50,000.00 mark.

The local market on cattle was fully steady if not a little higher than the previous week. All classes seemed to move fairly fast. There was definitely not as much volume of fat stuff as we are used to having. This is generally due to drought; however there was a fair offering of butcher cattle.

Hershel Warren of Randlett, Oklahoma, brought in a load of short fed dry lot steers ranging in weight around 750 lbs. that brought him from 25c to 27c. These cattle, from the information I have, were in the feed lot around seventy days and were not too good quality, and I think this was a fancy price. These steers were the best bunch of this kind I have seen at this sale.

G. C. Reeves, Fred Parks, C. H. Thompson and Goody Henry also from Randlett had some very fancy cattle here that sold good. I believe Goody and Fred sold a nice pair of roan heifers as I have seen any place. If I remember right, they weighed better than 800 lbs. each and sold for close to 27c. Figure that out.

W. M. Goins, retired farmer, West of Burkburnett had a load of 500 lb. calves here that brought top prices. According to the paper it looks like the cattle market in Fort Worth is up again this week so there is no telling what the buyers will do here Saturday. This bunch that makes the Burk sale don't try to keep in line with larger markets. They usually stay out in front of them.

The sale starts at 1:30, so bring them in and let's see what they will do.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD



If you divide this charming fall picture into thirds, vertically and horizontally, you'll find that the youngsters were caught in the view finder at a point where two of the lines cross.

It's a Matter of Thirds

WE usually think of pictorial composition as a matter of artistry, rather than of mathematical science, but, strange as it may seem, one of the simplest and most useful rules of composition has its basis in plane geometry.

This is commonly known as the "rule of thirds" and will help you to determine where in your picture to place the point, or points, of emphasis for the best effect. Such a point is essential to a good picture. To be meaningful, a shot must have some one thing or group of things that must stand out sufficiently to show that it or they provided the reason for making the picture.

To make use of the rule of thirds, you have to do a little imaginative drawing of lines. When you are studying your proposed picture in the view finder of your camera, divide the picture area into thirds,

vertically and horizontally. These lines will cross at four points and it has been found that any one of these four points offers a natural spot for the placement of your primary subject. Secondary points of interest can be located at or near any of the other three intersections.

In this way you are placing the subject to one side of and above or below the center of the picture and thus avoiding the static quality that so often is the result of placing a subject in the dead center of the picture area.

Of course, like all rules, the rule of thirds is made to be broken and varied in accordance with particular situations. However, in general, it's a good guide and you will find that it works particularly well when you are dealing with action and movement.

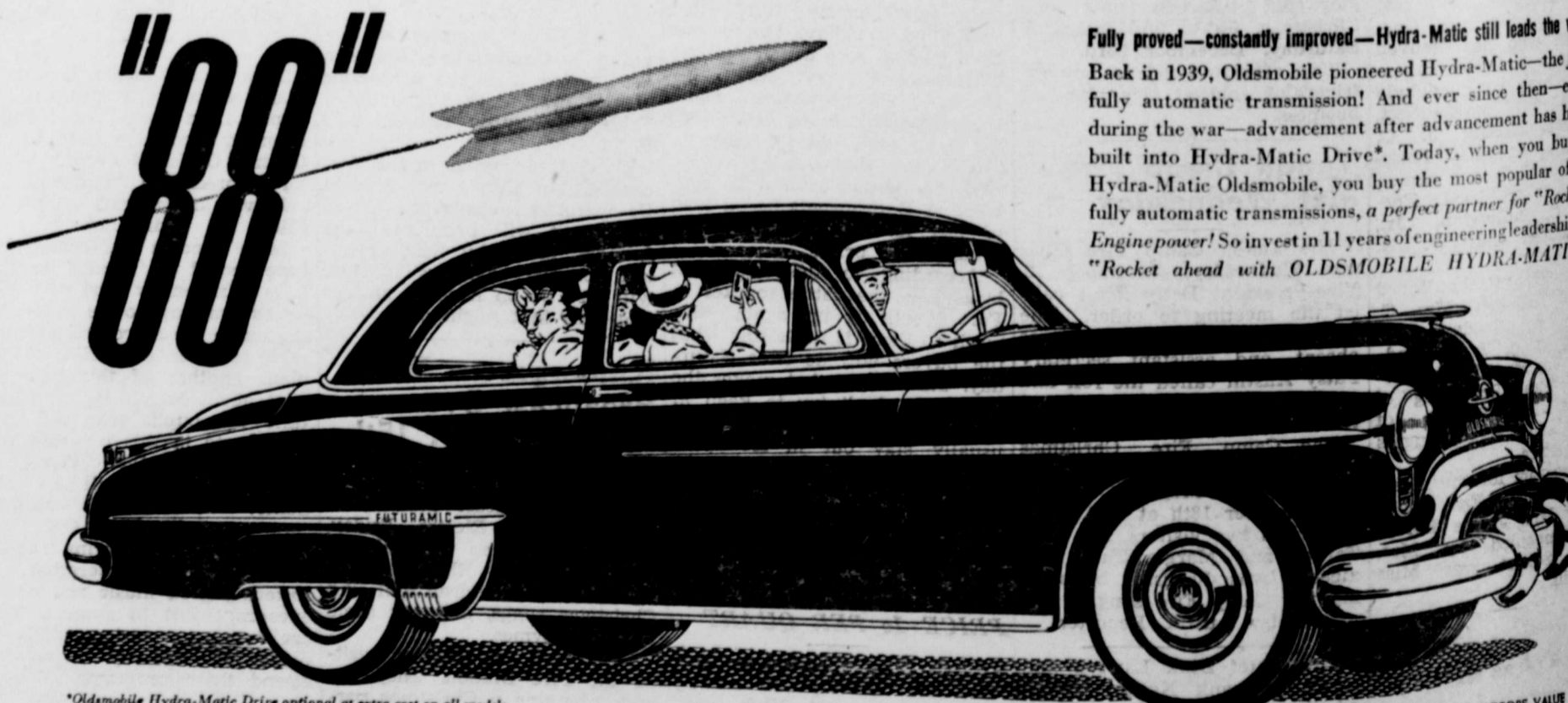

Records Cut Costs

true in poultry raising. Al- though you do not need an elaborate system of charts, in- dexes, and graphs, you should maintain accurate figures and see to it that all entries are kept up to date.

Control Expenses

Daily flock records help the poultryman keep a close check on his birds. Not only is he able to see how much money his flock is making, but he can also visualize more easily how production costs can be reduced and expenses kept under control. Poultry raisers who fail to keep records on their birds,

simply risk their flock, their profits, and their entire poultry- raising operation.

The cost of chicks and the cost of feed are the two big expense items a poultryman contends with. They may account for 90 per cent or more of his total expense. Other costs high on the expense list are cost of medicine; litter, in- surance, fuel, miscellaneous supplies, and depreciation on buildings and equipment.

Mortality of birds is another item to consider. It is here that the raiser is given a good opportunity to boost his profits. Mortality of 15 per cent is con- sidered about the average in many sections. A poultryman taking steps to reduce this mortality to 10 per cent or less can cut production costs and increase his income.

Egg Production

Much income can be derived from a laying flock, providing eggs are handled carefully and the layers are well cared for. To keep egg production up, es- tablish a system for handling and storing eggs in such a way as to maintain good egg qual- ity between the time they are laid and when they are ship- ped to market.

Also manage the layers care- fully. Good or poor manage- ment will determine whether your expenses are greater or less than average. By keeping daily flock records, you can not only increase the efficiency of your poultry business, but also increase your total poultry profits.

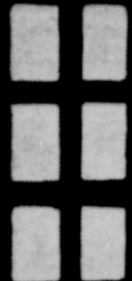

from pipe cleaners and dress them in cloth or paper costumes.

Since there is no action involved, table tops are usually time exposures. And, if you use a long time exposure, you won't need especially bright lighting. You can use ordinary household, 60-watt lamps, singly or in combination, if you place them quite close to your "table tops." Of course, inexpensive photofood lamps will give you excellent lighting, not only for this type of work, but for other indoor shooting.

Table tops can be made with any type of camera you can set for a time exposure. If you are using a fixed-focus camera, such as a box camera, your lens opening is about f/11. In that case, your exposure will be one to two minutes, depending on the amount of light, color and character of the set, and the detail you want.

Actually, you'll want to experiment in order to achieve the desired effect. I can't give you any hard-and-fast formula, but I can tell you that in this way you can have unusual Christmas cards—and fun making them. —John Van Gulder

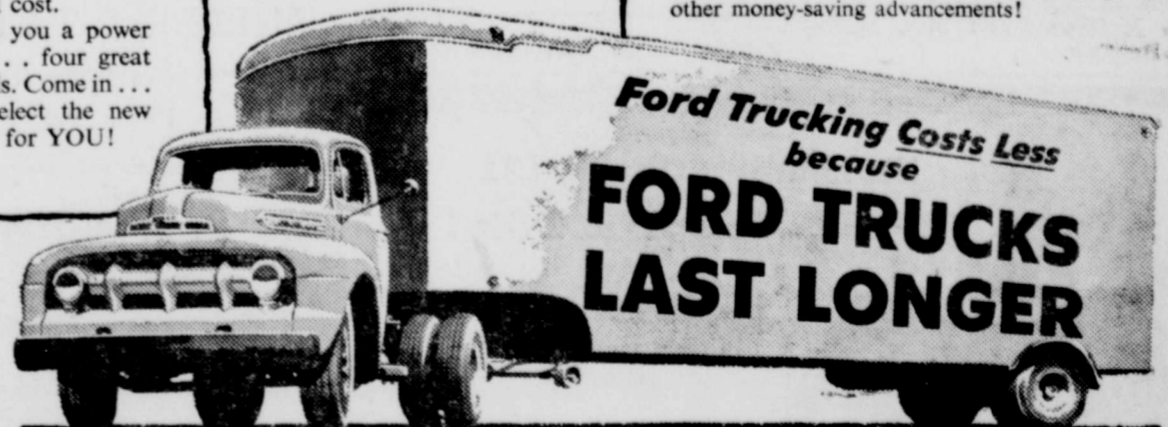

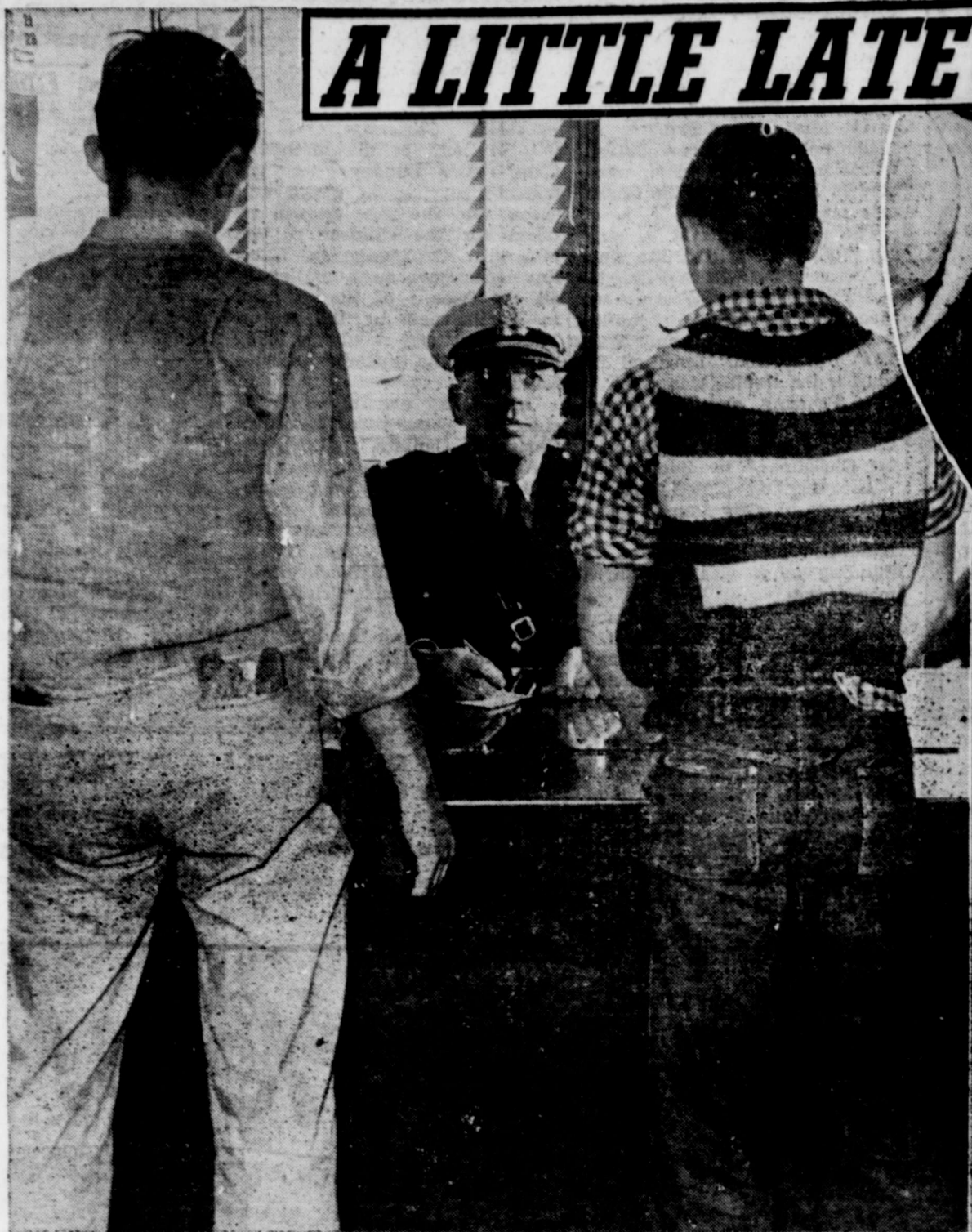

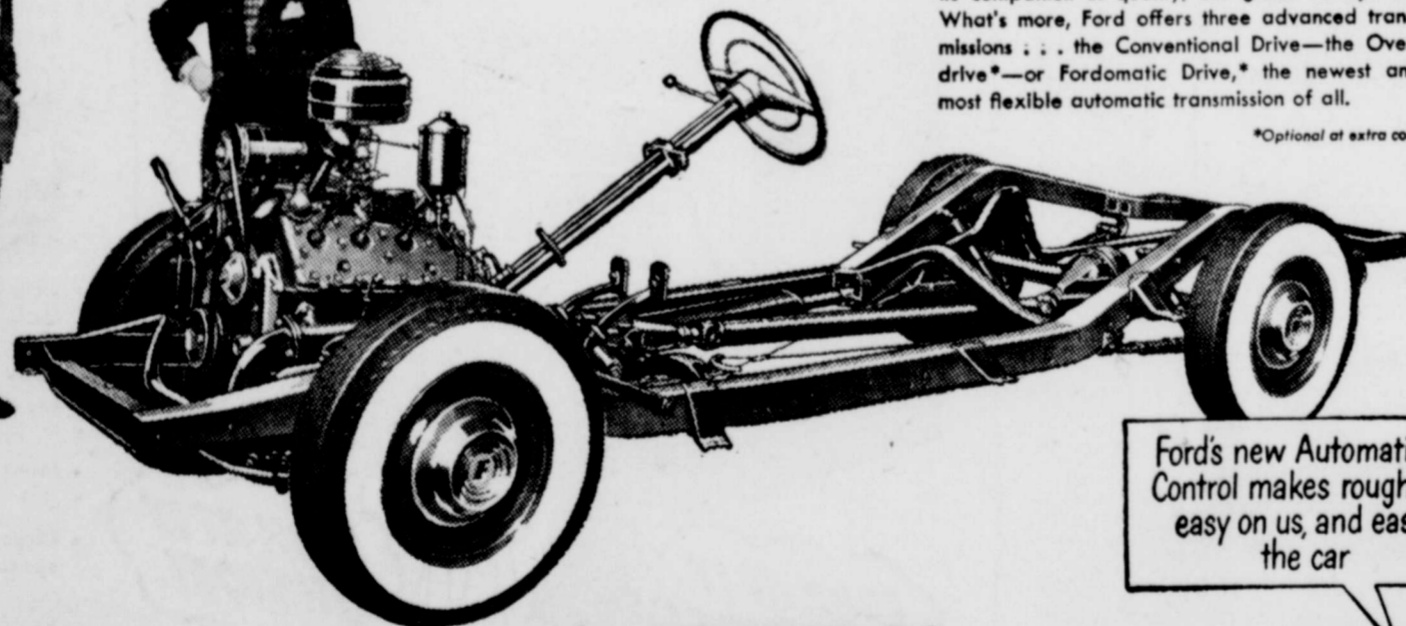

Yule Decorations Can Be Dangerous Fire Experts Warn

Safety as well as beauty should be a consideration in your choice of Christmas decorations, the National Board of Fire Underwriters advises.

Combustible decorations contributed to one of the worst fire disasters of modern times, when 9 people died at a Christmas party in Newfoundland in 1942, the organization points out. Many home fire tragedies have also resulted from this cause.

Non-inflammable decorations of glass and metal are now generally available, the National Board says. Families can also

obtain "snow" for use around the Christmas tree which will not flare up when touched by a flame. The organization emphasized the importance of selecting the Christmas tree lights which bear evidence of listing by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc. Candles should never be used on the tree or around the house, and decorating the tree with cotton or paper is also extremely dangerous, the National Board observed.

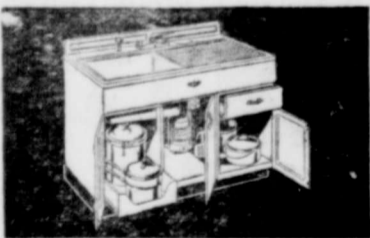

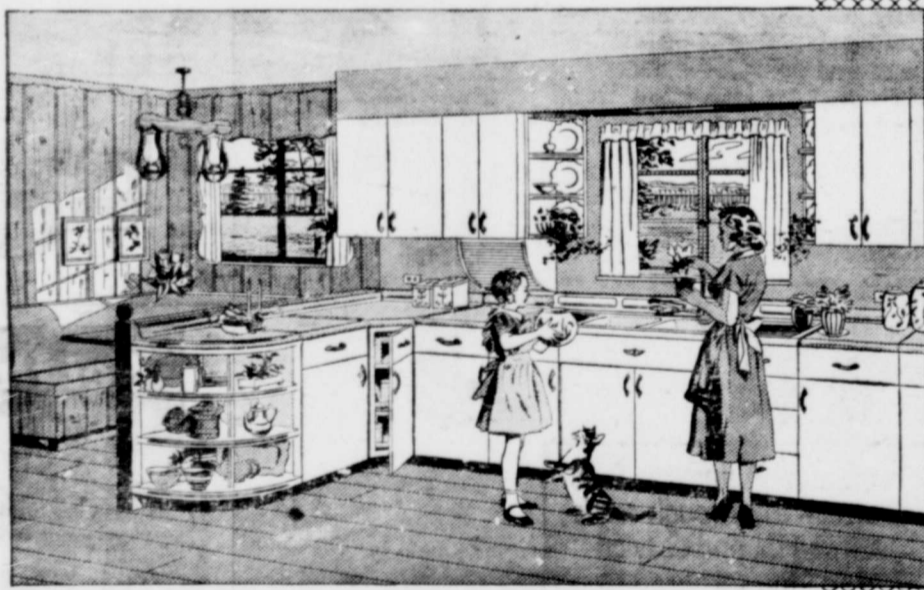

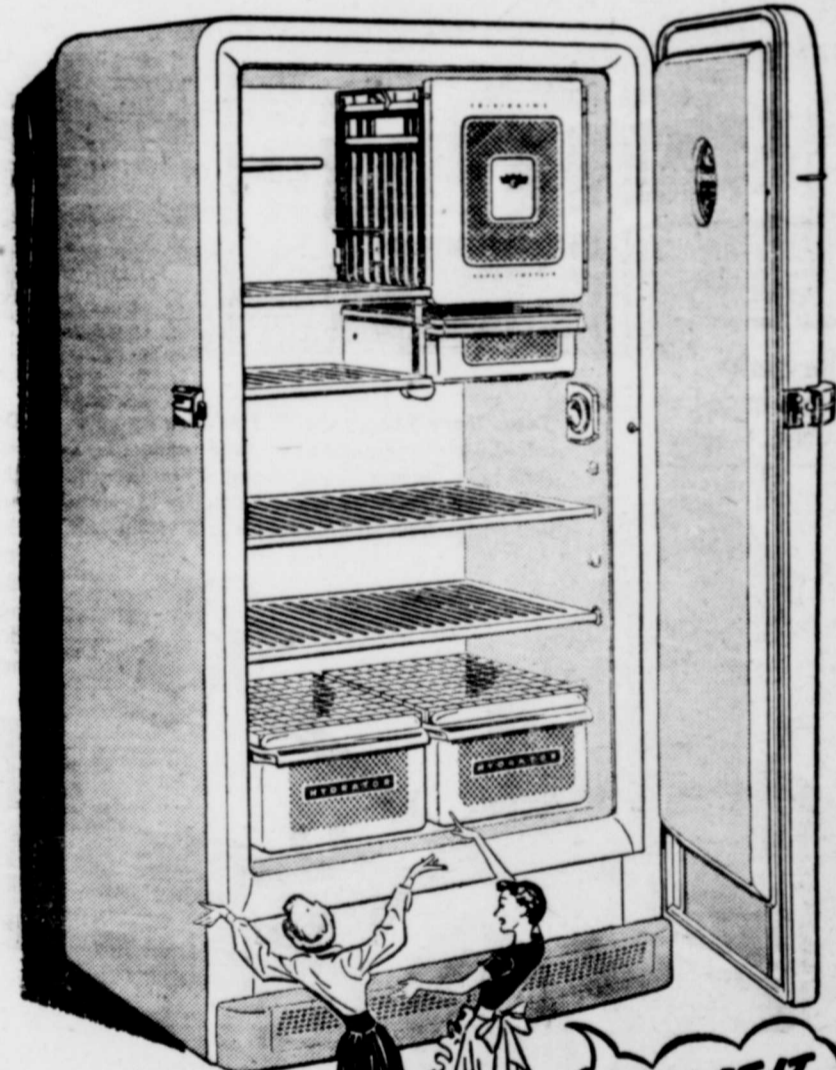

Announcement for Seaman Recruits

Seaman recruits and seaman apprentices who were members of the Naval Reserve prior to September 1, 1950, can now volunteer for active duty in the Navy after they have received draft induction notices, Eighth Naval District headquarters announced.

The Commandant of the 8th Naval District said the new ruling will affect approximately 14,000 men in the district who are in the above category.

Until now, he said, regulations had prevented men in the

Naval Reserve's two lowest pay grades from volunteering for active duty unless they had at least six months' previous full time duty on their records. Under those regulations, a number of these men have been drafted for lack of required regular duty. The Navy cannot now take draftees.

These reservists may now be placed on active duty in the Naval Reserve while they are being processed under selective service, at any time prior to the actual selective service induction date, the Navy ruling stated.

The procedure is as follows: The reservist wishing to volunteer should contact his nearest Naval recruiting station or substation. He must meet the same mental, physical and other standards as the regular Navy recruit.

He will be required to sign an agreement to serve 24 mos. on active duty.

He will then be sent into recruit training with regular Navy recruits, but will maintain his identity as a Reservist in Class V-13 of the Naval Reserve.

Reservists in the rates of seaman and fireman, and petty officer in certain ratings, still are being accepted as volunteers, the Commandant pointed out.

Mrs. Hicks served lovely refreshments to 14 members.

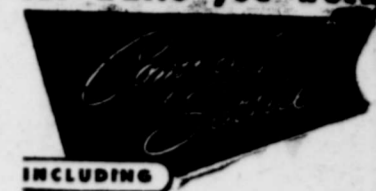
Added Bonuses For AP Employees

All A & P employees throughout the country with six months or more service will participate in the pre-holiday cash distribution. Last year the company voted \$2,250,000 additional compensation.

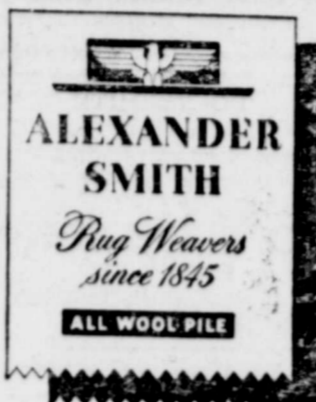
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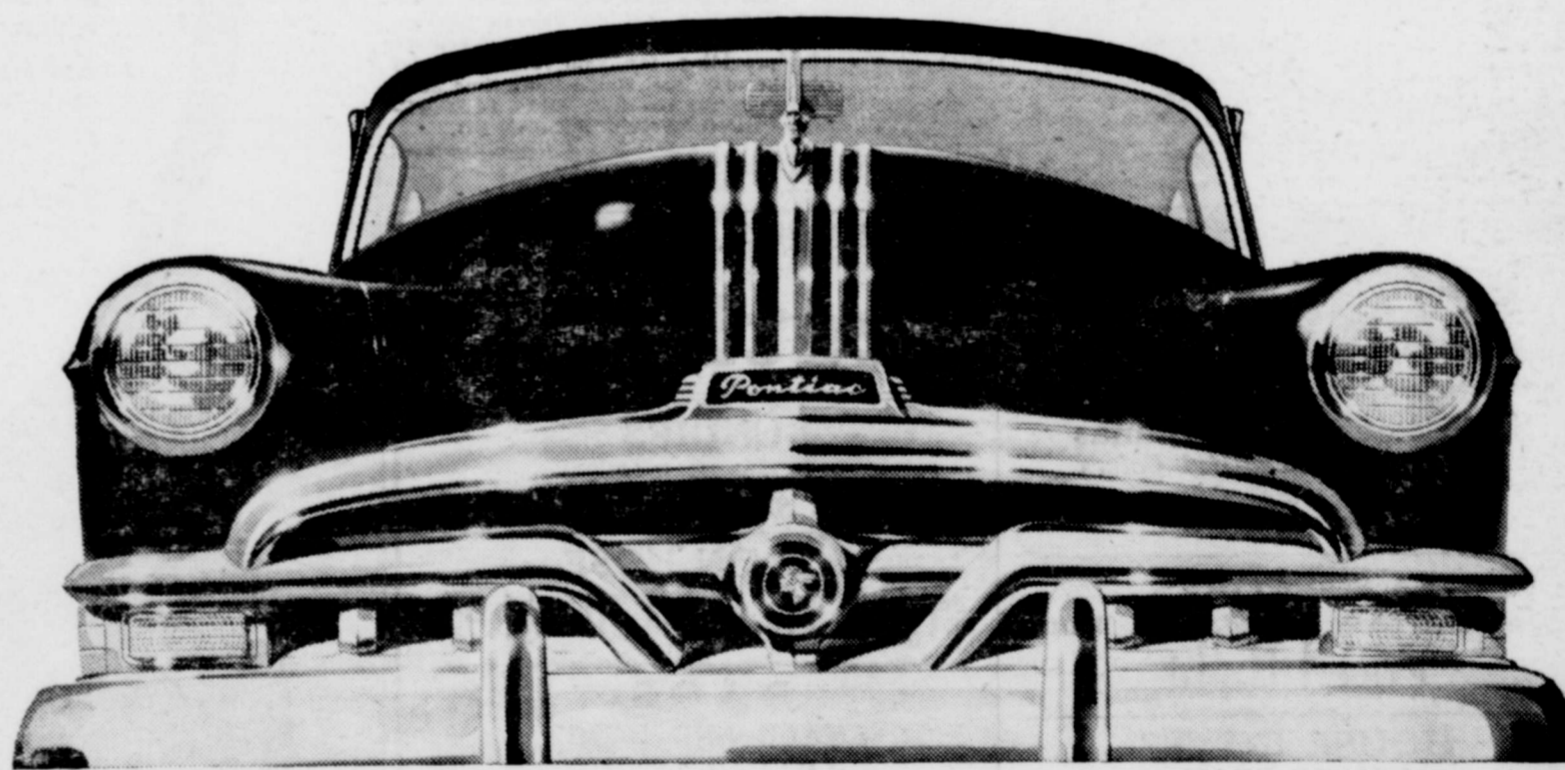
