## MASS MEETING

### Monday Night 7:30 At Town Hall

#### Light Plant

Overed in Burkburnett for 30 years, I have the best interest of our town.

for 12 years as a member of the City Council. It was time it was necessary to make large sums of money to keep the Municipal Light Plant in repair. An estimate of some \$50,000 was made for a new engine while the Council. This estimate is entirely too little for the present load, and almost continuously installation some five years in the future. It is badly in need, and another larger engine will cost more than the amount that last year's engine cost.

#### AGAINST . . . Sale of Light Plant

To the Citizens of Burkburnett: You are called upon to vote to sell or not to sell our Electric Plant on April 27. Let me call your attention to a few things. First, we were paying 15c per K. W. for our service then they said they were cutting it to 12 K. W., but did they? Instead they slipped a \$1.40 demand charge of your bill and made it higher than it was before.

In went the home plant and your rate was 8c for the first 100 K. W., 6c per K. W. for the second 100, and 3c for the rest of the month. Now look at the many thousands of dollars the Home plant has saved us. Do you appreciate it or not? Let's not be overly anxious to pay the debt that is against the City. Are we going to kill the Goose that lays the Golden Egg, or be patient and keep our assets and let them help pay the debt? I don't like a Bull Dog's judgment every time, but if you will watch him he will teach you a good lesson in life. He gets a hold and holds his grip and he gives every way but up. My father told me when I was a young man to always try to know when you are doing well, and if you find a good thing and cannot take it with you, stay with it. I found Burkburnett, Jan. 5, 1914 and could not take it with me, so I have followed my father's advice. Burkburnett is just what we make out of it. There is no substitute for good management. There is some talk going that the plant is going in the hole and don't pay. Can we accuse the Texas Electric Co. of having little enough judgment to buy a White Elephant like that?

Come on. Let's go vote on the 27th and say NO so loud that such a thing will never be attempted again. We have the best town in the State for its size. Let's keep what we have and always keep getting more. So far as I am concerned, Burkburnett is not for sale to anyone. Let's tighten our belts one more notch. Come a little earlier, work a little harder and stay a little longer. Manage a little better. I have been told many times that Burkburnett is on the side track in six months, but she has battled on through to where it is now. This is the first time since I have been here that we have been called upon to step in and save the Town. Let's not fail.

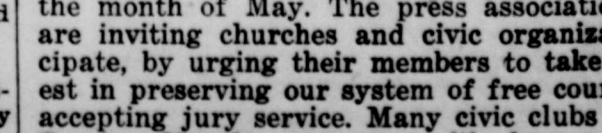

## THE REFORMATION

Reforms seems to be the order of the day and even the weather is coming in for investigation. We have depended upon the U. S. Weather Bureau to predict the fair and foul for us and have generally abided by their decisions. Now there is some dissention about what is what in weather. Three Senate sub-committees have been listening to numerous witnesses testify for and against artificial rainmaking. The cloud-tappers who favor the modern method of creating precipitation by experiments with dry ice and silveriodide, have a wide following. This is not agreeable to the Weather Bureau and meteorologists, for the most part, who are not sold on cloud-seeding, feeling unconvinced that if rain was not ready to fall anyway, manufactured rain wouldn't be of much consequence. Senators are listening favorably however to the rain-makers, so who can tell what may come of this?

## A NOT SO STRANGE TONGUE

Few of us who, when we hear that "Sap's running," don't know what it means. This usually comes along about February. Then someone, say in March, reports that they heard a crow's caw, and we understand that they mean it's spring. When April brings its showers and a neighbor reminds that a good shower in April will bring flowers in May, we speak his tongue. And when an old-timer stops us later next month to remind us that a good rain in May is worth a load of hay, you know he is talking the language.

## This In Spite of War, Fire, Flood, Famine

The latest population estimate of the world's people, is clocked at 2,378,000,000. In thirty years we have increased about one generation, and if this rate continues at the same level over a lengthy period, the present population will be doubled in less than 100 years. Considering the fact that all noses are not counted, the figure is actually underestimating the whole number. Actually only a small proportion of the world keeps track of definite statistics of births and deaths. We know not what faces these generations to come. We can only sur-

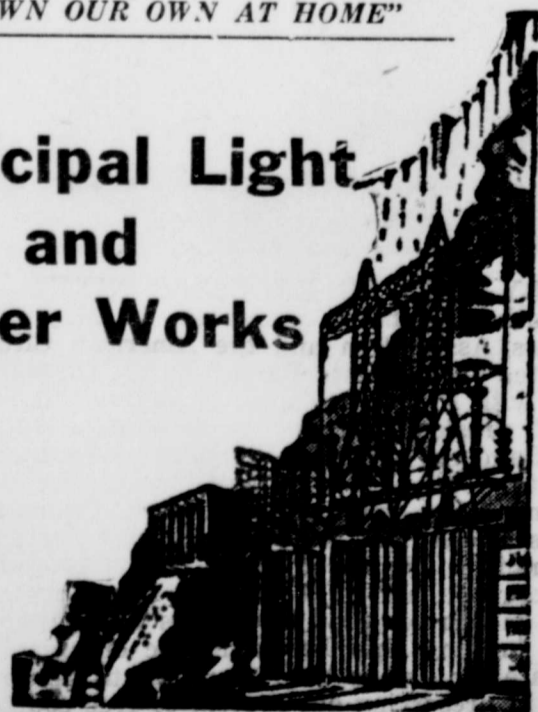

Washington Newsletter

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7, 1951—The Senate this week finished the so-called "great debate." It perhaps was not a very great debate after all and no one is sure what, if anything, was accomplished. Of more importance perhaps, is the debate now going on in the House on the so-called Manpower Bill, i. e., the draft and universal military training bill all rolled into one. Congress is certain to extend the draft. There is much opposition to the present provisions in the bill on universal military training. The bill, in brief, provides that a commission be appointed by the President with power to draw up a Universal Military Training Bill. This commission would report a bill to Congress and if Congress did not repudiate the bill by resolution within 60 days of its submission, it would become law. Many of us feel that this is an unwise delegation of legislative power and that Congress, and not some commission appointed by the President, should write UMT legislation. We do not want Anna Rosenberg doing it. It is hoped this provision of the bill will be changed before final passage.

In the newsletter he is mailing out this week, my colleague Congressman Olin Teague, of College Station, discusses a UMT bill he has drawn. Of his bill, he says: "Under this UMT program, the average youngster would be liable for 4 months basic military training in a special training corps in his eighteenth year. Immediately upon completion of basic training he would have to elect one of nine alternate programs to enter to fulfill the balance of his UMT requirements. Among these alternates are additional active duty; entry into one of the reserve programs; entry into an officer training program (including college ROTC) or entry into a university for military technical or specialist training. The program would be directed by a civilian commission to be appointed by the President. The main advantages of this program would be that (a) it is definite and would allow the youngsters and their families to make definite plans; (b) it would not be necessary to interrupt a youngster's education or career since four months basic training could be taken during a summer and an

alternate program selected that should fit in with whatever plans he had; (c) the program would be controlled and directed by civilians; and (d) the program would build a large, trained reservoir of manpower on a permanent, democratic basis."

I agree substantially with Congressman Teague. It has always been my contention that a UMT program should, first, be controlled by civilians, and secondly, it should give to the young man at least a half dozen alternate methods which he could satisfy the requirements. It should be designed to be the least disruptive of normal living and designed to build character and intellect, as well as train the youngsters to fit into a useful slot in the event of war. Few of us would subscribe to the European style of Universal Military Training. National strength lies in a great deal more than simply armies and armament. We have created and are creating many things through scientific techniques and synthetic processes. Men of strong character cannot be produced through synthetic processes.

One amendment which will be very controversial in this bill, is the so-called Winstead amendment. This amendment provides that "insofar as practical" the Government shall respect a boy's wishes as to service in a segregated unit. Adam Powell, Negro Congressman from New York, is offering an amendment to strike this provision. The socializers in our country have been very successful and are making rapid strides in their program to abolish all forms of segregation. They may eventually succeed in the complete mongrelization of American society.

The Displaced Persons Commission was before the Subcommittee on Immigration upon which I serve, this week. They are asking for a six months extension of the DP program. By March of this year, 240,000 DP's had been admitted. The program ends under present legislation, on June 30, by which time it is estimated that 265,000 will have been admitted. The Commission wants to extend its life six months in order to bring in an additional 35 or 40 thousand. The current newsletter from the U. S. Customs Service in New York reports on several alleged DP's whom they have intercepted and searched a few days ago. One Leiser Weitman had in the heels

of his shoes 11 packages of diamonds totaling 718 carats worth more than \$100,000. Later in the detention house he was found to have 1100 more carats concealed inside his body of the value of \$650,000.00. On the day following Weitman's apprehension, one Ella Hoffman, just arrived from Holland, had concealed 1674 carats of diamonds of the value of \$696,000.00. Later, in a cache found in the hollowed supports of her luggage was found other diamonds of the value of \$600,000.00. A few days later, great quantities of jewelry and silver were found concealed in the luggage of one Joseph Orzechowski. One hundred and fifty-six watches were found artfully concealed in the baggage of one Jacob Weirza. The custom's officials are to be commended for this good work. Of course, no one knows how many get by with smuggling or how many wolves in sheeps clothing are admitted.

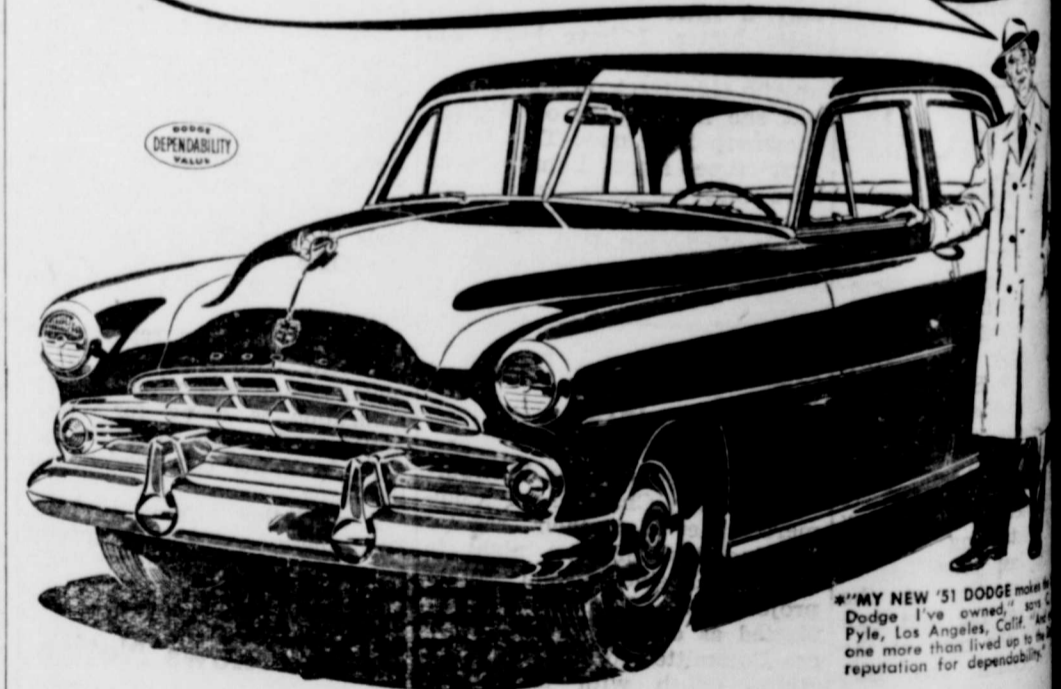

herein granted subject to the provisions of said Charter relating thereto and reserved therein, and as provided by Sections 1 to 17, inclusive, of Article VIII thereof. SECTION 5. This grant is expressly made subject to the right of the City of Burkburnett to terminate this grant and acquire the property Grantee by ordinance in the manner and at the times hereinafter specified. In the event the City elects to terminate this grant as herein provided and acquire the properties of Grantee as hereinafter provided, or upon the termination of this grant by operation of time, unless renewed or extended, the City shall acquire all of such properties of Grantee, but not a part thereof. Upon such a determination on the part of the City to terminate this grant and acquire all of the properties of Grantee within said City, the Board of Commissioners shall pass and deliver to the owner and holder hereof an ordinance terminating this grant and expressing its intention to acquire said properties, and the right of acquisition shall be exercised as herein provided; provided, however, that no proceedings or other action shall be taken in respect to the termination of this grant unless the City shall, by the enactment of an ordinance delivered to Grantee, give notice of its intention to proceed hereunder as herein provided at least one (1) year prior thereto, and until and unless the question of whether or not the City should acquire Grantee's business and properties shall have been submitted to a referendum vote by the qualified voters of the City within a period of sixty (60) days prior to any such action on the part of the Board of Commissioners of the City. SECTION 6. The right of acquisition on the part of the City of Burkburnett shall be exercised only by action taken by the Board of Commissioners of the City during the thirty (30) day period preceding the 1st day of October in each tenth year after the expiration of fifteen (15) years from the granting of this franchise until the expiration hereof. SECTION 7. The franchise heretofore granted Grantee shall remain in force and effect as provided in a certain contract between City and Grantee dated 2nd day of April, 1951. SECTION 8. The exercise of the right of acquisition by the City of Burkburnett to acquire all of the property and business of the Grantee shall be governed by the following: (a) Within thirty days following the effective date of the ordinance terminating the grant, the Board of Commissioners of the City shall by resolution appoint two (2) persons and Grantee shall within the same period of time appoint two (2) persons to act as a Board of Commissioners to determine the price to be paid for said business and properties by the City to Grantee, and the four persons so appointed shall within ten (10) days after their appointment appoint a disinterested person who, together with the number appointed by the City and by Grantee, shall determine such price. One of those selected by the City shall be a graduate engineer learned in the general nature of the business of Grantee and one shall be a certified public accountant, and said engineer and public accountant may but need not be citizens and residents of the County of Wichita, Texas. Such Board of Commissioners shall have the right to employ such other engineers and accountants as may be necessary in the premises, and the cost of employing any such engineers and accountants shall be borne as hereinafter provided. (b) The Board of Commissioners shall promptly set a time for a hearing of the parties, namely the City and Grantee, and the day appointed for the beginning of said hearing shall not be less than twenty days after the notice of such hearing shall have been issued and served upon Grantee. (c) Grantee hereunder shall be adequately compensated for the fair value of all of the property, both real and personal, property rights and assets of every description, belonging to Grantee and located in the City of Burkburnett. The compensation to be paid Grantee shall also include an amount representing the reasonable value of the damages sustained by Grantee by virtue of having its properties located within said City severed from its properties located without such City. For the purpose of this franchise, the term "fair value" shall be deemed to mean a sum equal to the cost of constructing or providing for, as of the date of acquisition, the properties being acquired less depreciation as of that date.

(d) After the election on the part of the City to acquire Grantee's property and business becomes effective, and pending determination and payment of purchase price, Grantee shall continue to make all additions to its facilities necessary to maintain adequate service to its customers, and shall complete all construction work under way at that time. The City shall pay to Grantee the cost price of all such additions to facilities and completed construction work. After the date when the election on the part of the City to acquire Grantee's property and business becomes effective, Grantee shall not make or be required to make any major additions to its property located within the City, except with the consent in writing of both Grantee and the City. (e) All of the books, records, documents, assets and properties of whatsoever nature kept or owned by Grantee shall be subject to examination by one or more of said Commissioners or their duly authorized agents and employees upon demand therefor. (f) As the basis of their appraisal, the Commissioners shall make or have made a complete and reasonably detailed list and inventory of all of Grantee's properties, property rights and assets to be acquired. When the Commissioners have assessed the value of Grantee's property and business, they shall reduce their decision to writing, stating therein the total value of said property and business, the amount of severance damages, if any, the amounts of all liens and encumbrances against such property and business, and to whom payable, and all the costs which have accrued as a result of such hearing, the examination and investigation, and shall file it, together with a copy of the aforesaid list and inventory of Grantee's property rights and assets located in the City and all other papers connected with the matter, with the District Clerk of the District Court of Wichita County, Texas, and shall also deliver a copy thereof to the City of Burkburnett and to Grantee. The decision of the Commissioners upon any matter shall be by a majority of said Commissioners. (g) If either party, that is to say, Grantee or the City of Burkburnett, be dissatisfied with the value placed upon the properties and business of Grantee, such party may, within twenty days after the same has been filed with the Clerk of the District Court, file its objection thereto in writing, setting forth the grounds of its objections; thereupon the adverse party shall be cited to appear therein, and the cause shall be tried and determined as in other civil causes in the District Court. If no objection to such valuation is filed within twenty days, such decision shall thereupon become binding upon both the City of Burkburnett and Grantee, and the same may be enforced in any court of competent jurisdiction. (h) If the value fixed for the property and business of Grantee by the court on appeal shall be the same or greater than the value fixed by the Commissioners, the cost of the proceedings upon appeal shall be assessed against the City. If the value of the property and business of Grantee shall be fixed by the Court on appeal at a less sum than fixed by the Commissioners, the costs of court on appeal shall be assessed against Grantee. If the value of the property and business of Grantee shall be fixed by the Court on appeal at the same sum as that fixed by the Commissioners, the court costs on appeal shall be assessed against the party appellant. (i) Grantee shall retain the possession and use of its properties until a final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction has been entered and until payment to Grantee of the value fixed therefor by said final judgment. Full payment of the value of property and business of Grantee shall be made or tendered in accordance with the final judgment of said court within six months from the date said judgment becomes final; provided, however, that if such full payment is not made or tendered within such six months period, then and in that event the City shall forfeit its right to acquire Grantee's properties until the expiration of the then current ten year period hereunder, and the City shall reimburse Grantee for all costs and expenses reasonably incurred by Grantee as a consequence of, or arising out of any such unconsummated acquisition proceedings. (j) Upon receipt by it of the purchase price of its property and business, Grantee shall deliver to the City all books, records, maps, drawings, memor-

anda and other papers relating to the operation of its property and business in the City of Burkburnett; provided, however, that Grantee shall not be required to deliver to the City any of such books, records, maps, drawings, memoranda or other papers as pertain, in whole or in part, to portions of Grantee's property and business located without the City. SECTION 9. The right of termination on the part of the City of Burkburnett to terminate this grant as herein provided and to acquire the properties of Grantee as herein provided shall be an exclusive remedy, and the City of Burkburnett shall not engage in the construction or operation of an electric light and power plant for the purpose of serving said City and the inhabitants thereof until and unless it exercises the right of termination and of acquisition as herein provided. SECTION 10. Nothing in this franchise contract shall be construed to limit or abate the exercise of judicial power in adjudging the adequate compensation to be paid for the property and business of Grantee or to limit the courts of this State in their determination of the elements of value, the weight to be given thereto, or the consequential damage which shall be included as adequate compensation for the property and business of Grantee sought to be acquired in the manner herein provided. SECTION 11. This grant shall not become effective unless and until Grantee shall file its written acceptance thereof within thirty (30) days from the passage and approval. In the event that this franchise is rejected at the polls by a referendum vote of the electors of the City of Burkburnett, the franchise heretofore granted to W. H. PAINTER and his assigns on the 19th day of April, 1915, and which is now owned by Grantee, shall remain in full force and effect, and shall not be deemed to have been repealed, rescinded, surrendered or in any wise modified because of the prior enactment or acceptance of this ordinance. SECTION 12. In passing this ordinance the Board of Commissioners of the City of Burkburnett finds that all of the conditions precedent to its adoption and passage as provided in the Charter of the City of Burkburnett have been complied with. SECTION 13. If any provision hereof or the application of such provision to any person or circumstance shall be held invalid, the remainder hereof and the application of such provision to persons or circumstances other than those as to which it is held invalid shall not be affected thereby; and provided further that if any part of this ordinance is hereafter declared to be invalid, or if any section of the City Charter of the City of Burkburnett, Texas, upon which such part or parts is predicated is declared to be invalid, then and in such event and notwithstanding the acceptance hereof by Grantee, and notwithstanding any other provision herein contained, such part or parts or section or sections shall not thereafter be binding upon Grantee. EXHIBIT I CONTRACT THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF WICHITA THIS CONTRACT AND AGREEMENT made this 2nd day of April, A. D. 1951, by and between the City of Burkburnett, Texas, a municipal corporation, hereinafter called "City," and Texas Electric Service Company, a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Texas, hereinafter called "Company," WITNESSETH: WHEREAS, City owns and operates an electric generating plant and distribution system within the territorial limits of City; and WHEREAS, it is deemed best for the financial interest of the City and its inhabitants to lease said property to Company for a period of six (6) years and to give and grant to Company an option to purchase said facilities at the end of said lease period, and to give and grant to Company a franchise to operate said facilities within said City in the event it elects to exercise said option: NOW, THEREFORE, it is agreed between the parties hereto as follows: 1. City demises and leases to company its electric generating plant and its electric distribution system and street lighting equipment as described and set out in Exhibit 1 attached hereto and made a part hereof for a period of six (6) years. Company agrees to purchase from City at the time of the beginning of said lease all materials and supplies on hand at cost price to City. In event Company does not elect to purchase said property as hereinafter provided, company agrees to sell City all materials and supplies on hand at Burkburnett at the end of the lease period at cost to Company. 2. Company agrees to pay City annually in advance the following sums as rental for such facilities: The first year \$40,000.00; the second year \$41,000.00; the third year \$42,000.00; the fourth year \$43,000.00; the fifth year \$44,000.00; the sixth year \$45,000.00. City agrees that Company may remove any of said properties, may add to and make additions to any of said properties, and may operate said properties during the term of this lease in conformity with standard practices and custom and in any way which Company may deem necessary and proper to furnish an adequate and continuous electric service to City and its inhabitants. Company agrees to operate and maintain said property and facilities and upon the expiration of the term of this lease to return said property, or its equivalent in kind and value, to City in the same condition as the same were in upon the date of the beginning of said lease, reasonable wear, tear and deterioration excepted. 3. Within sixty (60) days after the effective date of this lease, Company will cause an inventory of said properties to be prepared by engineers acceptable to City, and said inventory and map will be evidence of the nature, the condition and the location of said leased properties and shall be conclusive in connection with the return of said property and facilities to City at the termination of this lease. Copies of said inventory and said map shall be delivered to City upon completion. 4. In further consideration of the payment of \$5,000.00 in cash, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, City gives and grants to Company an option to purchase said properties at the end of said lease period by the payment of \$200,000.00 in cash to City. In the event of the exercise of said option, said payment shall be applied on the purchase price. In the event Company does not exercise said option, said payment shall be returned by City. Notice on the part of Company to exercise said option shall be given City in writing on or before six (6) months prior to the expiration of said lease period. In the event Company does not elect to exercise said option within the prescribed time, Company agrees to pay City the sum of \$20,000.00 in full payment for City's expense in re-attaching customers to its lines. During the existence of this lease City covenants that it will not authorize or suffer the placing of any lien or encumbrance of any nature upon the properties hereby leased. In the event Company does not exercise its right to purchase said properties, and City is unable by reason of lack of generating capacity to supply its customers, Company agrees during such emergency for a period of not more than one (1) year to sell the City its requirements of electric power and energy at the Company's rate in effect at the

time for such character of service. In this connection City agrees to utilize to the fullest extent possible its own generating facilities. In the event Company does exercise its right to purchase said property as herein provided, City agrees to convey the same to Company by proper instrument of conveyance free and clear of any and all liens or encumbrances of every nature and character. In further consideration of the premises City agrees in the event Company exercises its option to purchase said facilities that it will not engage directly or indirectly in the operation of an electric light and power distribution or transmission system within said City for a period of not less than ten (10) years from and after the date of the termination of this lease. 5. City agrees to give and grant to Company a franchise for a period of fifty (50) years in the form attached hereto and marked Exhibit 3 for identification. In the event Company does not elect to purchase said properties, said fifty-year franchise shall be of no further force and effect and Company shall have only such rights as are set out in its present existing franchise. 6. Company agrees that during the period of its operation of said facilities under said lease and thereafter, it will place in effect its regular rates and charges which are charged to cities and towns similarly situated. In this connection City agrees to repeal Ordinance No. 184 from and after the date of the approval of this contract as hereinafter provided (Minimum Rate Ordinance). 7. In the event any dispute arises between City and Company with reference to any of the provisions hereof, the same shall be settled by arbitration. City shall select one arbitrator and Company shall select another and the two thus selected shall select a third arbitrator. In the event the representatives of City and Company can not agree upon the selection of a third arbitrator, then the then Judge of the District Court of Wichita County, Texas 30 Judicial District, shall appoint said third arbitrator. Within a period of ten (10) days after the selection of said Board of Arbitration the matters in dispute shall be submitted to said Board, and within thirty (30) days thereafter said Board of Arbitration shall hand down its decision with respect thereto and the decision of a majority of said Board shall be binding upon both City and Company. 8. This contract and agreement is expressly subject to the approval of the qualified voters of City at an election called for that purpose, said approval to be evidenced by a majority of those voting at said election. Said election shall be called within thirty (30) days after the execution of this instrument by City and Company. Said approval shall include not only the approval of this lease contract but also the right and authority of the City to give the option herein provided for and to consummate the sale of said properties and facilities in the event Company elects to exercise such right, and shall approve the granting of a franchise to the Company as herein provided. The expense of such election shall be borne by Company. It is the intention of the parties hereto to fully and in all respects comply with the provisions of Section 2 of Article IIIB, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas. In the event this contract is approved no further action with respect to the conveyance of said properties to Company in the event it exercises its option shall be deemed to be necessary, except the execution of deeds to the real property. ## SPORTS AFIELD

By Ted Kesting

The Dingell Federal Aid to State Fisheries Act became effective July 1, 1950, at which time the 10 per cent tax on sport fishing tackle (which covers rods, reels, and artificial lures, baits and flies) was ear-marked for the fish restoration program.

The first allocation of tackle-tax money will be made this July. The states figure on slicing a \$3 million pie every year. This Act is without question the most important piece of legislation enacted for anglers, according to Washington Correspondent Michael Hudoba.

To achieve its purpose, the law outlines four general objectives. (1) It provides for necessary research in fish management and culture to assure efficient administration of fish resources. (2) Fact finding to determine drain on fish supplies from fishing or natural causes and thus to improve regulations. (3) Adoption of plans for restocking waters with food and game fishes and study to be sure such plans are practical. (4) Restoration and rehabilitation of water areas to increase fish populations.

The Dingell-Johnson program is not an instantaneous open sesame to huge catches of sport

fish. But it is, with careful management, the road to better fishing. It will expand the sport-fish programs of each state. It will help take fish management out of the hit-an-miss, the lick-and-a-promise type of approach. It will get down to fundamentals and treatment of causes of fishery problems. You should soon be getting more strikes and catching more fish.

But a law on the statute books does not immediately insure more fish or more game. It merely streamlines the vehicle, overhauls the engine and fills the tank with gas. How fast or where it will go depends on the passengers.

In this case, the state fishery administrator is the driver, the fishery men his crew, and you—the sportmen—the passengers.

If the vehicle gets stuck, you might have to get out and push.
