Farm Bureau Fights Dumping Trash On Roads

A program to do away with the dumping of trash and tin cans along the public roads will be launched by the Wichita County Farm Bureau, it was voted by the directors at a meeting Monday night in the office at Iowa Park. Farmers are urged to contact their commissioners immediately and ask for their cooperation in this program. It is time something was done about this unsanitary and unsightly situation.

Loys Barbour returned from Austin and reports that a tax on gasoline is unlikely but it is going to take a stiff fight to pass the Sewell Nokes bill on rural roads. The Sewell Nokes bill would put a tax of a cent per 1000 cubic foot on natural gas of which a large portion is being piped out of the state tax free. This revenue would be divided 1-4 to incorporated towns and villages in Texas to be used for the building and improvement of streets, 1-4 to the schools, and 1-2 will go to the counties for building rural roads. More than half of this tax would be paid by people outside the state of Texas, since more than half of the natural gas produced in Texas goes to other areas of the nation.

Mayor Alvin Hill has proclaimed Monday, May 14th the beginning of a full week of city-wide cleanup. It is the wish of city officials that every citizen enter wholeheartedly into this worthy undertaking. Lion Rigby introduced Miss Martha Gail Parr, Director of the North Texas Cerebral Palsy Clinic at Wichita Falls, who spoke of the work they are doing with patients from North Texas and Southern Oklahoma. Miss Parr made two points clear: The majority of cerebral palsy patients are NOT mentally deficient. The injury to the brain is in the motor center, not the intelligence center. Cerebral palsy is second to polio in the number of affected persons. Miss Parr said that for each 100,000 population in any area, seven babies would be born each year handicapped by cerebral palsy.

President Patterson, Woodrow Wright and Virgil Inman attended the Lions District Convention in Fort Worth last week end and made short reports.

The club voted unanimously to attend the County-wide Lions meeting in Wichita Falls next Tuesday night. The meeting, sponsored by the Wichita Falls club, will be held at Haven Park. the reason that they had been diverted into the black market and other illegal channels where the last possible nickel of profit was squeezed out of the customer.

Practically every segment of the economy has been blamed for inflation—manufacturing, retailing, agriculture, labor. As usual, most of us always blame the other fellow. And this helter-skelter casting of criticism still is obscuring the fact that we are just dealing with the symptoms of inflation and not the causes. It is as much as if a doctor were to prescribe a handkerchief as a cure for a cold in the head. The disease lies in government policies of spend and spend and spend, regardless of any real need—and in increasing the national purchasing power faster than the available supply of consumer goods can be increased. So long as that situation exists, inflation will have the upper hand.

TAXES AND PRICES

When you buy an oil product, taxes represent a far larger proportion of the selling price than is generally realized.

The oil industry is one of the most heavily taxed of all enterprises—as a whole it represents three per cent of the national income and pays seven per cent of the Federal, state and local taxes.

Oil actually pays about 200 different kinds of taxes, including severance taxes, pipeline taxes, privilege taxes, pump taxes, and so on, which are levied by 180,000 separate taxing jurisdictions throughout the nation. In 1950, it is estimated, the industry's total tax payments came to \$3,500,000,000.

Here is something to keep in mind when you feel like complaining about the high prices of oil. Actually, some of the most important oil products, such as gasoline, now cost less than they did 20 or so years ago if the tax factor is taken into consideration. And their quality is much better.

Taxes, in brief, are a dominant influence on the cost of living.



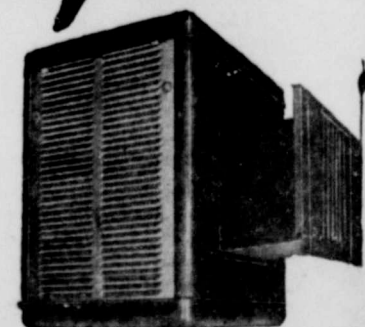

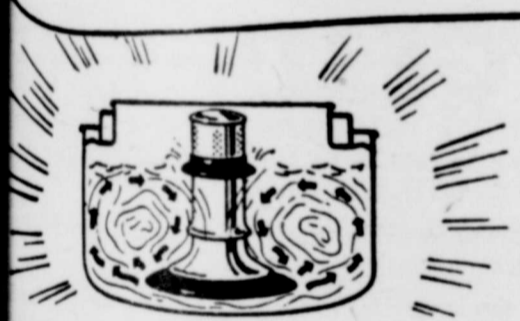

KITCHEN GREASE WANTED



OUR PRICE TODAY IS 4¢ per pound

The nation's housewives are for the second time in this generation in a unique position to make a major contribution toward victory and peace on the battlefield.

A serious shortage of grease—which is a major element in the manufacture of ammunition and medicine—has been noted increasingly over the past few weeks.

And, as during World War Two, housewives have within their control millions of pounds of kitchen grease that normally goes to waste which could be converted into the war effort.

Grease—or its by-product, glycerine—is a pharmaceutical necessity and plays an essential role in the production of most types of medicines. Nitroglycerine is made by 'nitrating glycerine,' and glycerine is an all important ingredient in dynamite, smokeless powder and other explosives.

A program has already been set up here to begin collecting kitchen grease. And like during the recent war, the housewife stands to profit by saving her few grease scraps daily. Several grocers here who are participating in the program will pay four cents a pound for the badly needed product.

In order to alleviate the developing grease shortage, the government is again needing housewives to cooperate in a new 'grease saving campaign.' A majority of the grocery stores and markets here have already agreed to serve as 'grease collecting agencies,' and will at the same time pay the housewife for her effort.
