It came from Mr. and Mrs. Herschel Warren's farm just across the state line from Burk 1. in Oklahoma.

For bringing the first Oklahoma cotton here, Warren was awarded a \$25.00 prize by the Burkburnett Chamber of Commerce. A similar prize will be given the first bale of cotton grown in Texas that is ginned

The Co-op's. new plant, which incorporates the "re-ginning" Tate explained that process which was first used oved do not report in 1950, is expected to put an additional \$75,000 in members' pockets by turning out a higher

G. W. Fleming, gin manager, said the new process is able to take ordinary field run cotton and turn out strict mid-

Fleming said the gin would turn out a bale of cotton every and also contains a 12 minutes. He expects to process about 7,500 bales this year. The plant will go on a 24-hour self-employment, and basis with three crews working when the season gets into full

> The new ginning system will add from \$7.50 to \$20.00 per bale of cotton, according to the condition it is in when pro cessed.

> Warren,, who had already picked his third bale of cotton Wednesday, has 130 acres of cotton on his Oklahoma farm. He expects to make about an average of three-fourths of bale to the acre.



For coffee, tea or fruit stains on linens, from a height of two or three feet pour boiling hot water on the stained fabric which is held taut with a rubber band over a Sponge iodine stains with a solu-

tion of one cup of denatured alco-hol to two cups of warm water. Ink spots should, if possible, be removed immediately that they occur. Spread an absorbent, such as corn meal or flour, on the spot and work it around, brushing it off as it becomes soiled. Repeat until no more ink is absorbed, then make a paste of water and the absorbent and apply it to the stain. When dry, brush it off.



Eight men are running for Congress to succeed Ed Gossett in the Thirteenth Congressional District (Wichita County, Denton County, Cooke, Wilbarger, Montague, Hardeman, etc.). So far as the column knows, all eight of them are respectable citizens with clean records.
