Walter Jenkins Hits Immorality In Government

Walter Jenkins of Wichita Falls, candidate for Congress in the special election to be held Sept. 8, is hitting hard in talks all over the Thirteenth District at the alarming decline in morality in government.
"On the one hand, we have the influence boys and five percenters, with their mink coats and free deep freeze units and payoffs under the guise of professional fees," Jenkins has pointed out. "On the other, we have character assassination based on unproved accusations. The whole picture is black."
"Knowing the people of this district as I do, I know that they want a cleanup in Washington. It will be my principal objective, if I am elected, to represent them in Congress, to do everything I can to promote

a cleanup that will really clean." The 33-year-old candidate, who will be heard in an address from radio station KWFT, Wichita Falls, Saturday night at 8:15 o'clock, has suggested a number of immediate reforms in government, including a change in the system of electing the President and Vice-President of the United States. The present system causes thousands of people to lose their votes, he declares.

Vaccination For Dogs and Cats Sat., August 18

The people of Burkburnett and surrounding territories who own cats and dogs may have these pets vaccinated against rabies Saturday, August 18th. For the convenience of the pet owners of this community there will be a veterinarian at the Mills and Fleming Feed Store to conduct the vaccination from 12 noon to 5 P. M. Other problems pertaining to veterinary medicine may also be discussed at this time.

Rabies is a dreaded disease that may strike in your community without warning. In fact, a positively diagnosed case in dogs has occurred in Wichita Falls this summer.

Rabid wild life such as coyote, skunk and fox are chiefly responsible for the alarming spread of rabies throughout Texas each year. These infected animals bite unvaccinated dogs and cats which in turn spread the infection and endanger the lives of humans. This malady is one of the oldest diseases mentioned in history. It is caused by a filterable virus which is present in the saliva of infected animals. The disease is characterized by mental disturbances, nervous excitability, with subsequent paralysis and death. Once these symptoms appear there is no known treatment. This dreaded disease can however be prevented to a large extent by having pets vaccinated every 12 months and by destruction of stray ownerless pets.

Citizens of this community are urged to cooperate in this rabies drive by bringing their pets to the Mills and Fleming Feed Store Saturday, August 18th for vaccination.

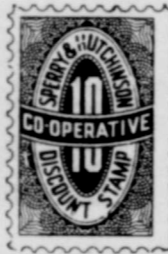

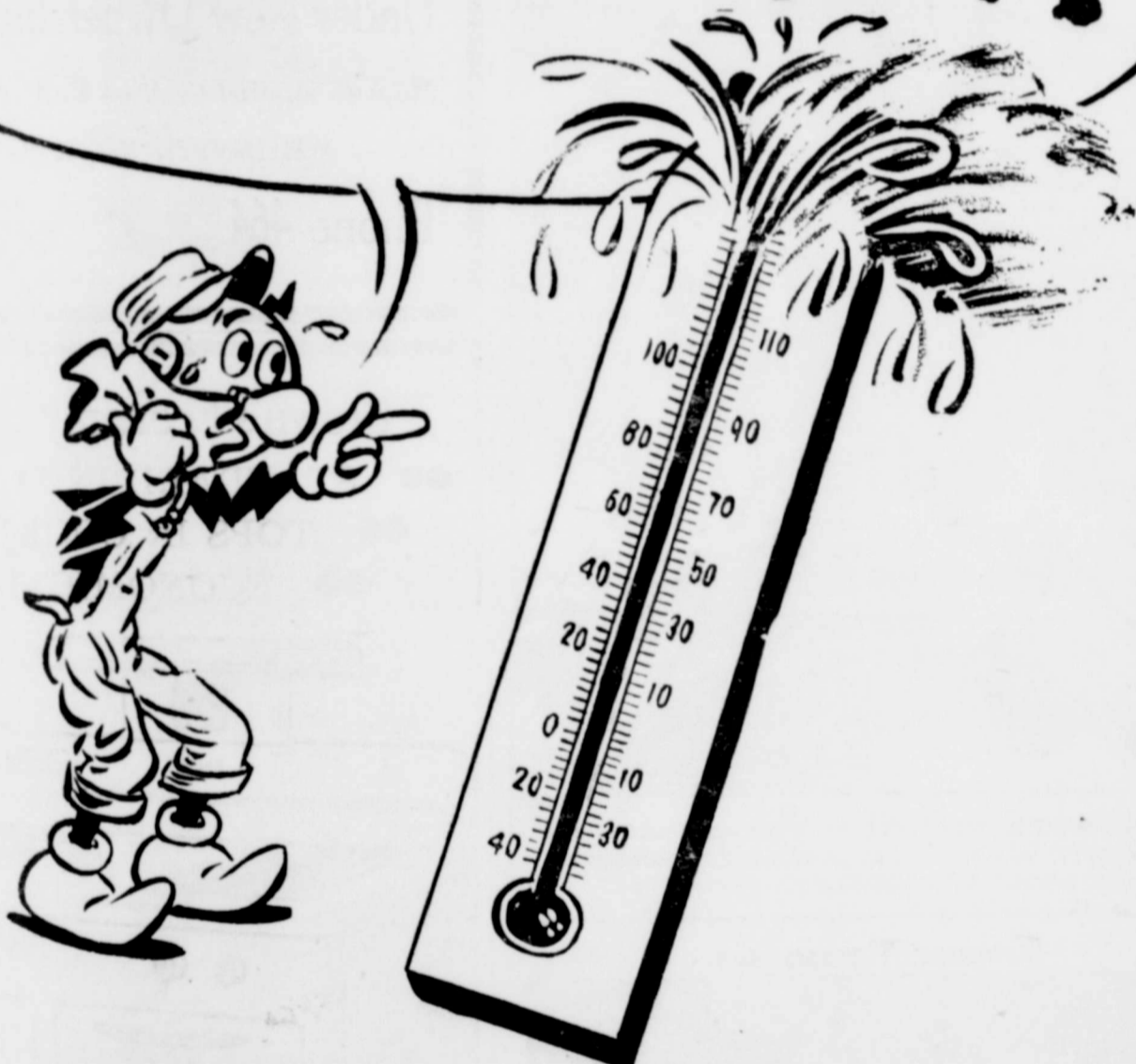

Thinking Out Loud

JOE JACKSON

Eight men are running for Congress to succeed Ed Gossett in the Thirteenth Congressional District (Wichita County, Denton County, Cooke, Wilbarger, Montague, Hardeman, etc.). So far as the column knows, all eight of them are respectable citizens with clean records.

But it will not be overlooked that the Thirteenth District has in this election a very real opportunity to do a signal service to the State of Texas. The Democratic administration at Washington has taken from the school children of Texas the tidelands. It deserves a rebuke of the only kind which the present administration can understand. It deserves to be told that Texas is utterly angry and utterly disgusted with the treatment it has received. The Thirteenth District has the opportunity to send that word to Washington.

ALL-TEXAN

The Thirteenth District is all Texan and all-American. And it has an honorable record in defense of the tidelands title of Texas. Ed Gossett put up a magnificent fight, recently climaxed with a magnificent victory on the floor of the House at Washington.

Now, there should be no unfairness to the candidates of this election. It is understood that all eight of them are in favor of the return of the tidelands to Texas . . .

But if the Thirteenth District really wants to make the cold chills run up and down the backs of the Queer Deal politicians in Washington, it will turn out a whacking big vote for **JOE JACKSON**. Nothing else will do so much to make Harry Truman chew the staff of his pen before he signs a veto on the tidelands return. Nothing else in this race would have a greater effect upon the forthcoming Democratic National Convention, when it gets ready to decide whether it is going to let Harry Truman renominate himself.

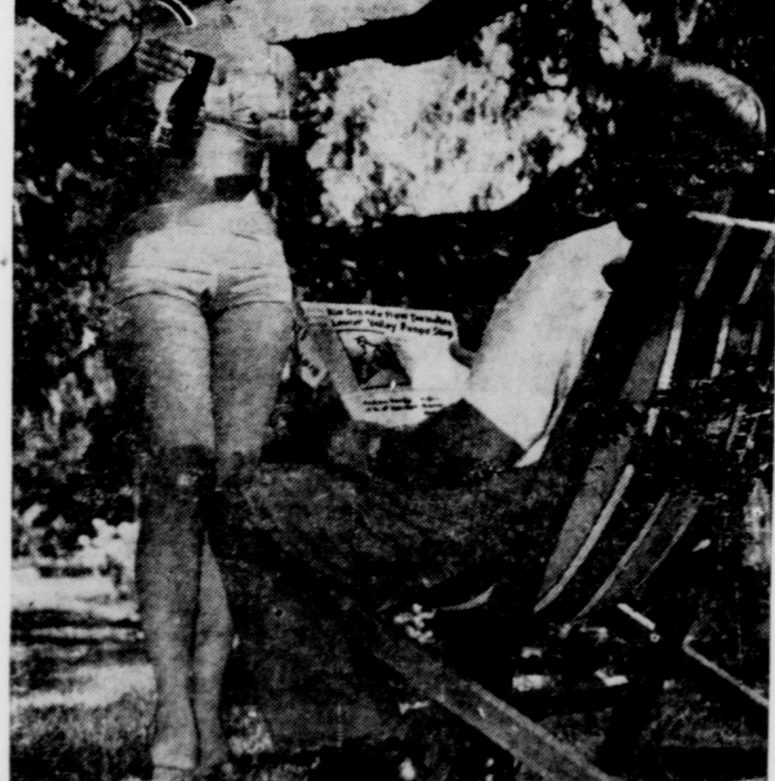
