GRASS ROOTS OPINION

MORRISON, ILL. NEWS: "Our government may topple because you and I have neglected our Ship of State. Directly and indirectly we are sabotaging that sleek, swift vessel designed by the framers of the Constitution to gracefully and successfully take the lead among world governments in the race for a better world. We have allowed barnacles to accumulate on her hull, and her timbers and planking to rot. We have rigged her with ignorance and manned her with incompetence."

BEREA, OHIO, ENTERPRISE: "The construction cost of our own Economic Planners' Arizona irrigation project, together with its so-called 'multi-purpose' trimmings, is to be \$708,780,000. But that's just the beginning of what the American taxpayers would have to pay. The Interior Department itself admits that actual cost to the taxpayers, counting interest on the borrowed money necessary to build it, would be \$2,784,509,000. That's almost 10 times the total value of all farm lands and buildings in the whole State of Arizona as recorded by the U. S. Census Bureau. Yes, planning by government economic planners comes high."

CENTRAL CITY, COLO., REGISTER-CALL: "Thru June 30, 1951, overseas assistance in all forms since the end of the war has amounted to \$55 billion. In other words, 'post-war' rehabilitation and reconstruction abroad has cost the American taxpayers more than arms assistance during the war."

HIGHER PRICES AHEAD?

Some government economists are forecasting that food prices will rise again in the very near future. Forecasts of this nature must always be taken with a grain of salt—they have often been wrong, and other experts think there will be little or no change in the present price structure.

Time will tell as to that. However, if prices do go up again—for food or anything else in general use—it is probable that the retailers will be blamed, precisely as they have been blamed in the past. In the early days of postwar inflation, consumer groups actually went so far as to picket stores, armed with placards which urged everyone to refuse to buy this item or that unless the price was heavily cut.

Consumer worry and anger over high prices is certainly understandable. But when the blame is centered on the retailer, the consumer is simply barking up the wrong tree. He has been caught in the bite along with all the rest of us. The wholesale prices he must pay, his taxes, his administrative costs, and so on. All of this might be of comparatively small moment if he had a fat margin of profit to fall back on. But, actually, the profit in food retailing is far smaller than most of us realize. The big food chains, for example, earn, as profit, only one to two cents out of each dollar which goes through their tills. And in other types of retailing, the profit usually amounts to less than five cents on each dollar of sales.

Competition holds prices to a minimum, in every field of manufacturing and retailing. When prices go up, it means that the economic forces of the time made this unavoidable.

FEDERAL AID FARCE EXPOSED

Indiana's 85th General Assembly recently sent a remarkable message to the Congress of the United States. It said, in part, "We have decided that there is no such thing as 'Federal Aid.' We know there is no wealth to tax that is not already within the boundaries of the 48 states. So we propose henceforth to tax ourselves and take care of ourselves."

The people of Indiana resent the encroachment of the Federal government into the fields of education, highways, employment, agriculture, medicine, banking, welfare and civic projects. They hold that these activities are the responsibilities of the state, the local communities, or private individuals, and that Federal participation in these fields, both financial and managerial, should

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be abandoned throughout this nation of ours." That message comes like a breath of fresh mountain air in an era when most of the chambers of commerce and other such civic organizations seem to be primarily involved in trying to get more and more money out of the Federal Treasury, or more appropriately, the taxpayer's pocket. Moreover, it is a message which is based squarely on what we used to consider fundamental American ideals and principles. Yet a whole generation has grown up which never lived under anything except the system of Federal grants and doles which began with the depression and has continued, at an ever accelerating pitch, ever since.

This is the system which has destroyed states' rights and undermined the independence of the people. It is the system which has taxed us to the point of confiscation, and has made the tax bill one of the largest items in every family budget. It is the system which has created huge government deficits, even in times when business was booming and tax revenues were at record peaks. It is the system which will ruin us if continued.

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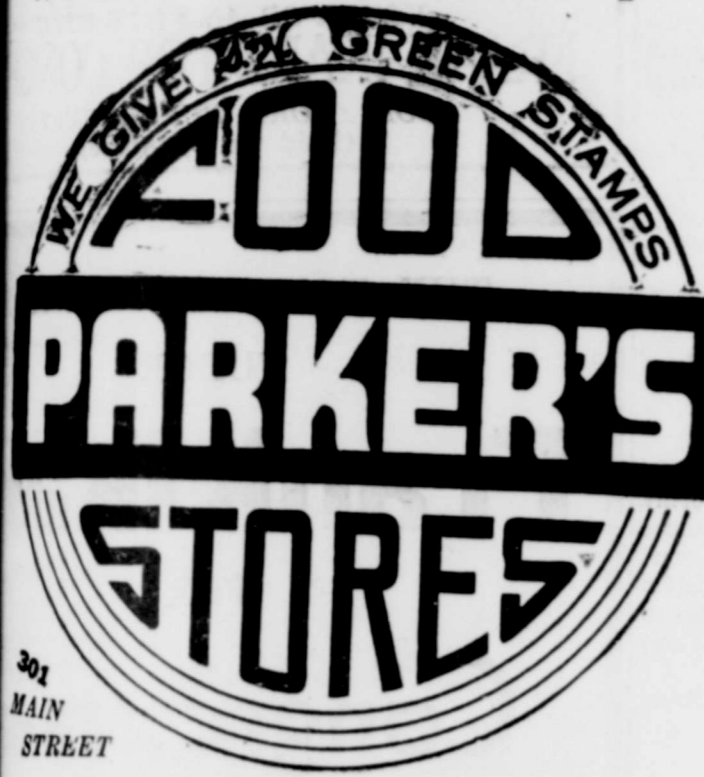


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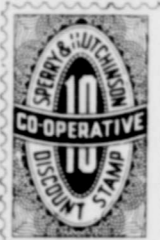

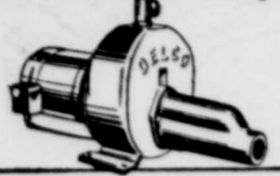

Walter Jenkins Hits Communism As War Threat

Communism stands for war and conquest, slavery and ruin, Walter Jenkins, candidate for Congress in the special election to be held Saturday, declared this week.

"The communists never stop trying," Jenkins warned. "Their aim is to enslave the world and everything they do is designed to bring them closer to realization of that aim. Sometimes they may seem to retreat a little—but they are not really retreating. A Tip for New Movie Makers

NINETY-NINE out of a hundred new movie makers (and some not so new) have a common tendency to approach the first scenic view and panoram like mad. As a result, the movie they put on the screen is jerky and hard on the eyes.
 In making movies, the camera's function is to record motion, not to provide it. So when you want to film different areas in a vast scene, take your finger off the exposure button as you move the camera to take in the next part of the subject.
 Panoramng isn't a good idea in amateur movie-making because it is an unnatural way of looking at the scene. When your eyes survey a big scene they don't sweep across it. You may gradually turn your head to take in the whole view, but your eyes fasten on one spot until they're ready to go on, and then jump to the next point of interest, skipping over any dull area that may be in between. Since you want your movie screen to reflect a scene as you saw it,

you'll be better off shooting it that way.
 Why does panoraming make my movies jerky is a frequently asked question. The answer lies in the way the camera works. Most amateur movies are filmed at 16 frames per second. That means the film pauses that many times behind the lens while the shutter opens and closes. When you hold the camera still in shooting, this doesn't show on the screen because it happens so fast the object being photographed is in the same position in several successive frames. But when you start paning, the object is varied in its position relative to the camera in successive frames. And that is what gives you eye strain and a film that isn't as good as it could have been.
 If you just have to pan with your camera—do it s-l-o-w and s-t-e-a-d-y, moving from the point of least interest to the peak—and never retracing the scene.

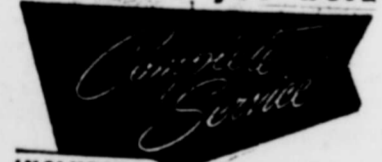
Notice From Wichita Falls C of C Officials

"The Taxpayer Must Hold the Pursestrings"
READ WALTER JENKINS' PLAN FOR ECONOMY

Everybody talks about economy. But, in politics, most candidates don't get specific.

Walter Jenkins—the candidate who knows the job—has a specific plan for cutting government spending.

Here's his plan:
I. Give Congress control over the Federal Budget.

Today the pursestrings on the taxpayers' money are held by the Bureau of the Budget, an Executive Agency. This agency prepares the Federal Budget, decides how much money shall be asked for, determines what is needed, what is not needed.

The director of the Bureau of the Budget is appointed by the President and works for and with the President.

The result is we have a budget the President wants, not necessarily a budget the people want.

Congress is closest to the people. Congress knows what the people want, what they need, what they can afford to pay for in taxes. Congress ought to establish a staff of its own, supervised by a committee of Senators and Congressmen, to examine every item in the Budget—and cut out those that aren't needed and those that can wait.

Under the present set-up, the people who spend the money are the ones who decide how much to spend. We must change that. The people who pay the bill—the taxpayers—ought to hold the pursestrings.

To do that, Congress must control the Budget.

II. Put cut-off dates on all emergency aid programs.

One great fault with present practices is that once the United States begins a spending program on an emergency basis, the "emergency" seems to become permanent. We continue spending, year after year, more and more, on programs meant to be temporary.

We should not quit necessary spending to meet emergencies, at home or abroad. But, when we begin to spend, we should know how much the total cost will be—and how long our payments will run.

Imagine your personal financial position if you were still paying on every installment purchase you ever made. You would be bankrupt by now. But when you go to buy—a new car, a new stove, a new tractor—you get the total price, make a down payment, and pay for a specific number of months. While you are carrying the payments, you tighten up on other spending—to stay within your budget.

That is common sense budgeting. The Federal Government can

save billions by establishing and holding firmly to a definite cut-off date on all emergency spending.

III. Provide incentives for Federal employees to cut spending.

At present, it is standard practice in Washington for all Federal agencies to spend every cent of the money appropriated by Congress. It's a rare agency that turns up with a surplus at the end of the fiscal year. The tradition of free spending is deep rooted.

Substantial savings could be realized if Federal employees were given bonuses—as private employees in industry often are—for any action, recommendation, or decision that resulted in a saving.

Federal employees are now rewarded solely on the basis of seniority. This bonus for economy would give them real incentive for saving. No one can save more, more quickly, than the people who spend the money.

The road back to a balanced spending program—where the Federal outgo matches the Federal income—is a long, hard one. Spending is a habit, not easily cured.

The meat-axe approach will not succeed. You may cut off some program that is unpopular, but, for every dollar saved that way, another dollar will be spent in increased appropriations for so-called "popular programs."

We have got to save money, not only on what we spend abroad, but on what we spend on ourselves here at home. We must save money on operations, save money on administration, save money by increased efficiency.

This requires thoughtful, painstaking, tireless endeavor on the part of your Congressman—to do the job right, your Congressman needs to know the job.

Young Business Men Campaigning For Frank Ikard

Wichita Falls, Sept. 5—Thirty young business and professional men of Wichita County opened a program to take the campaign of District Judge Frank Ikard for Congress to every city, community and crossroads in the 15 county district.

The men, ranging from 25 to 43 years of age, spread out over the district in groups of three's and four's with an appeal to voters to cast their ballots Saturday, Sept. 8th and to vote for Frank Ikard.

Each of the men planned to talk with personal friends and to make appeals to the general public in behalf of the 37-year-old Judge.

Meanwhile, Judge Ikard reaffirmed his pledge not to participate in any cheap political tricks or dirty name-calling in the course of his campaign for the 13th Congressional post.

Stressing his stand for a strong national defense policy as one of the best measures against the threats of war, Frank Ikard pledged to do all in his power to reduce non-military government spending in order to hold down taxes. Lashing at inflation, Judge Ikard said he would work to keep our economy strong. He condemned the cheapened dollar that made incomes of most families insufficient to meet the necessities of living. Urging continuation of the Democratic agricultural programs, Judge Ikard also pledged support of rights of veterans and aged citizens.

McFarlane Speaks At Iowa Park In Race for Congress

Iowa Park, Sept. 3—W. D. McFarlane, candidate for Congress, speaking to the large crowd present for the dedication of the City Lake, stated that "the fundamental issue in this campaign is plain: The people of this district on September 8th are called upon to decide between McFarlane who presents a record of service and a platform in keeping with the fundamental principles of the democratic program, dedicated to the establishment of equal rights for all our people, with special privileges to none, and candidates whose printed literature and critical speeches made throughout this campaign offer neither a constructive platform nor a record of performance which would justify their election and the destruction of the democratic program which has meant so much for all our people."

McFarlane specifically pointed out that the democratic program worked out while he was a member of Congress, 1933 to 1939, increased the income of the farmer and the working man tenfold and the fact that none of the candidates from Wichita and Montague Counties specifically favor the democratic program for the farmer and the worker shows that if given an opportunity they would repeal this great program which has meant so much to the prosperity of this nation.

McFarlane stressed his record of service and platform as the basis of his candidacy and pointed out his six years' seniority in Congress "would give me preferred committee assignments not available to any other candidate in this race and this would permit me to render you that much better and more efficient service."

McFarlane urged the voters to go to the polls September 8th and "select your representative in Congress as you would your lawyer, doctor, banker, or place of doing business, which is and should be based on his ability, integrity, honesty, and efficiency to now render the service in the position involved."

HOW TO STAY HEALTHY THIS WINTER

Summer tans fade, but summer health can and should be maintained right through the winter months.

A plan, based on the best medical advice, on "How To Stay Healthy This Winter" is outlined in September's Cosmopolitan Magazine. Here are the main points:

FOOD: A healthful diet is essential. Milk; vegetables; fruits; eggs; meat, fish or cheese; cereals and bread; and butter are necessary daily. The quantities vary according to age, but children require three or four glasses of milk each day.

VITAMINS: Most growing children and many adults need supplementary vitamins in winter. A large group of nutritionists and medical men, believing that an individual lacking in one vitamin is probably deficient in others, recommend multivitamin concentrates, which contain all vitamins known to be essential to the human diet. See your favorite druggist.

REST: Eight hours sleep a night is regarded as average; however, the necessary hours vary with the individual, so let your body tell you if you are getting enough sleep. Healthful sleeping requires a quiet, dark, and well-ventilated room; a hard mattress with plenty of sleeping space, and light but warm blankets.

VENTILATION: A properly ventilated home and correct cold weather dress help in preventing common colds. Too much clothing robs the skin of its natural ability to regulate body temperatures. The general rule for winter wear is: maximum warmth with minimum weight.

COLDS: Try to avoid colds by shying away from contact with persons who have them; do not share the use of toilet articles, towels, glasses or cups with anyone; wash hands before eating; shun drafts and wet clothing, and don't get overtired.
