## IS IT BAD?

"I'm getting tired of hearing about those 'rich oil companies.' I'm getting tired of the implication that for an oil company to exist is an affront, and for one to be rich is sinful," writes Ernestine Adams in The Petroleum Engineer.

"Will someone tell me what is wrong with being an oil company or with an oil company's being rich? How long do you think an oil company would last if it didn't handle a lot of money? It takes barrels of the stuff just to keep a company going."

The attacks on the oil industry, of course, are just part and parcel of the general argument that there is something disgraceful about being big and successful, and something even more disgraceful about making a profit. The fact that the oil industry has done an incredibly fine job in peace and war is conveniently overlooked. So is the fact that most of the \$7,000,000,000 a year it receives through sales goes to the tax collector and to the industry's almost 2,000,000 well paid employees. So is the fact that a very large part of what is left goes right back into the business in the form of new facilities. The U. S. oil industry now represents an investment of \$32,000,000,000—which works out to \$200 for every man, woman and child in the country. And \$12,000,000,000 of that money has been invested since World War II—in order to make certain every oil consumer is able to get the oil products he wants when he wants them.

To paraphrase a famous old saying, "If this be sinful, make the most of it." The American people consume more and better oil products than the people of any other country, and by a huge margin. They pay less for those products than do the people of any other nation. Is that supposed to be bad?

## We're Still Being Talked to Death

The truce talks at Panmunjom are reported as proceeding without acrimony, and also without progress. "The teeter-totter teeters more than it totters," says Col. William P. Nuckols, the UN information officer. At this writing, no agreement on the location of the buffer zone was in sight.

That a truce is expected however, might be read into the statement of Army's Chief of Staff, General Lawton Collins from "somewhere in Korea," that our troops "will have to stay in Korea for some time if a cease-fire is arranged."

Meantime fresh Red troops are reported coming into the enemy's lines from their apparently inexhaustible reserves in that protected Shangri-la just over the border of Mongolia. And meantime in the U. S., our baggage cars are carrying more and more Americans home, in flag-draped coffins.

## The Facts Speak For Themselves

The proponents of the Administration's compulsory Federal health insurance bill make much of the alleged fact that the cost of medical care is now excessive, and beyond the ability of the masses to pay. That is just political talk.

The American people spend more for alcohol and more for recreation than for medical care. They spend two-thirds as much for tobacco. Over a long period of years, the people have spent four per cent of their incomes for medical care—including doctors, dentists, hospitals, and the cost of drugs, appliances, etc.

It has been implied that, as a people, our standards of health are low, and that compulsory health insurance is needed to better them.

According to Dr. John W. Cline, president of the American Medical Association, "We are the healthiest large nation in the world . . . Since 1900 we have added almost 20 years to the life span in this country . . . Maternal and infant mortality are generally considered to be the best indices of the quality of medical care. Comparison of the figures of the United States with those of the rest of the world shows us at the top of the list of large countries. Certain small homogeneous countries have in the past had records surpassing ours, but the improvement in the past decade makes it improbable that they now can equal our level."

These achievements have been made under private medicine. What possible excuse could there be for accepting a system of government-dominated medicine which in its basic premises, is little different from that which has woefully reduced the standards of medical care in England?
